# Policeman causes crash, then kills self

I guess if you hang in there long enough almost everything will happen. I am in my fiftieth year as publisher of a newspaper and last Wednesday night was the first time we ever had a fire or was ever burglarized. Judging from the appearance of the building and contents the next morning, I'm convinced that an experience of that kind every fifty years is more than enough.

I am sure that Don will give a complete report, and all of the cruddy details, about the happenings on our premises early last Thursday morning, and from the available facts our readers can form their own conclusions. We do know that our cash drawer was rifled and that a small amount of currency and silver was taken, probably less than \$200. Certainly not enough to

create a financial crisis. The fire is another story. It played havoc with our building and contents. My first impression, on inspection Thursday morning, was that there was no way we could publish a paper this week. I underestimated the ability and determination of our staff friends. tackled what appeared to be an almost impossible task, with little, if any, supervision, and by Saturday night we had enough fixtures and leased, or borrowed, equipment to publish the News this week. I have no idea how many bottles of cleaning compound or how many bundles of rags were used to clean up the mess. There is no way you can thank people for that kind of loyalty and dedication.

Newspapering, probably more than any other business, has to have a system, set routine and fixed schedules to meet a deadline. All of that jazz goes out the window when a fire immobilizes the production department with soot and goo. It was necessary that we start work on this weeks paper in a new location with spur of the moment arrangement of tools of our trade, some of which were borrowed and strange to our touch. In parlance of our profession we talk about work flow, copy flow, etc., all of which means there is a basket for copy of various categories, files for headlines, dead copy, classifieds, display ad copy, the whole ball of wax. 

## No, we don't miss an issue

Out of operation? Nope. Intimidated? Nope. Tired? Yep.

That describes the spirit and determination of the News staff in publishing this issue. Phoenix-like, the News arose from the ashes this

Within three hours after firemen left the scene of destruction last Thursday morning, News staffers started clean-up operations. With everyone working at his or her own area, they washed the "gunk" off of all essential desks, tables and equipment that could still be used; and prepared to set up temporary headquarters elsewhere, determined not to miss an issue.

A Dimmitt police patrolman killed himself with his service revolver shortly after midnight Monday after steering his patrol car into the path of an oncoming car eight miles north of the city.

After he lived through the crash that critically injured two occupants of the other car, investigating officers said, Patrolman Vaughn Maddox, 30, shot himself in the heart with his .38-caliber pistol.

He was found lying on the seat of his city patrol car with a gunshot wound in his chest and his service revolver on the floorboard under his right hand. officers reported.

Officers also found a suicide note in the car, addressed to Maddox's wife, Teresia.

Critically injured in the crash were the driver of the other car, Robert G. Young Jr., 47, of Midland, and his nephew, 13-yearold Michael Stephenson, who is the son of the superintendent of schools in Clayton, N.M. Young's wife, Jane, 45, was treated for minor injuries at Plains Memorial Hospital.

After receiving emergency treatment here, Young and Stephenson were transferred to Lubbock Methodist Hospital in critical condition. Both were listed in serious but stable condition in the hospital's intensive care unit Wednesday.

Several motorists witnessed the bizarre accident, including Cari Spurlin of Midland, a friend of the Youngs who was riding

Spurlin said the police

Daniel Moreno of Friona, who reported the accident, said he had been driving north when Maddox's loading door at the north- gathering information patrol car passed him at approximately 70 or 80 mph with no lights or siren. Moments later, he came upon the accident scene just south of the Bea-

con Liquor Store. Moreno told officers he tried unsuccessfully to use the patrol car's radios to report the accident, then asked the occupant of a nearby mobile home to call, then went on to Hereford, where he called the local dispatcher from an convenience all-night

Meanwhile, Spurlin said, she and the others riding with her stopped and tried to get the Youngs out of their car "because we were afraid it was going to blow up." She said several people stopped and helped, while others went to call an ambulance.

Maddox apparently was not seriously injured in the accident before he shot himself, officers said, although his car was virtually demolished. The patrol car skidded 250 feet after the impact before coming to rest in a ditch on the west side of the high-

DPS Trooper John Moore investigated the accident, assisted by Troopers Rick Bentley of Dimmitt and Joe Rex Smith of Tulia, Deputies Jerry Jansa and Ramon Aleman of the Castro County Sheriff's Office and Lt. Larry Edwards of the Dimmitt Police Dept.

