If held too long, it is likely to develop old, rancid flavors. Artificial Eyes to Be Made Movable

Doctor Invents Substitute Floydada Office For German Glass.

MEXICO CITY.-The invention of an artificial eye that moves, an important contribution not only to science but also to American defense, was reported to the International Assembly of the International College of Surgeons which met here.

Dr. Theodore J. Dimitry, director of the department of ophthalmology at the Louisiana State university medical center, told the assembly that with the outbreak of war in Europe he foresaw a shortage of glass eyes in the United States. Germany has a monopoly on the manufacture of glass used in blowing glass

To forestall a glass-eye shortage, Dr. Dimitry began experimenting with two objects in view: To develop an artificial eye that would turn, and to develop an eye that could be the past, only to farmers whose cash manufactured from a substance other than glass, making the United States independent of German sup-

The results of his research were placed before the assembly. Dr. Dimitry's eye is made from acrylic resins, the substance used to manufacture lucite. It is not blown, but quired to give as security a first lien is cast in a die. It is superior to the German eye because it is lighter, unbreakable and endurable. The German eye deteriorates in three

With the aid of color photography, Dr. Dimitry has been able to match an artificial eye perfectly with its human counterpart. The negative is developed directly on the plastic.

Dr. Dimitry found a simple solution to the mobility problem. His the eye muscles. The muscles turn the artificial eye just as they do the real eye. The German eye, he discovered, crowded the eye socket, making the muscles useless.

New Device Diagnoses Paralysis of Muscles

WASHINGTON .- A new method of diagnosing the chances of recovering the use of muscles damaged by ed to the American Congress of Physical Therapy.

Employing a device which enables a physician to determine whether the nerves controlling the muscles are in a "good," "fair," or "hopeless" condition, its development was made possible by a grant from funds raised for the Na-Foundation for Infantile Paralysis by the President's birthday ball series.

Dr. Erich Schwarkopf, working with Dr. B. S. Troedsen and Dr. K. G. Hansson in New York hospital. developed the instrument. Their device is a combination of an oscillograph, an uncanny machine which transforms electrical energy into an electron beam which is visible on . screen, a camera which takes pictures of the beam, an amplifier which picks up electrical impulses from the body, and a projector to show the strip of movie film on which the

impulses are recorded. Working from the principle that the nerves of the body function through electrical impulses which are only about a millionth of a volt in strength, the three scientists developed a method of picking up these tiny currents by electrodes fastened to the ends of muscles, amplifying them through vacuum tubes about a million times, and projecting them on the oscillograph screen.

Navy Employs Movies to Get Facts About Wind

WASHINGTON. - The navy has applied the combined methods of Hollywood producers and streamlining engineers to collect satisfactory data for the designing of a group of buildings at the Lakehurst, N. J., lighter-than-air station.

Small-scale models of the desired structures were placed in a wind tunnel, the fans started, and "screen tests" made of the air currents.

The currents, however, had to be visible for possible photography, so smoke was blown through the windmaking device. A number of different wind velocities were created and the smoke weaved in and out and past the midget hangars and

other buildings. The tests were carried out by the Franklin Institute of Philadelphia at the request of the bureau of yards and docks and took about one month to set up and record on film. They were made, navy men say, to insure proper design and location of the buildings in order that the entrances would not be in the path of reak air currents that might enlanger or destroy the blimps and other airships as they entered or departed. The navy is highly pleased with the results.

California Will Try Castor Bean Crop

SACRAMENTO, CALIF.-Statewide experimental planting of seeds from eight strains of castor beans is expected to start next spring, announced J. W. Gilmore. professor of agronomy at the Uni versity of California college of agriculture. In the past the United States has imported almost all its eastor beans from the Orient.



Precautions About Handling NATURAL GAS

In Case Of Air-Raid Alarms!

Natural gas is the safest fuel you could be using during an air raid. BUT, the HANDLING of natural gas is a technical matter, requiring the services of trained men who know how to avoid the hazards involved.

