Floyd County Farmers Favor Corn-Hog Contracts, Other Contracts Separate

Last week a pool was taken of all the farmers in the United States who signed Corn-Hog contracts with the government to determine whether or not they desired these contracts for next year.

In Floyd County the pool was taken Friday night in each school district. Of the three hundred and ten contract signers in this county one hundred and fifty three voted Friday night. One hundred and eight votes were cast in favor of extending the contract and forty five votes cast in opposition.

The second question voted upon was concerning the desirability of having one contract to cover all the grain and livestock on a farm instead of having several separate contracts. Of those voting on this question thirty seven were in favor of the proposal and fifty six were opposed to it.

Porcher Receiving Tax Exemption Certificates For Entry Into Pool

The tax exemption certificates are now being received for entry into the National Pool by J. S. Porcher, at the County Agent's office.

It is reported by the agricultural adjustment administration that there is an active demand for these certificates in the eastern part of the cotton belt.

The National Pool, who are handling the certificates, will probably be open until about the end of the ginning season but it is suggested that those who care to enter the pool should do so in the near future. If the pool should run short of certificates it is possible that some of the eastern cotton growers would pay the tax instead of waiting for the certificates.

Wood From Floyd County School to be Used in Construction of Gavel

Wood from the Campbell school in Floyd County will be used in the construction of a gavel to be used by Charles L. Ross, president of the New Mexico Teachers Association, when he presides at the fall session of that body on October 30th and November 1.

Mr. Ross, present superintendent of the Fort Sumner, New Mexico schools, taught his first school in Floyd County at Campbell in the year 1913-1914. He taught the following year, 1914-1915 at Campbell and in 1915-1916 taught at Hillcrest in this county. In the latter three months of the 1916-1917 term he taught at Baker.

Following Mr. Ross's election as president of the New Mexico State Teachers Association, friends hit upon the idea of constructing a gavel from wood of schools which marked milestones in Mr. Ross's life and teaching career. A small piece of wood from each building will be used. Wood from the first school he attended, the first he taught and the remainder from New Mexico schools. Mr. Ross spent several years in Floyd County and married a Floyd County girl. Several years ago he moved to New Mexico and has advanced far in the teaching profession.

Woodrow Hill Seriously Injured In Auto Collision Saturday Morning

Woodrow Hill was seriously injured Saturday morning when the car in which he was riding in company with four other young men from Floydada collided with another car on the highway west of Lockney.

Hill, with Ernest Morrison, Herbert Morrison, Raymond Baker and Ted Morrison, was traveling east in a Model T Ford touring car which was owned by Ernest and Herbert Morrison and driven by the former, when their machine crashed head-on into a Model A Ford coupe. The coupe was occupied by two young men from Plainview and a Lockney girl. The accident occurred between 12 and 1 o'clock Saturday morning on the highway one and one-half miles west of Lockney.

According to one of the boys from Floydada the accident occurred when drivers of both cars were blinded by dust and glare from headlights of another car that had just passed. All of the boys in the Model T Ford, with the exception of Ted Morrison, were knocked unconscious. Hill sustained severe head injuries, major of which was a hole in the skull. Baker sustained a broken nose and severe gashes about the face. Herbert Morrison's arm was badly sprained. Occupants of both cars were badly bruised and gashed.

Both cars were badly damaged, the coupe overturning from the force of the head-on collision.

Motorists, arriving on the scene soon after the accident, rushed the injured to Lockney for medical attention. Hill later was transferred to the Plainview hospital where his condition remains serious.

Seven From Floyd County Attended Road Meeting In Plainview

Seven from Floyd County attended a West Texas mass meeting in Plainview Friday afternoon for the purpose of discussing a unified effort to secure paving of the highway gaps in the South Plains and the Panhandle.

Members of the Panhandle delegation were in favor of asking for a new highway commission to succeed Judge W. R. Ely, of Abilene, but the South Plains delegation voted against such an action and outvoted the Panhandle delegates.

A resolutions committee was appointed to draft resolutions for the paving of the gaps in the plains highways.

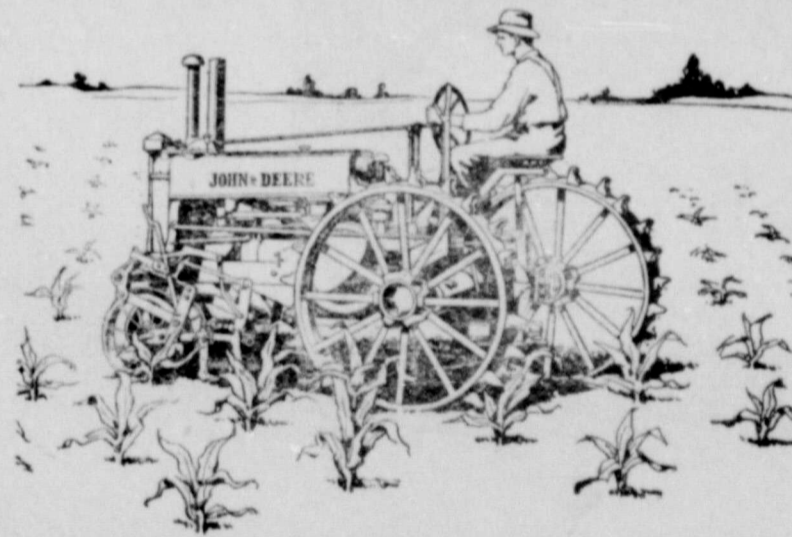
