## Farm Loan Association Changes Policy of Handling Their Loan Business

Joe Breed, secretary treasurer of the Floydada National Farm Loan Association, received word today from Wm. Myers, Governor of the Farm Credit Administration, Washington, D. C., that Federal land bank loans and Land Bank Commission loans will be made in the future through the Federal land bank in bonds of the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation, which bonds are guaranteed by the United States Government both as to principal and interest, which will be at the rate of 3 1-4 per cent per annum for the bonds to be issued at this time. These bonds will take the place of the cash distribution in the disbursement of the unclosed loans previously approved by the Federal land banks.

The bonds of the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation, according to the statement by Governor Myers, will have behind them not only the unconditional guarantee of the Federal Government as to both principal and interest, and the capital of the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation amounting to about \$200,000,000, but also the consolidated bonds of the Federal land banks issued in exchange for the bonds of the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation and the mortgages accepted by the land bank commissioner as security for loans. Governor Myers assured Secretary Breed that the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation bonds will be an attractive investment. "They will be as readily marketable as bonds of the United States Government and they will be quoted in all of the principal markets," he continued. "Holders who have to dispose of these bonds should not sell them without first ascertaining their real market value."

The Governor particularly stressed the fact that country bankers probably will be large investors in these securities since the creditors of farmers are being refinanced may not all be in the position where they can hold the bonds so acquired and will find it necessary to sell them. Secretary Breed states that these bonds, which will be tendered to farmers' creditors in payment of the refinanced indebtedness, are "except from all Federal, State, municipal and local taxation, except surtaxes and estate, inheritance and gift taxes. They are lawful security for fifteen-day borrowings by member banks of the Federal Reserve system. They are also lawful investments for all trust, public and fiduciary funds of which the deposit or investment is under the authority or control of the Government. The payments of the interest on these bonds and the repayment of their principal are guaranteed by the United States, which means that if the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation should ever be unable to meet the payments on the bonds, the Treasury will assume such payments.

"These bonds will be issued in denominations of \$100, \$500, and \$1,000. However, amounts less than \$100 will be disbursed in cash. For example, a loan of \$965 would be made in a \$500 bond, four \$100 bonds and the rest in cash. In addition, to provide for certain debts, such as taxes which cannot be paid in bonds, cash covering the required amounts will be provided.

"Loans which have been applied for and approved, but on which the cash has not been paid out, as well as those approved by the bank in the future, will be financed on the above basis. This arrangement in no way disturbs or alters the other provisions of the loans. The interest rate on new loans will continue to be 4 1-2 per cent. for the emergency period when made through a national farm loan association and 5 per cent. when made directly by the bank."

## 8 Men Floyd County's Allotment For Third Enrollment, C. C. Corps

Burl Bedford, county relief administrator and Civil Works Administrator, received information from the state this week in regards to the third enrollment for the Civil Conservation Corps.

Floyd County's allotment in the third enrollment will be 8 men, who will be selected, starting April 2. Last year several young men between the ages of 18 and 25 years enrolled in the C. C. C. and served for several months in the camps.

C. C. C. members are allowed \$30 per month, with all clothing and food furnished. Most of this amount must be sent to dependents at home.

## Crop Prospects More Favorable Following Rain And Snow In Floyd Co.

Crop prospects are much more favorable on Floyd County farms following the rain and snow Saturday and Sunday of the past week. Approximately one and one fourth inches of moisture was received generally over Floyd County.

A good rain was received Saturday night between nine and ten o'clock, following a decided change in weather conditions Saturday. Sunday morning the temperature was much lower with considerable sleet falling, which turned to snow as the temperature became warmer. Snow continued falling until almost noon Sunday.

A good season for planting is now had all over Floyd County according to farmers in the various communities. Growing wheat will be greatly benefited by the moisture. Almost all traffic was halted on Floyd County roads by the rain and snow. Roads were very heavy and travel was made difficult. This week the weather has been warmer and streets and roads are rapidly drying so as to permit travel.

