Funeral services for John Stewart Solomon, 75, Texas pioneer and justice who died at 3 o'clock Sunday morning were held from the First Methodist Church at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon. Rev. I. A. Smith. pastor, assisted by Rev. R. B. Waldon, had charge of the funeral services.

Interment in the Floydada cemetery was directed by the Masonic order, with which he had been affiliated many years. The aged justice had been in ill health the past two years.
