Entire Nation Hails Peace in Auto Industry

The vital importance to the entire nation of restored peace in the auto industry is shown by this latest survey of raw materials consumed during a single year.

One out of every seven American workers now derives his daily bread—either directly or indirectly—from the automobile industry. Miners of lead, zinc and copper, cotton pickers in the South, sheep herders in the West, industrial workers in hundreds of cities—all owe a big part of their income to the modern motor car. Business in every state quickens with renewed activity in big auto plants like the Plymouth factory at Detroit, world's biggest single production unit for finished cars, as new Plymouth

models again move out to 12,500 dealer showrooms throughout the United States.

A single low-priced car like the 1937 Plymouth, when it comes off the assembly line, contains 1,700 pounds of steel and 500 pounds of iron, 70 pounds of safety glass, 180 pounds of rubber including tires, 60 pounds of copper, 20 pounds of aluminum, and other materials too numerous to mention.

Thus the automobile industry is now the No. 1 consumer of steel, malleable iron, rubber, oil, plate glass, mohair, nickel, lead and gasoline, the latest survey shows. Total amounts used by the industry in a single year are shown by the tables above, with the percentage of total production these figures represent.

ORDINANCE NO. 195 An Ordinance Amending Ordinance Number 192.

Be It Ordained by The City Council Of The City of Floydada, Texas:

"SECTION ONE: That Ordinance No. 192, passed by the City Council of said City on the 12th Day of January, 1937, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of the following Section:

"Section Twenty-Six A: Notwithstanding any other provision of this Ordinance, it shall hereafter be lawful to center park automobiles, motor cycles or trucks of an overall length including any article or object thereon of Eighteen (18) feet, upon the following portions of Streets within the City of Floydada, Texas:

"California Street, between its intersections with Wall Street and Main Street;

"Main Street, between its intersections with California Street and Missouri Street;

"Missouri Street between its intersections with Main Street and Wall Street;

"Wall Street, between its intersections with California Street and Missouri Street.

Old Age Assistance Checks Being Held Up Awaiting Funds

With May checks for approximately 126,000 needy aged ready for mailing, payments this month are being delayed until the federal grant is received from Washington, W. A. Little, acting director of the Old Age Assistance Commission reported this week.

"Our understanding is that the Social Security Board is waiting for a deficiency appropriation from Congress and that all the other states are in the same position that we are in. We will mail the May assistance checks immediately upon receipt of the federal matching funds. This might be in a day or so, or it might be a week before the grant reaches Austin.

"When you consider that more than 100,000 needy aged are waiting for their assistance warrants to pay grocers, rental agents, etc., the seriousness of this delay becomes apparent. I ask that people who deal with the aged give them due consideration until the checks can be released," Little said.

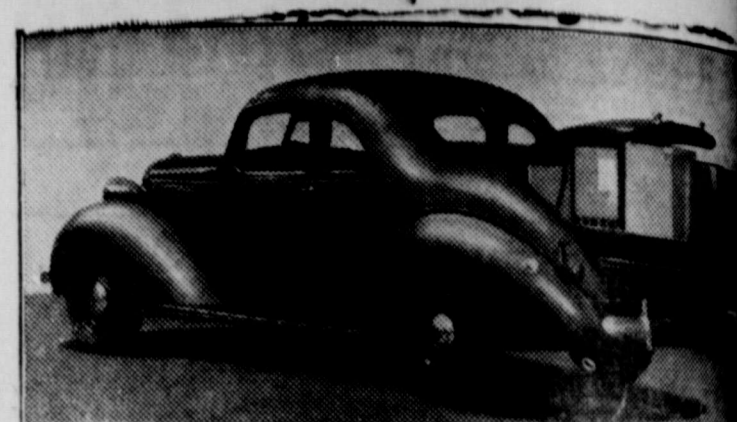
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NEW TERRAPLANE COUPE ALSO IS LIGHT TRUCK

