Most of the grasshoppers are still found along the fence rows and in alfalfa fields and it wil be easier to exterminate these now than after they migrate from





#### Canada Pit Keeps Gold Mining Lead

Porcupine Camp Heads All In Production.

WINNIPEG, MAN .- Despite power shortage, poor transportation facilities, adverse weather conditions and lack of capital, the central Canada mining industry fought its way to new standard levels during the past 12 months and reached an alltime high in production.

Canada's yield of gold, copper, zinc and lead showed steady increase last year, and while prices for base metals were considerably lower throughout the year than for short of those for the previous year. In the case of gold, prices were considerably higher.

After 27 years of production, the Porcupine camp still leads the westworld in the production of gold, followed closely by Canada's second Kirkland field. Both are in Ontario. The Ontario gold output for the

\$100,000,000 mark.

However, Manitoba, too, has many gold prospects. San Antonio, God's ake, Gunnar, Gold and Beresford Lake mines top the list as gold producers, while many others are steadily extending operations.

"Joined as a link in the chain of Canadian provinces that have endowed the rock formations or pre-Cambian age, Manitoba is justified in anticipating a long and successful mineral history," J. S. McDiarmid, minister of mines of the province, said in a statement.

At northern Manitoba's leading mining town, Flin Flon, the Hudson Bay Mining and Smelting company is preparing to sink a new shaft to a depth of approximately 4,500 feet. An estimated 200,000 tons of rock will be moved in the operation. The hoist which will service this shaft will be the biggest yet installed in Canada, and possibly in the world.

#### Delaware Asks Control

Of Ocean 27 Miles Out DOVER, DEL .- Delaware has laid claim to all of the Atlantic ocean which lies within 27 miles of its

Jurisdiction of the federal government does not extend beyond the three-mile limit, but the Delaware senate recently passed a bill to extend that limit, as far as the state is concerned, to a point 27 miles offshore.

The bill adds a minimum of approximately 621 square miles of water to the 405 square miles within the state's jurisdiction under the old three-mile limit. The addition would be larger, but for the fact that the southern tip of New Jersey lies within the 27-mile limit.

Extension of the jurisdictional limit is based on the theory that coast artillery guns now can shoot 27 miles. When the three-mile limit was established in 1702, that was the range of muzzle-loading cannon.

> Texas sportsmen, in general, are only now recognizing the Peccary as a game animal capable of producing considerable sport, but nimrods from other states are invading Southwest Texas in increasing numbers each

They find Peccaries are capable of doing considerable damage to the unwary hunter and his dogs. Peccaries reach a weight of fifty pounds and its meat is regarded as table fare, but in order to prevent the meat from becoming permeated with a strong taste, it is necessary to cut away a muskbag, found on the rump, immediately after the animal is killed. By doing this the sportsman not only finds he has a fine trophy to go alongside others in his den, but that he has supplies for the larder.

Wild hogs, now found in only twenty-two counties of Texas, formerly ranged over most of the state. Many references are found in the writings of early-day naturalists, hunters and explorers to the ferociousness of the Peccary when it is cornered. Many present-day hunters and other residents of Southwest Texas, who have been forced to hastily retreat to the refuge of a tree or rock pile, where they sat for hours watching the milling wild hogs gnashing their ugly tusks and hearing the herd utter its shrill war cry. can attest to the gameness of the animal when it is aroused.

Short-legged, but fleet, the Peccary boasts long tusks and it is with these and its sharp hoofs that it does considerable damage to its natural

H. P. Attwater, Texas naturalist for whom the Attwater prairie chick. en is named, related in his writings sent a card instructing him to send in 1896 that "the Peccary was widely hunted for its hide and as food, but that sportsmen also sought them." Too, he recorded the fact that the hides were used as currency in Zavalla County in 1886. Since that time the hides have been exported, mostly to France, where they were made into ladies' gloves. The bristles are

# Driving Hazards | Poll Tax Ruling Is

Biggest Travel Year in Our Histoy Spells More Accidents.

MINNEAPOLIS. - Chances are about one in twenty that your family car will be involved in a crash this year in which someone will be killed or injured. The chances are one in five or better that you will witness such a crash, or reach the scene soon enough to be of help, and you need to know only a few simple first-aid rules, according to the medical department of Northwestern National Life Insurance company.

