Ray Joe Riley, a Castro County farmer, has been appointed by Gov. Mark White to serve on the State Seed and Plant Board. Riley's term will extend through Oct. 6, 1985.

The board sets the state's seed certification policy, reviews certification licenses of plant breeders, and deals with new plant and seed varieties for the state of Texas.

Riley, 48, is president of Riley Yieldmaster Seed Corp. of Hart, and is nationally known as a seed producer. He has headed both the sorghum and cotton divisions of the Texas Certified Seed Producers, has long been a top officer in Plains Cotton Growers, has served as a director of the Texas Association of Cotton Producers Organizations, has represented US producers and ginners at Universal Cotton Standards conferences, has served on the steering committee of the National Cotton Council, and was appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture to the US Cotton Board in 1980.

An honor graduate and former instructor at Texas A&M, Riley was named Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture in 1974 by the **Texas County Agricultural** Agents Association, and was recognized by Texas Tech as the 1974 Outstand-

ing Agriculturist. He has served the state in two previous appointments - as a member of the Market Value Review Panel for Texas in 1975 (appointed by the state commissioner of education) and as a member of the Interim Advisory Committee to the Legislative Property Tax Committee in 1978 (appointed by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby).

#### Hunters need 'blaze orange'

The deer and turkey hunting season which started Nov. 12 in most Texas counties would be substantially safer for hunters if they would wear "blaze orange" clothing.

This is the opinion of hunter education officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department who cite statistics from other states which show wearing the fluorescent color enhances safety without affecting hunter success.

"Hunter blaze or fluorescent orange is the most easily seen and recognized color for hunters under all weather and light conditions," said J. D. Peer, assistant hunter education coordinator. "In some states where this material is mandatory, the number of 'mistaken for game' accidents has been reduced by as much as 50 percent."

Hunter orange is not mandatory in Texas except during public hunts on the department's wildlife management areas for deer, turkey, quail and javelina. 
**UETERAN'S** SERVICES

A large number of Veterans Administration beneficiaries will soon be required to complete the annual income report. This report is required at this time each year so that a determination can be made as to whether a person continues to be eligible for the disability or death benefit payments. Required to provide the annual income accounting will be all veterans receiving disability pension, all widows and children in receipt of death pension benefits, and all parents in receipt of dependency and indemnity compensation following service-connected the deaths of their veteran

sons or daughters. The income report was mailed to all of the VA recipients on Nov. 1, 1983. The completed report must be returned to the Veterans Administration prior to Jan. 1, 1984. Failure to return the report will result in termination of the benefits being paid. Some of these income report forms will be difficult to complete and many pensioners will require assistance to be

This credit will be deducted by the employer before the payroll tax is Therefore, the paid. employee will not notice any increase in Social Security payroll deductions for 1984. employer's matching share will be 7 percent. There are other increases effective for 1984. The self-employment tax will

be increased to 14 percent. However, the self-employed individual will get a credit of 2.7 percent, so the actual amount paid will be 11.3 percent.

The maximum amount subject to Social Security tax rises each year along with the average increase in wages. The figure for 1984 will be \$37,800, up from \$35,700 in 1983. Therefore, the maximum Social Security tax payable for an employee will be \$2,646.00 for the year. The maximum tax for selfemployed individuals will be \$4,271.40.

The exempt amounts for the annual earnings test will increase for 1984. Also called the retirement test, this is the limit set on how much a person can earn and still receive all Social Security benefits for the year. The amount for persons under age 65 will be set at \$5,160, and \$6,960 for persons that are age 65 in 1984.

The amount of earnings required to earn a quarter of coverage will go from \$370 to \$390.



Establishment of the third zone in effect opens roughly the western half of the state of sandhill crane hunting during the open season (see map).

### New cotton stripper

Phil Lemons of C&S Equipment Company of Dimmitt, has recently returned from a special announcement meeting in Lubbock where a big new cotton stripper was introduced. It's the John Deere 740, a one-of-a-kind 4- or 5-row tractor-mounted stripper.

This new stripper is designed to be teamed with a high-horsepower tractor, and is said to reduce harvesting cost by as much as 51 percent. In a comparison test across 1500 acres, John Deere engineers reportedly found that a new 4-row 740 mounted on a 4450 tractor with front-wheel drive costs as little as \$15 per acre to operate. A 5-row version on the same tractor costs only \$14 per acre. They figured it costs about \$30 per acre to harvest with two tractormounted 2-rows (tractors front-wheel without drive). To keep this cost-cutting harvester on the row longer, it comes with the largest basket in the industry for a tractormounted stripper - 706 cubic feet. And an optional basket compactor and dump control makes it easier to fill and unload.

### Winter pastures require grazing management'

Some stockmen may not be too keen on winter pastures because of past problems in getting their money's worth, but it all boils down to "grazing management."

"Grazing management is the key to making winter pastures (wheat, oats or ryegrass) pay for themselves," says Dr. David Bade, a forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Producers who say they are not getting their money's worth out of winter pastures likely are not using them properly."

Concerns often voiced by producers regarding winter pastures are poor stands, failure to get grazing when needed, and high costs, says

Bade. (Variable costs can run \$60 to \$100 per acre, depending on whether pastures are sodseeded or planted in prepared seedbeds.)

This is where grazing management comes into play. Bade describes grazing management as some form of limited grazing of winter pastures, particularly in the fall and winter.

"It's important to get the grass ahead of cows or calves so that there will be adequate carryover of forage into the critical winter months," he points out. "This means making sure that the grass is well established and growing vigorously before grazing. Having 6 to 8 inches of growth before grazing and then graze down to 3 to 4 inches."

By limiting grazing to only several hours a day, an acre of winter pasture can support four to six lactating cows, notes Bade.

Cow-calf operators can use winter pastures to keep their cows in top condition for rebreeding, since body condition is critical to fast recycling and rebreeding.

Also, putting springborn calves on winter pastures in the fall (rather than marketing them) and carrying them over until next spring can mean \$20 to \$50 extra income per cow depending on market conditions, points out the forage specialist.

Through a creep-grazing system for nursing calves, stockmen can get 50 to 100 pounds of extra weight on calves before moving them to market, notes Bade, and that also means additional income. "Winter pastures have the potential for meeting all the requirements of a cow weaning a 600-pound calf," contends Bade. "They are a much better alternative than feeding low quality hay and expensive protein supplement during the winter. Using these pastures wisely through grazing management can mean a little more profit due to increased weight gains





#### **HELP FOR** STUTTERERS

While parents should not be alarmed if their preschooler stutters, they should be concerned if that speech disfluency persists as the child gets ready to start school. "Parents should be assured that 80 percent of all children between two and seven years old frequently stutter, but will outgrow it by adolescence," says Dr. Delores Stegelin, a family life education specialist with Texas A&M's Agricultural Extension Service. But for children whose stuttering becomes more pronounced with age, early detection and treatment is best, says Stegelin. Newer methods of intervention for stuttering actively involve the parents and include family counseling as well as speech therapy for the child. Parents who are






