

McKeon Trial Is Recessed

PARRIS ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — The court-martial of Sgt. Matthew C. McKeon was in adjournment today until Monday. But this big Marine base was humming after these two developments yesterday:

1. The testimony of Col David W. Silvey, last prosecution witness, who said he had never heard of a night march by recruits here, and he has been here since Sept. 21, 1953.

2. A document produced by the defense, which indicated that the House Armed Services Committee in May had given the Marine Corps 90 days to clean house.

The court is concerned with a night disciplinary march ordered by McKeon in which six recruits drowned.

At the time of the March, April 8, Silvey was operations and training officer. His section had charge of preparing plans for recruit training. He was the highest ranking Marine officer to take the stand for the prosecution.

Silvey also told the court that he had never conducted a night inspection of the marshy areas back of the 3rd Recruit Battalion, or behind the rifle range.

The House Armed Services Committee's ultimatum was contained in a statement labeled "Policy of the Commandant of the Marine Corps Governing Recruit Training" issued May 1, the date the commandant, Gen. Randolph McC. Fite appeared before the committee. His appearance was prompted by the death march.

Excerpts from the document were used in questioning a witness at the court-martial yesterday. The full document was not read in court.

The document said in part: "The picture which is forming shows our recruit depots as repeated scenes of callousness and brutality in an atmosphere of coarseness and filth."

"The incident of such things as forced marches to exhaustion, punishment duck-walks and other physical mistreatment, the hazing and personal indignity of heads in buckets, verbal filthy abuse, public ridicule for receipt of personal and private letters, and incidents of this nature must be known."

"We must be able to clearly demonstrate that we have the situation completely in hand."

"If at the end of 90 days we are unable to make such a demonstration to the satisfaction of the House Armed Services Committee, we can be sure that the committee will take action to see what they must do to get our house in order."

Silvey was the 36th and last witness for the government, which completed its case at 3:53 p.m. against the 31-year-old former

drill instructor from Worcester, Mass.

The court adjourned until Monday to permit defense attorney Emile Zola Berman to go on an unexplained mission which he said was of "utmost importance to this case."

McKeon is on trial before a seven-man court-martial board as a result of an 850-yard night disciplinary march by Recruit Platoon 71.

On April 8, about 8 p.m., the sergeant led 74 men into the Ribbon Creek marsh back of the rifle range. Six drowned.

McKeon is charged with involuntary manslaughter, oppression of recruits, possessing an alcoholic beverage in barracks and drinking in the presence of a recruit.

A Navy doctor, Lt. Robert J. Atcheson, 27, of Memphis, Tenn., told the court he examined McKeon for sobriety about 9 p.m. the night of the tragedy and "he was within the normal limits of sobriety."

About midnight, Atcheson said, he drew blood from McKeon to run a test for alcohol in his bloodstream. The result showed .015 per cent, the doctor reported.

Under cross examination Atcheson said he didn't put much faith in the accuracy of the blood test, anyhow, and regarded McKeon as "clinically sober."

In the course of the day, the prosecutor, Maj. Charles B. Sevier introduced into evidence the orders McKeon supposedly violated.

One read in part: "No extra instructions will take place . . . on Sundays and holidays."

The prosecution contends the march was such extra instruction.

The defense holds that the drill instructor had been given wide latitude in the instillation of discipline — the march was normal procedure.

McKeon is also accused of violating night march regulations, which requires troops on the move to wear white towels and have a light showing at each end of the column.

Under vigorous cross examination by Berman, Silvey admitted there were no specific orders placing the Ribbon Creek area out of bounds, except as it pertained to swimming.

He also told the court that drill instructors had considerable latitude and discretion in teaching and maintaining discipline. He added: "Within certain limits."

Silvey insisted the commanding general of the base was the only one who could order a "troop movement."

Berman, a former Air Force colonel, asked him if he regarded a march of 74 men 850 yards across a field as a "troop movement."

"I believe I would. Yes," Silvey answered.

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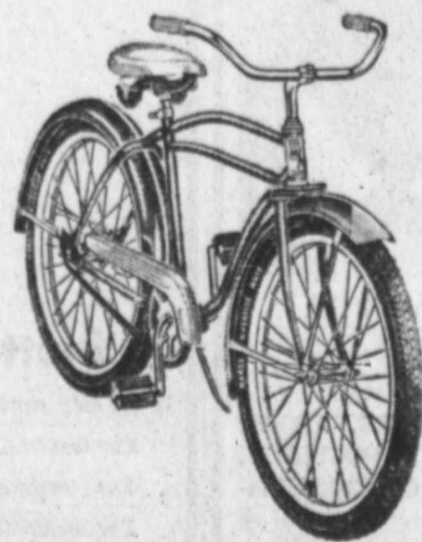
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Ike Irritated By Stassen Rebellion

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower was described by several congressional Republicans today as irritated by Harold E. Stassen's continuing efforts to dump Vice President Nixon.

However, GOP lawmakers who professed to know something about the President's attitude toward his disarmament aide's anti-Nixon campaign said they do not expect Stassen to be fired.

One senator said the President was determined not to make a political "martyr" out of Stassen by dismissing him. This legislator said he expects Stassen to retain his White House job until after the election but not much longer.

