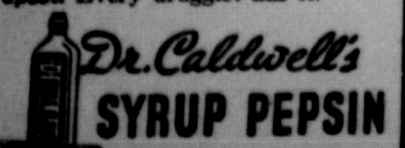

Several Cases Disposed
Of In District Court

Several cases were disposed of in
district court this week. Judge A.
J. Foley of the judicial district court
of Floydada, who was disqualified to
serve on the bench here this week,
exchanged benches with Judge E. C.
Neison, Jr., of the 47th judicial dis-
trict court at Amarillo.

The case of the State vs. C. B.
Bland was postponed pending the re-
covery of the defendant who cut his
throat a few minutes before he was
to appear in court Monday morning.
He was charged with Merle Brandt,
who was given a five year term in
district court last week.

The case of H. W. Shields, (color-
ed) who resides on Lee Street here,
was tried before the court Monday
morning, without a jury, and given a
five year suspended sentence. He
was charged with murder. The case
was tried last year and ended with a
hung jury.

Wayman Holloway of Hereford,
was given a five year suspended
sentence Tuesday. He was charged
with the robbery of wheat from Jim
Taylor, who lives near Floydada.
He entered a plea of guilty. The
case was tried before the court with-
out the services of a jury.

The jury has been dismissed for
the remainder of the week.

Lockney Monday night. The score at
the end of the game was 29 and 27
in favor of the locals. Floydada
made the first field goal, but Lake-
view led throughout the game until
the last three minutes of play when
Sissions, Harrison and Lider made
field goals to win the game by a
margin of two points. The winning
score was made by Lider. The ball
had just passed through the goal
when the whistle was sounded.

Saturday evening. The Lakeview
team defeated the locals to the tune
of 37 and 22.

By winning the county champi-
onship, this gave Floydada the right
to enter the district meet at Lubbock,
February 22 and 23.

Floydada Prisoner Cuts
Throat In County Jail

C. B. Bland, a prisoner in the
Floyd County jail, slashed his throat
with a safety razor blade Monday
morning a few minutes before he
was scheduled to appear in district
court on a charge of robbery with
firearms. Fellow prisoners inter-
fered, it was said and kept Bland
from killing himself.

He is expected to recover in a very
short time.

District Judge A. J. Foley, an-
nounced that Bland's case had been
postponed indefinitely pending the
recovery of the prisoner. He was
indicted with Merle Brandt, who was
given a five year term in the state
penitentiary last week in the same
court.

They were charged with the rob-
bery of W. S. Rexrode and family
as they were returning from church.
Exactly one month elapsed between
the time of the reported robbery and
the sentence of Brandt.

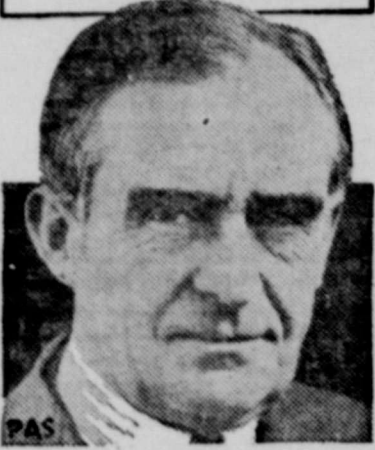
