THE CHURCHES OF CHRIST AND THE OLD TESTAMENT

You hear many strange things about the Churches of Christ and our attitude toward the Old Testament. Such as: "They don't think God wrote the Old Testament." "They don't take all the Bible." These and similar thoughts are passed around about the Churches of Christ.

What is our real attitude toward the Old Testament and the New?
1. We know that the authority of the Old Testament law ended at the cross. Paul assures us that Christ blotted "out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us, and took it out of the way; NAILING IT TO HIS CROSS." Col. 2:14.

We are told that we were made dead to the law "by the body of Christ that we should be married to another, even to him who is raised from the dead." Rom. 7:4. So since the law was nailed to the cross, and since we were made dead to the law, and since we are joined to Christ we MUST understand that the authority of the law ended at the cross.

2. We know that the examples of the law of the Old Testament were preserved for our warning. "Now all these things happened unto them for ensamples; and they are written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the world are come." I Cor. 10:11. We, today, are not under the same law of the Old Testament, but we can profit by the examples under it.

3. The prophecies of the Old Testament, together with its types and figures, are still profitable to us today, for in Christ we see the fulfillment of them all. Paul used the Old Testament prophecies to prove that Jesus is the Son of God, Acts 17:2, 3, but he said by—"the deeds of the law

shall no flesh be justified." Rom. 3:20.

The Old Testament is inspired by God, for, "holy men inspired of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Spirit." 2 Pet. 1:21. It comprises a law given to Jews who lived before the cross. The New Testament comprises a law given to both Gentile and Jew who live after the cross. We are "come to Jesus, the mediator of the new covenant." Heb. 12:22,24.

Paul said the Jews never realized that the Old Testament law was done away in Christ. II Cor. 3:14, 15. They still talk about keeping the ten commandments, the Sabbath day, tithing, etc., when ALL these were Old Testament laws, done away in Christ. The New Testament contains the law for men today. By it we, today, must be governed, and it "thoroughly furnishes the man of God unto every good work." 2 Tim. 3:16, 17, and is God's "power unto salvation to everyone that believeth." Rom. 1:16.

MOTOR VEHICLE OWNERS HAVE TITLES IN ORDER

AUSTIN, TEXAS, FEBRUARY 12, 1946—The Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department today urged all Texas motor vehicle owners to see that the titles for vehicles to be registered in 1946 are in order. The law provides that before a vehicle may be registered, the owner must present to the Tax Collector the prior year's registration re-

ceipt and must have a title. Many people do not understand the importance and value of the Title Act, and do not realize that the Certificate of Title Act was passed to improve the validity of titles on motor vehicles thereby making such title comparable to an abstract on real estate. Motor vehicle owners who have acquired used vehicles, and who have received assigned titles from the previous owners, are urged to apply at once for their titles

in order that the transactions may be recorded and the new owners shown on the title records of the Department. Motor vehicle owners are also urged to register their equipment by purchasing the 1946 license plates as soon as possible. It is common practice throughout the State for owners to wait until the last week in March, there creating congested conditions and long lines of applicants in the various Tax Collector's offices. The County Tax Collectors are experiencing difficulty in obtaining temporary help, and you will be helping them and yourselves by obtaining 1946 license plates during February or in the first part of March and not waiting until the last day or days.

There are some persons operating motor vehicles with Out-Of-State license plates who may legally operate under 1946 Out-Of-State license plates, and these persons are cautioned to obtain such 1946 plates and apply same on or before the separation of

their present plates. There are others operating motor vehicles with Out-Of-State license plates who must legally re-register in Texas, and these persons are advised to purchase Texas plates immediately to avoid having to pay a penalty in addition to the registration fee.

Particular attention of the owners of trucks, truck-tractors, trailers, semi-trailers and buses was called to the fact that they must be prepared to furnish the Tax Collector with a complete description as to the size, type and serial number, et cetera, of equipment to be registered, and must be prepared to register for the actual weight of the empty vehicle plus the heaviest load to be carried, which under the law cannot be less than the manufacturer's rated carrying capacity. If in doubt as to the actual weight, the owners of commercial vehicles should have them weighed and present the weight certificate at the time of registration.

FARM-TO-MARKET ROAD PROGRAM GAINING SPEED

AUSTIN, Texas' \$16,000,000 farm-to-market road program is rolling along at an increasing pace.

Substantial progress has been made by the Texas highway department in the actual construction of the tremendous postwar program. Seven months ago the commission, in cooperation with the commissioners' courts, selected the system of 7,205 miles of farm-to-market roads the highway department was to improve with funds that will be available in the three years following the war.

Three months after selection of these roads V-J day came, and 30 days later the highway department held its first postwar letting contracts. It has steadily moved forward with a letting each month to place this work under construction.

Bids have been received on work involving \$2,150,000. This provides for 258 miles on 28 different roads involving 31 counties.

All farm-to-market roads will be dustless two-lane roads with bridges of adequate strength to carry the normal amount of traffic that may be involved. Maintenance of these roads will be the responsibility of the highway department.