A second GOP senator said he understands the President has said he did not sanction in advance Stassen's proposal that Nixon be supplanted by Gov. Christian Herter of Massachusetts.

Two other Republicans said they do not think Eisenhower will speak out on the matter until an expected White House news conference next week.

"If Eisenhower follows his usual

course, then, they said they expect him to reaffirm his confidence in Nixon with little more than an implied rebuke to Stassen.

Nixon smilingly declined comment on Stassen's announced move to take a new professional poll of public sentiment on potential vice presidential nominees.

Until the new poll is completed about a week hence, Stassen said, he will "make no adverse comment about any Republican."

He named Adolph Toigo, president of Lennen and Newell of New York, as one of five Republicans he said are helping to finance the newest poll. He said Toigo will supervise the work, to be done by professional pollsters.

The other four he named, all delegates to the Republican National Convention in San Francisco, are H. F. Johnson of Racine, Wis., president of the Johnson Wax Co.; Baile Vinson, Tulsa businessman and Oklahoma Republican national committeeman; Elroy W. Bromwich, Missouri committeeman; and Carl Stifel, a St. Louis businessman.

In St. Louis, Stifel said he had contributed \$1,000 to the new poll to see how Nixon "stands with the voters." Johnson declined to comment.

The others Stassen named were not reached for comment.

Stassen has contended that an Eisenhower-Nixon ticket would run 6 per cent behind an Eisenhower-Herter team. He has said that a previous private poll showed Nixon at the bottom of the list in popularity among eight potential vice presidential candidates.

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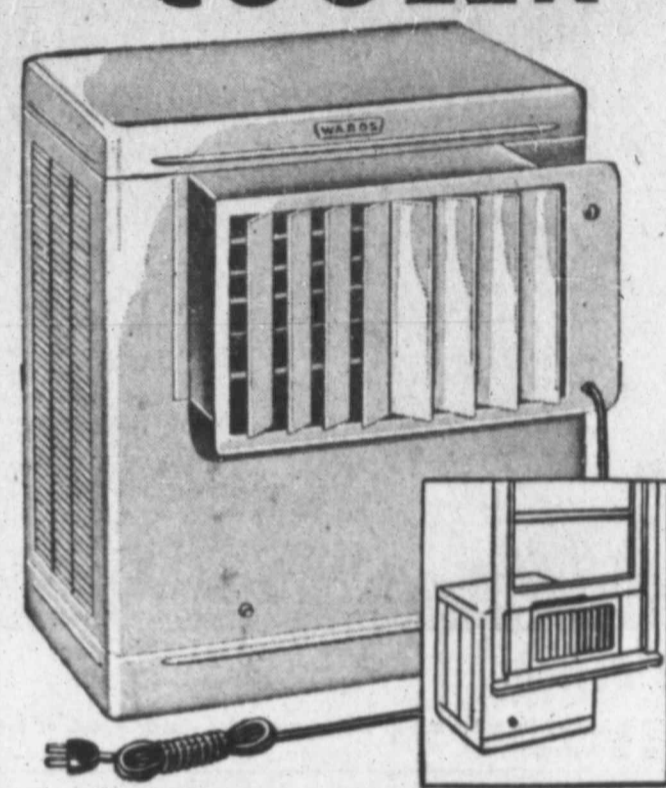
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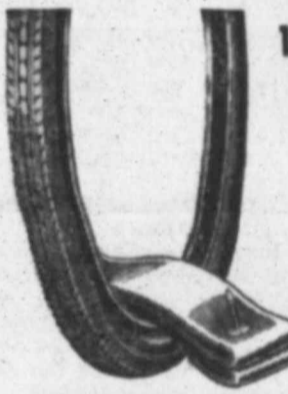

NEW YORK (AP)—Last week Joe Adcock was spraying home runs. This week it's Bobby Thomson. And the Milwaukee Braves roll on, adding to their first-place hold in the National League.

Thomson hit his 16th homer yesterday as the Braves mauled the last-place New York Giants 11-0.

It was Milwaukee's fifth straight victory and 14th in 16 starts. With Cincinnati losing its third straight to Brooklyn 5-3, Milwaukee stretched out to a 5 1/2-game lead over the Redlegs and six over the third-place Dodgers.

At one stage last week, first baseman Adcock had smashed out nine homers in 11 games. Then Thomson came off the bench at Milwaukee, where he had been parked for weak hitting. He earned the permanent left field position by belting a homer and a double that scored four runs against the Giants, his former teammates.

Sunday he closed out the home stand at Milwaukee with two homers as the Braves swept a pair from Philadelphia.

His biggest smash of the year came Wednesday in the Polo Grounds, a grand-slam homer that pulled the Braves behind and put them on the way to a 7-4 victory.

"Believe it or not," he said, "I wasn't going for the long ball. I was just trying to get that base hit and knock home the guy on third."

"When I went up to hit I was thinking I'd had a funny year against the Giants. Earlier this season I'd gone lousy the first two or three times up, then had come through with some key hits later in the ball game. The same thing happened this time and I told myself I was overdue and it was about time I did something."

