Castro County News to be sworn Friday

Dimmitt attorney Jack R Miller will take the oath of 16 Pages office Friday as the new judge of the 64th Judicial District. He'll be sworn in by his predecessor, Judge John T.

Boyd, at a public ceremony at 4 p.m. Friday in the district courtroom here. A reception will follow. Gov. Bill Clements announced Miller's appointment


to the judge's post last Wednesday afternoon. Miller is believed to be the first Castro County man ever to hold a state judgeship.

Miller, 51, will succeed Judge Boyd, who held the post 13 years before being appointed by the governor in August to the new Seventh Court of Appeals in Amarillo. Miller's appointive term will expire Dec. 31, 1982. He announced this week that he will seek election to a full term in the Democratic primary election next May.

The 64th District Court serves Hale, Swisher and Castro Counties, in tandem with the newer 242nd District Court. Approximately 70 to 80% of the court's case load originates in Plainview.

"However, I plan to continue to live in Dimmitt as long as I can adequately handle the job," Miller said. "I will have an office in the courthouses of all three counties."

Miller will assume his new fulltime duties and work out the staffing of his offices after he returns from a state judicial conference in Corpus Christi next week, "and I'll be trying at the same time to wind up the obligations of my law practice, he said.

Current USDA figures indicate production costs per acre on all commodities are increasing. Yet at the same time, prices on these same commodities are falling.

As an example, Moeller cited wheat, whose average price in July was \$3.55 a bushel, 41 cents per bushel less than a year ago. Yet the production costs were 15 percent more this year than in 1980.





hopes to further the field of conservation and improve the producers farming operations.


