DEEN AND NEWSOME WIN AS COUNTY JUDGE AND COUNTY ATTORNEY; MARSHALL AND McGUIRE, CASS AND NELSON, WILL BE IN SECOND PRIMARY

Tom W. Deen, long time office holder and politician, won over both his opponents, J. W. Howard, incumbent and A. H. Kreis, Dougherty farmer, in the race for County Judge in the first primary election Saturday. Winfred F. Newsome, on his first venture into politics, defeated W. E. Grimes, Sterley teacher, in the county attorney's race.

Geo. B. Marshall, Simmons University graduate, and Robert McGuire, formerly connected with local stores as clerk and more recently employed in the local relief office here, will be in the run-off for District Clerk of Floyd County. Roy O'Brien, incumbent, and J. J. Davis were eliminated in this contest.

F. C. Nelson and C. A. Cass will be panned in the run-off for County School Superintendent of Public Instruction. Price Scott, who has held the office for several years, and Floyd Blankenship, former Dougherty school teacher, were eliminated in the first election.

A. S. Cummings, present incumbent as Commissioner of Precinct 1, won easily over W. S. Williams in this campaign. In precinct 3 Wood, incumbent, won over Lackey, his only opponent for commissioner.

B. P. Woody, candidate for Justice of the Peace in Precinct 1, won easily over both his opponents, E. T. Hanks and R. C. Watson. A. E. Shelton, incumbent Weigher of Precincts 1 and 4, won from W. N. Paschall the only other candidate for this office.

T. T. Hamilton and J. P. Davidson will go into the second primary August 25 in the campaign for Constable of precinct 1.

In the offices where the incumbents were unopposed they polled practically every vote cast in the county. Voting was heavier than usual all over the county in spite of the fact that interest had not been evident just before the election.

Floyd County Gets Contract For Highway Improvement For \$33,997.00

Floyd County's Highway 28 west to Hale county line will be improved within the near future. A contract was let Monday by the State Highway Commission to E. T. Prater, of Memphis, for grading and drainage structures on a straight route to Hale county, 19.041 miles.

The total amount of Mr. Prater's contract was \$33,997.00 which amount will be used for grading and drainage and the loop of the highway through Lockney.

F. C. Stanley, of the State Highway Department arrived Friday and will be resident engineer on the project. He is officiating in the Read-himer building. Mr. Stanley has held a similar position on a Quitaque road project and for the present time will divide his time between the two places.

This contract for \$33,997.00 does not include paving. 150 working days will be allowed from the time of the starting until the job is complete. Mr. Stanley said that he expected to start work here soon and that Mr. Prater would arrive with his equipment within three or four weeks. If there is any paving done it will be let in another contract Mr. Stanley said.

Several local laborers will be employed on the project. A project for the grading and drainage of Highway 28 East to Motley county and the paving of two miles through Floydada was recently completed.

Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Strickland, and son Reid, and daughter Miss Mildred, left Tuesday morning for Wolfe City, Texas, where they are visiting with her mother, Mrs. Dollie Stone. IS IT FAIR?

TO THE VOTERS OF FLOYD COUNTY:

When I entered the race for District Judge, it was with the firm intention to make a clean campaign, and to indulge in no unfair methods, personalities, or misrepresentation. I believed that my opponents would make the campaign in the same spirit and along the same high plane.

The dignity of the high position sought justifies—deserves and demands—a clean campaign, clear of personalities and low tricks and methods.

It is a deplorable fact, however, that as the campaign drew to a close, dignity was abandoned, and honesty forgotten.

On the night of Saturday, July 28th, when a large crowd had gathered at the Bulletin Board in Floydada, the story was reported and industriously circulated by designing friends of Mr. Folley that I had called Mr. Folley from Spur and told him that, in view of the fact that he had beaten me in Dickens County 300 votes, that I would not enter the Run-off Primary. Mr. Folley knew this was not true. He knew he had not talked with me by phone. He was bound to have heard, and discussed this report, and yet, permitted, if he did not encourage his friends to continue to circulate this falsehood.

He knew, or could have known, had he, or his friends, called me, or anyone else in Spur, that he only got seven votes more in Dickens County than I received, and that I had no idea of abandoning the race for District Judge.

He knew, or could have known, that I received more votes in my home box, Dickens, than both of my opponents.