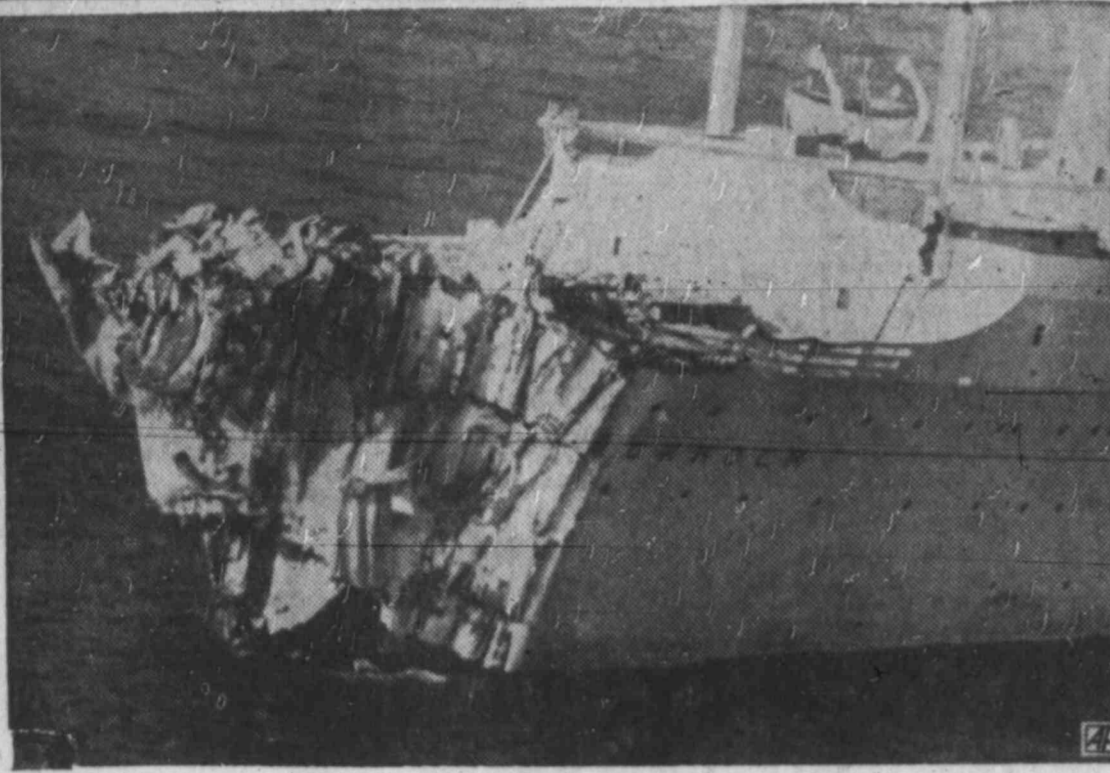
Dillard's Equichall Runs At Centennial Saturday

Negligence Claimed In Ocean Collision

NEW YORK (AP)—A group of survivors of the Andrea Doria have accused the ship's personnel of "complete negligence" at the time the Italian liner collided with the Swedish motorship Stockholm.

Many other passengers had different versions and words of praise for the crew.

The accusation was made in a typewritten statement last night addressed to news media. It was signed by 96 persons brought here aboard the freighter Cape Ann, and was given to a newsmen by Arthur Fisher of New York City, who is in the textile business.

The statement said, "There existed a state of complete negligence on the part of the crew and officers toward its obligations and responsibilities to the safety of the passengers of the ship."

The statement further charged no proper alarm drill was held on the westbound crossing, that no alarm was sounded when the ship was struck, and that no notice was given to abandon ship.

The statement added: "There was no indication of life-

boat stations or procedure beyond wearing of lifebelts.

"No instructions were received by public address system (which was in operating condition) or by word of mouth from the crew that danger was imminent and lifebelts should be donned.

"As a result, passengers acted on their own initiative at the reversing of the motors, the impact of the collision, the immediate listing of the ship, the fumes and water which entered some cabins and passageways, and the instant panic which broke loose."

The statement continued: "There were a small number of crew members who worked alongside of the passengers, as individuals, in aiding the abandoning of the ship. We give these men recognition as individuals, carrying a private sense of responsibility."

An Italian Line spokesman said the line would launch an investigation of the complaint.

9 Congress Places Wait To Be Filled

Nine Congress places will be decided Saturday but only three or four races have aroused much voter interest.

Several congressmen with opponents staying in Washington while friends carried on their campaigns.

Fifteen representatives from Texas are either unopposed or heavily favored for renomination. Among them is Speaker Sam Rayburn of District 4 who drew two opponents early in the campaign. Both dropped out.

One of the hottest campaigns is in District 3 of East Texas where Lindley Beckworth, former congressman, and R. E. Blount, former state legislator, are fighting for the seat vacated by Rep. Brady Gentry of Tyler.

Both have been conducting a rural door-to-door campaign in the eight county area.

Beckworth was 14 years in Congress, but resigned in 1952 to be beaten for the Senate by Price Daniel. Beckworth tried to unseat Gentry two years ago.

Blount served six years in the Legislature from Big Spring. He has never been defeated in a political race. He is now an attorney in Tyler.

In the 11 counties of District 1, Rep. Wright Patman, has a hard race with Kenneth Simmons, former mayor of Avinger. Both have campaigned extensively and recently have staged several television appearances.