Driving hazards will be greater in 1939, the report warns. Indications the country's history. With two world's fairs in operation, there will be more fast, long-distance traffic on the highways. There will be more strange drivers hurrying through cities and towns, unfamiliar with local driving rules and customs. These conditions spell more accidents, and close to a million and a quarter casualties in 1939.

Accidents More Ser'ous.

Injuries in motor accidents today are much more serious, on the average, than a few years ago, due to faster driving. More multiple fractures of the lower limbs occur. Skull fractures are more frequent. More spinal injuries are found, due to the whiplash effect of collisions at high speed.

Moving victims often causes a fractured bone to jam through the flesh, causing much graver injury; spinal injuries may be made fatal by move-

use artificial respiration at once. 4. Cover victim with coats or blankets and keep him warm. Crash injuries are nearly always accompanied by shock, which calls for warmth, and a position with the head lower than the feet.

In Case of Bleeding.

5. If there is severe bleeding, apply a pad of the cleanest material check bleeding. If bleeding is from a cut on a limb, a tourniquet may be used instead, between the wound and the heart.

6. Send somebody to summon a policeman or highway patrolman at once, while you call the nearest doctor; if no doctor is immediately available and injuries seem serious, phone the nearest emergency hos pital for an ambulance. Be careful to give clear directions for reaching the spot.

7. Do not attempt to transport victim in a private car, unless certain his injuries are trivial. Anyone with serious injuries should be moved only in a reclining position, which is impossible in a passenger auto-

Pilots of planes will be able to lock the doors of the plane from the cockpit, and motorists will be able to do likewise by moving a lever on the dash-

The lock dispenses with keyholes knobs or spindles.

#### Majolica Derives Name From Island of Majorca

The true majolica ware is a form of painted and enameled earthen ware sometimes finished with a brilliant luster and always very decorative in character. The name is derived from the fact that the first specimens of this ware were imported to Italy from the small island of Majorca, one of the Balearic isles, off the coast of Spain. The Saracens flourished in this group of islands

In 1115, the Crusaders captured Majorca, and many pieces of the pottery found their way to Italy. The Italians improved the ware to such an extent that some very fine examples of painted and enameled pottery with a luster finish were sometimes before it was fired and sometimes after. The earlier and more decorative pieces were painted on the unfired ground which absorbed the colors, much of their medieval style and design until the Fifteenth century.

Wars of the Roses

The Wars of the Roses were a series of civil wars in England between the rival houses of York and Lancaster in the latter half of the Fifteenth century. They were so named because the badge of Lancaster was a red rose and that of York was a white rose. The House of Lancaster had obtained the throne of England in 1399. When Henry V died, he left as heir a child nine months old who proved both physically and mentally unfit. Under these circumstances Richard, duke of York, claimed the throne. The wars ended with the defeat and death of Richard III at Bosworth, August 22, 1485, and the succession of Henry VII, representing the house of Lancaster, whose marriage with a Yorkish princess, united the conflicting

Marine Hospitals

The marine hospitals of the United States public health service are supported by appropriations made by congress for the "pay of personne and maintenance of hospitals of the United States." From 1798 until 1886 they were maintained by a tax of 20 cents per month which was collected by the collector of customs from each sailor on American merchant marine ships. From 1886 to 1906 a special tonnage tax provided their maintenance. Since 1906 the hospitals have been maintained by direct appropriations made by

About the Panama Canal The canal works and other improvements in the Canal Zone are the property of the Unted States government. In a strictly technical sense, the United States did not acquire title to any territory in Panama by the Isthmian treaty of 1903. It obtained a perpetual right of occupation, use and control over the land within the zone. For this privilege it paid \$10,000,000 outright, and pays a rental of \$250,000 annually during the life of the treaty.

Non-Smokers in College Forty per cent of the students at Niagara university at Niagara Falls, N. Y., do not smoke, according to a survey by the business statistics class under the guidance of Bernard P. Guerin, instructor in the school of business. The average cigarette smoker consumes about half a pack a day, according to the survey. Only seven students consumed more than a pack a day.
