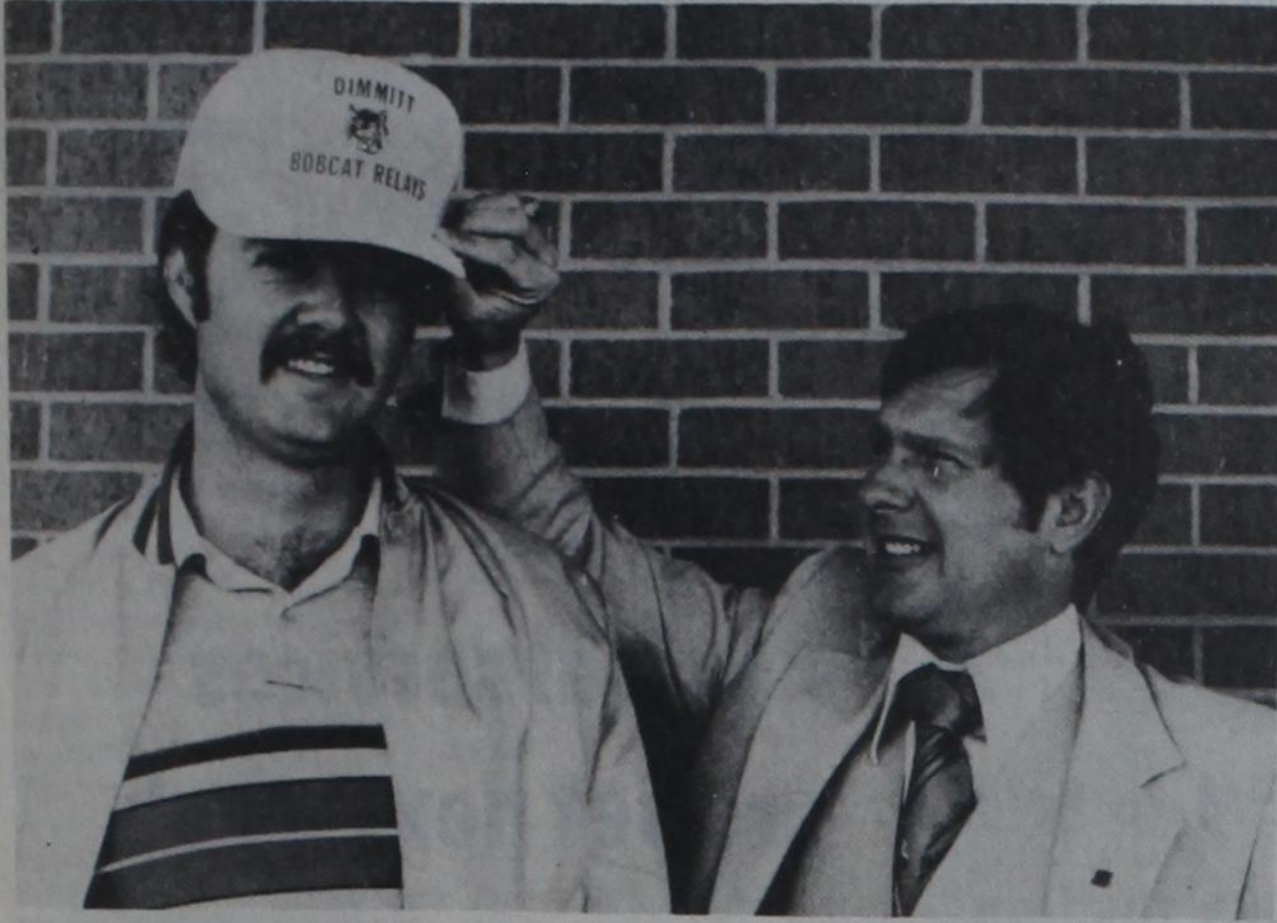

Over 200 expected for Bobcat Relays Saturday

More than 200 athletes from 13 area high schools will be attending the Dimmitt Bobcat Relays Saturday in the Dimmitt stadium.

Field events and running preliminaries will begin at 8:30 a.m., and the finals will be at 12:20 p.m. Scoring will be conducted according to UIL scoring.

Participants in the meet will include 11 girls' teams and ten boys' teams with between ten and 15 members on each

team.

The girls' teams planning to compete are from Kress, Vega, Spur, Hart, Hale Center, Farwell, Friona, Petersburg, Springlake, Bovina and Dimmitt.

The boys' teams are from Nazareth, Littlefield, Hart, Hale Center, Farwell, Friona, Petersburg, Springlake, Bovina and Dimmitt.

Meet director will be Kenneth Cleveland. George Rasor, DHS track coach, is

helping coordinate the activities. Meet referee will be Randy Lightfoot from Plainview.

The Bobcat Relays are being sponsored by the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce. Volunteers from among chamber members and members of various service organizations in Dimmitt are helping to staff the meet.

Three more markers eyed

Mrs. L. B. Bowden told the county commissioners Monday in an annual report that the Castro County Historical Society is working toward adding three historical markers, getting a marker supplement, updating cemetery records, having 25 Indian campsites recorded with the state and preparing for the 150th birthday of Texas in 1986.

The state has approved a joint effort with Deaf Smith County to place a marker at the World War II Prisoner of War Camp Chapel in the northern part of Castro County.

Mrs. Bowden said that work is progressing on a marker application to designate the 1891 shoot-out on the old Main Street of Dimmitt involving Sheriff Ira Aten and

the McClellan brothers.

The society is also applying for a marker at Dameron Corner in Summerfield. A supplemental marker for the J. W. Carter Family historical marker has been shipped, but not yet received, Mrs. Bowden added.

Cemetery records are being updated to the present from the 1969 book published by the local genealogical society.

