## 5-year-old Dimmitt girl drowns after slipping into lake near Lubbock

Lake near Lubbock turned tragic for one Dimmitt family Saturday when a
5 -year-old girl slipped and fell into 5 -year-old girl slipped and fell into
the chilly water. Felicia Elaine Vasquez and her
parents, Jessie and Melba Vasquez
of Dimmitt, were walking along a nature trail at the lake Saturday afternoon when Felicia slipped and fell
into the water, which was about 10 feet deep.
The girl was pulled from the icy water approximately 40 minutes after the accident, and paramedics at-
tempted to resuscitate her. She was airlifted to University Medical Cen-
ter in Lubbock, where she was proter in Lubbock, where she w
nounced dead at 6:57 p.m. According to Alton Chapman of

Jessie Vasquez jumped in and trie to rescue his daughter, but was unable to find her.

fields recently. Pea aphid adults are bright green and have long legs. They are about one-eighth of an inch long. Adults may be winged or wingless. Pea aphids generally cause the greatest damage in the spring and
