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Floydada Whirlwinds Defeated Matador Team To Score of 18-0

Floydada Whirlwinds won the football game against the Matador Bullfighters last Friday in a game played in Matador on their new field west of Matador High School. The final score of the game was Floydada 18 and Matador 0.

Floydada football squad played a hard game Friday to win the second place in this district of 4-B. Paducah won first place when they defeated Spur in a game played on Armistice Day to a score of 6-0. Spur has third and Matador fourth place. Paducah won every conference game; Floydada won against Matador and Spur and lost to Paducah; Spur won against Matador and lost to Floydada and Paducah; Matador lost every conference game played this season.

The Whirlwinds started the game Friday with McClung kicking off to Matador with W. J. Brian receiving. Matador played hard and fast but were unable to win against Floydada. Floydada scored in the first half by Standforth making a fifteen yard run and Baker carried the ball over the goal. The extra point was tried by Billy Standforth, who passed to McClung, which was not completed. The second touchdown was made by Lightfoot, who made a 15 yard run around right end for the counter. Lightfoot had already made a 40 yard run early in the first quarter. Allen tried to kick the ball for the extra point but failed. Baker made the last counter in the last quarter. He carried the ball over the line after it had been carried close to the scoring point by long runs.

Charlie Scaff, Matador quarterback, who is their main player, was suffering from an infected finger and was unable to start the game, but played most all of the last half. Matador played a good defensive game but were unable to score. They made many good plays and completed several long passes.

They marched down the field and turned around and while in the center of the field they gave a yell for Matador, after which they turned around and faced Floydada and gave a yell for the Whirlwinds. The Matador pep squad gave a short formation and presented their football game. The group was dressed in black sweaters and skirts with their queen dressed in white skirt and blouse. They yelled for the Whirlwinds and Bullfighters.

National Plowing Contest at Wheatland, Ill., Created Much Interest

Akron, Ohio, November 16—A new champion emerged from the National Plowing Contest at Wheatland, Ill., recently, but not without a struggle.

As intensely interesting to the thousands of persons present that sunny autumn afternoon as a world's series game is to a baseball fan, the National Plowing Contest presents a picture of skilled farmers pitted against each other in their endeavor to turn in the best job they know how.

Orvis Schroyer, Lily Lake, Ill., with a score of 92 points out of a possible 100, led the field, but won by only a slight margin from Paul Steifboldt, Naperville, Ill., whose final score was 90 points.

Interesting to observers at the contest was the fact that again this year, as was the case in 1935, tractors only were used, no horses being entered. Another interesting fact was that a greater percentage of tractors than before were mounted on rubber tires.

"Approval by the farmer of new types of equipment is always reflected in events such as the Wheatland contest," declared F. N. Thomas, manager of the truck tire department of The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. "Gradual displacement of the horse by the tractor was seen in the annual plowing contests, and now the definite swing to pneumatic tires is shown in the same way. Of the 26 tractors entered, 22 were on pneumatics.

"Schroyer and Steifboldt were keenly aware of the fact that sure-footed traction is of utmost importance in a plowing contest—just as it is in many everyday farming jobs right through the year.

2807 Bales of Cotton Was Ginned In Floyd County to November 1

There were 2807 bales of cotton ginned in Floyd County from the 1936 crop as compared to 3488 bales ginned by November 1, 1935. There had been 681 more bales ginned in the crop to November 1 last year than in the same time this year. The census was made by Fred Bell, special agent for the department of Commerce.

There had been 1223 bales of cotton ginned in Floydada by Saturday, November 14, by the three local gins. In the past two weeks 827 bales of cotton have been ginned in Floydada.

On November 1, 1936 only 396 bales of cotton had been ginned in Floydada.

El Paso Gets Next Session of Assembly of Texas Baptists

Mineral Wells, — The Texas Baptist general convention decreed the spread of vice in resolutions as delegates closed their 1936 meeting here.

The convention chose El Paso for its 1937 meeting and set Nov. 9 to 12, inclusive as the date. Dr. E. D. Head of Houston was chosen to preach the 1937 convention sermoa with Dr. C. E. Hereford of Lubbock as alternate.