Members of the organization have located 25 Indian campsites in Castro County including one of an aboriginal people that contained artifacts dated as early as 8000 B.C. The site is authentic, Mrs. Bowden said, adding that all findings have to be validated with maps and photos. The society is presently asking for state verification on one campsite.

In regard to the 150th birthday of Texas, Mrs. Bowden said, "It will be 1986 before we're ready for it." The historical society has begun to formulate plans, and the county commissioners said that they would help whenever possible.

The Castro County History Book will be entered in a competition in the annual Texas Historical Commission meeting April 15-17 in Brenham, she added.

In other business, the county governing board:

—Approved a resolution stating that the county judge is authorized to sign the application for a Criminal Justice Grant of \$5,000 for juvenile probation officer services in Swisher and [See HISTORY, Page 9]

Voters' deadline is April 1

May 1 is the date for the Democratic and Republican Party primaries, but if you want to vote in them you must be a registered voter on or before April 1.

Voter registration doesn't cost anything, and forms for registering may be picked up at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office on the first floor of the courthouse.

"The filled out forms must be back in our office by 5 p.m. on April 1," Tax Assessor-Collector Billy Hackleman said.

There are several contested races on the state and county levels in both primaries.

On the state level in the Democratic primary, contested races include for the office of governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, land commissioner, agriculture commissioner, railroad commissioner, Supreme Court of Texas, places 1, 2, and 3, Court of Criminal Appeals, judges for places 1 and 2, and for representation to the United States Senate.

On the local level for the Democrats, contested races include for the office of county judge, district-county clerk, county commissioner for Precinct 2, and county commissioner for Precinct 4.

The Republicans have no contested races on the local level. On the state level, the contested races are for governor, comptroller of public accounts, and land commissioner.

So, if you want a choice, get out and vote; and if you want to vote, get out and register.

SPRING'S MIRACLE—If the calendar hadn't told you that Saturday was the first day of spring, you'd know it by the beautiful blossoms that have been popping out on many fruit trees in the area. This lone blossom was the last one on a young apricot tree. Whether by ones or by hundreds, the blossoms have "set" the summer's fruit on plum, apricot and

peach trees in the area, and the cherry and apple blossoms shouldn't be far behind. Although temperatures have dipped below the freezing mark several times since blossoming began, the nights have been calm, and not cold enough to stunt the fruit crops on most trees.

New brochure published

A new community survey of Dimmitt has been compiled by the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce and published by Southwestern Public Service Co. The information is being sent to industries that might consider locating in our area.

Chamber Manager Delores Heller said that seeking new industry is a major goal of the CoC.

"We need to upgrade Dimmitt, to bring up the quality of living here," she added.

The survey gives information on the city's location, population, climate, community facilities, education,

medical information and recreation facilities. The brochure contains facts about communications, government, financial institutions, taxes, utilities and services. It also has an analysis of labor, agriculture and transportation.

"The Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce is very active in community development," the new brochure says, adding, "The Industrial Committee is in place and working to answer your questions. Dimmitt wants to grow!" Information offered in the new brochure includes these facts and statistics:

—Dimmitt's elevation is 3,854 ft. above sea level.

Castro County has a population of 10,556, and Dimmitt has a population of 5,019, as of 1980.

The average annual temperature for Dimmitt is 56.9 degrees, with an average of 36.6 degrees in January and 77.2 degrees in July. Annual average rainfall is 17.36 inches and the annual average snowfall is 11.2 inches. There are usually 193 days between killing frosts. The city has about 85 days per year of over 90 degree temperatures.

—The city has 16 Protestant churches and one Catholic

church. It has three motels with 61 rooms, one shopping center, six department stores, and one public library with 17,900 books.

—The 1981-82 budget for the Dimmitt Independent School District is \$4,098,085, with a bonded indebtedness of \$1.2 million. Richardson Elementary School has 687 students and 62 teachers, Dimmitt Middle School has 376 students and 30 teachers.

—Dimmitt's one private school, Lucky-U Christian School, has 39 students and four teachers.

State champions continue to reap honors

The county's two state championship basketball teams and their coaches continued to reap post-season honors this week.

And it wasn't just the state champions who were singled out for honors. In all, three

local girls, three boys and two coaches were named to regional and/or state honor teams.

The local honor players are Kevin Cleveland, Jeff Watts and Sonya Andrews of Dimmitt, and Roxane Birken-

feld, Karen Birkenfeld and Calvin Schulte of Nazareth.

Dimmitt juniors Kevin Cleveland, 5-11 guard, and Jeff Watts, 6-4 post forward, both were named to three honor squads — the consensus all-state team, chosen by

the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches; the All-South Plains Team, named by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal; and the Panhandle Boys' Basketball Super Team, selected by the Amarillo News-Globe.

The All-South Plains and Panhandle Super Team selections were family affairs for Cleveland and his father, Bobcat Coach Ken Cleveland. While Kevin was named the Class AAA Player of the Year in the All-South Plains selections, his father was chosen as the Class AAA South Plains Coach of the Year for the third time. The Dimmitt basketball mentor also was named the Coach of the Year for all classes in the Panhandle Super Team selections.

In its All-South Plains girls' team selections, the Avalanche-Journal named Dimmitt's Sonya Andrews, a 5-7 senior, to the Class AAA first team.

Also, Nazareth Swiftette Coach Joe Lombard was named the Class A girls' basketball Coach of the Year in the All-South Plains selections, and two of his senior all-stars were chosen for post-season all-star games.

Karen Birkenfeld was chosen to play for the West team in the annual Golden Spread All-Star Game in the Amarillo Civic Center Saturday evening.

Two teams of Panhandle all-star players from all class-

es will compete in the game at 7 p.m. in the Amarillo Civic Center. The game will precede the championship game of the National Women's Invitational Tournament.

