Nicaragua's Pres. Somoza **Dies Of Wound**

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Sept. 29 President Anastasio Somoza died in a Panama Canal Zone hospital today of gunshot wounds fired by an assassin, and his two U. S. educated sons prepared to continue his 20-year rule.

Congress was called into special session for the purpose of naming Somoza's son, Luis, 34, president to fill the unexpired term that ends next May, Luis, as president of Congress, already had been named acting president by Congress.

To Col. Anastasio Jr., 32-yearold younger son, went the task of maintaining his brother in power. He is commander of the national

guard, Nicaragua's army. Sixty-year-old President Somoza died at the United States' Gorgas Hospital in the Panama Canal Zone after a colorful career in Central American polities. He had been this country's dominant fig-ure in the presidency and behind it since 1936.

He had been ruler, in name or in fact, of his country of more than a million people since 1936. The 60-year-old leader, who fueded with Guatemala and Costa Rica and befriended Argentina's exiled dictator Juan Peron, was

began, as did all of the early time rural mail carrying systems, with the employment of a horse and buggy. Some of the mail carriers had to go on horseback. Roads were not what they are today and as a result, the mail man's journey had to be much shorter in miles than is the case in modern RFD

Today Route No. 1 makes its daily rounds in a motor car. Where its predecessors covered perhaps 20 miles in their rounds, the route of No. 1 now requires a daily trip of 74 miles.

On those weary miles, the mail carrier stops and leaves mail and parcels, picks up mail to be sent. sells postage stamps, money orders or handles parcel post needs to 255 families. There are actually what the post office classifies as 374 patrons on the route.

There are 252 mail boxes along the road.

While it not always happens, it is quite possible that the mail carrier will have to bring his car to a halt, place mail in boxes or take out letters to be dispatched at each of these in the course of one day's rounds.

In the old days, Rural Route No. 1, limited itself to a 20-mile swing around a north-northeast course.

Today's RFD No. 1 makes one round trip daily six days each week over a 74-mile loop. It goes west out of Big Spring leaving around 9:30 each morning, makes a swing north and east to bring it to a point almost due north of ma. At that point it turns south to old Highway 80 and westward back to Big Spring.

Ervin Daniel is the present carrier. He started his career with the post office on Aug. 19, 1929, as a clerk in the office. In April 7, 1947, he transferred to the job as mail carrier on Rural Route

A rural mail carrier has to furnish his own automobile, but he is compensated by the government at the rate of 9 cents per mile for the distance of his route. Thus, Daniel is paid, in addition to his salary, \$6.66 per day for his car. He gets standard pay for a clerk of his grade. With his mileage, Boatler said, the rural route driver gets more pay than most of his fellows in the post office. He has to have a substitute driver, however, to take over on the job should he become ill or for some other reason be unable to make the round. His mileage stops under such conditions, but he is not penalized his salary.

In the old days, when rural drivers were more isolated due to lack of roads and transportation. the rural mail carrier was called upon to do countless chores for the patrons along his route. He conveyed messages to other families as he passed; he served as a personal shopper and on his next round delivered the sewing thread, medicine, small objects of hardware and other commodities which his patrons had requested him to buy for them in town. He passed along important news he had heard

Today, while perhaps 99 per cent of the rural residents have motorcars and are in the town nearly every day, they still depend much on their rural mail carrier. His visit to their mail box is still a big event and he is the personal friend of all of the 255 families he

Few men are better acquainted with the residents along the roads he travels than the rural mail car-

Travelling 74 miles a day and making anywhere up to 255 stops does not allow much time for idle gossip, but the rural mail carrier still finds time to pass the time of day with those of his patrons he encounters as he travels his route.

There may come a time, Boatler said, when the need for this type of service will disappear but that time is still far in the future.

Daniel shows up at the post office two hours or more before his scheduled departure hour. It takes that long to get his daily allotment of letters, papers, packages, and parcels properly assorted in the order in which they will be de-livered. He must load the mail into the back seat of his car in such a way that he can quickly locate each family's particular mail and deposit it in the box.