Of course, the idea behind this report, and the reason for its origin, was to get fixed in the minds of the people the idea that I was out of the race—that Mr. Folley was elected.

Mr. Folley may as well understand that I am in the field, and that he has not won the race.

Also, in the closing days of the recent campaign, Mr. Folley and his friends, in their desperation, saw fit to stoop to the low level of spreading scurrilous stories as to my private family life, as unjust as they were untrue.

A man who will attempt to deceive the voters by false propoganda before an election, will likely prove untrue after he is elected.

I believe the people of Floyd County, and this Judicial District are fair. I believe they want fair play. I believe they do not sanction, and will not tolerate unfair campaign propoganda.

In fairness, I wish to say that Judge Bain, who was eliminated in the first Primary, treated me with courtesy, and conducted his campaign on the same high plane that mine was conducted, and I admire him for it.

VALUE OF TAXABLE PROPERTY FOR CITY IS \$36,645 LESS THAN 1933

Total taxable property value was reduced in 1934 over 1933, in the City of Floydada, by \$36,645.00. A board of equalization yesterday afternoon approved the 1934 tax rolls for the City of Floydada wherein it was shown that the total taxable property value for 1934 is \$1,338,895.00.

In 1933 the total taxable value was \$1,375,540.00. Value of real property in 1933 was \$1,091,935.00, in 1934 it is \$1,059,475.00. Value of personal property 1933 \$283,605.00; 1934 \$279,420.00.

The total tax for 1934 is \$534.08 less than in 1933. Total tax for 1933 was \$20,633.10 and in 1934 is \$20,098.42. Distribution of 1934 taxes is as follows: General fund \$14,738.84; Waterworks \$2,009.83; Sewer \$2,009.85; Street \$1,330.89; Pools \$721.00. Distribution of 1933 taxes was: General fund \$15,130.94; Water Works \$2,063.30; Sewer \$2,063.30; Street \$1,375.56; Pools \$643.00.

Government Cattle Buying Program Is Under Way In County

The government's cattle buying program in Floyd County is well under way this week under the direction of Dr. C. E. Diamond, veterinarian, and Howard Mayfield, appraiser.

Dr. Diamond, whose home is in Kansas, came to Floydada from Tahoka, Lynn county where he conducted the buying program. Howard Mayfield, the appraiser, came here from Crosby county.

Mr. Mayfield and Dr. Diamond visit the farm or ranch where cattle are listed for sale. Mr. Mayfield appraises the cattle as to their value and Dr. Diamond inspects them and decides if they are fit to be shipped. Cattle not fit to be shipped or used for food purposes are shot and the owners dispose of the carcasses.

About 40 percent of the cattle bought by the government have been shot it was estimated. This average is extremely high, assistant county agent Porter said, because a great number are small calves which could not stand to be shipped. About 1000 cattle were bought the first four days and of this amount upward of 400 were shot.

Dr. Diamond and Mr. Mayfield are working at Blanco, Harmony, Allmon today and Friday. They will be in Dougherty, Antelope sections Saturday and Monday. Tuesday and part of Wednesday will be spent at Hillcrest and Campbell and Wednesday afternoon and Saturday will be spent in the Floydada district.

Cattle fit to be shipped are moved to concentration points and loaded by labor through the Floyd County Relief Administration. The cattle buying program is handled through the county agent's office. The veterinarian and appraiser are routed to the general purpose committee in each community and this committee in turn routes them to the farmers or stockmen who have cattle listed for sale.

Blank forms, to be filled out by those who wish to sell cattle, are becoming exhausted and if no blanks are received within the next few days the program may be held up until the blanks arrive.

Alton B. Chapman Wins In District Attorney's Race Over Maxey

Alton B. Chapman, county attorney of Dickens County, won over Tony B. Maxey, Floyd County candidate, in the district attorney's race by a majority of 2228 votes in Saturday's first primary election, according to un-official returns.

Mr. Maxey carried Floyd County with a lead of 65 votes, and Mr. Chapman carried the remaining three counties. Following is how the counties voted:

Billie Yearwood Died Thursday Night From Accidental Gunshot Wounds

Billie Yearwood, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Yearwood, was fatally injured Thursday night when he was accidentally and unintentionally shot by Harold Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. Fred Brown, while the two boys were playing near the Yearwood home on West Kentucky street.