Roxane Birkenfeld, a three-time all-stater, will compete in the Texas North-South All-Star Game later this year. She was also named to the Texas Panhandle Girls' Basketball Super Team and the Class A All-South Plains Team.

Another Nazareth player joined the all-state ranks this week when Calvin Schulte of the regional finalist Nazareth Swifts was named to the Class A all-state third team by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches (TABC), as well as to the Class A All-South Plains first team.

Schulte, a 6-0 senior guard, was a starter on the Swift team that reached the state's Final Four in Class A two years ago, and this year was the leading scorer for the team that came within four points of another trip to the state tournament.

Other area players named to the Class A all-state squad were Richey Fuston of Valley, 6-7 senior, first team; and Galen Kunka of Follett, 5-7 junior, third team.

Cleveland was named to the TABC Class AAA all-state first team, along with Edwin Mitchell of Diboll, Donald Craver of Linden-Kildare,

Patrick Murphree of Decatur, Gary Nelson of Denver City and Rodney Cannon of Abernathy.

Watts was named to the Class AAA all-state third team.

During their team's climb

to the state championship, Cleveland and Watts played against every other member of the all-state first team except Murphree of Decatur.

Other North Texas players named in the TABC all-state selections were Littlefield

junior James Randel (second team) and Perryton senior Gary Rinker (third team).

The all-state squad also included two other state tournament players — junior Bay Bay Gibson of Diboll and [See CHAMPIONS, Page 9]

IRS says form 1040A is easy

Most taxpayers who use the 1040A form when filing their 1981 Federal income tax returns should be able to prepare it themselves, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Last year 41 percent of U.S. taxpayers used the short Form 1040A when filing their returns.

In urging 1040A filers to try to do the 1040A themselves, the IRS points out that the form contains only 18 lines, and comes with easy-to-understand, step-by-step instructions explaining how to fill it in.

Form 1040A can be used by taxpayers whose income consists only of wages, salaries, tips, interest, dividends, and unemployment compensation for the taxable year. Form 1040A filers also must have a total income of \$50,000 or less.

The IRS stressed that under certain conditions — for example, when itemizing deductions, claiming adjustments to income or a tax credit — taxpayers cannot file Form 1040A. The tax instructions taxpayers receive in the mail cover this information.

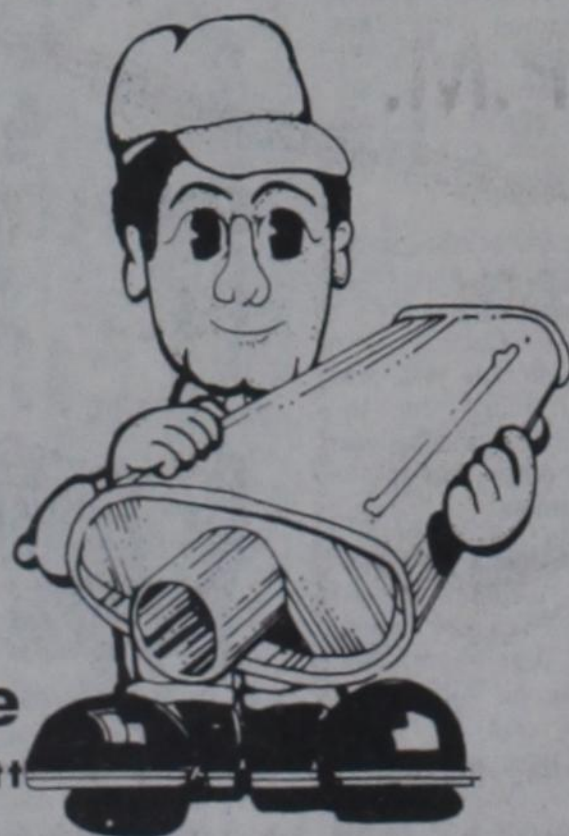

View from the library

The effects of television on people's ideas can be astonishing. Were it not for an HBO program, the name Nostradamus would never have come to our attention here at the library.

Known as Michel de Nostradamus, this man actually was a physician in France in the 1500's. He became well known through his successful and somewhat unorthodox treatment of the plague which still afflicted Europe from time to time. In his medical practice he used astrology. The use of astrology at the time was wide spread. Apparently Nostradamus also used a method of "seeing" or scrying, a method for which he had both a penchant and a talent. In fact, it seems to be so successful that he gave up medicine toward the end of his career completely and devoted the whole of his attention to scrying. Scrying is the practice of making observations with the use of one's intuition. The "seer" allows his subconscious mind to work while musing over cards or crystals.

In 1555 the results of the seings of Nostradamus were published in a book called "Centuries." It became popular and widely acclaimed. Nostradamus finished his life as a court astrologer and physician to Charles the Ninth. The prophecies, written in obscure four-lined verses, however, continued to

be popular and were regularly consulted until 1781 when the Catholic Church condemned them.

Today, because the prophecies seem to coincide with many twentieth century events, like the rise of Hitler, and others, there continues to be a vital interest in the writings of Nostradamus. There are several excellent books and translations concerning them (however none of them seem to be available right now in the Texas Panhandle).

For those of you who have asked for Nostradamus materials, the Library is continuing its assault on bookstores, interlibrary loan departments and book subscription companies. One of them is bound to produce something — so please be patient.

One of our patrons suggested that if we do not get any Nostradamus books we should get a seance together and call Mr. Nostradamus himself for more prophecies. That's all right by us but someone will have to provide the table. Library furniture is heavy you know.

ASCS sets deadlines

The ASCS office in Dimmitt needs to have cotton production cards (ASCS-503) as soon as all the warehouse receipts for a particular farm are returned to the gin. Net warehouse weights are to be used.

Farmers are responsible for the production shown on their cards and are encouraged to see that the gin has accounted for all their bales, modules and remnants.