He has to check over his supply of stamps, postal cards, envelopes. He must have all the forms for handling special delivery letters, registered mail or parcel





Let's Be Fair In Our Dealings

Webb AFB is located in Big Spring largely because Big Spring made a spirited bid to make facilities here available to the Air Force for its stepped up training program. It goes without saying that we have a special obligation toward Webb AFB because it is "our" base.

Therefore it pains us to hear of instances in recent weeks of difficult housing situations for personnel attached to Webb. Admittedly, there is no surplus of better grade housing, and one might expect a respectable charge to be made on the modest supply of modern quarters, well appointed and well furnished.

But when the pressure of securing housing penetrates into the average and subaverage category to the extent that charges are based on what the traffic will bear rather on the service provided, we are off base. When we try to pass off marginal units at standard or better prices simply because there is a dearth of houses or apartments, we are in the

From a practical standpoint, we are taking a short-sighted policy, for within a matter of months a major on-base housing project is going to take shape at Webb. These units, you may be sure, will be nice and convenient; they will be available at charges which will return a reasonable rate on the investment. They will be in

That means that some of the pressure for local housing will be relieved. It might

even mean some vacant apartments. But we venture that the first apartments or houses which would go vacant will be those either of a marginal character or which have carried an unrealistically high rental tag.

Landlords who have maintained a fair and reasonable charge commensurate with what they have offered will be the ones to keep tenants. Not all the base-connected people will be housed at the Webb project, so you may be sure that those moving out of a place in town to take a place at the base will tell a friend about the quarters they are leaving. If they have been treated fairly, they will be walking advertisements for placing

Weedo not propose to tell the owner of any private property what he may do with his property, how he shall run it or whatcharge to make. But we do plead with our people to be as conscientious in their housing dealings as they would in any other transactions.

David Lawrence Ike's Honesty On Farm Program

WASHINGTON - Just about the most penetrating speech in many a campaign from the standpoint of clarity, persuasive argument, and all-around effectiveness politically was delivered at Peoria, Illinois, by President Eisenhower.

Short sentences, with crisply presented points that the listener could retain for future discussions, gave the address a distinctiveness in style that was reminiscent of FDR at his best in the famous "fireside" chats.

In a striking passage, the President

"No farmer - nor any citizen - will trust politicians who go to the cities to deinflation and some to the country to promise loose credit. Nor will any citizen trust any politician who promises expanded governmental expenditures, reduced taxes and — at the same time — a balanced budget."

Mr. Eisenhower thus summed up the whole Republican defense against the Democratic effort to sectionalize the issues of the campaign. For years the Democrats have been urging more and more spending of government money, and on the farm question they have been advocating a return to "rigid price supports." This means that the farmer may plant as much as he pleases and the government, in effect, will guarantee to buy it from him at a fixed "parity" price. This also means using money from taxpayers in all parts of the country to keep on buying the surplus production, whatever it

Mr. Eisenhower boldly tackled in the center of the farm belt itself - supposed to be his weakest area from a vote-getting standpoint - the basic issue when he said:

"Rigidly fixing price supports at 90 per cent of parity without regard to supply conditions - and so encouraging surpluses that depress market prices - is, for the farmer, mockery and deceit. That kind of program compels drastic quotas, allotments, government regulation. It robs the farmer of a chance for full income parity. It is a program for politicians, not

Somebody in authority had to say this flatly and tell the farmers the facts about "rigid price support" fallacy which has plagued the American economy for many years. Few people, farmers or city folks, have realized that the federal government has bought surpluses amounting to the astonishing total of \$9,000,000,000. This big sum of taxpayers' money is one of the reasons for budget deficits which have prevented tax reduction from being



Right now, Bell Tele-phone and associated companies have a picture phone in their laboratories. In fact, scientists have been "seeing" each other over the phone for some time. When phone vision comes, you'll have to be mighty alert to jump behind the shower curtain, and coyly thrust out arm and hand to grasp the instrument. The guy at the other end of the line sees only the forearm, you hope.

