COUNTY SCHOOL STUDENTS TO GATHER FOR LEAGUE MEET

TENNIS AND PLAYGROUND BALL CONTESTS, SATURDAY, MARCH 23

One-Act Plays, Floydada and Lockney Monday, March 25; Junior and Senior, Class A and Class B, Declamations, Choral Singing, Debate and Literary Events Friday, March 29; Track Events, Floydada and Lockney, Saturday, March 30.

Floyd County Rural School students and those from Floydada and Lockney will throng Floydada Saturday and part of next week when the annual County Interscholastic League Meet will be held. All events with the exception of volleyball will be held at the Floydada High School building. The volleyball games will be held at the Andrews ward gymnasium.

The meet will begin Saturday, March 23, when the tennis and playground ball contests will be held. The tennis finals will be played off in the three classifications, A, B, and C.

On Monday evening, the one act plays will be given. Those seeking honors in this event are the two class A schools, Floydada and Lockney.

The literary events will all be held on Friday and Friday evening at the high school building. Junior and senior class A and class B declamation, choral singing, debate, extemporaneous speaking, music memory, picture memory, essay writing, spelling and numerous other literary events will be held on this day.

\$100,000,000 UP FOR SOUTHWEST HOME LOANS

FEDERAL BANK ARRANGES TO AID BORROWERS

Little Rock Branch of FHA to Accommodate Home Owners. Will Help Builders. Loans on New Houses and Refinanced Mortgages to be Accepted.

Dallas, March 17.—William H. Clark Jr., southwest regional director of the federal housing administration, announced today that the Federal Home Loan bank of Little Rock, Ark., has made available more than \$100,000,000 for rediscounting FHA insured loans on new homes and refinanced mortgages under title 2 of the housing act.

Conference Held

"An agreement was reached in Little Rock yesterday," he said, "at a conference with officials of the Home Loan bank here, to accept for rediscount insured mortgages made under title 2 of the housing act, from the 200 members of the Federal Home Loan bank system in the southwest region. This is the first home loan bank in the United States to make such an agreement, and it means that any citizen of the Southwest who wants to build a home, or refinance the existing mortgage on his present home, if he can meet the very reasonable requirements of the housing administration, will have available ample capital to finance the enterprise.

"More than a hundred of the 200 financial institutions affiliated with the home loan bank system office in Little Rock are located in Texas. By April 1 there should be available in every sizeable community in the southwest region, a qualified lending institution, ready to handle FHA title 2 loans.

50 Institutions

"More than 50 financial institutions, with combined assets of over \$125,000,000, will have completed qualification by that date. These include banks, insurance companies, thrift and home savings institutions, and mortgage companies. The home loan bank is prepared to rediscount their mortgages at 90 cents on the dollar, on either a long or short term basis."

He said favorable action was anticipated in the Texas legislature on a bill which would permit full participation by all classes of thrift and home financing institutions in the state in the housing program, adding more millions to the available funds.