Several of the children in the neighborhood had been playing along the sidewalk on skates and scooters during the evening. Harold Brown, 13, had procured a 32-20 Colts Revolver belonging to his father and thought he had removed all the shells before taking the gun with him to engage in a game with the other children. While playing he snapped the gun, while near Billie Yearwood, and one shell which Harold had failed to remove exploded the bullet striking Billie in the right upper part of the chest, ranging through the body emerging from the lower left back, it was reported.

Mr. Yearwood, hearing the shot, went to see what had occurred and carried Billie to the hospital. The accident occurred about 9:45 o'clock. The accident victim and Harold Brown were close friends and often played together with other children nearby. J. R. Maddox, justice-of-the-peace, conducted an inquest and returned a verdict of accidental and unintentional death.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That there be added to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be numbered Section 2-A and to have five (5) lettered subdivisions and which sections shall read as follows:

Section 2-A.

(a) General management and control of the affairs of the County shall hereafter be vested in the Commissioners Court, provided that in the exercise of powers not specifically granted to the Commissioners Court by the Constitution and Amendments thereto, the Court shall be subject to the authority of the Legislature of the State, and the Court shall also be subject to all general laws of the State now in force not in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment until such laws are modified or repealed.

(b) All duties heretofore performed by the Clerk of the District Court and the County Clerk shall hereafter be performed by an officer to be known as Record Clerk; all duties heretofore performed by the County Tax Assessor and the County Tax Collector shall hereafter be performed by one officer known as Tax Clerk; and in the counties where the sheriff performs the duties of the Tax Collector he may hereafter perform the duties of the Tax Clerk. The Record Clerk and the Tax Clerk shall be elected to hold office for a term of two (2) years and until their successors shall be elected and qualified. The Commissioners Court shall have authority to combine the office of County Treasurer and the office of County Surveyor, or to combine either, or both, of said offices with any county office. Within the maximum and minimum limits prescribed by the Legislature the Commissioners Court shall have authority to fix the compensation of all county and precinct officers except County Auditor, County Judge and County Commissioners. The Legislature shall fix the compensation of District Judges, District Attorneys, County Judges and the County Commissioners and may provide for a County auditor and prescribe his duties and fix his compensation and the number and compensation of his assistants. The Commissioners Court shall fix the compensation of and determine the number of deputies, assistants and clerical personnel of all precinct officers and county officers except the county auditor.

(c) City and county officers and employees may, in addition to their duties as such city and county officers or employees, be required to perform such other similar duties for cities, towns and districts within the county, or for the county, as may be mutually agreed upon and contracted for between the Commissioners Court of said county and the governing board, or boards, of such cities, towns and districts; and the cost of such service shall be provided for in said contracts and paid by such county, cities, towns or districts into the Treasury of the county or city, town or district, as provided for in said contract. All such contracts shall be approved by the Attorney General of this State and such contracts shall not cover a period longer than two (2) years.

(d) The Legislature shall have authority, by general law, to provide for complete forms of county government and organizations different from that provided for in this Constitution to become effective in any county when submitted in such manner as may be prescribed by the Legislature to the qualified voters of such county in an election held for such purpose and approved by a majority of the qualified voters voting in said election. Provided, however, that no such law shall impair the authority of the Commissioners Court to determine the compensation of county and precinct officers other than the County Auditor, to fix the number of assistants, deputies, and clerical personnel which said officers may employ; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations as to particular and total tax levies for any of all county purposes; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations on counties to incur public debts.

(e) In any and all cases where provisions of the Constitution of this State are in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment, the provision of this Amendment (Section 2-A, Article IX) shall control; provided, however, should any county adopt a Home Rule Charter under authority of any provisions of the State Constitution or Amendment thereto, this Amendment shall not be applicable to such county.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State,

qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article IX of the State Constitution by adding Section 2-A thereto, giving the Commissioners Court general management and control of county affairs, and authorizing the Legislature to provide more economical forms of county government and different than as now provided by law."

