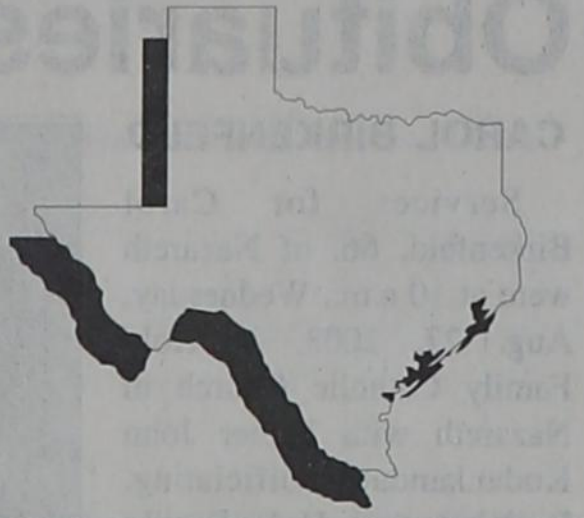

Hazardous duty pay asked for deputies

Sheriff says he's lost four deputies to higher paying jobs in last year

In the past year, the Sheriff's Department has lost four field deputies - all because other municipalities can pay them better, Sheriff C.D. Fitzgearld told Commissioners on Monday.

In a formal presentation before the Commissioners Court, Fitzgearld asked that he be allotted an extra \$3,000 per year for each of the five field deputies he is entitled to employ. Right now, there are only three such deputies.

"The first deputy went to Earth for \$5,000 more a year; the next two went to Littlefield for \$5,500 more and the fourth

went to Dalhart for \$7,000 more," Fitzgearld said. "We've got two people in mind who we could probably get if we had that extra stipend."

He asked the Commissioners, who are in the process of working out a budget for the coming fiscal year to consider allotting and extra \$15,000 a year for the field deputies, who he said "are subject to a different working environment than any other position held by persons employed with the County."

His letter to Commissioners read in part, "An officer never knows until they arrive at a call exactly what that call is going to entail. An officer, believing that he is responding

to a call involving just an argument can escalate into a full-blown physical confrontation in a matter of seconds, which requires the officer to make immediate and sudden decisions that can result in the officer having to resort to deadly force.

"No officer wants to have to face this type of situation, but each are ready to accept that responsibility because of the commitment they have made to their jobs.

"It is because of situations like these that I feel that the officers should be compensated with hazardous duty pay."

Commissioner Bay Baldrige said, "We need to do this so that we can get some field deputies that will stay."