The office is presently accepting applications for measurement service on wheat, barley and oats. Wednesday is the final date to put 1981 wheat, oats or barley in the loan.

Acreage designated as conservation use acreage must be cropland that was planted to a small grain or row crop in one of the previous two years. This acreage must be protect-

ed from wind and water erosion and can not be grazed from May 1 through October 31.

The closing dates to file for Federal Crop Insurance are Monday for sugar beets, next Thursday for corn and April 15 for cotton and grain sorghum.

Farmers may sign up for the 1982 Farm Program until April 16. The final certification date for wheat, oats and barley is May 15.

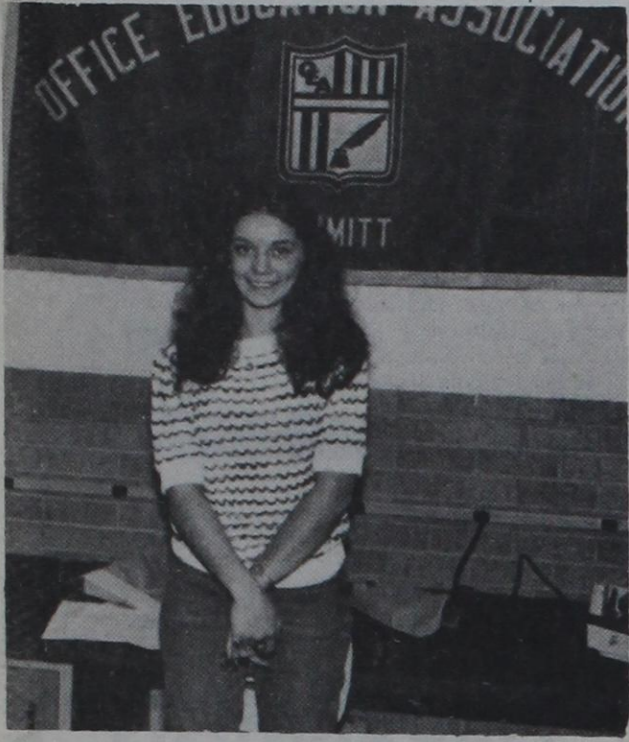

Editor of Dimmitt's first paper dies

Ulric Clifton, 87, of El Monte, Calif., died recently. He was the teenage editor of Dimmitt's first newspaper, "The Plainsman," in 1913. Mr. Clifton was born in Missouri May 10, 1894. He and his family moved to Dimmitt when he was 11 years old. He started working for the local paper, "The Plainsman," in 1908 at the age of 14 as a printer's devil, earning a dollar a week. He graduated from Dimmitt High School in 1912 and was appointed editor of the Plainsman in 1913, at the age of 19. The paper folded in the spring of 1914. Mr. Clifton moved to Plainview, where he worked on a newspaper and attended college. He also spent a year at SMU, and served in the Army during World War I. He received a commission as a second lieutenant. Later he farmed and ranched here for a couple of years before moving to the Los Angeles area in 1920. Sometime around 1945, he married Dorothy Welte. She died in 1974. Mr. Clifton worked for the Railway Express for more than 39 years before retiring in 1960. He also did income tax work. He returned to Dimmitt for several Old Settlers' Reunions in recent years. Graveside services were held for Mr. Clifton at Rose Hills Memorial Park, Los Angeles County. Survivors include his sister, Cecil Helen Henke of Santa Cruz, N.M.; a niece, Belle-marie Rice of Tiburon, Calif.; two nephews, Robert Henke of San Francisco, Calif., and George Henke of Aptos, Calif.; and three step-children, Dorothy Job of Salt Lake City, Utah, Bayard Welte of Hesperia, Calif., and Richard Welte of Mission Viejo, Calif.

Texas cities receive largest rebate ever

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$48.9 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for March. The payment is the largest representing a single month's tax collections ever distributed — 29 percent over the same period in 1981. This record payment, reflecting taxable sales made by Texas businesses in January, is the second record payment in two months, but Bullock added a note of caution. "Record sales can be one indicator of good times, but they are not an indicator of profit margins. These taxes are based on sales price or market value. True, Texans are spending more but these figures don't tell us what the merchants or suppliers or manufacturers are having to pay for the goods they buy." Dimmitt received \$10,407.01, up 3.52 percent from the March 1981 payment. Hart's check of \$557.96 is 7.8 percent less than last March. Nazareth received \$1,174.42, an increase of 2.92 percent from last year's check. Rebates to neighboring towns and cities were \$611,309.06 to Amarillo, an increase of 16.23 percent; \$827,584.25 to Lubbock, an increase of 16.22 percent; \$77,084.54 to Plainview, an increase of 10.53 percent; \$32,470.45 to Hereford, a bare increase of 0.95 percent; \$7,215.09 to Friona, an increase of 35.07 percent; and \$11,539.60 to Tulia, a de-

Excess FICA tax can be a credit

If you worked for two or more employers during 1981 and received wages totaling more than \$29,700, and more than \$1,975.05 of social security (FICA) tax was withheld, you are entitled to claim the excess social security tax withheld as a credit against your income tax.

If you file a joint return, you and your spouse must make separate computations. However, if you worked for only one employer and more than \$1,975.05 was withheld, you may not claim the excess as a credit against your income tax.

Your employer should refund the over-collection to you.

within commuting distance of Dimmitt, including West Texas State University in Canyon, Wayland Baptist University in Plainview, Texas Tech University at Lubbock and Eastern New Mexico at Portales.

—Plains Memorial Hospital has 50 beds, and South Hills Manor has 118 beds.

—Dimmitt has two dentists, two doctors and two clinics. However, another clinic and doctor have recently been added to Dimmitt's medical assets. Dimmitt also has an ambulance service.

—Recreational facilities include an indoor movie, skating rink, golf course, two city parks, three ball fields, three swimming pools and 11 tennis courts.