"Against the Amendment of Article IX of the State Constitution by adding Section 2-A thereto, giving the Commissioners Court general management and control of county affairs, and authorizing the Legislature to provide more economical forms of county government, and different than as now provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed amendment.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 61, which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000), or more, according to the then last preceding Federal census, shall hereafter be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties of this State the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the then last preceding Federal census, the Commissioners' Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis. All fees earned by district, county or precinct officers shall be paid into the County Treasury where earned, for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid to the County Treasury, when collected, and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis, such fees may be retained by such officer, or paid into the Treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, County Surveyors and Public Weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified voters of this State and the next general election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adding Section 61 to Article XVI, abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether County officers in counties containing less than twenty thousand (20,000) population shall be compensated on a fee basis or a salary basis; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court in all counties of this State to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adding Section 61 to Article XVI, abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether County officers in counties containing less than twenty thousand (20,000) population shall be compensated on a fee basis or a salary basis; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court in all counties of this State to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed amendment.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 41

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5, of Article XI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent (2½%) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two per cent (2%) thereon; provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every twelve (12) months."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934; at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months;" and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 16, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to the taxation for county and school district purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned; provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon the values fixed by the State Tax Board and that the values fixed for school district purposes shall not exceed the values fixed for county purposes on the same land; and provided that the University of Texas from the University Available Fund, shall remit annually to each of the counties and school districts in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county and school district purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located."

Lice Are Common on Young Cattle

Use Raw Linseed Oil Before Pasturing, Recommended for Control.

By C. L. Blackman, Specialist in Dairy Husbandry, Ohio State University, WNU Service.

Before cattle go to pasture in the spring is the best time to rid them of lice. Raw linseed oil is the best material to use.

The oil should be brushed thoroughly into the coat and all over the animal, and then thoroughly brushed out. The lice, creeping through the coat of the animal, become covered with a thin film of oil which clogs their breathing organs. The process repeated a second time ten days later kills the lice which hatch after the first treatment.

A day or so after the treatment the cattle take on a dirty appearance. This is remedied by rubbing the animal with a damp cloth dipped into warm water. The treatment must be followed by careful grooming to remove loose, matted hair.

Lice are found most commonly on the younger cattle, which are not so carefully groomed as the milking herd. They concentrate usually on the shoulders, the withers, and about the neck.

Cattle that rub against fences and trees are seeking relief from itching caused by lice. So are cattle that scratch their heads and necks with their hind feet. Dirt on these parts of the body, put there by the scratching, is almost a certain indication of the presence of vermin.

Brush Dams Last 3 Years; Other Types More Durable

To farmers who would like to know how long temporary check dams built in gullies for control of soil erosion will last, the United States bureau of agricultural engineering supplies information derived from experience.

Check dams made of brush will last from two and one-half to three years. This is time enough for vegetation to grow on the silt accumulated in the gullies and to prevent erosion of the soil.

Pole dams, which are more efficient in catching silt than brush dams, decay fairly rapidly but will last about a year longer than brush dams. After standing up for three or more years, pole dams will sometimes give way during a series of heavy rains.

Time seems to solidify rock dam construction by adding a heavy blanket of silt and grass and similar debris. Rock dams last longer than any other type of temporary check dam.

Guard Against Insects

With the likelihood that market values of many commodities, particularly food crops produced on farms, will rise as a result of the NRA, AAA and other governmental activities, it is more important than ever that such stored products be protected against destructive insects, says M. D. Farrar, research entomologist of the Illinois state natural history survey. In a statement to the extension service of the College of Agriculture, University of Illinois, Farrar points out that it is a quite common experience for insects to be found feeding on stored food products after they have been held in storage a few weeks to several months. Dried beans, peas, apples or fruits of all kinds are particularly susceptible, if stored in a warm place.

Keep Ditches Clean

No tile drain is better than its outlet. During the winter months obstructions have accumulated along most ditches. A stump, log, or stick may have lodged across the channel. Grass, weeds and smaller sticks become lodged against such obstructions, forming a dam across the stream. Sediment carried by water will be deposited above such natural dams, submerging any drains that enter the stream near by. Frequent inspection of a ditch will reveal such troubles.

Agricultural Briefs

South Africa expects its 1934 wheat crop to total 3,001,000 bags.

More than 500,000 tons of butter was consumed in Germany last year.

This country produces nearly 90 per cent of the lard that enters world commerce.

Because of the danger of choking it is usually advised to slice or pulp roots before they are fed to cattle.

The simplest way to feed salt to cows is to place a block of rock salt in the manger where they can lick it as they choose.

Grasshopper egg pods contain from 20 to 120 eggs and a single female will deposit about 20 pods. One egg pod per square foot over a field means at least 25 young grasshoppers per square foot.