A bitter issue has been Patman's criticism of Simmons' activities in selling insurance to servicemen. Simmons contends Patman made unfounded allegations to a committee of Congress which later cleared Simmons of all charges.

In South Texas, Nueces County Judge John Young is challenging Rep. John Bell of Cuero in the 14th District. Young has referred numerous times to Bell's alleged connections with the state veterans land deals. Bell has replied he served his district "honestly and honorably" and stressed his efforts to get federal projects for his district.

In West Texas, Rep. J. T. Rutherford is opposed by former County Judge William Blanton, son of the Thomas Blanton who had a 20 years in Congress.

Foreign Aid Study Set

WASHINGTON (AP)—A six-member group headed by Sen. Green (D-RI) will start an exhaustive review of American foreign aid policy.

The bipartisan group was named yesterday by Chairman George (D-Ga) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. It will function as an executive committee of the special Senate committee on foreign aid, set up under a resolution appropriating \$300,000 for the study.

Other members are Chairman Russell (D-Ga) of the Armed Services Committee, Chairman Fulbright (D-Ark) of the Banking Committee and Senators Bridges (R-NH), Knowland (R-Calif) and H. Alexander Smith (R-NJ).

George, in a statement, made it clear the committee will reach its own findings on the extent to which this country should continue to bolster the military and economic defenses of nations abroad, although it seeks administration cooperation in its studies.

To avoid partisanship, no hearings are contemplated before the November elections.

