each additional percent, beginning at 14. Charles Thomas of Pampa, wheat producer and member of the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee, said undoubtedly a lot more farmers will take advantage of the wheat loan this year than did last

year, as the 1939 program has come out in time for the farmer to give it. plenty of thought and soon enough for the AAA to set up lending mechanism before harvest is too far along.

Wheat loans likely will be made in 127 counties this year, he said.

To explain how the wheat loan and protein premium apply, Thomas cited the hypothetical Mr. Blank of Potter county.

Mr. Blank supposedly has 1,000 bushels of No. 2 hard red winter wheat with a protein test of 14 per cent. The basic loan rate for Texas is the Galveston rate of 85 cents. Subtract 21 cents (freight rate from Potter county to Galveston) and 3 cents (handling charge). That leaves 61 cents. Add 2 cents (protein pre. mium) and that nets Mr. Blank 63 cents a bushel on 1,000 bushels, or \$630. Without the premium he would have been able to borrow only \$610 on his wheat.

Pouliry And Green How Do You Like Feeds Both to be Considered

A poultry flock without green feeds or green feed substitutes is a poultry flock without profit.

This flat statement comes from Geo. P. McCarthy, poultry husband. man of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who points out that research workers are agreed that six of the known vitamins are esential to profitable poultry production, and that of these vitamin A, which comes primarily from green feeds, is the most likely to be deficient in Texas poultry rations.

Absence of vitamin A, even for a short time, lowers the resistance of the birds to diseases and, over a longer period, brings on the serious condition known as nutritional roup.

Tests with identical lots of 25 white leghorn pullets fed identical diets and supplemented with vitamin A showed that one lot without vitamins produced only 682 eggs while another lot supplemented with green alfalfa was producing 3,021 eggs.

Fresh green feeds are the most economical source of vitamin A. Mc. Carthy says. Most commonly used are alfalfa, barley, oats, wheat, lettuce, Swiss chard, sudan grass, kale and johnson grass. Vitamin content is highest before the woody or mature stage is reached.

Yellow and red carrots, yellow corn, and dried greens, such as alfalfa meal, alfalfa leaf meal, and cured alfalfa or peanut hay are also sources of vitamin A. Freshness, color, and freeness from excessive stems are indications of high vitamin content.

Several cod-liver oils are good sources of vitamin A, but poultrymen should investigate the content and buy only those oils that have been tested