Vice Deplored
Resolutions urged vigorous campaigns against drinking, gambling and immorality in Texas, following recommendations of the Civic Righteousness Committee.

Dr. John L. Whorton, of Longview, committee chairman, said "wide open" conditions tended to ruin morals of the state's citizens. Dr. Porter Bailes of Tyler urged abolition of Sunday amusements.

The committee report said the state "actually becomes a partner" in vice by licensing gambling devices.

The convention resolved to choose, in the future, at least five members of the Baptist State Mission board from country churches and assign one missionary to work exclusively among country churches.

It further resolved to instruct presidents of baptists schools to replace all non-baptist trustees with church members. Discussion indicated only Marshall College at Marshall would be affected.

Floydada Post Office Is Sending Out Forms to Employees and Employers

The Floydada post office is cooperating with the Social Security Board in sending out form S. S. 4 to each employer of Floydada who has one or more persons less than sixty-five years of age by November 6, 1936. These forms that have been sent out must be back in the local office by November 24.

Forms S. S. 5 are to be mailed every employee with request forms are back in the office by December 6.

These forms may be handed to your letter carrier, or they may be delivered to the local post office in person, or by messenger, or they may be mailed in a sealed envelope, addresses as follows: Postmaster, Local. In no case is it necessary to prepay postage. The prompt completion and return of the form is particularly important because it will be used in connection with the work of assigning account numbers to your employees, and employers.

ORDINANCE NO. 192

An Ordinance Regulating The Sale of Prophylactic Articles be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas:

SECTION ONE. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm, partnership, or corporation to sell, offer for sale, give away, or in any other manner whatever, dispose of any article, device or medical preparation, primarily manufactured for, or which may be used as a contraceptive, or for the prevention of venereal diseases and infections, within the City Limits of the City of Floydada, Texas, or the police jurisdiction thereof, except that the provisions of this section shall not apply to duly licensed physicians in their practice, nor to registered druggists in the confines of a licensed drug store, nor to wholesale druggists and manufacturers supplying such goods to licensed physicians and registered druggists; provided that all such goods dispensed by licensed physicians and registered druggists show clearly on the goods or containers in which they are sold at retail, the name of the manufacturer.

SECTION TWO. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, partnership or corporation to maintain or operate any vending machine or device, vending any of the above described articles, or to sell, offer for sale, give away or distribute by house to house canvass, or by peddling on the streets or elsewhere.

SECTION THREE. Any person, firm, partnership, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.

SECTION FOUR. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION FIVE. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

Passed by the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, and approved by the Mayor Pro Tem, this 10th day of November, A. D. 1936.

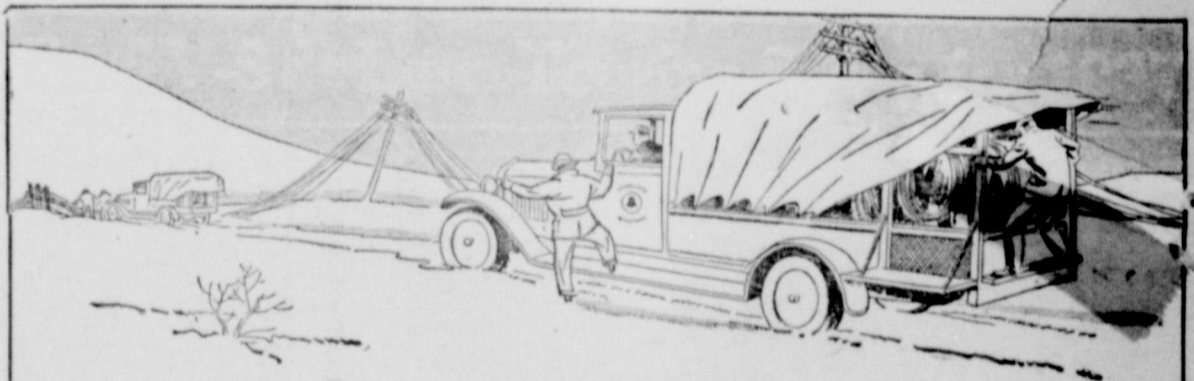