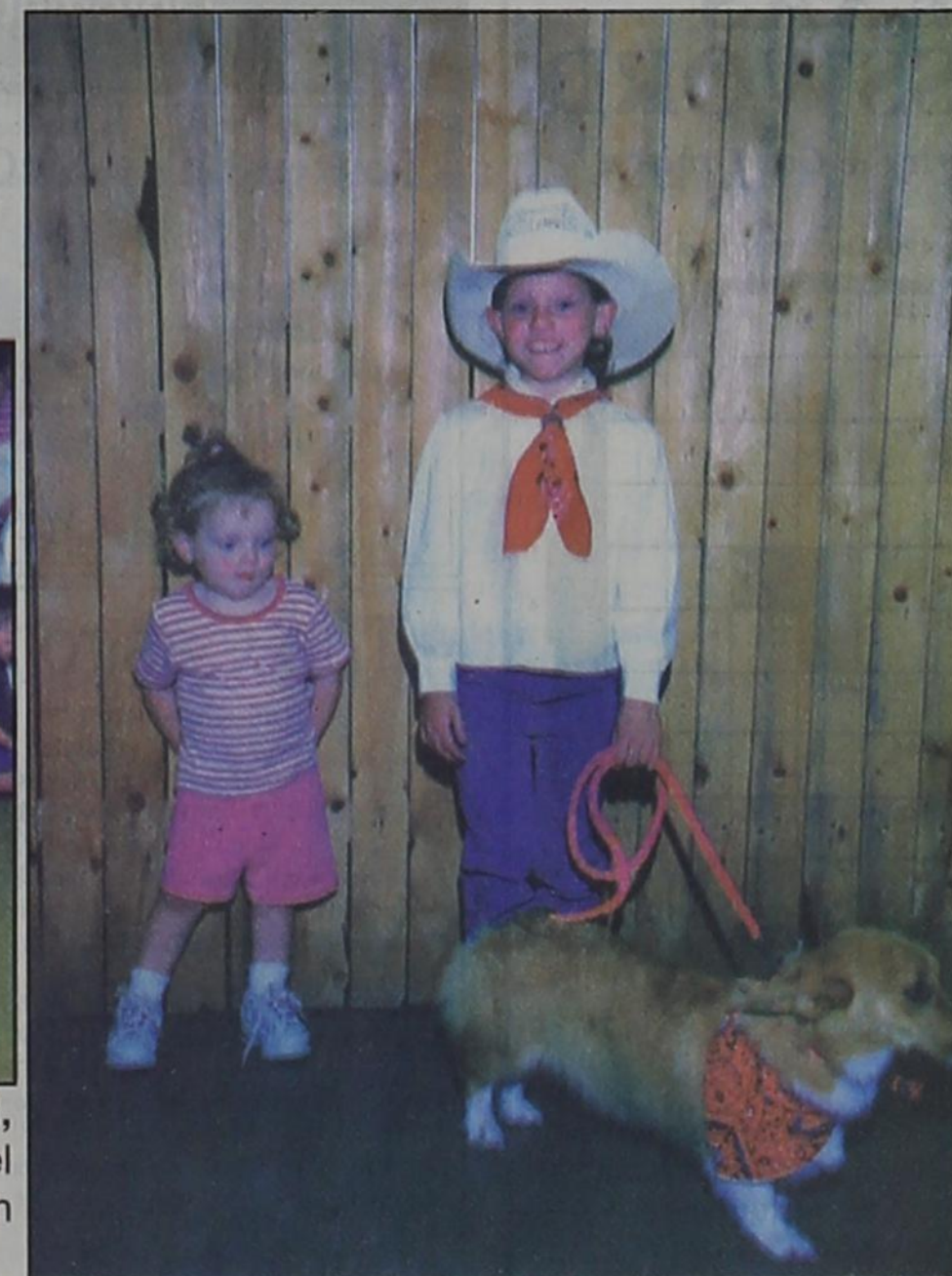
For instance, to participate in the Pet Show, all a child has to do is show up and register with his or her pet.

Court approves VINE program

County Commissioners agreed unanimously Monday to allow Sheriff C.D. Fitzgearld to apply for the VINE program. Under that program, when a victim of a violent crime or a relative of a victim of a crime like murder needs, by law, to be notified that the perpetrator is being released from prison; or when a victim of an assault or rape need to be notified that the person accused in the crime has bonded out of jail, the VINE program makes the notification.

Although Fitzgearld said that locally his office will continue to notify victims, he pointed out that the VINE program would be a backup for his office. "They call every 30 minutes for 24 hours until they notify the victim," Fitzgearld said. "Victims will be assigned a PIN and will be able to call in and check on the status of inmates."

He said his department already has the software in place to implement the program and the funds for it will be supplied by the State Attorney General's office. Commissioners approved the plan, contingent on the approval of the Castro County District Attorney after he looks over the contract and with the stipulation that the program will not cost the county anything.

In other action, Commissioners agreed to sign an interlocal agreement with the County Information Resource Agency. The purpose of the agency is to help counties with their technology needs. It offers free, secure e-mail to county and court officials and provides a free Web posting about each county which joins. The Commissioners also met for a budget workshop. Their next meeting is Sept. 8.

