The unions' statement said the company had attempted to "take away benefits in the year 1956 which employes have enjoyed for many years." Among these they listed a "clothes-changing time allowance" and fixed pay benefits from the first day of illness.

Boycott And Its Echoes

It has been suggested that a boycott of the Suez Canal might be the shortest and most effective way of bringing Nasser down off his high horse. The economic and financial position of Egypt is critical, and since the canal provides a large amount of its ready cash, a shutting off of those revenues even for a short period would immediately be reflected in internal and external troubles for the Nasser dic-

But by Monday morning that precise word appeared in the headlines to describe a "squeeze" the West plans against Nasser. This plan contemplates handling Middle East oil by tankers around the Capc of Good Hope, supplemented by up to 450,000 barrels a day from the U. S. and Venezuela, to keep West Europe percolating. As it appeared at the time, the U. S. was to provide up to half a billion dollars to help our West European friends.

particularly France and Britain, to ride out the economic and political storms and diminishment of petroleum supplies was sure to generate.

This plan is like starting from New York to Boston by traveling south to Richmond and doubling back by Phila-delphia, and if it works as well as expected it may achieve the main objective of reducing Nasser to size or perhaps get-ting him thrown out of power by his own people, which doesn't sound likely.

At best the boycott plan would be temporizing with a situation that calls for a bold, imaginative and all-out concerted and coordinated approach by the NATO

One immediate effect of the plan might be to put the squeeze on import oil and thus bring into bold relief the demands upon our domestic production. We, in Texas, could feel the effects of that right away. At any rate, the Suez crisis has indicated need for reappraising our domestic oil potentialities.

Mr. Dulles is facing an even more dif-ficult task at the second London conference than he did at the first. For the Western position, that of the Big Three, has deteriorated, and it will require some hard work to restore it.

A good diplomat does not talk much

about force; he lets the other fellow wonder and worry about it. Having renounced military force through Mr. Dulles' statement that we would not shoot our way through the canal, the British and French, with the United States dragging its feet behind it, began to talk as if they could bring Nasser to his knees

by organizing a boycott of the canal. Mr. Dulles then watered down that press. In this chapter of the story the world was treated to the embarrassing spectacle of Sir Anthony Eden and Secretary Dulles talking differently about a proposal that they were alleged to have agreed upon. The Western position has been weakened by these threats and backdowns. But most seriously of all, having renounced force to impose a solution which it was known that Nasser would not accept, the Western Powers have made it very difficult indeed for themselves to negotiate

with Nasser at all. For by taking what is so very nearly an inflexible position on their proposal for operation by an international board, they have left themselves with very little room to maneuver. The event has shown, so it seems to me, that the sound course would have been to present the Western proposal, not on a

The Western terms of settlement, which Mr. Menzies took to Cairo, were a reasonable proposal with which to begin a negotiation. But were they so good as to warrant standing on them to end nego-

The old Suez Company, which Britain and France found so satisfactory, was unable to enforce the treaty of 1888 against the Egyptian government in the case of the Israeli ships. This leads me to the belief that since the canal is in Egypt and within the military power of Egypt, free and equal use of the canal is not guaranteed by a private operating company nor would it be reliably guaranteed by a public international operating

Schools Are Growing

Public schooling has undergone a revo-lution in the last few years, and I'm not referring to desegregation.

I don't think integration in my school

would have caused a misaligned eyebrow, even 20 years ago. At least, the students wouldn't have batted their eyes over such

But they would have had some kind of a stroke at the mere suggestion of spending an hour in one class. And the prospect of having to complete 18 or 20 courses during the four years of high school would have given them a real case of conniptions, if not total paralysis.

The teachers would have had the fits if one of their pupils brought an automobile to school. And their wrath would have been wrought mercilessly if a student left the school yard during the noon hour without permission Not that students were required to eat

in the cafeteria. There wasn't any cafeteria. Students in those days took their sack lunches to school with them, and they ate in the classroom or studyhall, in whichever they could find a place. Another thing that would have surprised

students of my day, and which would have delighted them, would have been a great array of high school subjects to choose from. It took 16 "credits" to graduate in those days, just like it does now. So

the high school offered 16 subjects. A student completed those, and he had everything the school had to offer. It may have been a little easier to com-

plete a course then, too, because class periods lasted only 45 minutes. They take up an hour now, I'm informed. Pretty soon, the authorities may require 18 or even 20 credits for a high school

certificate. Supt. Floyd Parsons of the Big Spring schools says the 18 or 20course requirement may be in effect before the current crop of kids gets out of

I believe I like the present school program the best. I had a good time under the old system, but didn't learn very much. At college, the first thing they showed me was that the 16 courses my school offered didn't make up the background a would-be student needed.

