Poll Tax Payments Show Big Increase Over 1935 For Floyd County

According to a report received at the tax collector's office there was an increase of 1,223 poll taxes paid in Floyd County for this year over 1935. A total of 3,955 polls and exemptions were issued at the office, of which 184 were exemptions. Last year at this time there were 1,832 polls paid.

Car licenses for the new year were issued beginning February 1 and will be issued until April 1. A. M. battey was the first to get his licenses for his car. Automobile licenses may be used beginning March 1. The present highway plates are good up until midnight April 1, 1936. Unless the vehicle is properly registered for the year 1935 the collector's office is forbidden to issue licenses for 1936.

Driver's licenses will be issued beginning February 14, 1936. All persons who are 14 or over are required to obtain these licenses, which are free, if they drive an automobile.

McDermott Post American Legion Received Application Blanks

Floydada McDermott Post American Legion received approximately 350 application blanks for payment of adjusted service. These blanks were sent to Post Commander E. C. Thomas, and have to be signed and witnessed by an official of the post, notary public, postmaster or assistant postmaster.

The local post will take care of filling out the blanks for veterans of this territory. There will be a corps of clerks at the legion hall to take care of these applications; making them out, taking finger prints and of mailing the application to the required house.

When ex-service men appear at the hall to fill in application they must take their pink slip along and if you do not have a pink slip take your certificate and discharge papers.

During this week, beginning with Monday, several legion members will be at the hall to have charge of the applications. Each soldier, who is due a bonus, is requested by the legion to get application as quickly as possible, so they may be sent in for the bonds. These applications will be issued according to the time they are received.

Philadelphia, Feb. 1.—A stainless steel de luxe railroad chair car, in which are incorporated many new light-weight structural features, has been delivered to the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway by the Edward G. Budd Manufacturing Company.

The car, the first of its kind to be built for any railway, is of standard size, width and strength, but weighs only half as much as an ordinary Santa Fe chair car. It will be used in trains of standard steel cars.

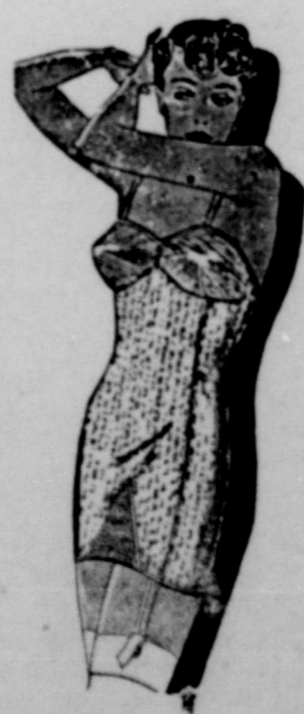

"Ense petit placidam sub lib-
ertate quietem" (With the sword
she seeks peace under liberty);
Michigan, "Si quaeris peninsulam
amoenam circumspecte" (If you seek
a pleasant peninsula look around
you); also "Tuebor" (I will de-
fend); Mississippi, "Virtute et
armis" (By valor and arms); Mis-
souri, "Salus populi suprema lex
esto" (Let the welfare of the peo-
ple be the supreme law); New Mex-
ico, "Crescit eundo" (It grows as it
does); New York, "Excelsior"
(Higher); North Carolina, "Esse
quum videri" (To be rather than
to seem); Ohio's former motto was
"Imperium in imperio" (An empire
within an empire); Oklahoma, "La-
bor omnia vincit" (Labor conquers
all things); Oregon, "Alis volat
propitris" (She flies with her own
wings); South Carolina, "Animus
obscure parati" (Ready in soul
and resource); "Dum spiro spero"
(While I breathe I hope); Virginia,
"Sic semper tyrannis" (Thus ever
to tyrants); West Virginia, "Mon-
tani semper liberi" (Mountaineers
are always freemen); Wyoming,
"Cedat arma togae" (Let arms yield
to the gown).

Liberia's Constitution

Copies That of the U. S.
Liberia is a republic, one of the
three independent negro nations
of the world. It had its origin in
the efforts of several American and
European colonization societies to
establish a homeland for liberated
slaves.
The first settlement was planted
in 1822, and in 1847 the land grants
which had been acquired from na-
tive chiefs by the colonization so-
cieties were constituted as the re-
public of Liberia. The United States
was rather tardy in giving recogni-
tion to the new nation, observes a
writer in the Cleveland Plain Deal-
er, but it has since several times
made the rest of the world un-
derstand that it is interested in
keeping Liberia independent, or the
republic would probably have been
swallowed up long since by one of
the European powers.
The constitution and government
of Liberia are modeled upon those
of the United States. There is a
congress made up of a senate and
a house of representatives, and the
executive authority is vested in a
president and a cabinet of six.
Electors must be of negro blood
and owners of land. All of the offi-
cers of government are negroes,
largely the descendants of Ameri-
can negroes. The official lan-
guage of the government is Eng-
lish, but only about 50,000 of the
population of 1,500,000 or more is
considered civilized. The first half
dozen presidents of Liberia were all
of American birth.