—Recreational facilities include the Castro County Country Club, Castro County Museum, County Expo Building, Ruskin Swim Club and the rodeo arena. The county is noted for its seasonal pheasant hunting. Nearby recreation areas include Palo Duro Canyon State Park and Lake Mackenzie.

—For communication, Dimmitt has a weekly newspaper, two out-of-town daily papers, a radio station, cable television service with 10 channels, Continental Telephone Co. service, and a Class A post office.

—The city has a mayor-alderman form of government. The Dimmitt Police Dept. has six full-time officers, and the city is also served by the Castro County Sheriff's Dept. The volunteer fire department has 24 volunteers and two full-time employees, three trucks, a tanker, a reserve and a command unit. The fire insurance rating is 21 cents.

—Dimmitt has a planning commission and zoning regulations. The total operating budget for the city for 1981-82 is \$1,211,480 with total tax collections of \$300,898. The payment of bonds and capital expenses is \$254,928, the bonded debt is \$40,000, and revenue bonds total \$1,350,000.

—The First State Bank has total assets of \$53,368,473.17. Three savings and loan associations here have total assets of \$105,069,131.58.

—Southwestern Public Service Co. supplies electricity; the City of Dimmitt

—As of November, the county's work force totaled 4,033, drawing labor from a radius of 50 miles. The estimated work force available is 900 males and 1,500 females. The annual number of high school graduates is 93. There is no working union here.

—State Highways 194 and 86 serve the area. In addition, US 385 runs north and south through Dimmitt. Dimmitt has one daily train, FW&D, Tex Pack motor freight carrier, United Parcel Service, and a municipal airport with runway length of 4,000 feet.

—The nearest commercial air service is in Amarillo. Carriers include Braniff, TWA, Southwest, Texas International, American and Air Midwest. The nearest bus depot is in Hereford.

—Local taxes are based on a \$100 valuation with city taxes of 61 cents, county taxes of 48 cents and school taxes of \$1.34. The average increase in taxation over the last five years was 20%.

—Major products grown in the area, and their estimated volume per year, are corn, 15,581,000 bushels; grains, 978,800 cwt; wheat, 2,603,000 bushels; and sunflowers, 5,000,000 lbs. Other farm production includes cotton, sugar beets and hay. 390,503 head of livestock were fed in Castro County last year, and 3.8 million were raised within 100 miles of Dimmitt. There are 164,100 acres of irrigated land in the Dimmitt area.

—Major industrial employers in and around the city (most of which are seasonal) include Dimco Industries, LaMantia, Cullum, Collier & Co., Inc., 11 cotton gins, Amstar Corp., Goodpasture, Inc., Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc., Corn Saver Manufacturing Co., Dimmitt Feed Yard, Western Vegetables, and Riverside Chemical Co.

Dannevik works on new ethanol plant

Ground breaking ceremonies were held Monday afternoon for an ethanol production plant that will be built in Tucumcari, N.M.

The plant, owned by Grain Power, Inc., will produce three million gallons of ethanol per year from both corn and milo. The design-construction firm for the project is Howe-Baker Engineers of Tyler.

William P. Dannevik, owner of Professional Agricultural Service of Dimmitt, is installing the plant's grain receiving facility as a subcontractor for Tate and Roe of Dallas, which is supplying the scales, tanks and hammer-mills for the plant.

Total project costs are expected to exceed \$12 million. A portion of the project funding was obtained through a Housing and Urban Development Action Grant. This will be loaned to Grain Power, Inc. for purchasing capital equipment. The sale of \$750,000 in industrial revenue bonds by Tucumcari will be used to provide utilities to the project.

Completion is scheduled for October of this year.

The ethanol produced will be used as an octane enhancer in motor fuels and distillers' dried gin. A high-protein by-product will be used to feed cattle.

