Conservation and Program Basis

When final provisions of the 1942 AAA farm program are drafted, increased emphasis will be placed on conservation and soil-building work on individual farms, Alcye A. Hoots, secretary of the Floyd County AAA Committee, has announced.

Soil-building allowance which will be the basis for determining maximum payments farmers may earn, have been announced through the department of agriculture. The rates will be substan tially the same as in 1941.

Under the 1942 program, farmers may receive two kinds of payments Aiken, Lockney, This. L. Collins, with the rates for compliance and special crop allotments to be an nounced later. The two types of payments are: (1) a payment for carrying out approved soil-building practices, and (2) a payment for planting within special crop allotments such as wheat, cotton, rice, and peanuts.

As in former years, conservation farm program are contingent on the annual appropriation authorized by

Congress, the AAA official said. Instead of a total soil-depleting allotment for the farm, there may be substituted special crop allotments covering certain feed grains in surplus areas, he said, adding that the state committee has not yet decided whether this would be necessary in Texas. Feed grains include oats,