## Strychnine Tablets Caused Death of Son of Mr. and Mrs. Fawver

Bobby Glenn Fawver, fourteen month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey G. Fawver, died Thursday night about 9:30 o'clock after having swallowed several chocolate covered tablets containing strychnine and nitroglycerin.

The child found the tablets, which had been used by another member of the family for a heart ailment, in the car and swallowed them before the parents were aware that the child had them. Physicians, summoned immediately, found the baby in convulsions and attempts to save his life proved futile. Physicians said that the child swallowed 17 tablets, each containing one two-hundredth grain of nitro glycerin and one-sixtieth grain of strychnine.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the First Methodist Church. Rev. Walter P. Jennings, pastor of the First Christian Church at Lubbock, conducted the services and was assisted by Rev. I. A. Smith, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Floydada.

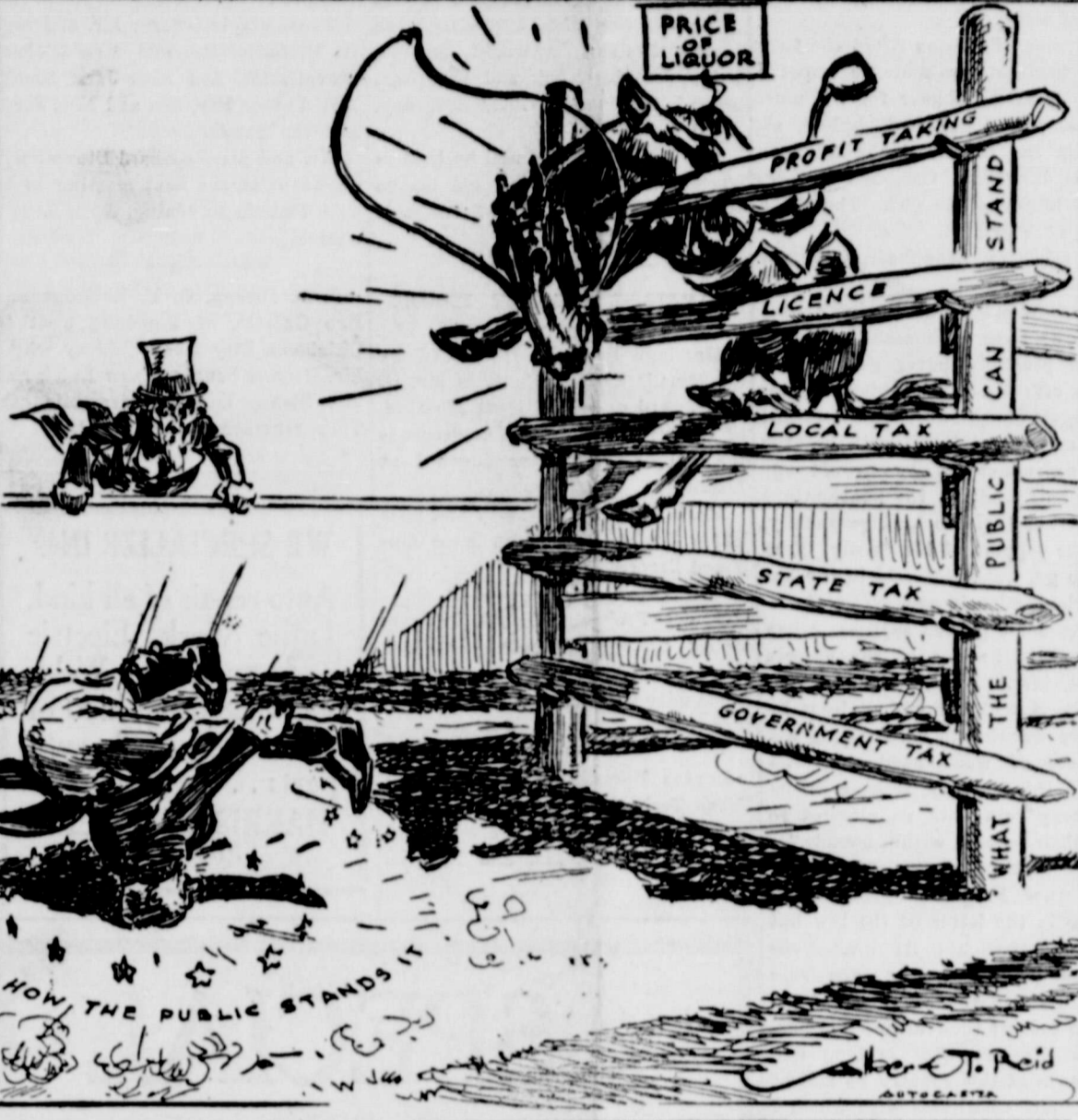
Interment was made in the Floydada cemetery. Arrangements were in charge of F. C. Harmon funeral directors, assisted by Mrs. Maud Burrus.