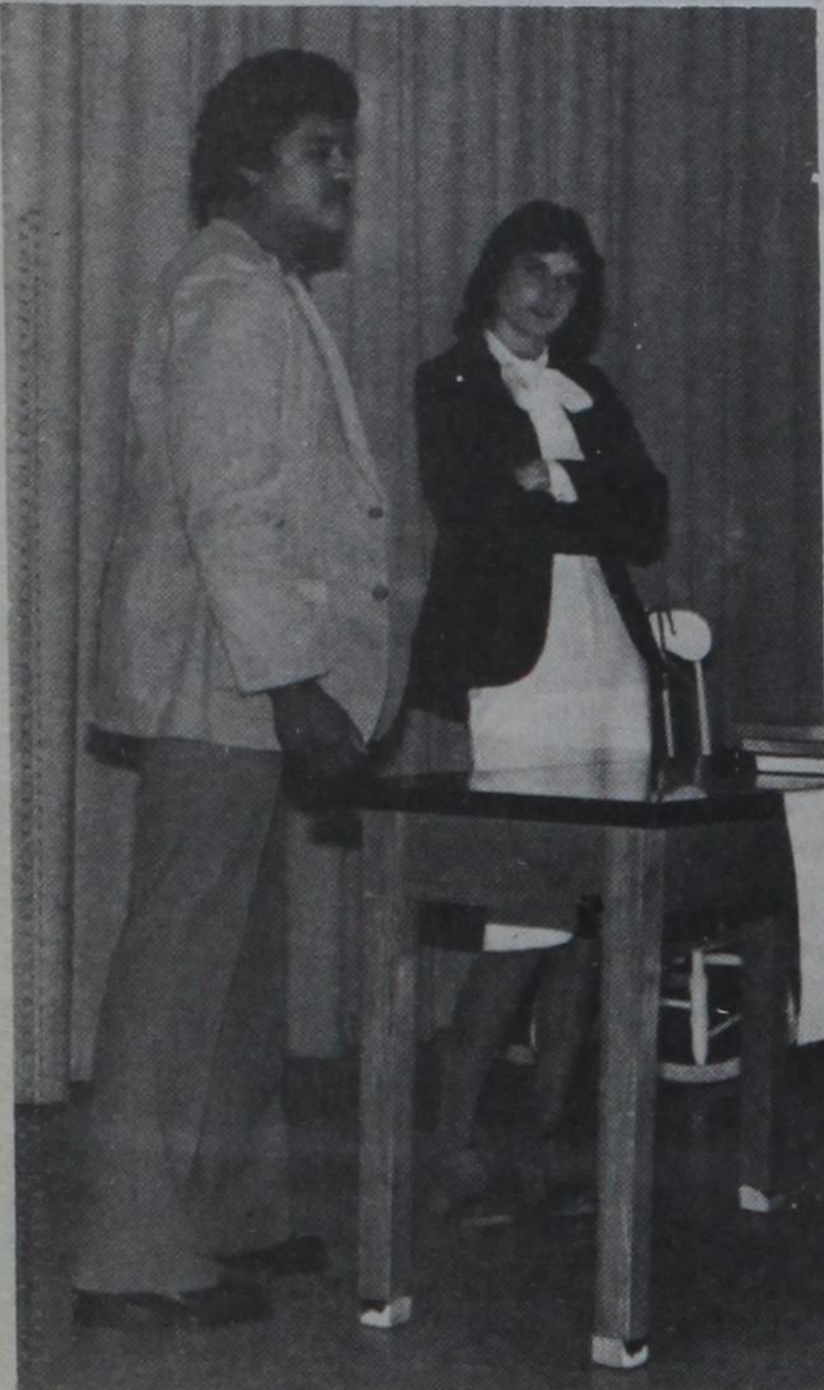

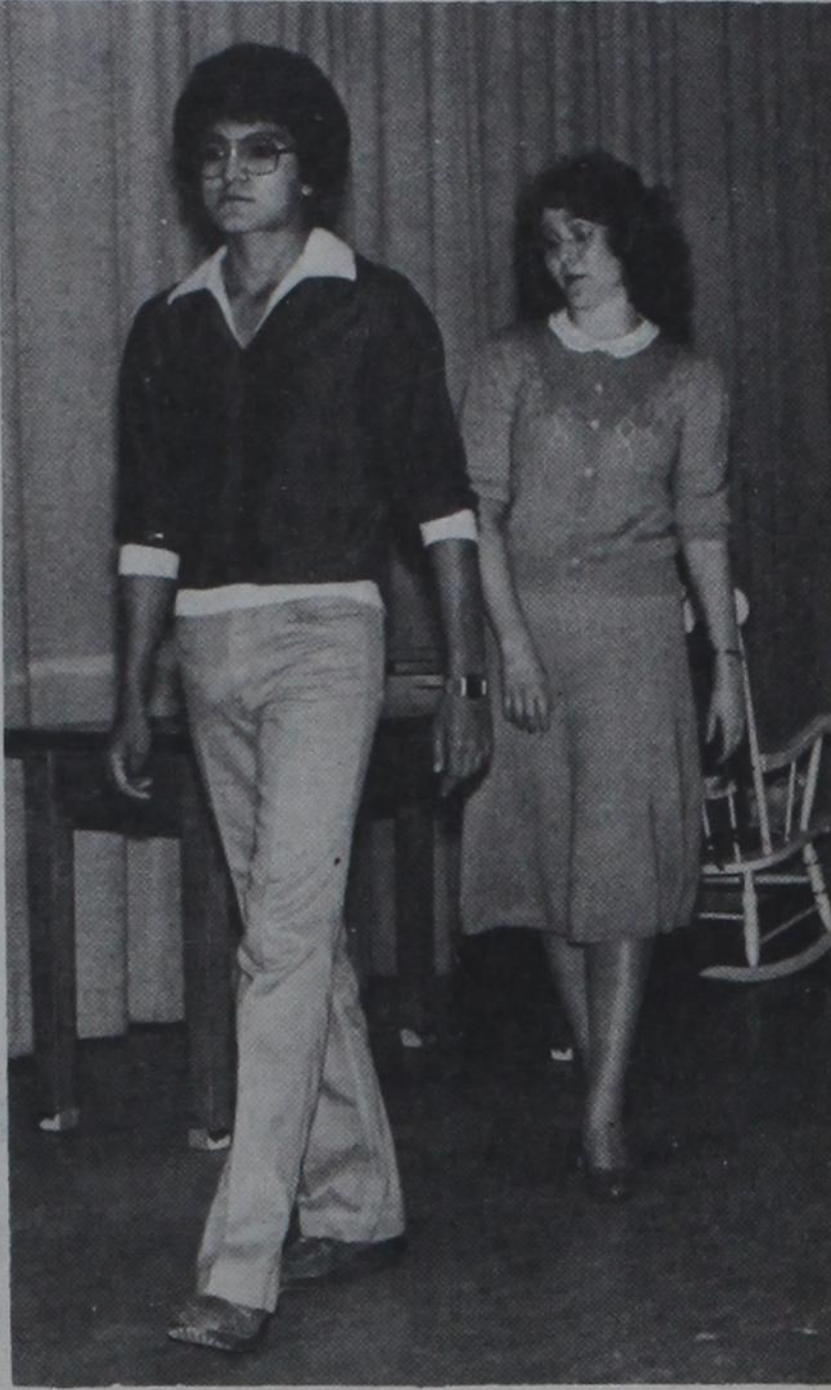

Named to the three inside positions on the first team were Gil Wright of Plainview, Todd Washington of Sanford-Fritch and Terry Faggins of Pampa.

"Kevin, the AAA Player of the Year, provided Dimmitt with scoring punch as well as emotional leadership as the Bobcats rebounded from a rocky start to earn the title.