The picture shows the new Utility with pick-up box extended to its full length (it can be pulled out one of three positions). The steel box, which is mounted on rubbered metal rollers, is 49 1/2 inches long, 38 inches wide, 11 1/4 inches deep has a loading height of 32 inches under the rear deck door. This may be removed. "SECTION TWO: That Section Twenty-One of said Ordinance No. 192 be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"SECTION TWENTY-ONE: Any person operating or driving an automobile, motorcycle, truck, or any other vehicle, and backing or causing same to move in reverse out from the curb at which same is parked as provided in Paragraph (A) of Section Two (2) of this Ordinance, shall back the same to the right, determined with reference to the direction in which such vehicle is headed, until the length of such vehicle is parallel to the length of the street, keeping the speed of such vehicle at not more than three (3) miles per hour, and shall then proceed along the street in the direction in which such vehicle is headed."

"SECTION THREE: That said Ordinance No. 192, save and except as expressly amended by the terms of this Ordinance, shall be and remain in full force and effect, and the provisions of Section Twenty-Six of said Ordinance shall apply to any violation of the amendments herein made to said Ordinance No. 192.

PASSED, and ordered published by the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, and approved by the Mayor, this 12th day of May, A. D. 1937.

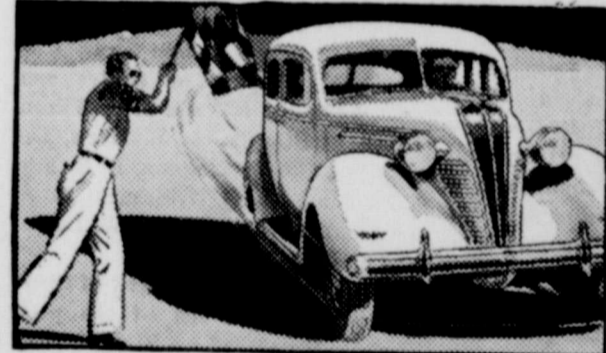

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article
III of the Constitution of the State
of Texas by adopting a new Section
to be known as section 51d, which
shall provide that the Legislature
shall have the power to provide, un-
der such limitations and restrictions
as may be deemed by the Legislature
expedient for assistance to destitute
children and for the payment of same
not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) for
one child or Twelve Dollars (\$12)
for the children of any one family
per month; further providing that
the Legislature may impose such re-
strictions and regulations as to it
may seem expedient; providing that
the amount to be expended out of
State funds in any one year for such
assistance shall never exceed the sum
of One Million, Five Hundred Thou-
sand Dollars (\$1,500,000); and pro-
viding that the Legislature shall
have the authority to accept from the
Government of the United States
financial aid for assistance to desti-
tute children; providing for an elec-
tion on the question of adoption or
rejection of such amendment and
making an appropriation therefor;
providing for the proclamation and
publication thereof, and prescribing
the form of ballot.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature

Section 1. That Article III of the
Constitution of the State of Texas be
amended by adding thereto a Section
to be known as Section 51d, which
shall read as follows:

"Section 51d. Subject to be limita-
tions and restrictions herein con-
tained, and such other limitations,
restrictions, and regulations as may
be provided by law, the Legislature
shall have the power to provide for
assistance to destitute children under
the age of fourteen (14) years; such
assistance shall not exceed Eight
Dollars (\$8) per month for one child
nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12)
per month for such children of any
one family; provided that the
amount to be expended for such as-
sistance out of State funds shall
never exceed the sum of One Million,
Five Hundred Thousand Dollars
(\$1,500,000) per year. The Legis-
lature may impose residential restric-
tions and such other restrictions,
limitations, and regulations as to it
may seem expedient.

"The Legislature shall have the au-
thority to accept from the Govern-
ment of the United States such fi-
nancial assistance to destitute chil-
dren as that Government may offer
not inconsistent with the restrictions
herein above provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitu-
tional Amendment shall be sub-
mitted to a vote of the qualified elec-
tors of this State at an election to
be held throughout the State on the
fourth Monday in August, 1937, at
which election all voters favoring the
proposed Amendment shall write or
have printed on their ballots the
following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State
Constitution providing for assistance
to destitute children under the age
of fourteen (14) years not to ex-
ceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month
for one child nor more than Twelve
Dollars (\$12) per month for such
children of any one family, and pro-
viding for acceptance from the Gov-
ernment of the United States of
America financial assistance for such
payment."