It is therefore extremely important that everyone should study and follow the carefully prepared instructions relating to the handling of natural gas during air raid alarms. If these instructions are not followed, serious consequences may result. Untrained persons should not attempt to turn gas off and on at the meters.

Following are the official instructions which have been approved and adopted by local Office of Civilian Defense. They are simple. Read them carefully. Discuss them in the family circle so all will understand. Cut them out and post them where all can see them. Above all, follow them!

In Case Of An Air-Raid Alarm:

- . Make no attempt to shut off the gas at the meter.
- Simply turn off all burners which you customarily turn on and off. Do not turn off pilot lights.
- 3 Only in case the house or building is badly damaged should the gas be turned off at the meter.
- 4. If, for any reason, the gas is turned off at the meter, do not turn it on again yourself. Call for a trained man.

Fighting Names For War Planes

British Were the First to Adopt Titles; U. S. Navy Goes Dramatic.

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Modern war's technique of "terror," extended to the naming of many fighting and death-spilling aircraft, has given new signifiance to the old question, "What's in a name?"

"Such titles as Airacobra and Typhoon hint at the destructive possibilities of the warbirds of Britain," says a bulletin from the National Geographic society.

"The British were the first to adopt the practice of using symbolic names on a large scale, giving headline writers the benefit of such fighting words as Spitfires, Hurricanes, Havocs, Gladiators, Furies, Whirlwinds and Defiants. There is the British Buffalo, named for the water buffalo of the Orient, a battler highly respected in the animal world, but tractable when tamed. One individual bombing plane-a gift to the R.A.F. from a Scottish mother who had lost two sons in active service-is known as Mac-Robert's Reply

U. S. Enters Field.

"The United States also has entered the naming field, with aircraft ranging from Mars (the world's largest flying boat) to Vengeance (a deadly dive bomber) A new American high-altitude superfighter, now reported to be manufactured in large quantities for the United States army, is called the Thunder-

"The American navy - pushing into the background the old letterand-number identification which may grow to a symbol as long as X S B 2 C-1-is going in for equally dramatic designations. For its fighter ships the names include Wildcat and Corsair. For torpedo bombers the Devastator and Avenger set the tone. Dive bombers are the Buccaneer, the Dauntless and the Vindicator. The popularly termed Helldiver has become official.

"Both the United States and British versions of certain warplanes may use the same name, as in the case of the Buffalo. On the other hand the British Mustang and the American Apache are different titles for the same fighter. A still more complicated variation in naming sequence concerns the Tomahawk and the Kittihawk. Cost of insurance will vary by farms since yields are figured from production records, and premiums are based on past crop losses on individual farms, the supervisor said

"This simply means low-loss farms will have smaller premiums than high loss farms," Cothran explained. When producers take out insurance, they sign a commodity note, which is part of the contract and guarantees the premium will be paid either in cash or cash equivalent before maturity date. Premiums may also be deducted from future AAA payments, indemnity payments, if any, or from cotton loans, if avail-

College Station, January 29th .-If Texas farm families supply much of the farm produce needed in nearby towns and cities, this will release large shipments to local dealers for use by the growing number of army defense areas.

Myrtle Murray, Extension Service specialist in home industries, says in taking over their responsibility of supplying food for others as well as themselmes, farm families will need to consider: Varieties of fruit and vegetables best suited to their section of the state, cultural methods the amount to plant, availability of farm labor for harvesting, proper preparation for market, and means of transportation.

Persons producing poultry for the market will need to study proper methods of feeding and dressing, the specialist points out, and consideration should be given also to grading and packing of eggs.

Notice to Tax Payers

YOUR 1941 TAXES ARE NOW DUE AND MUST BE PAID BEFORE THE FIRST DAY OF FEBRUARY, 1942 TO AVOID PENALTY.

Both men and women are required to pay their poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own or come into possession of.

Those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1941 are required to secure an exemption certificate during January, 1942, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year. No charge is made for these exemptions.

In 1942, automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1st, 1942, but must be paid between February 1st, and April 1st, 1942.
