# Officials discuss pros, cons of aldermanic system

Dimmitt voters will be asked Nov. 6 whether they approve a change to the aldermanic form of government.

Under the present commission system, the city is governed by a mayor and two commissioners. The aldermanic form, if approved by the voters, would have five aldermen and a mayor, which would require electing three additional alder-

Voters may vote against the change to an expanded aldermen in case the proposal is approved.

According to City Attorney Jack Edwards, the change would mean primarily that there would be five people voting on city business instead of two.

If the aldermanic system were approved, the aldermen could vote to set the salaries of their elected successors. At present the salaries of commissioners are set by state law at \$50 per month.

The city would still be under the general laws of the State of Texas under the aldermanic system, which is not a "home rule" system.

Essentially, according to Edwards, the only difference would aldermanic plan is that there would be five aldermen and a be getting five heads together instead of two, which might be more difficult.

Mayor Elmer Youts, asked about the response to the election and the surprisingly large number of candidates said, "I think there is more interest in city government than I thought a year and a half ago when some businessmen first mentioned this

Youts favors the change to the aldermanic system primarily because of the open meetings law. At present no two members governing board and still vote for their choice of three of the city commission (two would constitute a majority) can discuss city business except at city commission meetings.

If the commission were expanded to a five-member board of aldermen, individual members could discuss issues with each other prior to a commission meeting when they have to make a

'The city is spending taxpayers' money and they need to be represented," Youts said. He feels that the addition of three members to the governing board of the city would benefit the

City Commissioner Chet Braafladt said that the principal benefit he sees if the voters approve the change to the

mayor, and the city could still be able to do business if two members were absent. At present, two of the three elected officials must be at a meeting of the city commission for any business to be transacted.

Braafladt is concerned about the additional cost to taxpayers of having more city officials, paying each a minimal salary plus health insurance.

Under the aldermanic system if a vacancy occurs for any reason, an election must be held for a replacement -- an additional expense to taxpayers. If a seat is vacated under the commission plan, a replacement may be appointed to serve until the next regular election.

Braafladt also mentioned that "the more people you have involved, the more problems you have making decisions." Commissioner J. R. Brown said he is "thrilled to see the

quality of the candidates on the slate" but is disturbed by the salary-change possibilities if the city moved to the aldermanic plan. If salaries are raised, the city might have people running for office for the money and not to serve the city, he said.

In his opinion, the city has had no trouble taking care of business under the present system.

#### **Five fined** \$1,265 for welfare fraud

Fines and court costs totaling \$1,265 were assessed against five persons in welfare fraud hearings by County Judge M. L. Simpson Friday and Tuesday.

Charged with theft over \$20 and less than \$200 were Max Martinez and Nora Martinez, husband and wife, each charged with theft of \$90.50; Natividad Ortiz, \$87; Frances Sanchez, \$171; and Rafaela Enriquez, \$180.

The total amount which the five defendants were charged with stealing was \$619, Judge Simpson pointed out, less than half the amount of their

Hearings on the cases were held Friday and Tuesday. Another case is pending, the judge said, and some others are yet to be filed by investigators from the Texas Department of Human Resources. Investigators are still at work in this area, Judge Simpson added.

"The town is big enough now that we need more people,"

Noel Gollehon, another former city commissioner, said he sees advantages and disadvantages to the change.

Maybe two men can handle the job now, but in the future, as the city grows, it might be better to have more," he said. When Dimmitt was incorporated in December 1928, the city was automatically under the aldermanic plan. A year later voters approved a change to the commission system.



The building completed by Solomon was used as God's house until the people strayed from God, and then it was destroyed. God has no desire for the building without the people.





#### Third quarter tax reports due Oct. 31

Oct. 31 is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1979, and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service said. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until Nov. 10 to file
