### Machinery Is Complete For Vet Payments

WASHINGTON .- Postal official said to day that machinery has been set up to assure quick payment of bonus money to veterans who desire to eash their "baby bonds" after they are distributed in June. Following is the procedure out-

lined by officials: Applications Checked

A veteran applies for payments of his bonus certificate in \$50 bonds by sending an application blank with his fingerprints and other data to the nearest office of the veteran's

administration. After it has checked over the application, the veteran's administration certifies the application to the

Treasury department. The Treasury Department makes out an order for the proper number of \$50 bonds, plus a check to cover any odd amount. These are sent to the Federal Reserve Bank in the vet-

rans district. The Federal Reserve Bank makes up a bundle for each veteran, containing as many \$50 bonus "baby bonds" as the veteran is owed, plus the check to cover the odd amount.

To Addresses Only On June 15, these packages will start to move to veterans, through the registered letter service of the Post Office Department. Postmasters have been instructed to deliver the packages only to the veteran named on the package, even though the package may be addressed in "care of" another person, firm, hotel, or company. If the veteran has died or moved out of the post office's jurisdiction, the package will be returned to the reserve bank to await

a new claim for it. If a veteran choose to hold his bonds as an investment, he may draw interest at 3 per cent a year until 1945. He may, if he chooses, hold the bonds, drawing interest for a few years, then cash them at a date earlier than 1945. But no interest will be paid a veteran who cashes his bonds before the end of the first year, and no interest will be paid after 1945.

### Early Travel in America

On June 19, 1636, Gov. John Winthrop, of the Massachusetts Bay colony, sent to his son, John, "at the mouth of the Conecticot," a letter containing one of the earliest references to communication in New England history. He wrote: "Mr. Hooker went hence upon Tuesday, the last of May, by whom I wrote you and sent all your letters, with one from England, and all such news as came to hand." With more than 100 members of his congregation, Rev. Thomas Hooker set out through the wilderness from Newtown (now Cambridge), Mass., tosettle at the present site of Hartford, Conn. The journey of slightly more than 100 miles required two weeks. Such were America's facilities for travel and communication three centuries ago.

### Gestalt Psychology

Gestalt is a German word that was introduced into psychology in 1890 to indicate the character of a perception as a unity. ### Great Johnstown Flood

Caused by Breaking Dam There was only one great Johntown flood. This occurred on Friday, May 31, 1889, and was caused by the breaking of the dam at Conemaugh lake, which released a huge reservoir of water that rushed madly down the Conemaugh valley, washing out its villages and hurling itself in a deadly torrent on the

The bursting of the dam was due to the unprecedented and long-cononly in this disaster, but also in the destruction of a heavy railroad bridge between Harrisburg and Altoona, and in floods in various othjoining states, from which there was even greater loss of property

Shipped First Frozen Meat The honor of ploneering the fro-

zen meat export trade of the world lies to the credit of Australian pastorists. Repeated but unsuccessful attempts between 1840 and 1879 had been made to ship dried, dinned and pickled meats in commercial quantities. Toward the end of 1879 the steamer Strathleven, fitted with meat chambers and the Bell-Coleman cold-air system of freezing, left Australia with a cargo of meat. The cargo, consisting of beef, mutton and lamb, was supplied by leading graziers. On February 22, 1880, the Strathleven arrived at the East India dock, London, with her cargo in good condition. A lamb was sent to Queen Victoria and a sheep to the prince of Wales. Thus was commenced the frozen meat export trade.


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
