USDA exercises PIK option for 1983 crop

Farmers who do not have enough upland cotton under government loan to cover the amount they will receive under the payment-in-kind program will be required to obtain loans on their 1983 production, Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block said last

Farmers who did not plant upland cotton in 1983 or who have not planted enough to cover the amount they are scheduled to receive under PIK will instead receive paymentin-kind cotton presently in government inventory, he

Under PIK, the U. S. Department of Agriculture makes in-kind payments to upland cotton farmers who reduce their plantings to specified levels. Cotton farmers who agreed to reduce their 1983 planting will receive an amount of upland cotton up to 80 percent of the amount they would have produced on the PIK acreage.

Block said all producers who signed a contract to participate in the 1983 PIK program agreed to obtain a loan on their 1983 production for PIK purposes to satisfy program needs, if required by CCC. legislature, says Dr. Forrest Stegelin, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Purpose of the act is to provide financial assistance for the development and expansion of agricultural industries and agri-

business in Texas. A major reason for the legislation was to combat the high cost and lack of loans for farmers and ranchers. This has caused a drop in productivity and has hampered the abilities of producers and agribusinesses to acquire equipment and technical processes, notes Stegelin. Consequently, producers and agribusinesses have neither maintained high employment nor increased their employment.

Producers have also found it difficult to join the cooperative development of agricultural industries and enterprises that could increase the value of their products, increase their access to consumer markets and spur the development of new products.

The Agricultural Development Act encourages an increase of agricultural economic activity by authorizing counties to create public nonprofit corporations for financing agricultural enterprises, explains the economist.

The agricultural enterprise must be owned either by cooperatives licensed by the Texas Department of Agriculture or firms, partnerships or private or public corporations in which agricultural prohave majority control. These producers must provide the products or by-products required as the raw material, feedstuff or commodity which will be either assembled, packaged, processed, marketed or transported, Stegelin explains.

At any time, at least county where the business shall exist may file a written application with the Commissioners Court for the creation of the nonprofit corporation. Only one corporation may be created by each county under the Act but a corporation may serve more than one county, notes the economist. Such a corporation is tax exempt and can be financed through bond





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

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Holiday driving caution urged

mander of the Texas estimate is based on the Department of Public anticipated volume of Safety, Major Vernon traffic and the previous Cawthon asked drivers to use extreme caution in traveling the streets and bring more motorists to highways in Texas during the July 4th holiday weekend.

"We realize the added dangers of traveling by motor vehicle during holiday periods and want to help motorists avoid the tragedy and suffering which could mar this otherwise happy occasion," Cawthon said.

"Excessive speed and driving while intoxicated continue as the primary law violations contributing to fatal accidents. DPS troopers have been directed to be especially watchful for motorists exceeding speed limits or under the influence of alcohol," he said.

Cawthon added that many lives could be saved and serious injuries could be reduced during the crowded driving time through greater utilization of seat belts.

"The DPS will place all available troopers on the state's highways during the holiday, and we urge every Texas driver to join in an all-out effort to make the July 4th holiday as safe as possible," he conclud-

"Independence Day can our streets and highways compared to a regular weekend. We are estimating fewer deaths than we had during the Fourth of July holiday last year because thus far this year we have experienced a decline in traffic fatalities," Adams said.

Last year, 55 fatalities were recorded during the 78-hour period, but subsequent deaths from serious injuries brought the final count to 64 for the three-day holiday.

If drivers would stay sober, slow down and use seat belts, their chances for survival would increase, Adams said.

"Drivers who speed or are intoxicated pose the greatest threat to law abiding motorists. Some people will insist upon drinking excessively and attempting to drive during this period. We will do our best to remove these individuals from the roads," he said. "If a person drinks, that is his personal business, but if he drives drunk - that's police business."

Adams added that motorists who observe drunken drivers need to report them to the nearest police agency or Highway

commanders DPS throughout the state will utilize additional troopers in areas they deem appropriate.