Soy Bean Responds to Soil Sweetener

Limestone, When Added to Manure, Found to Greatly Boost Yield.

By C. J. Badger, College of Agriculture, University of Illinois.—WNU Service.

"Believe it or not," soy beans which are often spoken of as an acid tolerant crop will produce from two to five times as much hay to the acre, when given the benefit of limestone on some of the light-colored soils.

Evidence showing the value of an application of the "soil sweetener" is revealed in the results of four years of tests at two soil experiment fields of rather low productive levels maintained by the state university.

At one field, where the soil is a light gray silt loam, the use of manure gave a yield of 340 pounds of soy bean hay to the acre, but when limestone was applied in addition to manure, the yield of bean hay was 1,700 pounds an acre. The field that received no treatment returned about the same as where manure had been spread. The increase resulting from limestone, when it was applied in addition to manure, amounted to 1,360 pounds, or more than a half ton to the acre.

Another experiment field consisting of a yellow-gray silt loam gave somewhat better yields. Soil with no treatment returned 1,040 pounds of soy bean hay to the acre; the manure treatment improved the yield to an average of 1,420 pounds, and applications of both manure and limestone jumped the harvest to 2,980 pounds, or practically a ton and a half of hay to the acre.

The response to manure over no treatment amounted to 380 pounds, while the response to manure and limestone over manure alone was 1,500 pounds an acre. However, manure and limestone gave returns of 1,940, or nearly a ton to the acre, over the plot which did not receive any treatment.

Crested Wheatgrass Gets Good Start, Lasts Longer

One reason why forage specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture are enthusiastic over the merits of crested wheatgrass for planting the drier lands taken out of wheat production this year is the fact that this grass is able to grow at lower temperature than most grasses. Because of this, crested wheatgrass gets an early start in the spring and is one of the last grasses to become dormant in the fall.

A stockman who has a pasture of crested wheatgrass is fairly sure to have good grazing for stock for a week or ten days earlier than he otherwise would, and he may be able to stretch the grazing season again in the fall. The advantages of deferred grazing to allow pastures and ranges to recuperate after intensive use are becoming better known. Crested wheatgrass adds a new advantage of a longer season of keeping cattle on grass. Crested wheatgrass is also distinctively drought resistant and will endure extreme cold.

Plumpness in Oats

How much hull there is in a sample of oats cannot be judged by the plumpness of the kernels. This was shown by tests made by the Minnesota agricultural experiment station, which in 1930, '31 and '32, tested several recommended varieties of oats to determine hull percentages. There was very close agreement between results from tests at University farm and at Crookston, the average of all tests showing the following hull percentages: Rainbow, 25.1 per cent; Minrus, 26.1; Gopher, 26.6; Iogold, 27, and Anthony, 30.2. The studies were made because of common opinion among farmers that varieties with plump-looking grains, such as Anthony and Gopher, have less hull than those like Minrus and Minota with grains of thinner appearance.

Agricultural Hints

Crop roots cannot penetrate deeply into a soil logged with water.

New York state plans to provide 25,000,000 trees for planting on waste lands this year.

The white runner duck, a native of Malay, has a breed history which dates back more than two thousand years.

Farmers in the north of England are turning from plowing to dairying, and farms of from 50 to 75 acres are in demand.

Owing to the inelasticity of demand, small crops of potatoes consistently yield larger incomes to farmers than large crops.

Production credit associations to make short-term loans to farmers have been organized for more than half of the entire country.

Early oats have proved quite definitely superior to wheat as a companion, or "nurse," crop for alfalfa.

Emergency Feed Loan Office Established at Grand Jury Room, Court House

There has been established at the grand jury room, court house in Floydada an office where applications for emergency feed loans will be received, field supervisor Fred N. Warren announced this week.

Applications for loans will be accepted from farmers and stockmen for the purchase of feed for farm and range livestock and to plant forage crops in Floyd County, which has been designated as emergency drought area. Miss Wilma Fuller is in charge of the local office and the county committee consists of W. Edd Brown, chairman; S. W. Ross, O. P. Rutledge, Clifford Rhoades.

In discussing the regulations the field supervisor pointed out that applications can be accepted only from applicants who have no means or other sources of credit enabling them to undertake the production of a forage crop or crops or to purchase feed for their livestock.