Those voters opposing said pro-
posed Amendment shall write or have
printed on their ballots the words:
"AGAINST the Amendment to the
State Constitution providing for as-
sistance to destitute children under
the age of fourteen (14) years not
to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per
month for one child nor more than
Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for
such children of any one family, and
providing for acceptance from the
Government of the United States of
America financial assistance for such
payment."

If it appears from the returns of
said election that a majority of the
votes cast are in favor of said
Amendment, the same shall become
a part of the State constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State
of Texas shall issue the necessary
proclamation for said election and
shall have the same published as re-
quired by the Constitution for
Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand
Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof
as may be necessary, is hereby ap-
propriated out of any funds in the
Treasury of the State, not otherwise
appropriated, to pay the expenses
of such publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section
16, Article XVI, of the Constitution
of Texas; providing that the Legis-
lature shall authorize the incorpo-
ration of banking bodies and provide
for the supervision and regulation of
same; providing for all of the capital
stock to be subscribed and paid for
before charter issued; restricting
foreign corporations from doing
banking business, restricting corpo-
rate business to one place.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature

Section 1. That Section 16, Article
XVI, of the Constitution of Texas,
be amended so as to hereafter read
as follows:

"Section 16. The Legislature shall
by general laws, authorize the in-
corporation of corporate bodies with
banking and discounting privileges,
and shall provide for a system of
State supervision, regulation and
control of such bodies which will
adequately protect and secure the
depositors and creditors thereof.

"No such corporate body shall be
chartered until all of the authorized
capital stock has been subscribed and
paid for in full in cash. Such body
corporate shall not be authorized to
engage in business at more than one
place which shall be designated in its
charter.

"No foreign corporation, other
than the national banks of the
United States, shall be permitted to
exercise banking or discounting priv-
ileges in this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment
to the Constitution shall be sub-
mitted to a vote of the qualified elec-
tors of this State at an election to
be held throughout the State on the
fourth Monday in August, 1937. At
this election all voters favoring the
proposed amendment shall write, or
have printed, on their ballots the fol-
lowing words:

"FOR the amendment of Section
16 to Article XVI of the Constitu-
tion of the State of Texas, providing
for the amount of the liability of
stock-holders in State banks."

Those voters opposing said amend-
ment shall write, or have printed, on
their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the amendment of Sec-
tion 16 of Article XVI of the Con-
stitution of the State of Texas, pro-
viding for the amount of the liability
of stock-holders in State banks."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State
of Texas is hereby directed to issue
the necessary proclamation for such
election, and to have same published
as required by the Constitution and
the amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand
Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much there-
of as may be necessary, is hereby
appropriated out of any funds of the
State of Texas, not otherwise appro-
priated, to pay the expenses of such
election.

Motorists Show Interest In Road System It Is Indicated

Interest in the future of the road system on the part of the average motorist is reflected in returns from post card questionnaires distributed during the vehicle registration period by the State-Federal Highway Planning Survey. J. T. Barton, director of the financial unit of the survey, has indicated, the returns covered 31.7 per cent of the motor vehicles registered, an unusually high percentage, it was said.

The returns from Texas motorists, he said, are greatly in excess of the questionnaires returned by motorists in other states.

Information given on the cards is being tabulated and will play an important part in determining the future road program. The data included the residence of the owner, whether rural or urban, the mileage traveled during the past, the gallons of gasoline consumed, and the number of miles per gallon.

Starr county led in percentage of returns with 89.1 per cent. Lamar county was second with 73 per cent, Jefferson county, third, with 72 per cent, Shackelford county, fourth, with 69.2, and Andrews county, fifth, with 67.6 per cent. Several counties reported returns in excess of 60 per cent while nearly a score exceeded 50 per cent.