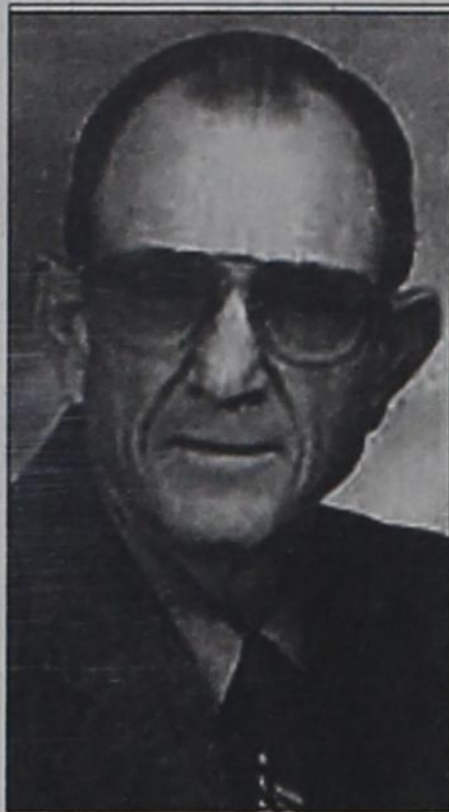

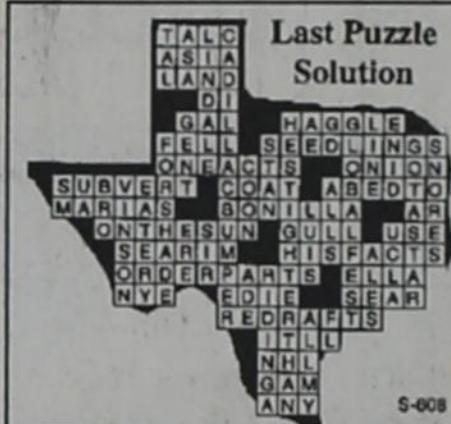

CONTACTS HELP EASE CORNEA DISEASE

"Keratoconus" is a thinning of the cornea or the front surface of the eye. A thinner cornea cannot maintain its normal shape but rather appears in the shape of a cone. This irregularity causes distorted vision.

About one in two thousand people have keratoconus, which often starts in the early twenties and then degenerates gradually. In most cases, both eyes become affected. Sometimes the condition is hereditary, but often the cause is unknown.

The use of gas-permeable contact lenses is often the first method of managing keratoconus. These lenses, which are available in numerous designs, provide the eye with a new regular surface and neutralize corneal distortions. A vision-wear specialist needs to craft the lenses to fit the cornea's very steep and irregular shape. If the cornea becomes too damaged, however, a corneal transplant may be necessary.