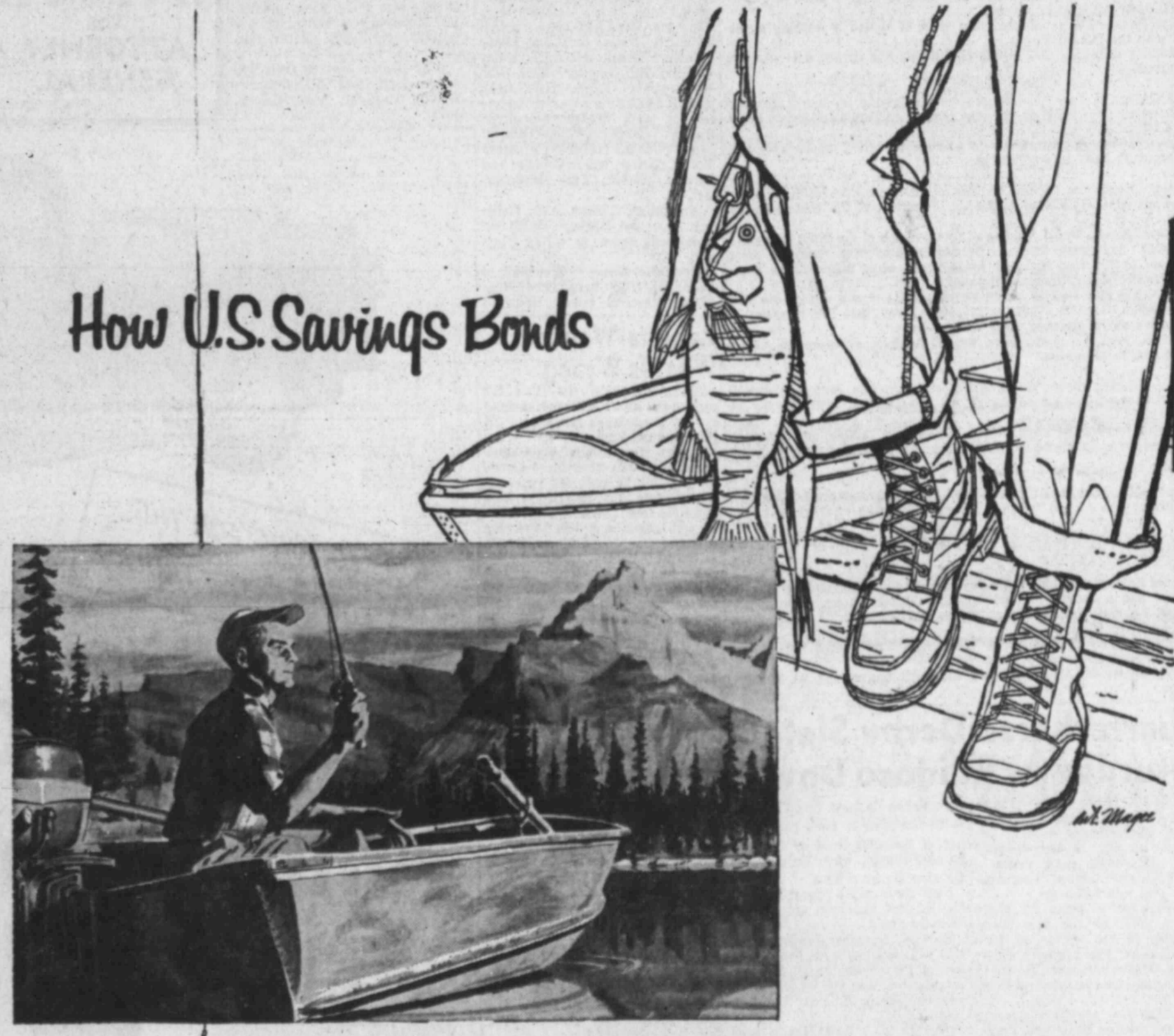

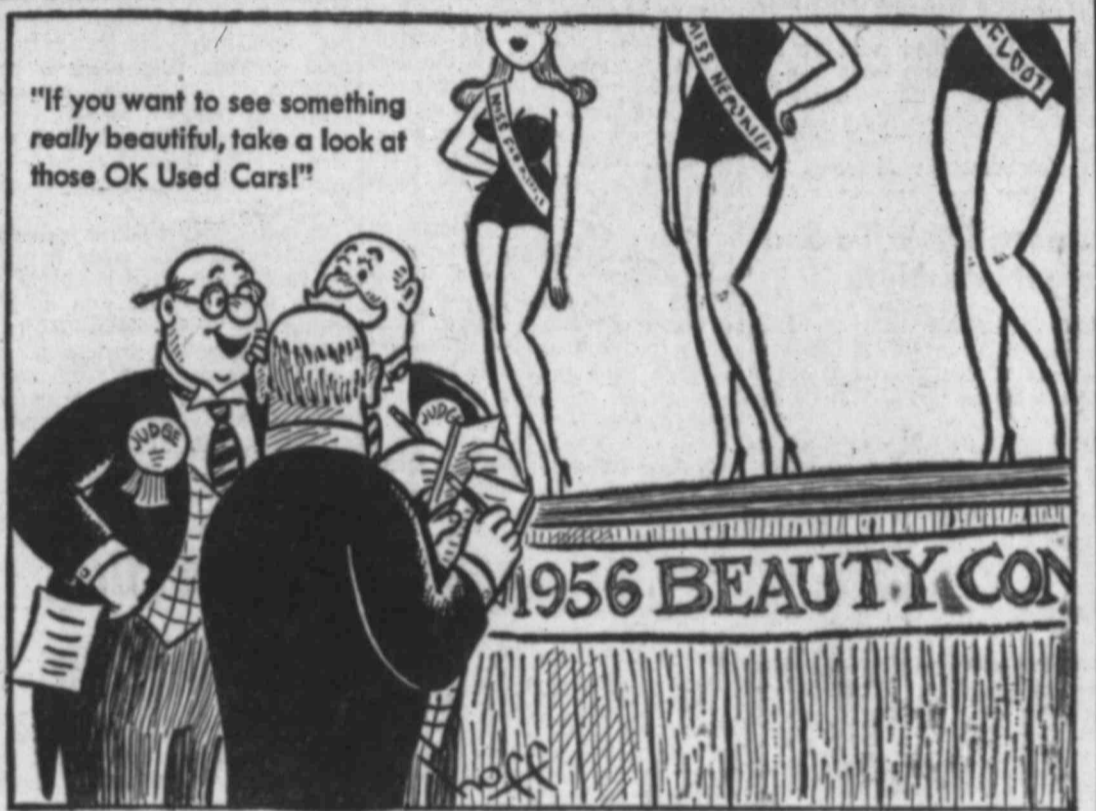

MALTA, Mont. (AP)—Mrs. Elizabeth Swan says an elk pushed her into the Missouri River. Mr. and Mrs. Swan of Lewistown stopped to fish southwest of Malta. Mrs. Swan, who is secretary of the Landless Indians of Montana, said she was sitting on a camp stool, awaiting a bite on her fish hook, when an elk slipped up behind her and nudged her into the water. Mrs. Swan said she does not know whether the elk was being playful or was displaying more than ordinary curiosity.

Laredo Probe Is Recessed

LAREDO (AP)—Two groups checking absentee voting in Webb County met together briefly yesterday, then adjourned until Monday when a spokesman said that a full scale probe would get underway. Several persons testified at a session conducted by the House Investigation Committee and representatives of the attorney general's office. Rep. Wade Spilman, committee chairman, said the hearing was not exhaustive, but was designed to get a general idea of what was going on. Spilman said no conclusions were reached. Several city employees testified. Manuel Jasso, an employee of the city sanitation department, testified he was not a U.S. citizen and had not voted. He said he had never been asked to secure a poll tax or pay a poll tax for anyone. He also denied that any money had been taken from his salary for political purposes. Pedro Vela, a part time city employee, denied a statement by the Freedom Party that he delivered an application for an absentee ballot to Mrs. Bruna Casquez. Other investigations are being held or are scheduled in Duval, Starr, Zapata and Jim Hogg counties, all nearby. C. B. Dick filed suit at Rio Grande City stating there are too many election clerks to count the absentee ballots in Starr County. County Atty. F. R. Nye said the suit was politically inspired.



Jack Buchanan, manager of the Howard County Farm Association, said his organization had only about 50 or 60 Mexican Nationals in this section, and most of these are special hands. He said some farmers were having a hard time keeping the workers busy, but didn't want to send them home, as there might be work later. Hiring workers from Mexico is more expensive than most people think. To get a special hand, which means one that can drive a tractor or handle livestock, requires first of all a \$3.00 fee to the U. S. government. Then there is a \$12.00 charge from the Mexican government, plus transportation from Piedras Negras or wherever the port of entry is located. Bus fare from Piedras Negras to Big Spring for one is \$9.13. On top of this comes the insurance. It amounts to \$3.95 a month for farm laborers and \$4.25 for ranch hands. From this the farmer may deduct 50 cents weekly from the worker's wages. Even with insurance rates so high, the insurance companies claim they lost money last year because of high hospitalization costs when a worker is injured. Buchanan said ranchers were using bracero labor more than ever. The special workers who know how to handle sheep and cattle are very much in demand.

