Melvin Ensey Found "Not Guilty" in Court Trial Here

Melvin Ensey, of Spur, was found not guilty of murder by the district court of Floyd County at 9:25 a. m. Friday morning. The jury returned a verdict six and a half hours after they received the case. The jury took the case at 5:00 p. m. Thursday afternoon.

Only about forty witnesses were called out of the sixty that had been subpoenaed.

Mr. Ensey had been charged with the slaying of J. B. (Uncle Ben) Speegle, tourist camp operator and pioneer Motley county resident last November 22. A hearing was held at Matador following the arrest of the boy on Saturday, November 23. The murder happened following a football game played at Matador by Ensey and Speegle.

Everett McArthur Postponed Until June

Everett McArthur, also of Spur, and charged with being implicated in the murder of Mr. J. B. Speegle, whose trial was to be brought before the January term of district court in Floyd County was postponed until next term of court, which will be in June. Both murder charges were filed against the Dickens county youths in Motley county last November following the tragedy.

E. L. Marshall, of Lockney, Cousin of L. A. Marshall, Buried Saturday

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 3:00 at the Church of Christ at Lockney for E. L. Marshall of that city. Mr. Marshall died at 3:00 Thursday morning after a heart attack.

The deceased was born in 1877 and had made his home in Lockney for a number of years. He was owner of a cafe in Lockney, but at the time of his death had it leased out.

Survivors are his mother, Mrs. T. J. Marshall, wife and one daughter, Grace.

\$9,041 Approved by State Department for Floyd County Teachers' Salary

The State Department of Education at Austin approved \$9,041 for teachers' salary aid of Floyd County. County Superintendent Walter Travis made a business trip to Austin Saturday for the purpose of raising the aid. It had been previously approved for \$7,722, which was less than the final agreement. G. D. Holbrook, deputy state superintendent had approved the aid of \$1,430 more than the State Department of Education had formerly agreed to.

In the meeting Saturday at Austin Mr. Travis in company with Calvin Hazelwood, of Lubbock, A. V. Bullock, of Abilene, and Mr. Jackson, of Brownwood, all which are district directors of National Youth Administration, met with the department of education at Austin Saturday and they agreed to raise the total school teachers' salary aid \$1,319 for Floyd County teachers.

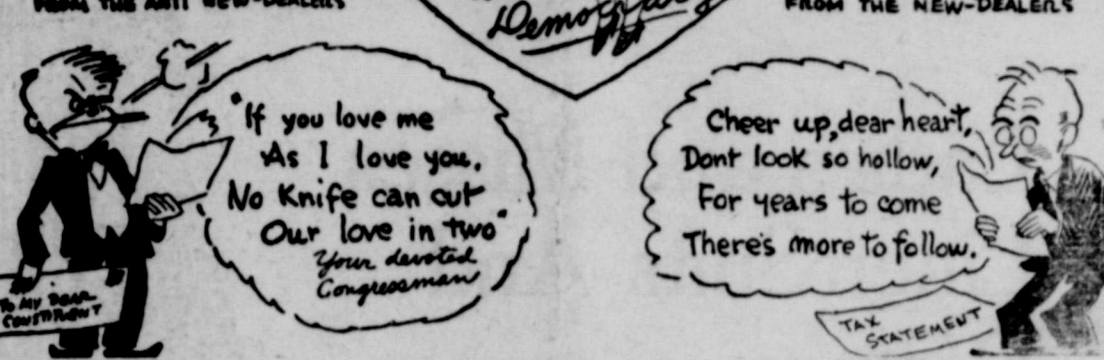
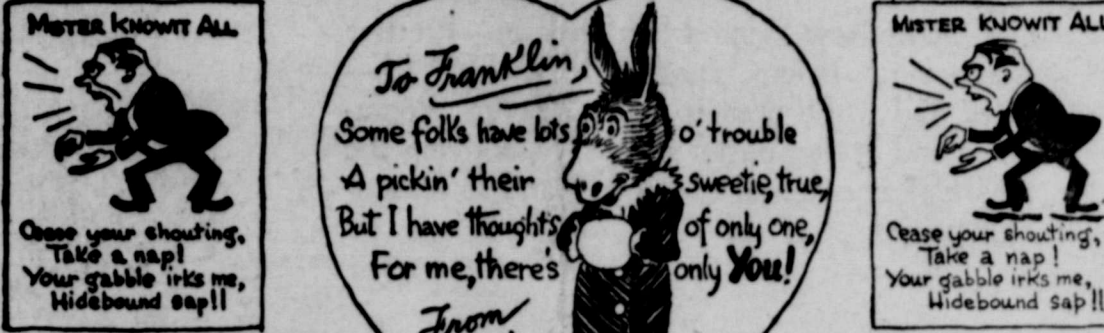
Herwin had been employed with The Floyd County Plainsman since his grammar school years and received his first training as a "journalist" and news reporter on this paper.