Counties furnish the right of way which varies from 70 to 100 feet in width, depending upon the drainage condition that may be involved on the prospective roads. With a favorable summer construction season, the winter of 1946 will see many of these new roads in operation, the highway department reports.

PRINTERS' INK (Feb. 9) in an editorial, prompted by a desire to find the answer to some of our current problems, went through its issues dating from 1918 to 1919 and discovered that many of the difficulties confronting us today were also in the headlines after the first World War.

Housing shortages, labor unrest, inflation and the problems of finding jobs for returning soldiers were all as pressing then as now, the magazine says, and though we have been ushered into the Atomic Era as a result of World War II we are still faced with the age-old dilemmas.

Even fashion experts made similar predictions, it states and men of both generations were expected to burst out in loud colorful clothes as a result of their being forced to wear drab army garments for so long, but, the magazine adds, then as now the men didn't respond to this prediction and continued to dress much as they did previous to the conflicts.

STATE HEALTH OFFICER URGES RODENT CONTROL

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Inasmuch as typhus fever is, even this early in the year, showing an increased incidence over the State, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent appeal to every Texan to cooperate in rodent control measures.

"The conquest of typhus fever in Texas is far from complete," Dr. Cox declared. "There is still entirely too much of this disabling disease.

"Concentrated effort and close cooperation from every citizen of Texas is urgently needed if typhus fever is to be brought definitely under control," Dr. Cox continued, "and this certainly must be done if our public health in Texas is to be protected."

Inasmuch as typhus is spread by the flea which feeds on typhus infected rats, control measures, according to Dr. Cox, depend on rat extermination through means of starving out and building out rats as well as trapping and poisoning them. He stated that regardless of what a fine garbage collection and disposal system a community maintains, it is particularly worthless in rodent control unless garbage is put into (and not beside) a garbage pail and the pail kept covered at all times.

Rat-proofing of all homes and business houses should be undertaken as quickly as possible and the local health departments are usually able to assist in overcoming the obstacle of obtaining materials and labor. They can also assist in trapping and poisoning campaigns and will gladly do so upon request.

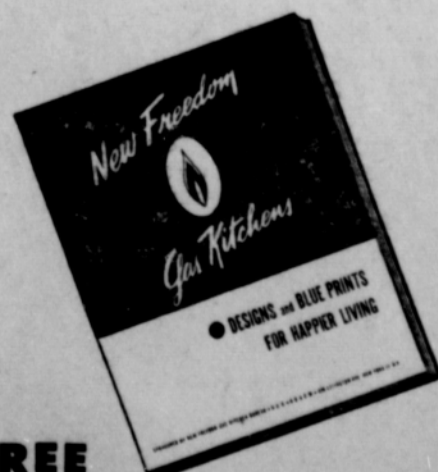

Need for USO Still Holds Important Place

The need for USO did not end on V-J Day and it is vitally important for many of the organization's services to continue unabated through the difficult period of transition from total war to permanent peace, the President of the United States said in a letter read at the Fifth Anniversary Luncheon of USO held February 4th in New York.

Copies of the President's letter and one read from General Eisenhower have been received by W. W. Jackson of San Antonio, Regional Executive of USO for Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico.

Speaking of USO as "an outstanding example of united action towards a single purpose," the President singled out two other aspects as worthy of special comment: the organization's support by voluntary contributions from the entire American people, and the opportunity it has afforded millions of volunteers to participate in the war effort.

Dated January 28, 1946, the President's letter reads:

"It has come to my attention that On February Fourth, the USO will mark its fifth anniversary. This seems an appropriate time for me to write into the record a word of appreciation and commendation for the great and significant contribution of the USO, through its Member Agencies and through Camp Shows, to the spirit of our fighting forces and their families.

"Three aspects of the USO deserve special comment: It is an outstanding example of united action towards a single purpose. Its far-flung services are maintained by voluntary contributions from the people of every community of the United States. Its local activities have permitted millions of volunteers to participate effectively in the war effort. These qualities distinguish the USO as a particularly fitting expression of the relationship between the American people and their armed forces.

"In recognizing this service to the Nation, I feel impelled, at the same time, to call attention to the fact that the need for the USO did not end on V-J Day. It is vitally important for many of its services to continue unabated through the difficult period of transition from total war to permanent peace."

General Eisenhower on January 22 wrote President Kimball: "A bath, hot food, and rest out of the line soon restore a man's physical fitness. To restore and maintain his mental balance is often more difficult. It is in this field that the USO made its greatest contribution. USO Camp Shows have brought American cheer and laughter close to every fighting front—You have helped make our soldier feel that the folks at home are vitally interested in their welfare."

The General's letter concludes by adding emphasis to the President's view on the importance of continuing USO: "To preserve our victory we dare not withdraw too quickly from our world-wide military commitments. Therefore in congratulating you on five years of significant service, may I earnestly count on your organization and your host of volunteers to stay with us through the dangerous and difficult period of transition to final peace?"

