Ex-Soldiers Asked Not To 'Fritter' Cash. Bill Becomes Law

Senate Overrides Veto of President by Almost Same Margin as Original Vote

Washington, Jan. 27.—Quickly accepting a climactic senate vote of 70 to 19 as sealing the overthrow of his bonus veto, President Roosevelt today sent orders down the line to pay off the \$2,491,000,000 soldiers bill as quickly as "accuracy will permit."

No word of disappointment or chagrin, no hint as to the possibility of new taxes came from the White House as the senate in a thumping bipartisan ballot—with a two-third majority never in doubt—declined to accept the president's disapproval of a bill for immediate payment in \$500 million bonds. The house previously had voted 324 to 61 to override.

President Urges Thrift

In the second of two statements issued quickly from the White House, however, the president opened a drive to lessen the strain on the treasury by arguing to veterans that they should not cash their bonds but hold them as "nest eggs."

After a speedily arranged conference with the national commanders of the three major veterans organizations, Mr. Roosevelt authorized a press release urging veterans to prevent "frittering away" of cash from the bonds.

"Permanent advantage as opposed to wholly temporary pleasure should be the criterion," said the statement.

Administration leaders have estimated that not more than one billion dollars will be needed to meet the first rush of demands for cashing the bonds, and the president apparently intended to keep the figure below this if possible.

Huge Task

Within a little more than two hours after the senate voted, Mr. Roosevelt said in his first statement that the treasury and veterans administration had been directed to pay as soon as possible. He warned of the "magnitude" of the task—requiring "between 2,500 and 3,000 additional personnel working for approximately six months to do this job."

He urged "patience" upon veterans. Refrain from writing follow-up letters after filing an application, he advised.

So certain was the outcome of the senate vote that even before it was taken, authoritative sources disclosed, the government printing office had started its presses rolling on applications to be filled in by veterans even before the senate met.

'1934 Wheat Crop Escapes Drought In Floyd County, Farm Census

The following report was sent from the Department of Commerce Bureau of the Census, from Washington which gives the farm census preliminary report:

"Largely because of the drought, the production of all field crops, except wheat, was greatly reduced in Floyd County, Texas, according to a preliminary report for the 1935 Federal Farm Census released recently by Director William L. Austin, Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce.

"Acreage of harvested crops in 1934 was 88,131 acres less than in 1929. In this county there were 109,490 acres of crop failure in 1934. The wheat yield for that year was 1,722,665 bushels harvested from 185,143 acres, as compared with 2,024,507 bushels produced from 209,902 acres in 1929. The crop of sorghums for grain was only 27,800 bushels as against 344,052 bushels harvested five years earlier. Oats threshed in 1934 totaled only 1,070 bushels as compared with 34,846 bushels in 1929, and barley dropped from 44,612 to 16,707 bushels. Hay and sorghums for forage decreased in the same period from 31,347 to 13,752 tons.

"Cattle on farms and ranches January 1, 1935, numbered 23,600 as compared with 19,260 in 1930. Hogs were reduced in this five-year period from 7,935 to 5,631. Other livestock reported in 1935 were 8,227 sheep, 4,815 horses, and 2,118 mules.

"The 1,743 farms and ranches enumerated in 1935 had an average size of 352.5 acres and an average value of \$8,245.

"State bulletins, containing final figures for the 1935 Farm Census will follow the preliminary releases. These bulletins may be secured for a nominal charge from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C."

**BONUS RACKETS DRAW
DECLARATION OF WAR
FROM LEGION CHIEFS**

Posts Instructed Not to Give Out
Lists of Veterans; Penalties Pre-
scribed for Charges.

Calls flood Bureau. Application
blanks are expected shortly and in-
quiries are unnecessary.

War on persons who would make a
racket of any sort of payment of the
soldiers' bonus was declared by the
American Legion, Department of
Texas, through Fred E. Young, Ad-
jutant, Austin, Tuesday.

"The legion is not going to stand
for anyone making any kind of rack-
et out of payment of the bonus," Mr.
Young said. "Already the State head-
quarters have been asked for lists of
veterans in an effort to start some
kind of campaign or racket to take
advantage of the delay in payment
of the bonus." The bonds in which
the bonus will be paid do not be-
come negotiable until June 15.

The law covering adjusted compensa-
tion for veterans of the World War
specifically sets out a penalty for
person who charges or collects or
attempts to collect fees or other com-
pensation for assisting a veteran or
his dependents in obtaining bene-
fits of the act, Mr. Young pointed
out.

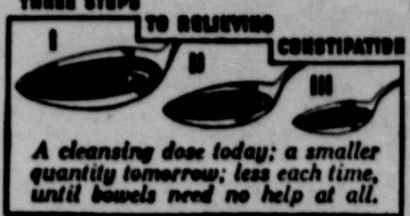

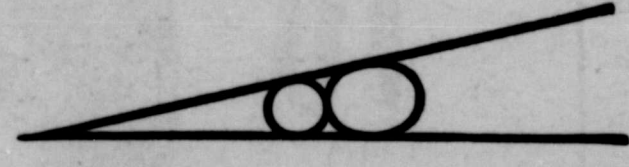
