Below is given five provisions, one of which states the amount of processing tax, governing the swine

1. Everyone who slaughters hogs and sells the meat must pay the prothe hogs at the time it is slaughtered is the one to pay the tax.

2. A man may kill a hog produced by himself and consume it with his own household and under this con-Rotary Club Wednesday dition is not subject to processing tax.

3. If the party (in case No. 2) sells a portion of this hog he must esday at noon with the Floydada pay a processing tax on the portion that he sells. In this case he makes out forms for the entire hog and claims exemption for that he consumes at home.

4. A restaurant or hotel that slau. ghters its own hogs and feeds the pork to the boarders musst pay a processing tax, because the boarders cannot be construed as being a part of the house hold of that individual. 5. The tax is 50 cents per cwt. from November 3 to 30, \$1.00 per ewt. December 1 to 31 inclusive, \$1.50 per cwt. from January 1 to 31, inclusive, \$2.00 per cwt. after February 1, 1934.

Bank for Cooperatives Ready to Consider Applications For Farmer Loans

Houston, December 4 .- A. C. Wilams, general agent of the Farm Credit Administration of Houston andacting president of the Bank for Cooperatives, announced today that the Houston Bank for Cooperatives is ready to consider applications for oans to farmers' cooperative asso ciations. James A. Smith, treasurer and John B. Jones, secretary, who were elected at the meeting of the directors in Houston last week, took up their duties Tuesday morning. "The first two applications receiv. ed by Houston Bank for Cooperatives

were from widely separated farmers' cooperatives in Texas," said Mr. Williams. "Loans requested by these borrowing cooperatives were for effective merchandising of vegetables and alfalfa, and financing the respective organizations. The amounts of the loans applied for vary from \$10,000 to \$30,000."

The Houston Bank for Cooperaatives, capitalized at \$5,000,000, will make loans to farmers' cooperative associations to provide working capital for their business operations and provide capital to finance or refinance the purchase or lease of neces. sary buildings and equipment. This bank will make loans to farmers' cooperative purchasing organizations as well as cooperative processing and marketing organizations. The interest rate will be 4 1-2 per cent on long term loans, at this time, for buildings and equipment owned or leased by cooperatives. Short-term loans usually not to exceed 12 months, on working capital for merchandising of agricultural commodities and food products, will bear 4 per cent interest.



All persons engaged in shelling pecans should have a health certificate the same as any other food handler. The purchaser should demand that the pecans they buy shall have been shelled by such a person and handled in a sanitary manner and under supervision to lesson the chances for the spread of tuberculosis, colds, dysentery, typhoid, and other diseases.