Loans will be advanced in monthly installments, with a supplemental application necessary for each month's requirements.

The lien securing the promissory note given will be subject to non-disturbance agreement to be executed by lien holders, if any, who must agree to take no steps to enforce the payment or collection of any claim against the borrower nor dispossess him of any property until January 1, 1936.

Applications must be submitted to the emergency crop and feed loan committee for Floyd County in which the applicant's livestock is located or forage crops to be planted.

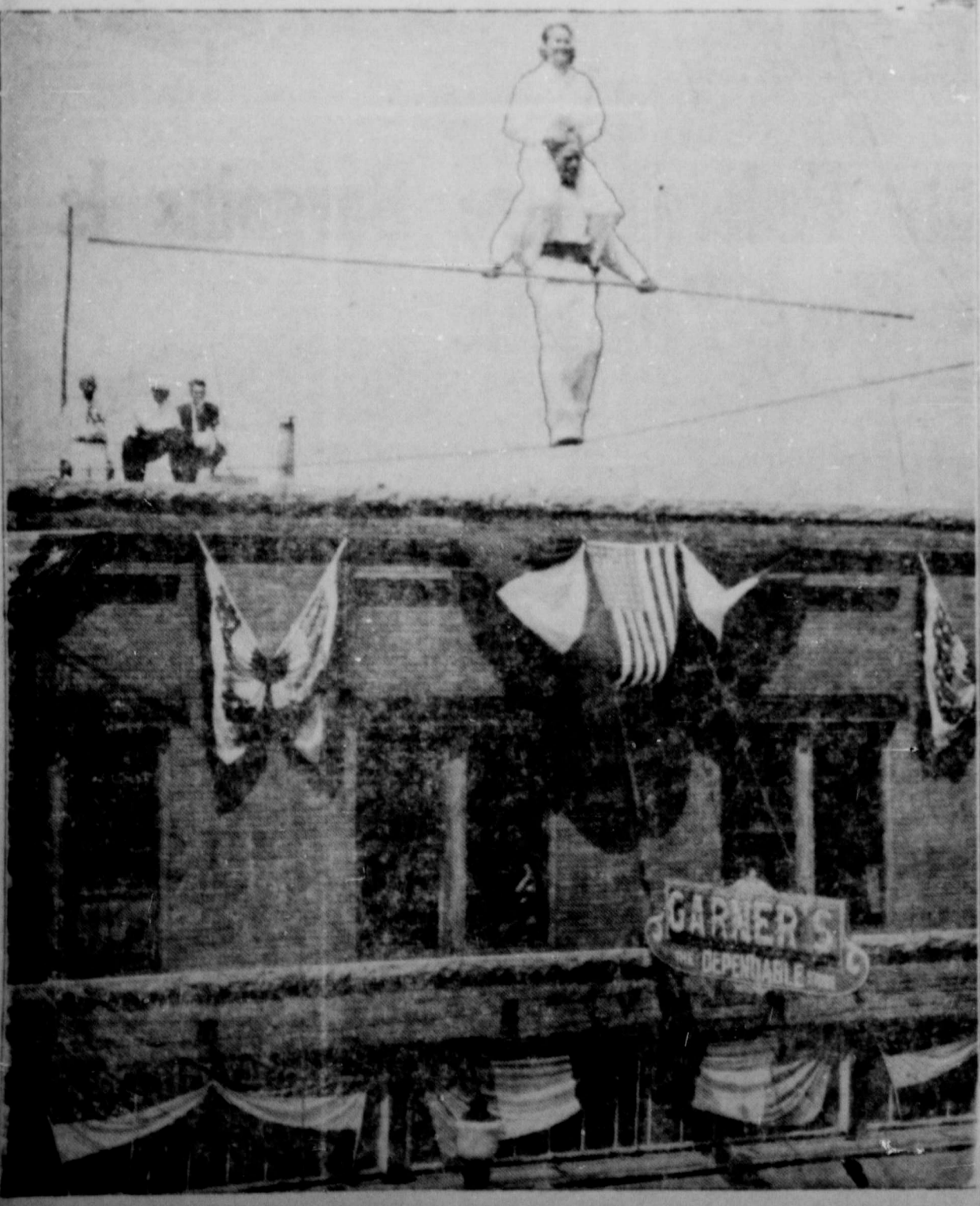
