sioners in a special called meeting that the county population had
shifted enough to require redistrictshifted enough to require redistrict-
ing.
According to 2000 Census data, the present populations of the four commissioner precincts are: Pct. 1 with 1,908; Pct. 2 with 2,088; Pct. 3
with 2,099; and Pct. 4 with 2,190. with 2,099 ; and Pct. 4 with 2,190 .
Bosse said the ideal population for each precinct would bopulation for each precinct would be 2,071,

She said Pct 2 and 3 could jus about be left as they are, with most of the changes coming between
and 4, with population taken from 4 and put into 1
Using a computer program showing the various population blocks Bosse transferred the required num ber fairly quickly by moving the Pct
1 boundaries into the city limits of 1 boundaries into the city limits of that such a move might necessitate establishing another voting box. She also showed how it could be accomplished by moving boundarie out in the county, without bringing into Dimmitt.

The General Education Development (GED) diploma is designed to be equivalent to a high school diploma. It has five sub-tests covering

The new version of the test, which will start being used in January of 2002, will cover those same areas but with more emphasis on lifeskiils, work place, and critical think-
ing applications, making its successful completion more like what is
required of today's high school grad uate. Getting that diploma can make a

tion numbers from the US Dept. of Agriculture show a decrease in acres planted to genetically-modified
(GMO) corn, but the American Corn Growers Assoc
by the decline.
ACGA is forecasting a $10 \%$ to $12 \%$ percent reduction once planting is completed. According to the USDA numbers,
total planting of GMO corn acres total planting of GMO corn acres
will drop from $25 \%$ in 2000 to $24 \%$ in 2001 .
What is especially troubling for
the biotechnology industry are reducthe biotechnology industry are reduc-
tions in the three major corn-producing states-Iowa, Nebraska and
Illinois, according to the ACGA. Illinois, according to the ACGA
Iowa shows a drop from $30 \%$ 2000 to $28 \%$ in 2001 . Illinois shows a drop from $17 \%$ in 2000 to $14 \%$ in 2001. In Nebraska, a huge drop is predicted, from $34 \%$ in 2000 to $25 \%$ in 2001.
While plantings indicate a $1 \%$ reduction ACGA anticipates a considerably larger drop of 10 to $12 \%$ in GMO planted corn acres.
The ACGA forec
The ACGA forecast is based on
contacts with corn growers all across the country. A larger forecast drop is also consistent with last year's pattern, when USDA planting intentions showed a much smaller drop than did the ACGA. "Once planting is completed in
late May, ACGA will commission a late May, ACGA will commission a
scientific, randomly-selected, statistically valid survey of corn producers to determine the definitive planting numbers. This will be the third year the ACGA has performed this objec-
tive marketing service to the nation's tive marketing service to the nation's
corn producers," said Dan McGuire, ACGA program director.