Cattle and sheep continue to disappear from West Texas ranges, according to A. L. Cooper, livestock dealer and owner of the local auction ring. He said ranchers were gradually unloading livestock as the drought hangs on. Several ranchers are now planning to clear their pastures entirely unless rains come in time to make grass this fall. Cooper said the areas southwest of here were equally as dry and barren. Ranchers are feeding steadily in the Rankin and Alpine country, and even in the highland area around Fort Davis and Marfa. Cooper owns a ranch near Chaning in the Texas Panhandle and says the weather has changed up there recently. Good rains the last few days are bringing out new grass. He said the local sales had dropped considerably the last year or two. Whereas they used to sell 1,200 on sales days, they are now averaging only 450 to 500. There are still a good many hogs in the country, with about 75 to 100 being sold at the auction ring every Wednesday. In spite of dry weather and bare pastures, the cattle going through the ring are in good condition. A buyer from Dalhart was in Big Spring this week looking for light stocker cattle, and commented on the good condition of cattle down here. However, he didn't find as many as he needed, and went on to San Angelo to continue his search.

Hot Time In The Old Town
MEXICALI, Mexico (AP)—There really was a hot time in this old town—all night—when a Chinese resident fired his gun. Here is what happened: Two other Chinese were wounded, Sam Woo Mashua in the head, Lucky Ky Yun in the shoulder and foot. One bullet ignited a box of powder used in making firecrackers. The resulting fire gutted a maze of 150 rooms in a Chinese residential section, in the ruins of which an unidentified body was found a few hours later yesterday. The fire spread to a warehouse, consuming five tons of lard and a large quantity of liquor. Then flames ignited a grocery store. The blaze threatened a saloon, 50 men rushed in and carried out all the bottles in sight. Fire engines roared up, but firemen discovered a repair crew had cut off the water supply. Officers said the pistol shooter who started it all was Lou Son Lon. He got away.

Heart Attack Fails To Slow Lyndon

WASHINGTON (AP)—No one watching Lyndon B. Johnson perform in the whirlwind windup of this congressional session would suspect that a heart ailment struck him down a year ago. The "moderately severe" attack which hit the Senate Democratic leader July 2, 1955, caused Johnson's friends to fear that his active career in the Senate and in politics had ended. Instead, slowly at first, he has returned to the demanding chores of his position and in the final month of Congress has been carrying them out with full vigor. The majority leader always has been the pivot on whom Senate business turns. Johnson, acclaimed by many of his colleagues as one of the greatest technicians to occupy the post in modern times, has added some extra touches of his own. The 47-year-old Texan eased into his old role in the early weeks of the 1956 session after getting clearance from his doctors in December to continue as majority leader. He has taken a few breaks at his Texas ranch. One trip home involved a short but intense battle with Gov. Allan Shivers in which Johnson overwhelmingly won control of the Texas delegation to the Democratic National Convention. Since his last respite at the ranch early this month, Johnson has worked at the same pace he maintained before his illness. He has scheduled many Senate sessions running 11, 12, or 13 hours and has restlessly prowled the floor throughout. He becomes so impatient at delays that he will leap ahead of a page boy to rush a senator's amendment to the clerk's desk if it will expedite business. The moment one amendment is disposed of, he is on his feet reminding a colleague who has another to offer. If the sponsor of a bill is not on hand when an opportunity offers to bring it up, Johnson often will handle it himself, reading the committee report, answering questions, and sometimes getting the measure passed before its author can get to the floor.

Fewer Government Workers Than In '55

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government ended the 1956 fiscal year last month with fewer civilian employees than a year earlier. But the federal work force has been growing steadily for the past six months. Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) reported this today as chairman of the Senate-House Committee on Reduction of Nonessential Federal Expenditures. Byrd said that at the end of fiscal 1956, on June 30, there were 2,382,276 civilians working for the government. This was 2,012 fewer than the previous year. Byrd said the June total represented an increase of 14,867 over May and was the sixth monthly rise in a row.

UNDERTONES OF TENSION

Twilight Zone Of Suspended War Lies Over Fertile Korea

DEMILITARIZED ZONE, Korea—Across the fertile green waist of Korea a strange and deadly twilight zone of suspended war stretches from coast to coast. Beneath its tangled stands of rice, growing wild on abandoned farms, the rusted debris of war lies scattered. The undergrowth hides jagged foundations of villages and a vicious maze of uncharted mine fields, booby traps and unexploded shells. Three years ago today, this 2 1/2-mile-wide demilitarized zone was created by the Korean armistice as a buffer against friction between Communist and United Nations armies. Superficially it is a peaceful never-never land that crackles with undertones of tension. In theory, it belongs to no one, but in a sense it is the property of both the Communist and Western nations who fought in the Korean War because it is under their jurisdiction. Troops of both sides still eye each other suspiciously across the buffer zone and move their patrols along its 200-mile length. And from its high points, every foot of ground is under continuous surveillance. "It's always been a ticklish situation," admits Capt. Jack A. Youngblood of Unadilla, Ga., "but