It was Lt. Edwards who found the suicide note in Maddox's patrol car and turned it over to Moore. Moore said the note was addressed mainly to Maddox's wife, and reflected no overt motives for his

"It was obviously written by someone who was under a lot of stress,' Moore said.







# Variety of methods used

Many of the farmers in Castro County are trying to cut down on the number of trips across their fields, due to the high costs of fuel.

James has stated that this has worked; however, he has noticed that the ground was hard, and problems were encountered in planting the next crop.

Clarence Behrends, west of Easter, uses a sub-mulcher on all of his wheat fields. This leaves the residue of the previous crop on the soil surface, but breaks up his hardpan, which allows more moisture to go into the soil from snows and

Dale Winders, west of Flagg, is using the Pengo equipment on the field underneath his sprinkler this year. The field was seeded to wheat, watered and then grazed until the middle of April. The wheat was about 8" high when Dale used the Pengo equipment. It rips the soil, tills the ground, and then forms the beds on a 40" spacing. Treatment consists of 168. a series of intravenous injections of organic arsenic, given twice a day for two or three days, depending on the severity of the condition.

Prior to treatment, the dog is tested to see if he is fit enough for treatment.

Three weeks after the injections, the dog is treated for the larvae in the bloodstream. If the larvae are not removed, the dog will become infected again.

Complications arise during this time. Once the heartworms die, they are released and move into the lungs, where they can cause pneumonia and other respiratory problems.

Once the larvae are removed from the blood, the dog is placed on preventive medication

during mosquito season.

The medication is administered in tablet or drop form, based on the weight of the dog. "We can't place a dog

Offers of help came from everywhere. Typewriters, front loaders, fork lifts, photo chemicals and paper, storage space, elbow grease - all were offered by concerned, generous neighbors and fellows in the profession.

As soon as they could get through on the temporary phone line, other newspapers called to ask if the News needed help. The Plainview Herald, for instance, offered to provide "anything or anybody we've got."

Meanwhile, the News staff - Kenneth and Janice Carroll, Kari Fluegel, Linda Maxwell, B. M. and Don

Nelson, Paula Portwood and Andrew Sepeda - got help in their nasty clean-up and set-up operations from Tommy and Rochelle Portwood, Verbie and Nathan Nelson, Bob Nino and Tony Martinez.

By Friday afternoon, all the essential "survival equipment" had been cleaned and moved, and the staff was ready to start producing a newspaper. Or

With all its previous "paste-ups" and negatives destroyed, the News started rebuilding and producing this issue Saturday morning, working from velox copies of the previous two issues (page-size reproductions on white plastic film).

Then gremlins started cropping up. With the cleanup of the darkroom enlarger Sunday, it became possible to test the photo processing chemicals which turned out to be ruined by the heat. Every paper clip in the world seemed to be covered with goo. Flaps on all the envelopes in the negative files were steamed shut. Everyone had to wait to use the single phone line. The most-used phototype film strips - the ones that were on the machines were ruined, as were the "head count sheets" which are relied upon daily to produce headlines and display lines that fit within the apportioned space.

But there was good news, too - enough to wring smiles from adversity.

The address stencils - tissue paper in cardboard frames - were undamaged, despite having been located near the main part of the fire. The addressing machine also worked.

And the phototypesetting machines, with their integrated chips and thousands of hair-like wires, turned out to be tougher than even the service engineer imagined. One was even put back into

# 'Au Revoir

I am soon going to leave Dimmitt and I feel like saying a few words of gratitude for the fantastic year I've had here.

I will never forget how scared I was at the Amarillo airport, looking for my new family; it would have been really a shock. I never thought that it would have been so hard and terrifying.

I couldn't feel anything in particular. I just had a feeling of total emptiness. I didn't know what I was doing there. And when I recognized my family, I was just suddenly ready to run away from these strangers. I think it was one of the most scary moments of my life.

It took me a few days to realize where I was and why. It had been really hard on me the first few months because of the important lack of English. But I still (sometimes) don't understand some 'Texas'




