

Look for the Administration to announce later this month a set of major "emergency measures' designed to reduce the crippling glut of US surplus commodities by as much as a billion bushels.

The Administration plan may call for an acreage diversion of up to 60% in 1983, stepped-up efforts to increase exports, and a method to bypass the \$50,000 limitation in diversion payments to any individual producer - perhaps by "in kind" payments of commodities to farmers participating in the diversion program.

Several of the emergency proposals being considered now by the Administration and USDA officials originiated with the Texas Corn Growers Association, headquartered in Dimmitt.

Carl King, Bill Clark and Ray Joe Riley of the TCGA met Saturday in Lubbock with Deputy Secretary of Agriculure John Ford to present a et of TCGA proposals for educing government stocks f commodities and providing centives for stepped-up narketing of the nation's ricultural products.

Ford referred the TCGA oposals to Secretary of riculture John Block Mony morning, then summoned ng to take part in an cussion in Washington Dec. 8 for further discussions on possible changes in the

present farm program. "If the federal government goes through with what we think they're planning, it could be the biggest turnaround in government policy in the history of federal agriculture programs," King

He said the announcement of the proposed emergency plan is expected to be made 'about Christmas time."

The TCGA got involved in the Administration's policy planning when its executive board drew up a set of 'emergency proposals'' last week to send "to everybody in the state and federal government who has anything to do with agriculture.'

Noting that "the worm is turning" in the makeup of the House Agriculture Committee because of Republican losses in the recent elections, the TCGA directors hoped their proposals would reach a sympathetic ear in Washing-

In its list of proposals, the TCGA is recommending:

-Increased exports of corn, cotton, sorghum, wheat, soybeans, oats and barley now in the CCC loan and reserve programs, in order to save the storage costs, make more storage space available, cut the balance-of-trade deficit and improve market

-Encourage producers to redeem surplus commodities from the Commodity Credit Corp. and sell them, rather than forfeit them under the loan and reserve programs.

-A mandatory 20% acreage reduction of the specified crops, plus an optional additional 40% reduction, with the producer to be paid (at his option) in cash, surplus commodities in kind, or credit

on storage, interest and handling charges. -Revision and updating of crop bases for the 1983 crop

-Establishment of a select 'emergency task force' to implement importation plan.

In a preamble to the TCGA's list of recommendations, King charged that the Administration's proposed crop diversions for 1983 -20% mandatory, with 10% paid - "is about half what the producers need."

'We are faced with a weak farm program and with past and present Administrations' embargoes, threats of embargoes and sanctions to the point where agriculturerelated businesses and farms alike are going bankrupt," King said.

The Texas Corn Growers' proposals drew an immediate response from the USDA.

'We really appreciated John Ford taking the time and trouble to meet with us Saturday," King said. "Something has to be done, and there's a lot of activity in the USDA right now to try to come up with some ideas and answers.'

The main TCGA proposal that may come out in the Administration plan is the 20-40 acreage reduction idea.

'Mr. Ford told us Monday that he is recommending that the USDA piggy-back our 60% diversion proposal on top of the present program as a further option for the farm-Sunday, Father Chen, ers," King said. 
