Business has a long list of uncertainties to consider and monetary policy is at the head of the list. It's no question that economists think that our fiscal policy will get tighter, because the Administration is committed to a slowing in the growth in federal spending.

But the question is what the monetary authorities will do to restrict credit. In fact most of the experts are confused about what the Federal Reserve is doing at the moment. Statistics don't shed any light on what the Fed will do.

WASTE MAKES WASTE
Trite, but true, especially when granting credit. Merchants, remember that a quick call to your credit bureau can save you money in the long run.

The money managers boosted the discount rate an extraordinary one percentage point a month ago. It is now at a record 9 1/2%. This kicked the prime rate up to 11 1/2%. It suggests a tightening noose for credit.

Our economic activity continues to advance at a moderate pace. The economy remains strong and the demand for credit continues. This suggests that we are really in a lull before the fiscal storm. If this is the case, then nervousness in international money market will force the Federal Reserve to tighten up on interest rates again.

There have been many recession forecasts lately. These forecasts figure that inflation and the need to defend the dollar will not only force interest rates higher, but will cause a "mini-money crunch." These forecasts predict a prime rate of 13% within the next 90 days, which will set a new record. The previous high was 12% in 1973.

The Federal Reserve Chairman remains opposed to credit controls, but the Chairman of the Council on Wage & Price Stability is raising the possibility of controls on borrowing as an additional means of curbing inflation.

Social Security tax rate will be increased in 1979

Workers may notice a higher deduction for their social security when they get their paychecks in 1979, a social security spokesman said recently.

This is because the social security tax rate for 1979 will be 6.13 percent, compared with 6.05 percent in 1978, the representative explained. The increase amounts to an additional 8 cents on every \$100 in pay.

In addition to paying the higher rates, workers who earn more than \$17,700 will pay the tax on a larger share of their income in 1979.

The maximum amount of earnings subject to social security taxes in 1979 is \$22,900, compared with the \$17,700 maximum in 1978.

People who earn \$22,900 or more in 1979 will pay \$1,403.77 in social security taxes, which is \$332.92 more than the maximum payable in 1978.

But they also can count on higher social security benefits later, the representative said. Monthly benefit amounts are based on average covered earnings so higher earnings generally mean higher benefit rates.

Employers match the social security taxes paid by employees on a dollar for dollar basis. The increases in the tax rate and the amount of earnings taxable in 1979 were part of a new financing package enacted by Congress in 1977 to keep the social security system on a sound footing until well into the next century.

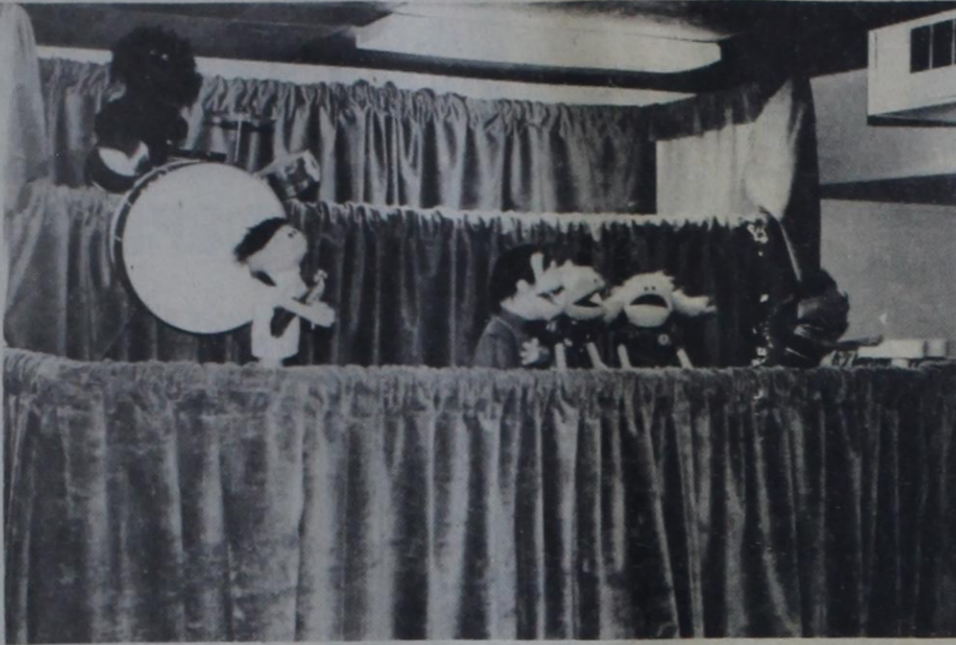

Safe driving is urged in New Year period

Operation Motorcade will be in effect for the New Year period beginning at 6 p.m. Friday Dec. 28 and will end at 11:59 p.m. Monday Jan. 1, with a prediction from the Texas Department of Public Safety that 35 lives will be lost in traffic accidents.

It had been predicted that 44 persons would lose their lives during the Christmas period of Operation Motorcade and that figure was exceeded.

Every available trooper from the DPS will be on duty throughout the holidays according to Maj. C.W. Bell, regional commander. These troopers will be on full alert on all highways in the area to control traffic, lower speeds and get the drinking driver off Texas roads.

Excessive speed and the

lack of control of speed will be great factors in traffic deaths. In repeated accidents it has been proved that any speed above 55 will take a large toll in human lives. Fifty-five miles per hour is the maximum speed allowed by law.

Bell urges every driver to do his part this holiday period by not drinking and driving. There is a strong opinion among traffic safety leaders that at least 50 per cent of all lives lost in traffic are caused by the drinking driver.

Texas reached a record high of 3,698 traffic deaths in the year 1977, an increase of 14 percent over 1976.

Slow down and practice defensive driving to stay alive.

The livestock owner must have suffered a substantial loss in the livestock feed normally produced on his farm for eligible livestock.

CARDS — Don't forget to turn in your cotton production cards. These records are needed to complete your 1979 farm yields. The yield for the farms not submitting records will be zero.

WOOL AND UNSHORN LAMBS — The 1978 wool marketing year ends Dec. 31. Application for wool or unshorn lambs sold in 1978 must be filed by Jan. 31, 1979.