it is particularly so now that truce inspection teams have been pulled out of both the North and South." The commander of the 24th Police Company says the Communists never miss a chance to remind his more than 100 volunteer troopers that they are near. "This is North Korea calling," says a strange voice, breaking in to the 24th's communications net. "We're going to play a record for you. It's called, 'GI, Why Don't You Go Home?'" Or a note written in Oriental characters is found pinned to a bush. Translated it reads, "Go home, Yankee. You're the reason we're in Korea." And sometimes Communist and United Nations patrols make contact, particularly at one point where they use different sides of the same road. The Communies yell and try to attract attention if they are quite a distance away. If close, their usual line is, "Come on over to our side," or, "Let me see that map you have." Frequently they read a GI's name off his blouse nameplate and speak to him by name. The Americans are under strict orders never to answer. Sometimes the days drop off into a dull routine, but the lull season lasts. Last February fire broke out in

the nearby Samichon River Valley. Winds of a rising blizzard whipped the flames into the demilitarized zone. Mines began to explode. The ground shook with repeated, thunderous explosions. Small arms ammunition scattered through the brush cracked like firecrackers. Tracer bullets arched across the sky in weird trails of fire. Old dud mortar shells erupted and the sharp crack of discarded hand grenades and booby traps added to the din. Soon it sounded like a full-fledged battle was under way as geysers of flame spewed upward. Soldiers of both sides watched in amazement as the fire swept 10 miles up the neutral zone. "It didn't look like we were ever going to get it stopped," Youngblood said. "But finally heavy snow began to fall and put it out." More recently a strange nighttime mystery has arisen to occupy the soldiers' attention. A series of flashing lights have been seen on several occasions near the center demarcation line. When a patrol comes racing to the scene, they are always gone. Are the Communies up to something? No one knows. The most acceptable theory is the lights are pure Communist harassment. During the more uneventful periods you can follow a patrol leisurely up the slopes of Outpost Ohio and look across the broad flat valley to the towering wall of mountains where the Communies are watching from their intricate array of dug-in gun positions and observation points. The constant flow of patrols in and out of the neutral zone leaves the men little time to worry about their own problems. Almost all are lean, hard field soldiers who catch two four-hour patrols daily. It is a company truism that "only the mess sergeant is allowed to be overweight." In their spare time the GIs of these special police units train for the more specialized jobs of warfare, pause to see a movie at their outdoor "CinemaScope" theater or try their hand at a game of softball or volleyball.

Dangerous Poison To Be Recalled

AUSTIN (AP)—A State Health Department official said today manufacturers of insecticides containing a dangerous poison called thallium sulphate would be asked to discontinue its use. At least three children have died in Texas since Jan. 1 after contacting the thallium - carrying roach, ant and mice killers. Dozens more have been brought to hospitals in Houston, Galveston, Corpus Christi and San Antonio for treatment, the official said. Joe Lakey, director of the division of food and drugs, said the children are attracted to the poison by its palatable smell and taste.

Four Texas Judge Posts To Be Filled

AUSTIN (AP)—Three Supreme Court justices and a judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals will be picked tomorrow. A vacancy will be filled on the state's highest tribunal to replace Will Wilson who left the court in June to campaign for attorney general. Associate Justices Meade Griffin and Robert Calvert are unopposed for second terms. Judge Robert Hughes of the 3rd Court of Civil Appeals in Austin and Judge James Norvell, of the 4th Court of Civil Appeals in San Antonio are seeking Wilson's spot. In the only other statewide race for a court job, presiding Judge W. A. Morrison is opposed by District Judge Jesse Owens of Vernon on the Court of Criminal Appeals. Morrison, 47, was made the youngest presiding judge in the history of the court Jan. 1, 1955 and is bidding for a second six-year term. He was a city attorney, district attorney and district judge earlier. Norvell, 53, has been a justice of the San Antonio court 16 years. He is past chairman of the State Bar committee on administration of justice and past chairman of

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Rescuer Describes Collision Of Liners

Editor's Note — The Associated Press radioed Capt. Raoul de Beaudouin, master of the Ile de France, for an account of the rescue operation after the collision of the liners Andrea Doria and the Stockholm. This is his story.

ABOARD SS ILE DE FRANCE, Via Radio (AP)—Received SOS from Andrea Doria at 10:30 p.m. as we were passing six miles south of Nantucket in a dense fog that had set in a half-hour earlier. Could not see the bow from the bridge. Immediately began trying to contact the ship for more details. Message simply said she needed assistance. We messaged we would be able to reach her in two hours. We asked if she was sinking but received no answer. From this time on she was using her emergency apparatus. It was too far to hear anything direct, but listening to other ships, I knew she was sinking with 1,500 aboard. Despite fog, we rushed at 22 knots to the spot. The SS Cape Ann and another ship had already arrived. One had

two lifeboats and the other eight, which would not be enough. The Stockholm messaged that she was sending some, although badly damaged herself, and might need lifeboats herself. I gave an intense mental prayer for a clearing of the fog. In truth the fog did start lifting and there was the Doria, quickly identifiable by her stern list. Ten of our lifeboats were lowered in five minutes and headed for the ship, 500 yards away. The crewmen in the boats showed magnificent discipline and courage. Orders were given from our ship by loudspeaker. We picked up about 700 persons, many half naked, some injured, some mourning their dead. All our doctors, nurses and aides were splendid in providing hospital facilities. The other ship was also magnificent. An American vessel was towing a French motorboat which had a fouled propeller. Altogether it was like being back in the war years. I am now rushing back to New York. How shall I regain my schedule? — but what's that compared to 700 lives.

