





# Some Answers To Important Queries

Here are questions and answers supplied by the Revenue Service on 10 more subjects frequently asked about by the millions of tax payers who each year ask for solution to their tax problems or puzzlements.

1. (Multiple support of dependent) My three brothers and I contributed a total of \$1,200 for the support of our mother in 1955. She had no other income. We each contributed about equally. Can any one of us claim her as a dependent?

In your case, any one of the four brothers could claim your mother as a dependent, provided that the other three state in writing to the Revenue Service that none of them will claim the same exemption. So long as you keep up the present arrangement, you can rotate the exemption for your mother among the four of you, year by year, with the other three yielding the exemption.

2. (Casualty losses) My summer residence was damaged by a hurricane. Is the cost of repairing it a deductible expense?

Yes, up to the value of the loss, so far as that value is not made good by insurance. The loss is the value of the property damaged just before the casualty, less the property's value just after the casualty—or the "adjusted value" of the property (usually what the property cost you, plus permanent improvements on it, and less any depreciation for which you have claimed a deduction, or less previous unreimbursed casualty losses). You can deduct whichever of these two value bases is the least. The Revenue Service has issued a special booklet on "losses from Hurricanes, Floods and Disasters" as they affect your federal income taxes. This concerns both private and business property.

3. (Support of an unrelated person) I gave a home last year to an old, down-and-out friend. Can I deduct the cost of his room and board?

You cannot deduct such expenses. But you can claim your friend as an exemption (freeing \$600 of your income from tax), so long as you provided more than half his support for the year.

4. (Earnings of a minor child) My minor son worked for a grocery last year. The grocery paid my son's earnings — \$200 — to me. Must I include this in my income for 1955?

No. Although it was paid to you, it is your child's income. If he earned as much as \$600 the child's income might be taxable, which would mean he would have to file an income tax return.

5. (Earnings of an adult child)

My son, 22, earned \$650 as a waiter at the college he attended in 1955. Can I still claim him as an exemption?

Yes, so long as you furnished over half his support in 1955, and he was a full-time student at least five months in the year.

6. (Sick pay exclusion) I was sick for a time last year, but received my regular salary while I was absent. Do I pay tax on my sick pay?

Sick pay is exempt from taxation up to a rate of \$100 a week. All of it up to that rate, is exempt in the case of injury. In the case of sickness, the first week's pay is not exempt unless you were hospitalized at least one day during your illness.

7. (Child care) I was employed full time as a stenographer last year. My husband also worked, and we are filing a joint return. I paid \$850 to a nursery school for care of our 8-year-old child while I worked. Can I claim this as a deductible expense?

Not all of it. In your case, the amount you can claim will depend upon how much, if any, the combined income of you and your husband exceeded \$4,500.

A married woman may claim a child care deduction only if she is the husband, and only up to \$600. But the deduction must not exceed what actually was paid for child care.

And the deduction is reduced by any amount the joint income exceeds \$4,500.

The deduction can be claimed only for care of children or stepchildren of the taxpayer under 12, or dependents of any age who cannot care for themselves.

Any single woman, or a widow including still single men who are divorced or legally separated under a decree, can claim the deduction, without reducing it by \$4,500.

8. (Death of a spouse) My wife (or husband) died during 1955. Can I claim an exemption for her on my 1955 return?

Yes, so long as you are not remarried by the end of the year. You can in fact file a full split-income joint return for 1955, as though your wife (or husband) were still alive.

9. I paid group hospitalization insurance premiums in 1955. Are my total premiums for the year deductible?

Yes, but within the limits set up by the law on medical deductions.

10. I gave an old television set to our local Boy Scout troop in 1955, and I paid \$50 rent for a meeting place for the troop. Are these deductible expenses?

Yes, as contributions, if you itemize your deductions. You deduct the fair market value of the TV set at the time you gave it, not its original cost to you.

Last minute checklist:

Have you signed your return? Both husband and wife must sign a joint return.

Have you double checked your arithmetic?

Did you attach your W-2 (tax withholding) form or forms to your return?

## 3,039 Qualify For Voting In Mitchell County

**COLORADO CITY**— In Mitchell County, 3,039 qualified to vote, according to Tom Glover, county tax assessor, with the big rush coming in the last five days of January when the tax office was writing poll tax receipts at the rate of two hundred or more a day.

The 3,039 included 2,957 paid polls and 82 exemptions. The figure will not show the entire voting strength of the county since those over 61 are not required to pay a poll tax nor obtain an exemption. Less political interest is in evidence in Mitchell County than in 1952, the last presidential year, when 3,605 polls were recorded.

## Uncle Ray: Stanley Searched For Livingstone

David Livingstone loved his native Scotland, but events kept him in Africa during much of his adult life. The exploration of that continent continued to seem an interesting adventure to him.

After one of his visits to Great Britain, he set out on a trip into Africa's jungles. At length he reached Lake Tanganyika, 700 miles from the coast of the Indian Ocean.

Livingstone remained in the area of that lake for several months, and during that period was cut off from the outside world. He failed to find anyone who would carry letters for him to a seaport.

People in Europe and North America waited in vain for news of the famous explorer. They wondered what could have happened to him. Perhaps he had been wounded by a poisoned arrow, or had fallen into the hands of cannibals. A rumor of his death spread far and wide.

The editor of the New York Herald decided to try to discover the truth. To his help he called Henry M. Stanley, a 30-year-old reporter.

At the expense of the newspaper, Stanley traveled to the southeastern coast of Africa. Natives gave him reports of the white doctor, and at length he followed the trail to Ujiji, a village near Lake Tanganyika.

The American flag was carried by a member of Stanley's party.



"Dr. Livingstone, I presume!" said Stanley.

When he located the explorer, Stanley uttered the words: "Dr. Livingstone, I presume!"

The two men had an enjoyable talk, and joined in an exploring trip around the district. Livingstone said that he desired to stay longer at Ujiji, and Stanley bade him farewell after giving him valuable supplies.

That was Livingstone's last sight of a white man. He fell sick and died in Africa during the following year.

## Teacher, Suspect Of Felony, Looks To Doctor's Love

**SAN FRANCISCO** (U.P.)—A teacher facing a felony charge and possible loss of her job says she is chiefly concerned about a prominent physician who publicly professed his longtime love for her after her arrest.

The teacher, Miss Lorraine Staker, appeared in Municipal Court yesterday and sobbed that she is innocent of charges of receiving stolen goods. Preliminary hearing was set Feb. 16.

She told reporters she returns the love of Dr. Rodney A. Yoell, who says he fell in love with her 18 years ago and separated from his wife.

Miss Staker was arrested Monday night with a man and three women. Police said they were in a steal-to-order shoplifting ring. The 43-year-old teacher said she never received any stolen goods; that she was only a casual acquaintance of one woman who was arrested.

Dr. Yoell, 63, said their love will continue, even though her arrest "means both her life and mine have gone to pieces." He resigned yesterday as medical adviser to the Board of Education "to spare the department further embarrassment."

Already the recipient of 70 million dollars through the U. S.-controlled Export - Import Bank, the mill with the new loan will be able to boost its annual ingot capacity from 650,000 to one million tons, Nixon said.