The Word "Maru"
The word Maru originally meant
"a circle." Its present meaning as
applied to ships is obscure to the
Japanese themselves. When used
as a prefix the word means "full,"
"complete," "all." But it is used
as a suffix to the names of ships,
not a prefix. According to Jap-
anese tradition, the use of Maru
in ship names dates back to the
Eighteenth century, when a Jap-
anese nobleman called a pleasure
boat "Maru." Some Japanese schol-
ars, among them school teachers of
the present day, understand the
word to mean "in a state of mo-
tion" or "moving." Many Japanese
seamen take it to mean "good luck,"
the word meaning "circle" indicat-
ing that the ship will safely sail
back to its home port.

Buffalo on White House Site
The first white men to ascend
the Potomac river saw specimens
of the American bison—the correct
name of the humped and shaggy
"buffalo"—near the place where
the White House stands, observes
a writer in the New York Times.
If there were no other evidence—
and there is plenty—the Elk river
flowing from Maryland into the
Chesapeake bay indicates by its
name that the early settlers saw
enough of these animals along its
course to name the stream for them.

Mrs. Penn's Epitaph
After Mrs. Penn's death, her hus-
band, the famous William, wrote
an epitaph. In it he stated that
"she was a Publick as well as a Pri-
vate loss"; that she was an excel-
lent mother, a constant friend, mod-
est and humble, religious, without
affectation, an "excellent" mistress,
good neighbor, especially to the
poor, and other virtues. He ended
it with the sentence, "Therefore our
great Loss though her own Eternal
gain."

Floydada Aces, of Floydada will
sponsor an independent basket ball
tournament to be played here Fri-
day and Saturday. First game will

compete for the championship, it has
been announced.
There will not be any school teams
playing, but all independent teams
were invited. West Texas State
Teachers College independent team
and Wayland College team has both
been invited to participate in the
tournament.

**OFFER OF PARTIAL
DEBT PAYMENT IS
MADE BY GREECE**

Washington, February 4.—A Greek
offer of partial war debt payments
Tuesday marked the first break in
the impasse resulting from wholesale
default by a dozen other European
nations two years ago.
With Finland the only debtor nation
at present continuing to fulfill its
obligations to the United States
Treasury, Greece has expressed will-
ingness to pay 35 per cent of the
coupon value of payment due May
10 and Nov. 10.
Dimitrios Skellanos, the Greek
Minister, was revealed to have com-
municated to the State Department
an offer to pay \$76,272 of the \$217,
920 due on each date.
Total obligations due from war
debtor nations amount to \$12,437,
837,030.33 (billions).

**WORK BEGUN ON CALICHE
BASE ON HIGHWAY 207 NORTH
TO COUNTY LINE**

Unit two, which includes a caliche
base, was begun this morning, Thurs-
day, on highway 207 north to the
county line, which will employ 80
men. There will be a crew of 181
men working on the highway finish-
ing unit one, which called for grad-
ing and placing bridges.
Work that is done on highway 207
is under the jurisdiction of WPA
and by men on the relief. This pro-
ject is for 23.25 miles from Floydada
to the county line on the north. Bris-
coe county will work on the highway
south to their county line, which will
complete the road to Silvertown.

saw a snake run in a hole and while
digging for it they found 65, which
they killed immediately.
The snakes were tied together and
brought to Floydada Wednesday
morning where many people passed
by and looked at the great number.
Measurements of the snakes ranged
from eighteen inches to five feet, in
length, with the smallest snake hav-
ing five rattlers.

**PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT
REPEAL OF AAA ADJUNCTS
ACTION DUE RULING**

Washington, February 3.—Con-
gressional leaders moved quickly to-
night to carry out President Roose-
velt's recommendation for removal
from the statute books of three of
the four remaining phases of AAA
crop control.
As new farm legislation advanced
on several fronts, the executive for-
warded an eight line special message
to Congress urging "prompt repeal"
of the Bankhead cotton control, Kerr-
Smith tobacco and potato control
laws. He did not mention the Jones-
Sostigan sugar control act.
Were Auxiliary Acts
"This recommendation is made,"
Mr. Roosevelt said, "because of the
termination of the program of agri-
cultural production adjustment un-
der the act of May 12, 1933, as
amended, known as the 'Agricultural
Adjustment Act,' to which the three
acts mentioned were auxiliary."
Capitol Hill spokesmen agreed this
should be done. Senator Russell,
Georgia, introduced a bill to repeal
the Bankhead law soon after the
message was read. Chairman Jones,
Texas, of the House agricultural com-
mittee later introduced a bill to
repeal all three laws. It was in-
dicated his committee might meet on
the repealer tomorrow.

It has been generally conceded in
administration circles that the three
laws mentioned by Mr. Roosevelt
were doomed by the Supreme Court's
AAA decision. Most administration
leaders, however, contend the sugar
act was not disturbed.
