





The purpose of having this contest every year is to encourage the study of history in high schools of this area by providing public recognition for the best students in these two fields. **TROPIES** were awarded for first and second place in each contest. Class I medals were given to the top 5 percent of the contestants in each contest and Class II

medals to the next 5 percent in each contest.