## Seed Loan Office Opened In Floydada; Mrs. Dona Covington In Charge

The Plainsman has just received word that an emergency crop loan office has been opened at the Court House in Floydada, and farmers desiring loans should apply between the hours of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. to Mrs. Dona Covington for blanks.

According to the regulations under which the crop loans are to be made this year, any farmer who secures a loan must obtain a statement from the county production council, where one exists, that he does not intend to increase his acreage or production in violation of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration program.

In counties where a county production has not been set up, before any application for a loan will be considered the farmer who is applying will have to give satisfactory evidence that he is co-operating with the production control program of the Agricultural Adjustment.

The maximum amount of an emergency crop loan that may be obtained by any one individual is \$250, the minimum is \$25.

Applications for loans in any amount from \$25 to \$150 may be accepted by the emergency crop loan office provided the farmer does not have sufficient security to obtain a loan elsewhere.

A farmer applying for \$150 or more must first make application to the Production Credit Association for a loan from it. Rejection of this application by the Production Credit Association will be considered sufficient evidence that other credit is not available and the applicant may then make application to the emergency crop loan office.

**ISSUES PARDON TO READHEIMER**

**Governor Upholds Slaying For 'Honor' In Giving Clemency**

Austin, March 23. — Protection against "young debauchers of womanhood" was promised by Texas woman governor, Miriam A. Ferguson, as she issued a complete pardon today to a 60-year-old father in an "honor slaying."

Governor Ferguson lifted the two-year penitentiary sentence imposed upon J. R. Readheimer for the murder of young Stokes Campbell, allegedly the father of a child born to his daughter. Campbell had refused to marry the girl. They both lived at Floydada.

In releasing Readheimer, Governor Ferguson said:

**Won't Do It Again**

"If he lives a thousand years he would probably never commit another offense like this because his youngest daughter has been ruined and no reform is possible because this defendant is now in old age and punishment in the penitentiary means but little to him, personally, but the support of his family, if he had to go, would add to the humiliation which it now suffers."

"Would his pardon suppress crime declared to be one of the objects of the law?" the governor wrote, "Maybe it will. It will at least be a grave warning to these young debauchers of womanhood who run around this country seeking whom they may ruin with no attempt to keep their passion within bounds."

**Human Limitations**

Governor Ferguson said "we all believe in the letter of the law but human nature has its limitations and as long as young men ruin young girls in this country and refuse to protect their name from passionate disgrace, just so long will the courts of this country be full of unfortunate conditions with which I am here confronted."

The governor said she was not restrained "by judicial statutes or findings of the jury", and that she was constrained "to take a broader view of the record in criminal cases, and if equitable facts demand it to relieve against punishment rendered in courts."—Amarillo Daily News.

