It is reported by the agricultural adjustment administration that there is an active demand for these certificates in the eastern part of the cotton belt.

The National Pool, who are handling the certificates, will probably be open until about the end of the ginning season but it is suggested that those who care to enter the pool should do so in the near future If the pool should run short of certificates it is possible that some of the eastern cotton growers would pay the tax instead of waiting for the certificates.




