Floyd County Wheat Test Plot Was Seeded Oct. 20, At Aiken

Floyd County wheat test plot seeded, October 20, on the farm of L. Brown, Aiken community.

Sixteen producers cooperating with the county have furnished a quart of wheat seed which they were to plant themselves this year.

The demonstration plot was planted with the use of commercial fertilizer and the row was planted with commercial fertilizer at the rate of 70 per acre of Ammonium Sul-

phate. The demonstration has two features: (1) to acquaint the irrigation with the use of fertilizer; (2) to maintain all wheat producers the use of a pure variety of wheat for planting.

Many cases wheat growers realize that they may be producing a superior grade of wheat. The demonstration plot is a fair uniform piece of land which has access to irrigation which also insure the success of the demonstration.

The demonstration plot can be visited from time to time and interested in the project is to visit the demonstration as it can easily be reached which is on highway 28 one and one-half miles East of Aiken on the west side of the road.

Two state highway patrolmen arrived here Monday and began their work giving tests and issuing driver's license Tuesday morning. Max Westerman and T. C. Laws, highway patrolmen, stated Tuesday that they would be stationed in Floydada each Tuesday from 8:30 until 12:00, and would be glad to assist applicants for driver's license.

All persons desiring license, who do not at present hold license, will be required to undergo a driver's test under the supervision of these officials before receiving permits to drive.

The test includes a thorough eye-sight test, color tests, road sign tests, and an actual driving test. Those desiring licenses should see Mr. Westerman or Mr. Laws at the Tax Collector's Office on Tuesday within the hours stated above.

Boy Scouts And Leaders Are Better Informed Following Inspection

Rural Electrification Administration Announce Lubbock Co. Allotment

Local Gins Reach Total Of 6,412 Bales At Noon Wednesday

Local gins reported that a total of 6,412 bales of cotton had been ginned up until noon Wednesday, with approximately 75 bales on the yards and 159 in storage. A survey at the same time last week gave a total of only 5,100.

Many farmers are completing their gathering, while others have scarcely begun. Gainers stated that at the present it would be difficult to estimate the number of bales that would be ginned before the season closes.

### CORPS IS TRAINED IN CRACKING SAFES

**But It's All Part of a Plan to Outwit Yeggs.**

Chicago.—There is a building here where men pass their days cracking safes, blazing away with revolvers at window glass, practicing bank holdups and topping things off with sessions in a tear-gas chamber to see how much of it they can take.

Their seemingly criminal occupation is strictly legitimate. They are the staff of the Underwriters' laboratories, a nonprofit organization engaged in protecting law-abiding citizens from criminals and in promoting safety.

Go into the basement. You may see a couple of men hammering a bright new safe all to pieces. The strong box has been sent to them by its manufacturer so they can prove it is all they assert it to be.

The testers know all the tricks a yegg can muster, and probably more. With hammer, chisel, acetylene torch and even nitroglycerin they go at it. If the safe stands them off for a prescribed length of time, it's a pretty sure bet no burglar will be able to open it.

Tests in these laboratories have made automobile construction safer; building materials have been made stronger; fire and burglar alarm systems improved and holdups made more risky.

One of the most trying jobs laboratory assistants have to undertake is the testing of tear gas. And it is one of the most dangerous.



## Extension Service Chemist Spent November 17, In Floyd County

M. K. Thornton, chemist for the Extension Service, spent Wednesday, November 17, in Floyd County assisting County Agent D. F. Bredthauer, Frank Buckley, county agent of Motley county, and Finley White, county agent of Briscoe county in studies of soil in this territory. With the development of extensive irrigation in Floyd County, Agent Bredthauer is particularly anxious to assist farmers with their soil problems from the standpoint of higher yields per acre to help defray the expenses of irrigation.

Under the study of soils comes the use of fertilizer which supplies three forms of plant foods most necessary for growing crops, namely, nitrogen, phosphoric acid, and potash. For best results, other conditions should be favorable, such as a well-drained soil in good physical condition, a well prepared seed bed, good seed, good cultivation sufficient rainfall or irrigation, and suitable rotation. Nitrogen is the most expensive plant food, and for this reason the amount of fertilizer used generally does not supply all of the nitrogen required by the crop. A cropping system which includes the regular growing of suitable legumes, such as clover, cowpeas, soy beans, velvet beans, peanuts, or alfalfa, should be followed for the purpose of securing nitrogen from the air, provided the legumes crops can be grown to advantage. A suitable rotation also adds organic matter to the soil, utilizes time and labor to better advantage, aids in controlling insect pests and plant diseases, and has other favorable effects.

NEW YORK—The same technique of using electrical prospecting methods—often likened to electrical divining rods—which has worked so successfully in discovering oil, gold and other minerals, is now being used to find deposits of coal in Pennsylvania.

Scientists told the meeting of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers here that the new electrical methods, based on how well a seam of coal conducts electricity, were successful in the Mahanoy coal fields which already have been worked for 70 years.

Locating Anthracite Pits  
Most of the coal seams, Dr. Maurice Ewing, A. P. Crary, J. W. Peoples and J. A. Peoples, Jr., describe in their report, were worked near the surface in the past but since the workings were never completely or accurately mapped complete extraction of the coal from older pits was not obtained. In consequence, they point out, virgin bodies of coal, not heretofore known, are yet to be found.

## Now It's All Right to Mow Your Dandelions

ANN ARBOR, MICH.—Dandelions have almost ceased from troubling lawn-anxious householders; but Prof. Carl D. LaRue of the University of Michigan is offering, for future reference, the results of his study of seed behavior in the heads of dandelions moved before the seeds were ripe.

He undertook his investigation because he had received many inquiries as to whether dandelion heads cut by the lawnmower would go on and ripen seeds that would sprout later. He cut off a large number of the heads at various stages of development and let them lie on moist moss until they had fully dried. Then he examined and placed the seeds under conditions for germination.

He found that in all heads cut at any stage before the white down ("pappus" to botanists) began to show above the closed green sheath after the petals had wilted, the seeds looked quite unpromising and that their germination performance did not bode their looks. They all failed to sprout; in fact, after ten days they had all decayed.

Professor LaRue concludes: "Apparently then, until the white of the dandelion pappus begins to extend beyond the green involucre tips, the heads may be cut and allowed to dry on the lawn without any danger of spreading the seed."