**U. S. Marine Corps Recruiting District Of New Orleans, La.**

Applicants must produce evidence that they are in good physical condition, of good moral character and that they have been graduated from an accredited high school before their applications will be considered. If accepted applicants will be ordered to report to the New Orleans Marine office for final examination. If this is successfully passed they will be enlisted and transferred to the Marine Barracks, Parris Island, S. C. for training.

While no special assignments are promised, all men being enlisted for general service, there are many special branches, such as aviation, radio, motor transport, etc., to which men may be assigned on completion of their training, provided that vacancies exist and the applicants for such duty possess the necessary qualifications for specialized training.

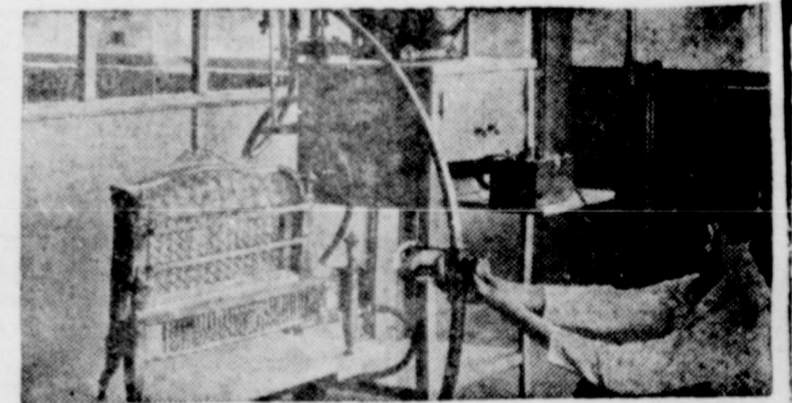

**Crop Production Loans Are Again Announced For Floyd County People**

Emergency Crop Production Loans for Floyd County will be made this year from this date. There will be a slight difference in requirements this year and the past three years. The County Committee having charge of these crop production loans are: W. Edd Brown, county chairman; O. P. Rutledge, S. W. Ross, of Floydada; Frank Perkins, chairman of Lockney division; J. I. Hammonds, H. M. Mason, of Lockney.  
Mrs. Dona Covington, with offices in the county court house at Floydada, will be in charge of the applications for these loans for Floydada and Floydada territory. Applications for Lockney and Lockney territory will be taken at the office of Frank Perkins in Lockney.  
All applications will pass through the hands of the county committee for checking and filing before being mailed to the central office at Dallas.

Briefly the requirements made of borrowers this year are as follows: Maximum loan, except in rare cases, \$250.00; minimum loan \$25.00; rate of interest 3 1/2 %; maturity date of loan October 31st, 1934; security required is first mortgage on all crops growing or to be planted or grown or harvested during the year 1934, or on livestock; landlords will be required to sign waivers as in former years; where landlord is the borrower and has tenants with interests in the crop the tenant will be required to sign waiver in favor of the landlord.

Applicant must furnish evidence of a nature that he is unable to produce a loan from any other source sufficient to meet his requirements for making the 1934 crop; must show that he is co-operating directly in the crop production control program of the national government.

Where an applicant has security to offer this year he is supposed to secure a loan from the local bank or from one of the other associations formed by the government for the purpose of establishing a source of permanent production credit. One of such government associations now has headquarters at Plainview.

The full amount of the loan this year will be sent to the borrower in a lump sum. If recording and legal fees run in excess of \$1.00 the borrower will have to pay all above the \$1.00. This does not have reference to notary fees, but recording fees only. The average cost for each applicant, including notary fees, will be about 50c so the county committee has been advised by the supervisor.

If an applicant has unsettled crop production loans for prior years, under certain circumstances these loans will bar him from securing a 1934 loan. However, these circumstances are such that few, if any, Floyd County applicants will be affected.

All interested parties are asked to file their applications at the designated headquarters as soon as possible as it is hoped that all applications may be forwarded immediately to Dallas in order to secure early approvals and get the money here for spring farm work without the delays that have been experienced in many of the former applications.