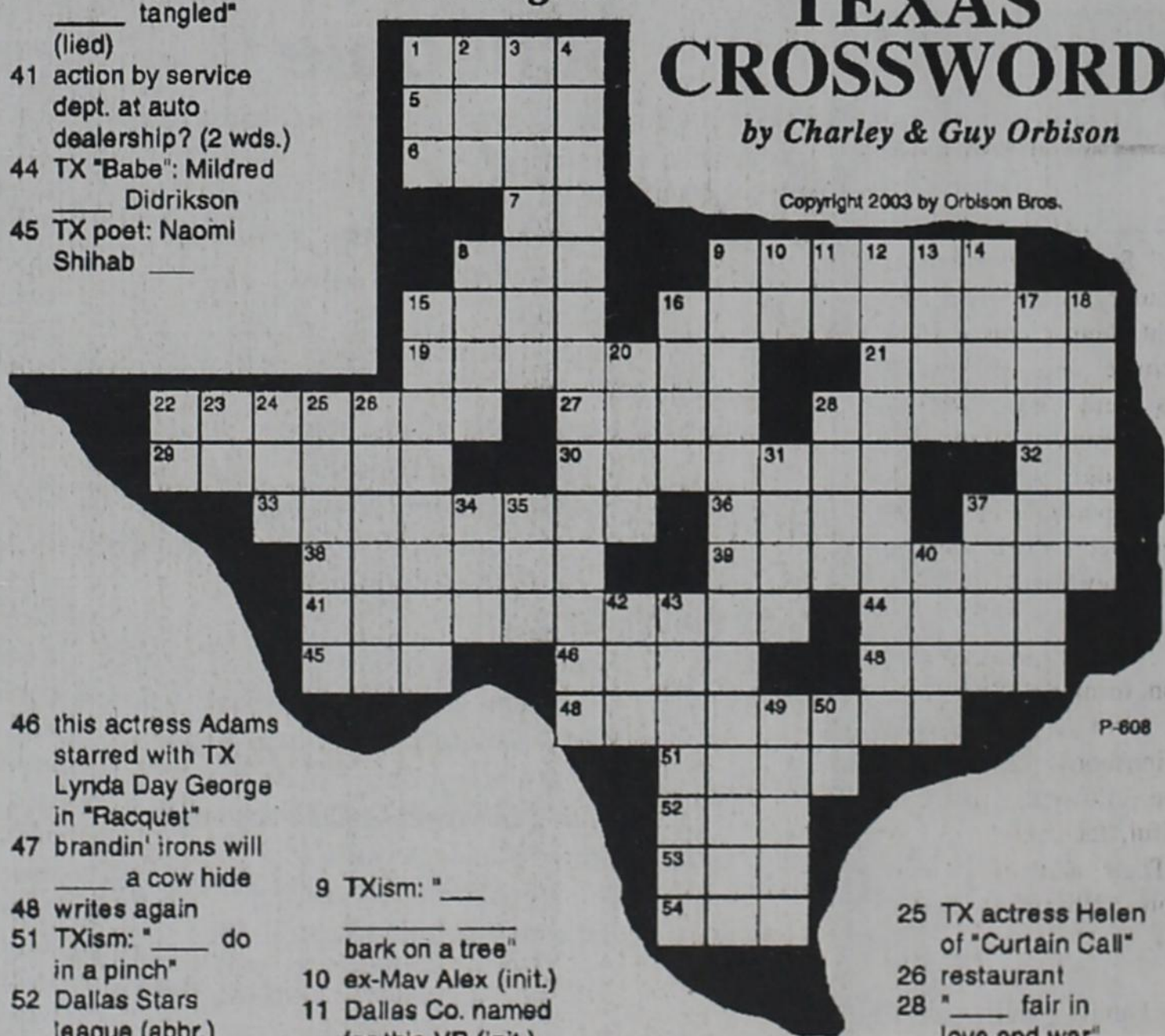

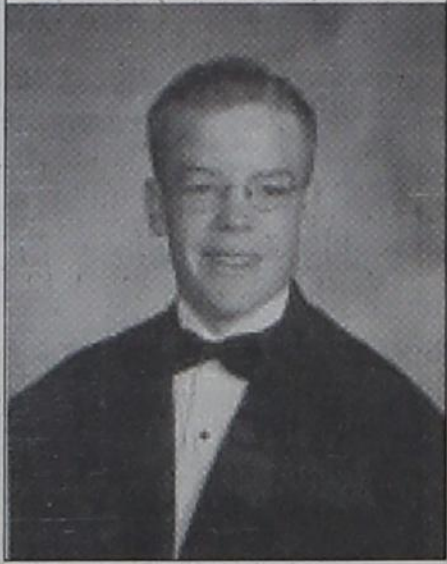

Birkenfeld gets scholarship

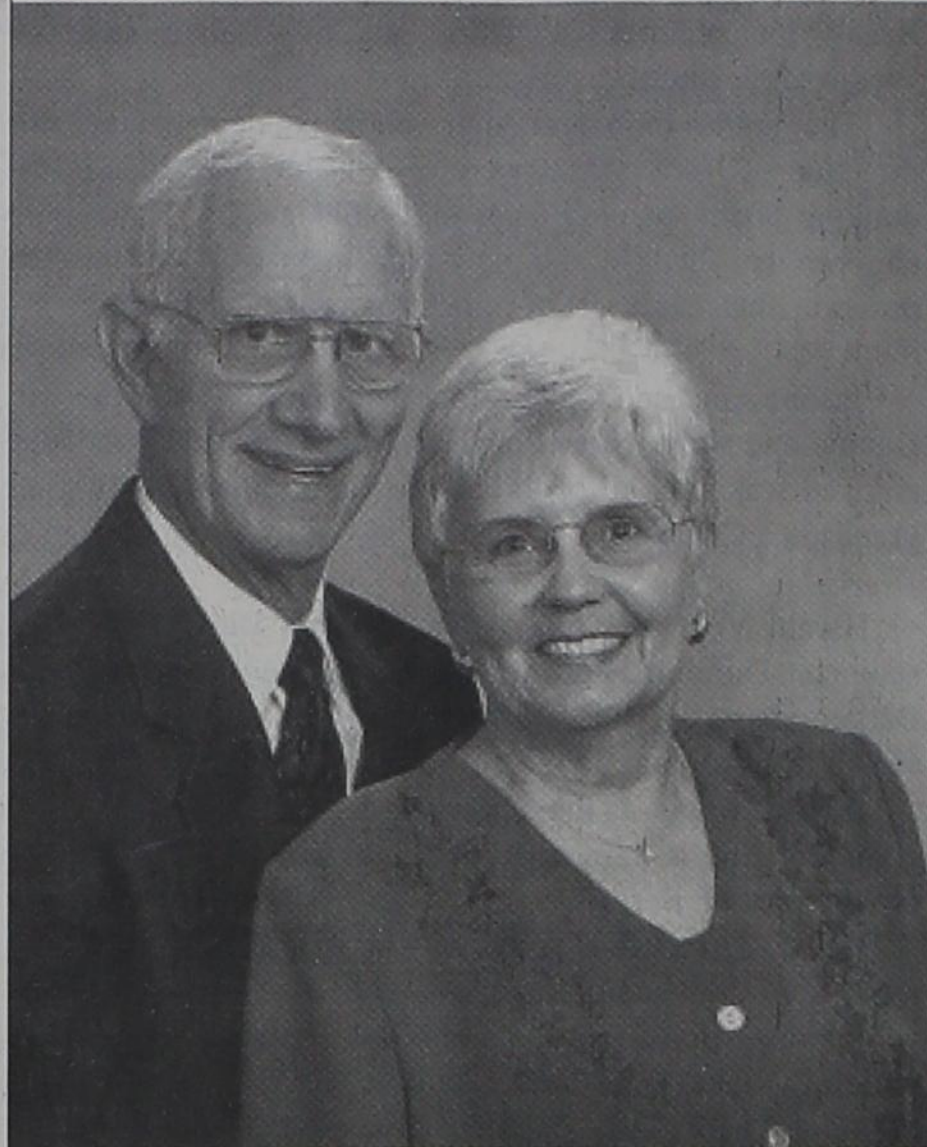
Craig Edward Birkenfeld, a 2003 graduate of Nazareth High School, has been awarded a scholarship by the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation.

There are few things as dangerous as driving on an interstate highway in a large city if you do not know exactly where you are going, especially during the rush hour.

This reminds me of a story I heard one time about an ol' country boy who came to Little Rock to visit some of his city kinfolks. Somebody had drawn him a map of how to get to their house and he got on loop I-430 that goes all the way around the city and he drove along to where he was supposed to turn off but something happened that caused him to miss his turn. He missed the exit ramp because some young men passed him in a hot rod, threw a few beer cans at him and welcomed him to Little Rock.

At this point the only

thing he knew to do was go all the way around the city and pick it up when he got back to this same spot. Would you believe about the time he was ready to get off a woman in a big Cadillac car came along and made an improper lane change and he missed the exit again. Of course the only thing he could do was to go back around again. He was getting low on gas but he finally made it and "Lo and behold!" about that time they had a five alarm fire in the area and with sirens blaring, three fire trucks, the rescue squad and the fire chief came along and caused him to miss his turn for the third time.