I was a foe of the consolidation movement in those days, being one of those who succumbed to the argument that pupils in the little schools got more "individual attention" than their cousins in the larger places of learning. I found that you need something besides attention to your credit, if you intend to pursue that education outside the borders of your home province. My young'un, I hope, will go to a school where more than the minimum training

The Democratic presidential nominee has repudiated the position taken, respectively, by the Democratic chairman of the House Committee on Un-American Activities and the Democratic chairman of the Senate subcommittee on Internal Security, who have recommended legislation to get rid of all "security risks" in the government. This means that Mr. Stevenson no longer

feels concerned about the charge that the Democratic administration was "soft on Communism," which was one of the principal accusations made by General Eisenhower in the 1952 campaign. Mr. Stevenson has come out flatly

against proposed legislation—endorsed by the Eisenhower administration—which would permit the federal government to throw out Communists or "security risks" from all agencies or departments, whether or not such positions have been specifically designated as "sensitive." His policy stems from the fact that a majority of the justices of the Supreme Court of the United States found a flaw in the present statute because, it was argued, Congress intended a distinction between "sensitive" and "non-sensitive" agencies. But the Democratic leadership in the two committees above-mentioned moved promptly to remedy the defect so as to give a President of the United States the right and the power in his discretion to determine which agencies are "sensitive" and to order 'security risks" fired from any place in the government where they are found. Many Democrats insisted this was the original intent of Congress, anyhow.

The question of whether a man is or is not a Communist cannot be determined merely by his statement or affidavit when he signs his application papers. So a "security risk" investigation is essential. If, however, this type of procedure is to be forbidden with respect to employes who work in so-called "non-sensitive" agencies. then espionage by Communist rings is made easier.

It will be recalled that, according to the sworn testimony of witnesses, Alger Hiss was a member of a Communist cell when he worked in the Agriculture Department. He could not have been investigated as a "security risk" today if he were an employe of the Agriculture Department because this a "non-sensitive" agency. Many naive persons, including

WASHINGTON - Adlai Stevenson has various lawyers who worked on a bar association report that came out recently in New York, are convinced that it isn't necessary to do a "security risk" investigation among employes of "non-sensitive" agencies, and that's where Adlai Stevenson gets his encouragement.

But a glance at the records of espionage in America shows that the use of government stationery or telephones from government desks, and free movement inside the government of seemingly unimportant employes is a vast help to the Communist apparatus. On this point, Justices Reed, Minton and Clark of the Supreme Court of the United States said: "It is not realistic to say that the govern-

ment can be protected merely by applying the act to sensitive jobs. One never knows just which job is sensitive. The janitor might prove to be in as important a spot security-wise as the top employe in the building . . . "The President's standard is 'complete

and unswerving loyalty,' not only in sensitive places but throughout the government. The President requires and every employe should give no less. This is all that the act and the order require. They should not be subverted by the technical interpretation the majority places on them today Mr. Stevenson evidently is assuming

that the anti-Communist issue is dead and that, when Senator McCarthy was "condemned" in 1954 by his fellow senators for extreme language, the whole issue of anti-Communism was squelched. The chances are that many independent

voters and many Democrats who voted for Eisenhower in 1952 and perhaps were inclined to revert to their party this year will be deterred from doing so now that Adlai Stevenson, in effect, says there should be no "security risk" investigations and firings of persons with a subversive background unless they handle secret stuff or are in agencies or jobs declared "sensitive."

Just why anybody who has belonged to and doesn't repent his membership in the Communist party or who refuses to assist his own government in running down subversives should be paid by American taxpayers and given the privilege of a job in the United States government is something the Democratic presidential nominee will have to explain to the votersfor they are the ones who pay the taxes. 1956, New York Herald Tribune Inc.

What with rent control and one thing and another, feelings have run high between landlord and tenant in most areas of the U. S. A. since World War II. But the more I think about it, the more I am convinced that the redecorating clause should be known as "The Landlord's Re-

People always want what they're en-

titled to. At the end of three years, I simply HAD to have this apartment redecorated, and darned if it doesn't serve me right. There isn't a habitable room in the apartment and appears unlikely to be in the foreseeable future.

Why is it that painters, when they come

into a home, have to go through every room, push all the furniture into a ghastly heap in the center and make the whole place unlivable before they even start to put a priming coat on the first room? This, to me, is a greater mystery than the composition of the atom bomb. In the interest of ultimate cleanliness, this apartment as of today is 10 times

as dirty as when the redecorating job started. The apartment was neat, tidy and well-ordered before the redoers moved in. Today it's a repulsive junk heap, buried in an inch of dust and debris, and I defy anyone to find a place to sit down, even on the floor. Three moves, says the old saw, is as



Under the proposed agency stat-ute before the delegates, countries with fissionable uranium, plutonium and thorium to spare would cy which in turn would allot them to nations in need.

Once the materials were deliv ered, the statute specifies, the agency could send inspectors into each recipient country to see that they were not being misused for military purposes. If so, aid to the violating country could be cut off and its membership suspended.







The shipper has the right, presumably, to call for the article within a reasonable time. However, the law says, if the shipper of the merchandise should appear and demand return of the article, you have the right to charge him a storage fee for keeping it for the interval.

If you make use of the merchandise, technically you are obligating yourself to pay for it but the odds that you will be asked to do so are remote. You do not have to provide it with "special care," there is no requirement that you even acknowledge its receipt and you certainly, the law says, do not lition unless you see fit.

In fact, if you do return it, the odds are, it is pointed out, you will be left on the shipper's master mailing list and will probably receive other unwanted shipments