Speakers at the luncheon were Lt. General J. Lawton Collins,

representing General Eisenhower; and Vice Admiral Louis E. Denfield, who spoke on behalf of Admiral Chester W. Nimitz. Dr. Kimball spoke on the future plans and program of USO.

ROSS CEMETERY IS BEAUTIFUL

About three years ago the City of Baird assumed charge of maintenance and up-keep of Ross Cemetery. It was then an ill kept plot with weeds and grave-stones viewing to see which could reach closer to the heavens. Today the cemetery is a beauty spot. It is clean and orderly. Quite a number of burials have been made in the cemetery during the past few months, and hundreds of people from around about have visited the cemetery. Those who have never seen the cemetery before speak lavishly of its beauty, and those who knew it before the city took it over marvel at the changes that have been made in its appearance. The old saying, "if there is a spark of civic pride in any city, it can first be seen in the appearance of its cemetery," is certainly true in Baird.

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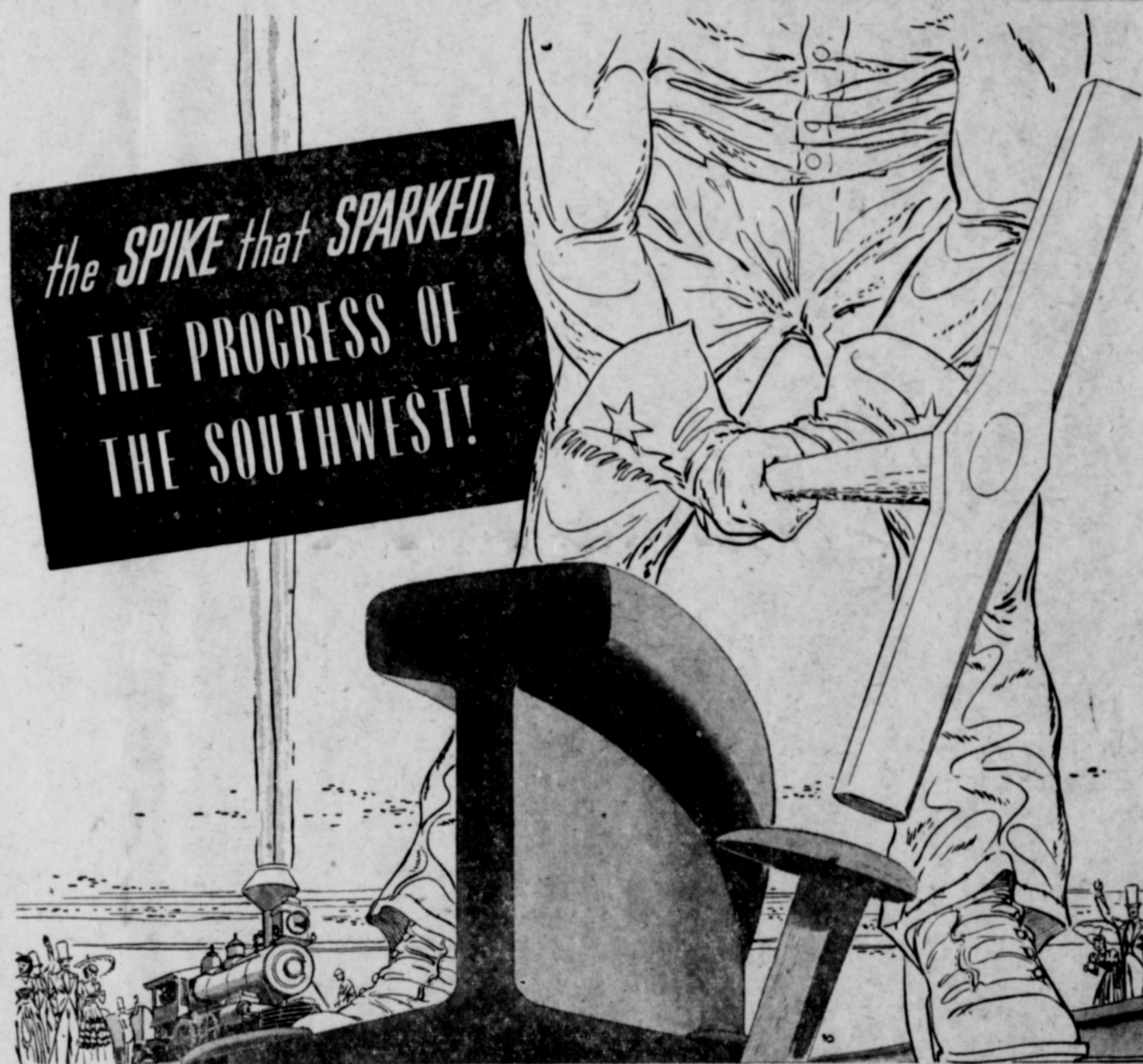

SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO, on March 3, 1871, the first spike was driven to anchor the rails of the Texas and Pacific—rails that were destined to push back the wilderness and open up a new world of opportunity to the nation.