Griffitt did a good job. "We're more of a running team when he's in there," Dunnam said. "Jared usually plays tailback for us."

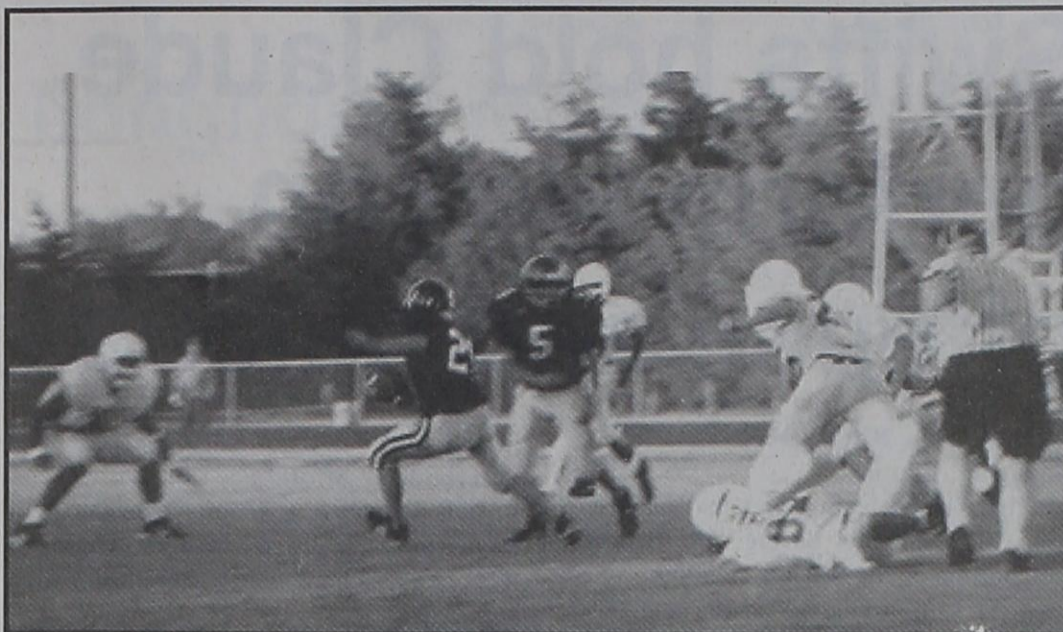

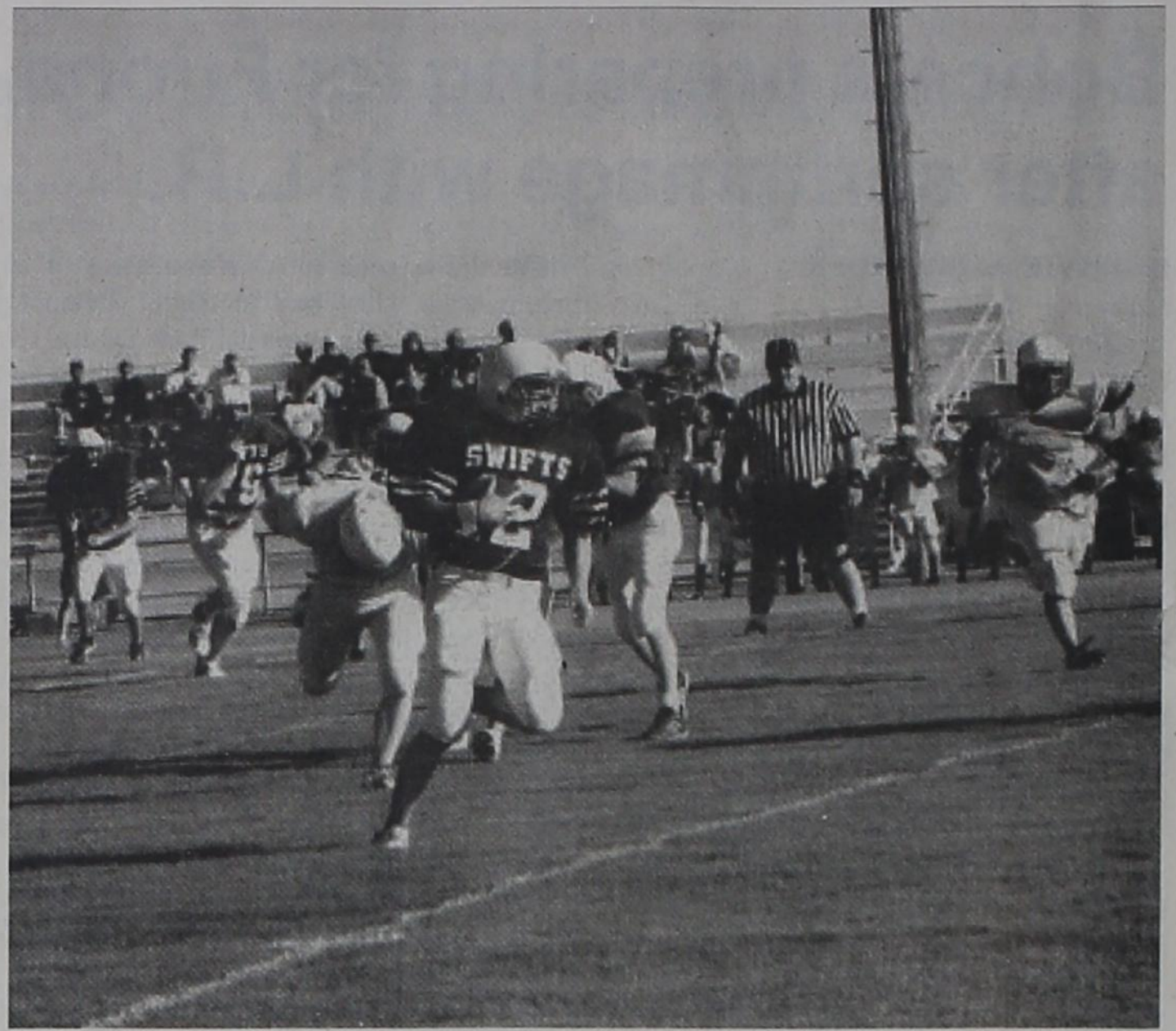
To win this week, the defense will have to step up, he said.

"I think we need to get better defensively. I think our defense will be big this week; we have to control their offense," he said. "And offensively, we'll have to have another good outing. Our offensive line will have to pick up stunts; then we have to keep possession of the ball."

So far, Peacock has scheduled two junior varsity games.

"We had 30 players come out, so we'll try to play junior varsity ball as long as we don't have any injuries," he said. "We're kind of excited about that. It's a lot better for the freshmen coming up to be playing in JV than standing on the sidelines watching."

The first junior varsity game is tonight, Aug. 28, at 6 p.m., at Hart.

