Production Credit Association to Hold Meet In Amarillo July 12

Mr. Olan Ridings, Lockney, director of the Plainview Production Credit Association at Plainview will leave Friday morning for Amarillo where he will attend a group meeting for directors of Production Credit Associations to be held there July 12. The directors will meet with the officers and field representatives of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston, the parent organization, which provides the capital and supervises the operations of Production Credit Associations in Texas.

According to Mr. Ridings, it is believed desirable to bring boards of directors and dissecretary-treasurers of Production Credit Associations together in groups during the summer in order to make them more familiar with the Farm Credit Administration, the operation and capital structure of the Production Credit Corporation and to review the operation of the associations during the first part of 1935.

General discussion of production credit problems, comparison of operating methods and exchange of mutually helpful ideas will be the order of business at the meeting, and plans will be made to take care of the production credit needs for farmers and ranchers during the next producing season.

Associations to be represented at the Amarillo meeting will include the following: Lubbock, Memphis, Plainview, Canadian Valley and Amarillo. Similar meetings of other groups will be held at San Angelo, San Antonio and Corpus Christi during the month of July for the directors in the territory surrounding these key cities, Mr. Ridings said.

Congressman Mahon Makes Appeal For Veterans' Hospital

Congressman George Mahon appeared before the Federal Board of Hospitalization Friday, making an appeal for a Veterans' Administration Hospital for West Texas. Hearings are being held by the Board of Hospitalization to determine the need for facilities throughout the country.

The proposed hospital would be a general medical and surgical facility. It would include approximately 500 patient beds. Construction would be under the direction of the Veterans' Administration, but it is estimated that an expenditure of approximately \$1,000,000 would be involved.

Facts presented by Mr. Mahon at the hearing disclose that there is a larger area centering in West Texas which does not now have access to a general medical facility than exists in any other section of the country. This area would include approximately 1,200,000 people and an estimated number of veterans exceeding 36,000. There are several facilities in Texas now, but one of them is used wholly for general medical purposes. There are only 235 beds available for this type of cases in the entire state, and these serve only 29.8 per cent of the general medical and surgical type cases arising within the state.

Mr. Mahon emphasized the need for the hospital from the standpoint of service for the veterans in the area who need medical attention, from the standpoint of the cost of transportation, and from the standpoint of its value in establishing definite medical records for individual claims with the veterans' administration.

The Federal Board of Hospitalization would choose the exact location, would a hospital be authorized for West Texas.

