


Election night has lost much of its excitement, or so far as that goes practically all of it. By the time voters begin dropping their ballots in the ballot box on election morning the computers have already determined the winners, even down to the fraction of a percentage point. From there on the returns given by hard-working reporters, announcers and commentators just merely confirm what the computers revealed early in the day. The prognosticators, in a few instances, have announced the winners in some races before the voting got underway.







> **Bible Thoughts** "THE FOLLY OF REJECTING DIVINE GUIDANCE" **By Ronnie Parker**

Even though Jeremiah tells us that "it is not in man that walketh to direct his own steps" (Jeremiah 10: 23, some still attempt to do so. The result is spiritual chaos. In the tenth chapter of Romans, Paul said that the Jewish nation was in a lost condition due to rejecting God's righteousness while following their own. It is folly for a human being to reject divine guidance as he strives to live a spiritual life. It is so easy to be deceived — either by others or by one's own self - that we must depend on God for guidance. Saul of Tarsus thought he was correct in opposing Jesus by persecuting the church. Even after his conversion to Christianity he said, "I have lived in all good conscience before God until this day" (Acts 23:1). Yet, he also said that he had been the "chief of sinners" (I Timothy 1:15). Paul's conscience was not a safe guide nor is ours. We cannot be guided by our feelings alone for they are often deceptive. We should say, "let the Bible be our guide" rather than "let our conscience be our guide."

Consider off-season buying. You will ordinarily have less of choice, but this is hardly a crucial disadvantage for standardized items such as socks or underwear, children's shoes or white goods. Beware of "going out of business" signs. These sales occasionally turn up real bargains, but there are not returns and there will be no place to whom you can complain if defects appear.

BE LEERY of too many sales and watch those exceptional articles carefully.

Understand the guarantee. On private label appliances, it's important to determine who is responsible for fulfilling the guarantee agreement. Will the store handle it or do you have to send the appliance back to some distant factory? Or have the terms of the guarantee been cut along with the price?

However carefully you shop, you won't save a cent, of course, if you go overboard on bargain-buying. As you walk down the aisles between counters laden with at tractive products, remember that to matter how cheap an item is it's no bargain if you don't need