Crash Strands U. S. Tourists

ROME (AP)—The collision of the Andrea Doria and the Swedish liner Stockholm left hundreds of Americans in Italy wondering today how and when they can get home. The luxurious Italian liner was scheduled to leave Genoa on its next sailing for New York on Aug. 14. More than 1,100 persons had booked passage. "It's the very height of the west-bound tourist season," said an official of a large tourist agency. "Everything from Italy is booked up solid. But one way or another, it will have to be worked out." A spokesman for the Italian line said the Andrea Doria's sister ship Giulio Cesare, already had been switched from its usual South American run to help handle the record-breaking North American summer traffic.

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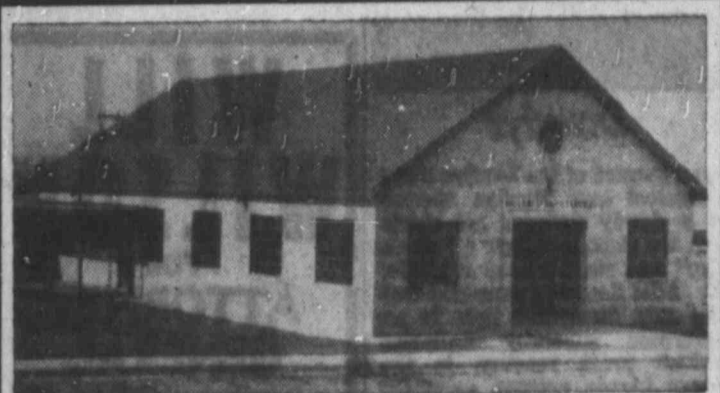

WHEN PERSECUTED, REJOICE, REMEMBERING JESUS' AGONY

Scripture—Acts 13:1-5; 1 Peter 1: 4:12-5:11.

WE THINK of martyrs as persons who were thrown into the arena at Rome and slain by wild animals. However, religious persecution exists even in our time.

Our editor, Dr. Wilbur M. Smith, tells of a child of 12 in North Africa who accepted the Gospel of Christ and her very life was threatened by her family. waited before he freed Peter to his enemies. We know from a previous lesson that Peter was freed by an angel of God while his friends prayed continuously for him.

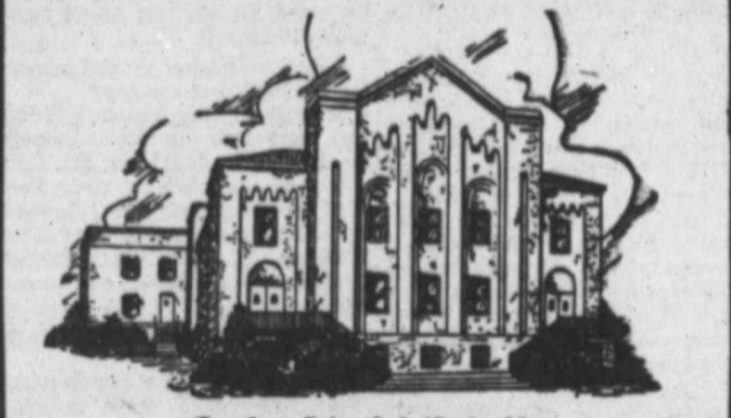
For the older classes we quote from the portion of the lesson used in the printed text:

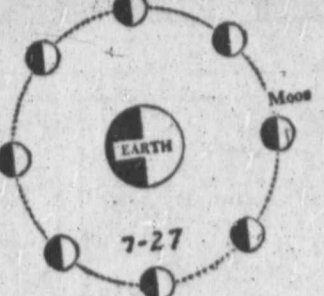

Uncle Ray: Egyptians Started System Of Hours

Questions about the solar system appear in a letter from M. Berger, who writes: "I would like to know why the earth rotates in exactly 24 hours. Does the moon travel in the same orbit as the earth?"



Nature had nothing to do with the dividing of a day into 24 hours. A day is the time it takes the earth to make one complete rotation.

In ancient Egypt a shadow clock was invented. This divided the morning into six parts, and the afternoon into six parts. Those 12 parts came to be called the daylight hours. Counting night as equal in length to daytime, the complete day has 24 parts, or hours.

The Egyptian divisions of the day into 24 hours came to be common in other countries. Now it is accepted by civilized countries over the globe.

Let it be observed, however, that savage people have been without any 24-hour system of counting time until taught by others. The American Indians, for example, knew nothing about 24-hour days before the whites arrived.

In answer to the question about the moon, let me say that the moon has the same orbit as the earth in a general way — but remember the words "in a general way." The moon revolves around the earth at the same time that it follows the earth around the sun. The actual orbit of the moon can be represented by a wavy line along the same general path as that of the earth.

While going around the sun once, the moon makes 12 and one fourth revolutions around the earth. In a single year, because of those trips, the moon covers 18 million

miles in addition to the distance involved in following the earth's orbit!