Automobile Collision Causes Injury to Floydada Children Monday

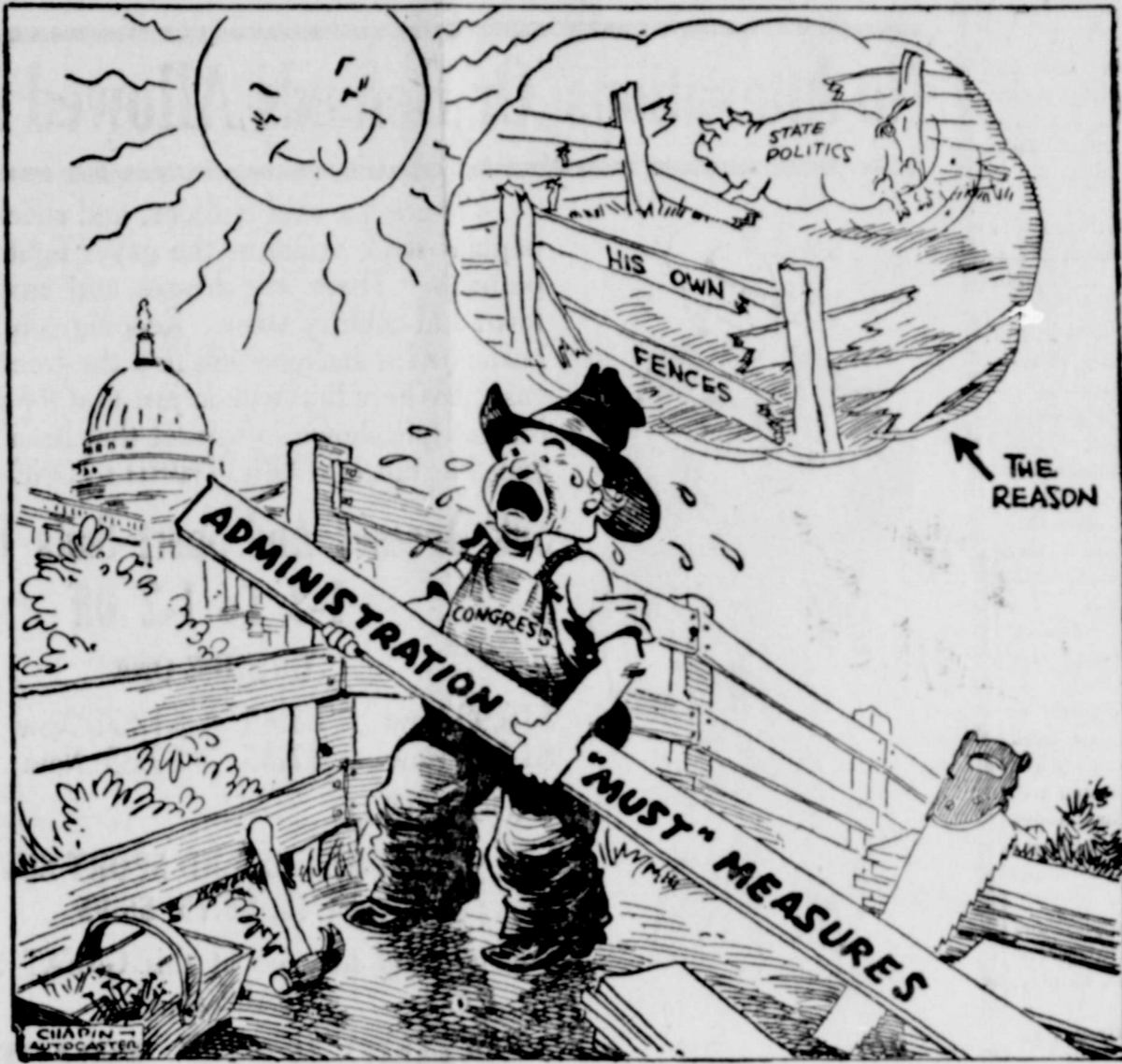

E. C. Nelson to Attend Short Course at A. & M. College

City of Floydada to Enforce Dog Tax Law

An attempt to enforce the dog tax law in this city, was passed on Tuesday night at a meeting of the city councilmen. This tax is an annual tax due June 1. Tax on the male dog is one dollar and fifty cents, and on the female dog five dollars. Each dog must wear a collar, with a tag attached.

All dogs running at large must wear a muzzle. The city marshal will be instructed to place it in the pound for twenty-four hours. When the twenty-four hours has expired and the dog has not been called for by owner, or person knowing the dog, it will be killed.

13,700 Pounds of Sorghum Seeds Received For Cover Crops

13,700 pounds of grain sorghum seed were received in Floydada this week from the soil conservation service. The seed which was 6,900 pounds of milo, 4,800 pounds of cañon, and 2,000 pounds of hegrira, is to be planted on Floyd County farms as a cover crop to protect the soil from wind erosion.

The seed may be planted in wide rows or in strips and may be headed or cut if a high stubble is left to keep the soil intact.

The seed will be distributed from the building just north of the post office and each farmer will be allowed a maximum of one and one-half pounds per acre. C. A. Cass will have charge of the distribution of the seed. Farmers are required to bring their own sacks. Mr. Cass will distribute the seed between the hours of one and six each day until the allotment has been used up.