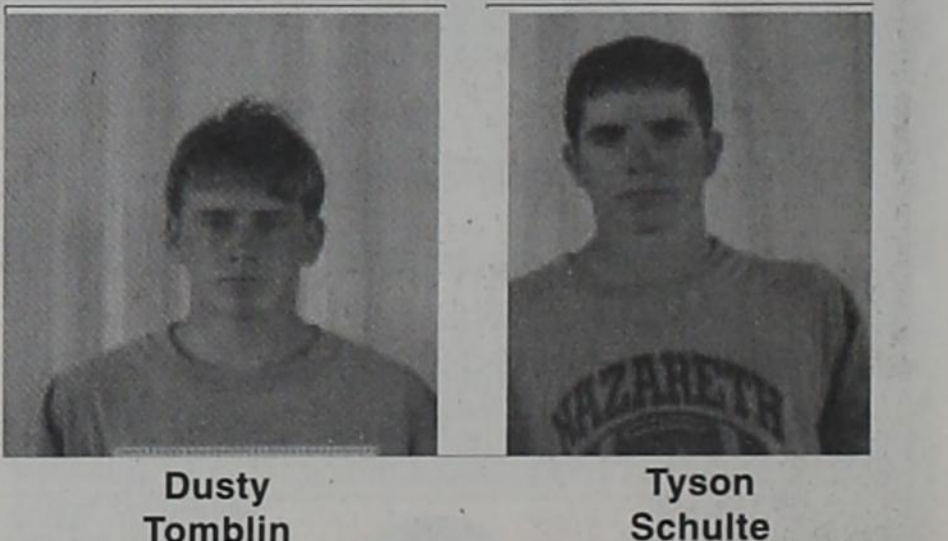

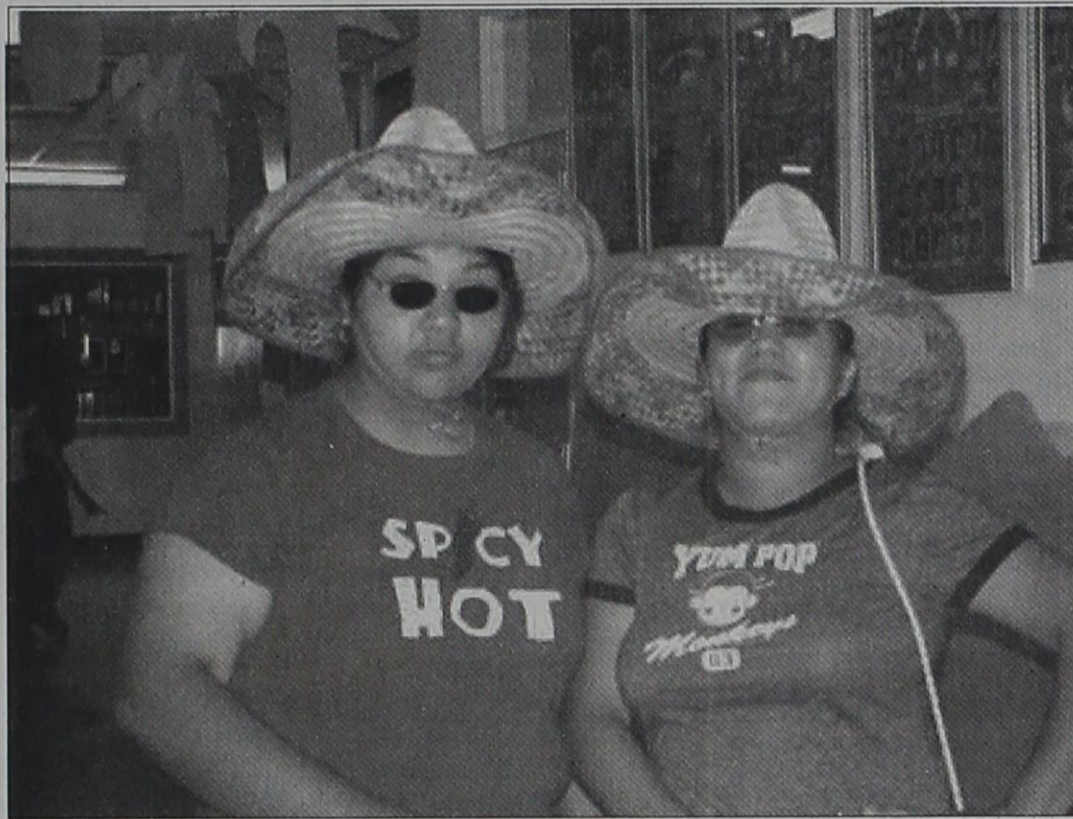

The burner on the left is the 12 million BTU and the right one is rated at 8 million BTU. The big burner goes to the "hot box" on the end of the module feeder and the other burner goes to the Diamond K dryer-cleaners. Warm dry cotton is easier to separate the trash from the cotton fiber. There are also sensors in the gin that will automatically adjust the burners to keep the cotton at the ideal temperature.