"Dimmitt reached the playoffs for the 15th time during Ken Cleveland's tenure as head coach and won the school's third state title despite a variety of close calls....

"Throughout the season, Kevin Cleveland led Dimmitt in scoring, averaging 22 points a game, and he was the player the Bobcats turned to in crucial situations, usually with the game on the line."

Of Watts, the Avalanche-Journal said:

"Watts, a 6-4 junior center, was the area's dominant Class AAA big man, averaging 12 points and 12 rebounds per game. He carried the Bobcats through several games, including the regional tourney clashes."

Announcing Schulte as a member of the Class A boys' All-South Plains first team, the Lubbock newspaper said:

"Schulte, a 6-1 junior guard and returnee from last year's All-South Plains team, led the

Swifts to the championship game of the regional tournament. He averaged 19.4 points a contest as Nazareth finished the season 26-8 after losing in the title game to (state finalist) Midland Greenwood."

In naming Miss Andrews to the Class AAA girls' All-South Plains first team, the Avalanche-Journal noted:

"Miss Andrews, a 5-7 senior post, tossed in 14.6 points and pulled down six rebounds a game as the Bobbies won the District 2-AAA title."

In making its Class A All-South Plains girls' team selections, the Avalanche-Journal said about Roxane Birkenfeld: "Miss Birkenfeld, a 5-7 senior guard who was on all four state championship teams during Lombard's tenure at Nazareth, averaged 15 points a game and provided the Swiftettes with senior leadership. She scored 30 points in Nazareth's two top-sided state tourney victories."

About Coach Lombard, the Avalanche-Journal commented:

"Joe Lombard was faced with possibly his greatest challenge at the beginning of the 1981-82 basketball season since he took over head coaching duties at perennial girls' basketball powerhouse Nazareth four seasons ago.

"The Swiftettes, coming off a fifth consecutive state Class A girls' championship won by maybe the best Nazareth team ever, were looking for title No. 6 but had less natural ability and size than any other Lombard squad.

"Still, despite a very strong challenge from District 5-A foe Sudan, Lombard coached the Swiftettes to a 33-5 season and their sixth crown while extending Nazareth's string of post-season victories to 36."

Social Security in Castro County
By JANICE GRANN



As a recipient of a disability program administered by the Social Security Administration, you have the responsibility to report any changes which may affect your benefits. These reporting responsibilities extend to those disabled workers receiving benefits based on their own earnings and to those receiving disability payments under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Program.

Social Security must be informed if your condition improves, and you return to work. No matter how little you may be earning while working, when you take a job or become self-employed we need to be notified.

If you have not started working, but feel your condition has improved, you may be eligible for a trial work period which will allow you to work and still receive your checks for a period of time. If you believe this provision may apply to your improved condition, contact our office for further explanation.

The Social Security disability program is geared to assist people to return to work. When you apply for disability benefits your name is sent to the state vocational rehabilitation program. This agency may contact you to provide assistance in job training and placement or counseling and guidance — helping you adjust to a new occupation.

If you are offered these services and refuse them without good cause, we will be informed and your eligibility benefits will be affected.

In addition to reporting employment or an improvement in your disability, you must inform us when you apply or start receiving any other benefits such as workmen's compensation, civil service, or a disability pension based on covered services.

If you are receiving SSI disability payments, any income you are receiving must be reported. This income extends to changes in your husband's or wife's income, VA benefits, pensions from any government or private industry, fire insurance proceeds, rents or interests, support and alimony payments, bank accounts or additional property.





ASCS expands crop insurance

All-Risk Crop Insurance may now be available on cropland which was previously considered uninsurable.

Melvin E. Sims, Chairman, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, recently announced that for most spring planted wheat, barley, corn, grain sorghum and cotton which have been uninsurable in the past, insurance is now available by individual agreement with the Corporation.

To obtain insurance, you must request coverage through a local agent before the All-Risk Crop Insurance Sales' closing date for the crop. A list of agents handling All-Risk Crop Insurance is available in the ASCS office of Dimmitt.

The sales' closing dates for Castro County are sugar beets, March 15; corn, April 1; cotton, grain sorghum and sunflowers, April 15.

Producers who have already reported crop acreage for the insurance can adjust the report if they participate in the acreage reduction program.

For example, suppose you bought All-Risk Crop Insurance on wheat, planted 100 acres last fall and have already filed your acreage for crop insurance. You now wish to participate in the ASCS acreage reduction program for wheat and have a permitted acreage of 85 acres. You can reduce your wheat acreage on which you pay crop insurance premiums to 85 acres by contacting your insurance agent before the final sign-up date.

You must adjust your acreage report to reduce your premium liability.

Producers have until April 16 to sign up in the 1982 acreage reduction programs for wheat, upland cotton, corn/sorghum and barley/oats. Deciding not to sign up is an irreversible decision. It means that you will be ineligible for loans and purchases, the farmer-owned reserve, if authorized, and possible deficiency payments for that crop.

After April 16, you cannot change your mind and become eligible. However, if you sign up in the program, you preserve your options. Final participation is determined by your acreage report as of the final acreage reporting date for the crop.

If conditions change, there is no penalty for withdrawing. Regardless of whether the crop or acreage is eligible for

disaster payments, a prompt report of natural disasters is still important in 1982. These reports can affect the planted acreage credited for 1982 and the history credit for computing 1983 acreage bases. Producers should report to the County ASCS office whenever they are prevented from planting a program crop, or whenever they plan to replant any failed acreage of a program crop to another use.

