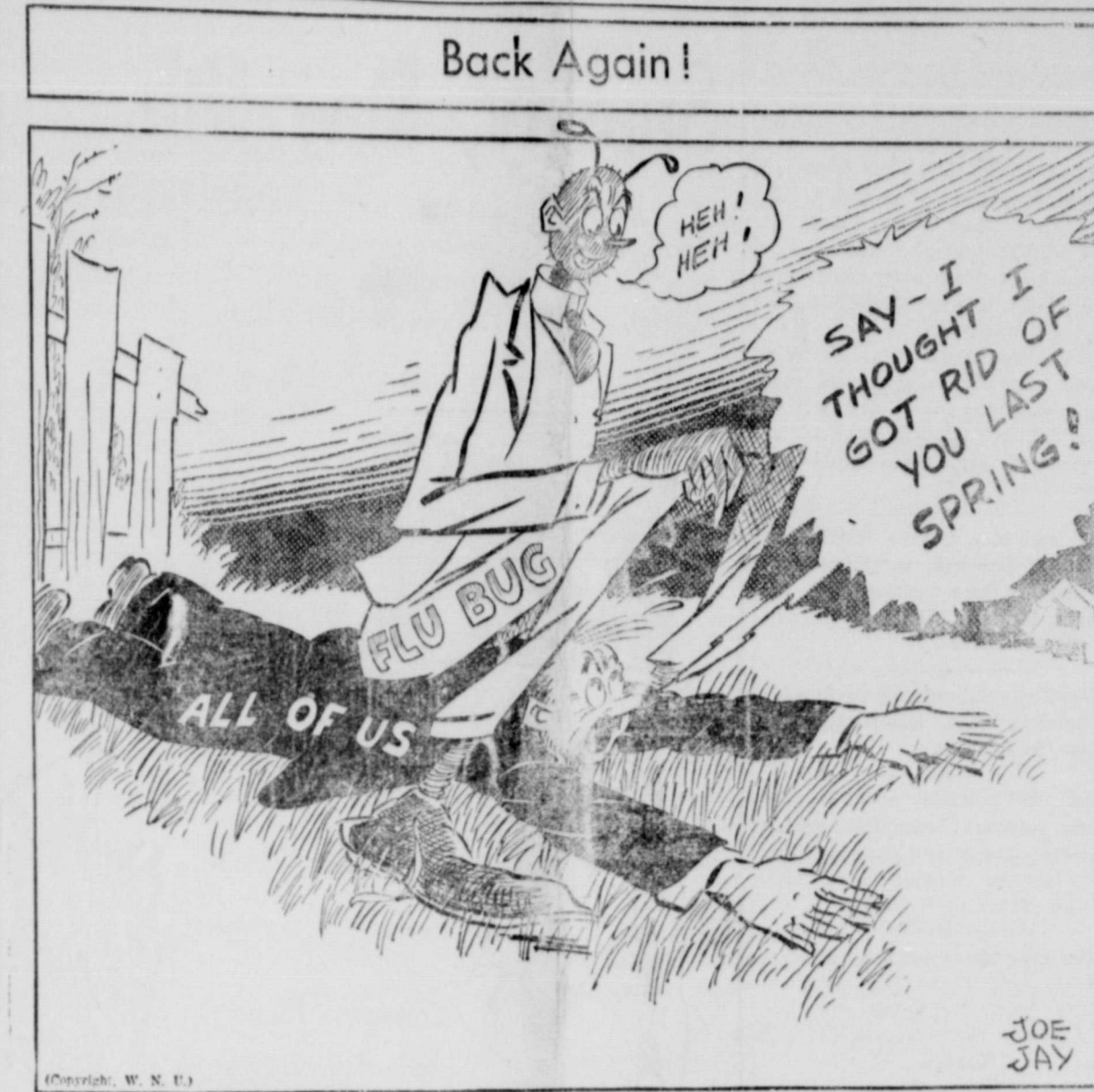

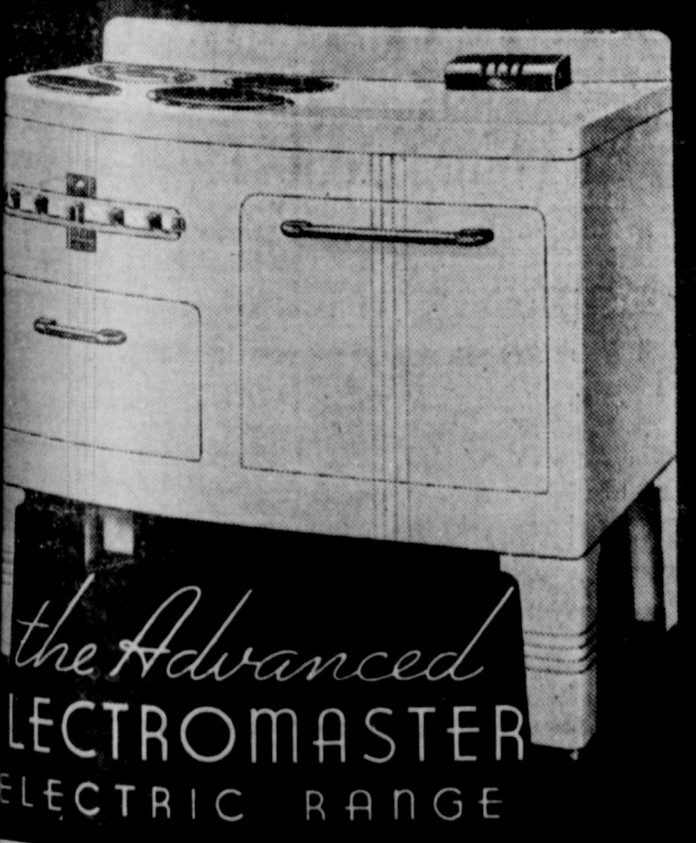

The Super Chief, the Santa Fe Railway's new diesel-powered, light-weight, stainless steel streamliner, is being groomed for an initial round trip run between Chicago and Los Angeles, preparatory to being placed in regular service.

The train, just recently delivered and the last word in modern transportation, will leave Chicago, May 8, carrying 70 members of the Chicago Association of Commerce who will make the trip west in response to an invitation from the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce.

On May 15, the new streamliner will return to Chicago taking with it an equally large delegation from the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce. An imposing round of festivities is being planned in both cities, each playing host to the other.

Heading the Chicago party will be C. L. Rise, president of the Association of Commerce, while the Los Angeles contingent will be led by Byron C. Hanna, president of the Chamber of Commerce. The Santa Fe will be represented by several officials, including Samuel T. Blodsoe, president, and Vice-Presidents W. K. Etter and F. B. Houghton.

Use of the Santa Fe's crack train, which will be placed in regular service May 18, provides a novel slant to this important get-together of two of the largest cities in the United States. It is the first of the streamliners constructed exclusively for first class, extra fare, de luxe travel and is the most beautiful train in the world today.

In regular service, the Super Chief, carrying eight light-weight, stainless steel cars of the latest design and offering every travel luxury, will cover the distance between Chicago and Los Angeles in 39 hours and 45 minutes.