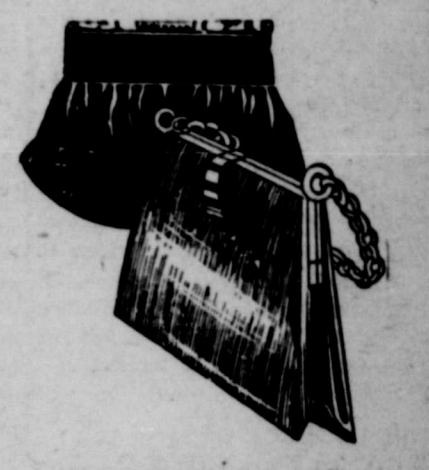

**Ancient Memorials Mark
Certain Parts of China**

Wherever one goes in China he
sees evidence that China is an old,
very old country. In the heart of
Hangchow there are tombs and
memorials so ancient that the
weather of the centuries has worn
the stone statues and carvings to
smooth surfaces. In the country are
disintegrating walls enclosing what
were once rich estates and impos-
ing buildings, the ruins of which
are overgrown with semi-tropical
jungle.

The "coffin houses" along the
paths in the hills, where repose the
remains of the departed awaiting
an auspicious day for burial, are
in better condition than the houses
of the living. These mausoleums,
writes Mason Warner in the Chi-
cago Tribune, are rows of 12 to
20 attached buildings, 10 to 12 feet
high, each having one room, with
space for either one or two cof-
fins. Sometimes the burial of hus-
band or wife is postponed until the
death of the survivor, and that oc-
casion the waiting of one for the
other in the coffin house.

For the peace of the departed
soul and the good luck of the sur-
viving members of the family, a day
when all the elements of nature
are in harmony in relation to the
departed one must be chosen by a
learned geomancer for interment in
the earth. That is always difficult,
for what would be a lucky day for
one son might bring disaster to
another. It is not unusual for a
corpse to wait five, ten, or twenty
years for burial. Very rich fami-
lies have been known to wait fifty
years for the right day.

**Lightness and Strength
Make Aluminum Popular**

Aluminum is used wherever a com-
bination of lightness and strength
is desired. The pure metal is high-
ly reactive with various corrosive
substances, yet in actual practice
it resists corrosion very much bet-
ter than the theoretically more re-
sistant iron. The reason for this,
writes Dr. Thomas M. Beck in the
Chicago Tribune, is that aluminum
on exposure to the atmosphere
forms a microscopically thin, tough,
air-tight coating of aluminum rust
which gives the underlying metal
perfect protection against cor-
rosion. Iron, on the other hand, forms
a brittle, porous rust that flakes off
and exposes more metal.

Along with the advantage of
lightness and rust resistance, pure
aluminum has the disadvantage of
being relatively soft. For a long
time this limited its use to the
manufacture of kitchen utensils,
sheet aluminum and similar uses
in which it was not subjected to
very great strain. However, there
have been developing some highly
successful aluminum alloys, in
which the metal has a strength ap-
proaching that of steel, with no sac-
rifice of lightness. Oddly enough,
in the cases of some of the most
useful of these alloys the aluminum,
in gaining strength, loses much of
its resistance to corrosion. This
fault, however, can easily be re-
medied by giving the alloy a thin coat-
ing of the pure metal.

A Widow's Name

Emily Post's "Etiquette" says: "A
widow no less than a married woman
should always continue to use
her husband's Christian name, or
his name and another initial, en-
graved on her cards. She is Mrs.
John Hunter Titherington Smith,
but she is never Mrs. Sarah Smith;
at least, not anywhere in good so-
ciety. In business and legal mat-
ters a woman is necessarily ad-
dressed by her own Christian name,
because she uses it in her signa-
ture. But no one should ever ad-
dress an envelope, except from a
bank or a lawyer's office, 'Mrs.
Sarah Smith.' As to the signa-
ture, Mrs. Post declares 'a mar-
ried woman should always sign a
letter to a stranger, a bank, busi-
ness firm, etc., with her baptismal
name, and add, in parentheses, her
married name.'"

Channel Islands

The Channel Islands of Britain,
only 75 square miles in area, have
a long and glorious history behind
them. From the most ancient days
the law allows a citizen to shout for
help against an alleged aggressor
and history records how in the year
1067 the burial of William the Con-
queror was delayed thus by an hum-
ble citizen whose home had been
wrecked by the king without com-
pensation. More than 800 years
later, in the year 1918, some one
who objected to a telephone pole
being planted near his gate, went
into the street, called for help ac-
cording to old usage and custom,
and the telephone people had to
stop work until the matter was ad-
justed.

Value of Punctuality

There is no more desirable busi-
ness qualification than punctuality,
and no other so indispensable to a
man of affairs, or to anyone who
would save his own time and that
of others. Napoleon once invited
his marshals to dine with him, but
as they did not arrive at the mo-
ment appointed, he began to eat
without them. They came in just
as he was rising from the table.
"Gentlemen," said he, "dinner is
now over, and we will immediately
proceed to business."