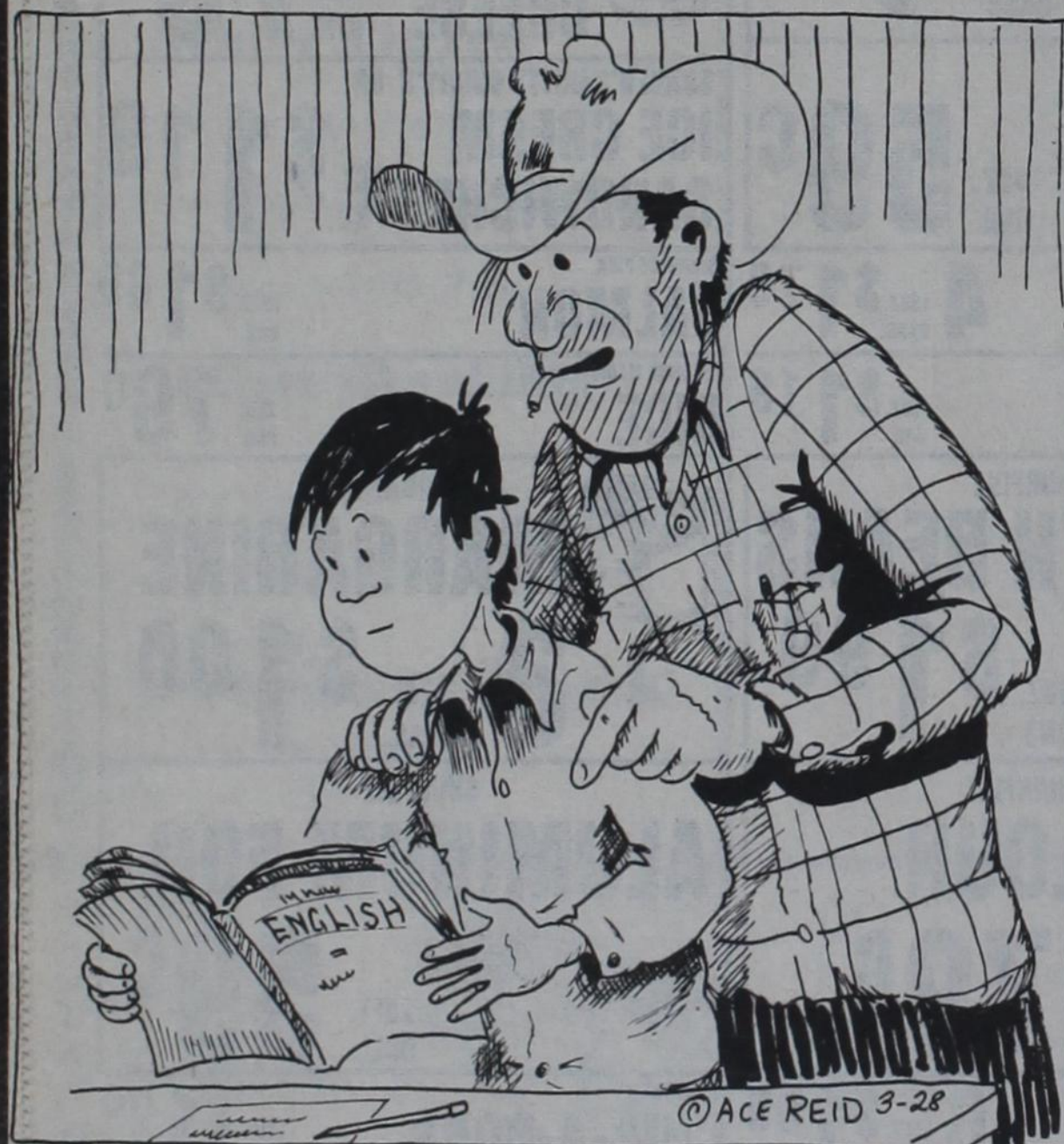

TAX NOTICE

HOUSE BILL 885

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their school district homestead exemptions in 1979 have until April 1 of this year to do so. In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 homestead exemption.

According to a law passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, over-65 homeowners who qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the home is located.

Application must be made with Jerry Heller before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979 a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years or older,
- Own his home,
- Use that home as his principal residence.

The chief appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the chief appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid will be given for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.

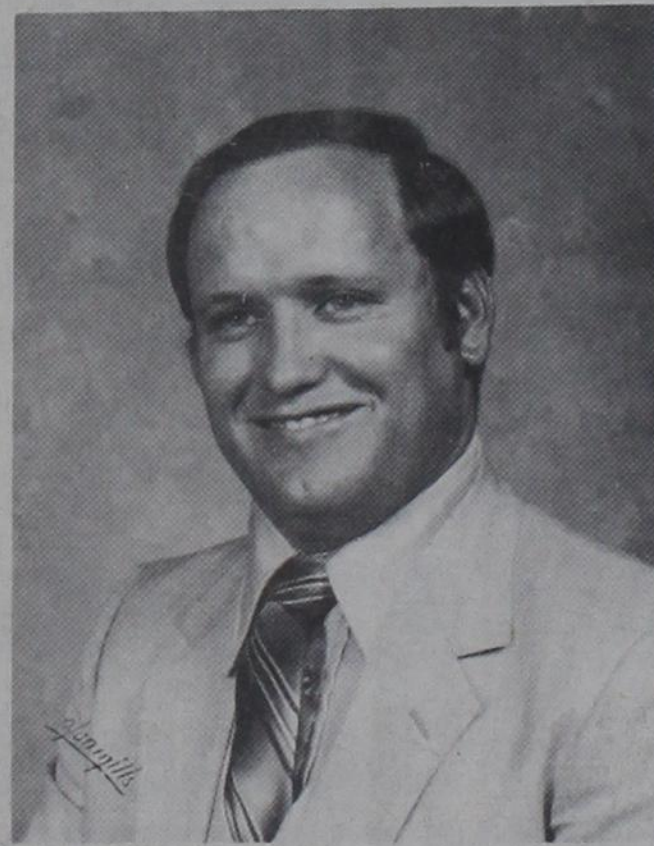