Norman Vincent Peale The Healing Power Of Faith

One of the greatest things that can come to a human being in this world is sound,

sturdy health. To have your heart functioning right, blood pressure normal and all your organs in proper working order is a priceless blessing. An important aid to physical health is the depth therapy of faith. By that I mean

that faith has the power to send its benign influence to the very center of your being and keep it functioning the way God meant. If you can get enough faith into your mind, you can overcome much sickness. It will help to maintain emotional balance so necessary to health. A committee of distinguished physicians

appointed by the British Medical Association recently conducted an investigation into spiritual healing. Their report was cautious, but did admit that what they cailed "conversion" has been known to accomplish remarkable results in changing the entire physical aspects of men

And what did they mean by "conversion"? Simply a change in thinking and living by getting faith, deep faith, the kind that hits you hard when you get it and stays with you because you live by it. The sort of faith that merely bounces off the top of the mind without penetrating it does not have the spiritual and psychological potency to which we are referring. But deep faith has such amazing power that it not only changes people morally and spiritually, but also is a powerful foe to disease and a creator of health.

I recently read a book, "Stay Alive All Your Life," by a minister, the Reverend Dr. Alston Smith. Dr. Smith writes about an occasion on which a doctor asked him to come to see a boy who was dying. The doctor said that he had done all he could, unless the minister could stimulate a new faith in the young man's living.

Dr. Smith arrived about two-thirty in the morning and found the doctor drinking coffee in the kitchen. "I don't believe Joe will live until morning," he told the minister. "But there is something about this case which baffles me. The boy ought to live, if only he would fight, but he won't. It's up to you to re-inspire his will to live." "What can I do?" Smith protested.

"Go in and give him a transfusion of faith. That's the only thing that can save the boy."

Dr. Smith went into the bedroom and found the whole family gathered around the bed. Not knowing what else to do, he sat by the bed and opened his Bible. He read aloud the 23rd Psalm, the 121st Psalm and other passages of faith. As he read, a deathlike stillness reigned in the room. He felt the power of the Scripture's words. As he continued to read, tears were rolling down the cheeks of the family. The power of God was present.

Those Important Kentucky Races BARDSTOWN, Ky. - in the tightly-

packed courtroom in the courthouse in the center of the square the audience listens intently to the speaking. The listeners have come from all the counties in the district to hear the two Republican candidates for the Senate in a contest which is, in many ways, unique.

In the first place, Kentucky is the only state in which two Senate seats are to be filled. This makes it possible that control of the Senate will be decided here. But more important, the two Republican candidates, John Sherman Cooper

and Thruston Ballard Morton, are closer to the design of the new Republicanism than are the GOP candidates in any other state. Both have proved their loyalty to the Eisenhower doctrine of cooperation with other nations and moderate reform at home. Because their election is so important

to the transformation of the party - if it is to be transformed - President Eisenhower is flying to Lexington on Monday to make three separate talks and to be seen by as many people as possible as he drives in and about the town. In county after county, the Republican organization is working to organize motorcades that will converge on Lexington for Eisenhower Day. For the formers and small town busi-

nessmen, their wives and children in the crowded courtroom, the role played by Cooper and Morton for the Republicans on the world stage must seem remote, in-Cooper, who previously served twice in

the Senate, was ambassador to India and in 17 months in that assignment did a great deal to bring the United States and India closer together. His last contribution before he resigned

was to negotiate the sale to the government of Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of more than \$300,000,000 in American farm surpluses, the terms being such as to help underwrite India's difficult foreign exchange position, Morton, who has served three terms in

the House, was an Assistant Secretary of State in charge of liaison with Congress: This is a ticklish assignment calling for diplomatic skill and tact of a high order. At first hand, Morton got to know how difficult - if not downright impossible -

it is to implement an internationalist foreign policy when most of the members of one's own party are either hostile or indifferent to that policy.

Perhaps because they sense that the gap between their experience and that of their listeners is so great or perhaps because this Presidential campaign is bringing to light a new inward-turning - isolation is not the word for it - both men seem slightly on the defensive.

Cooper's Democratic opponent, former Governor Lawrence Wetherby, has been attacking him for his reluctance to give up his post in India to run for the Senate, suggesting at the same time that somehow by the very fact of having been away so long he has lost interest in Kentucky. "My opponent has begun to belittle the fact that I've been away," Cooper tells

his serious, intently listening audience. "Yes, it's true I've been in India. I've served in several posts in having to do with foreign relations. But I'm proud of it. It is part of the great task that President Eisenhower is trying to carry out, the task of keeping the peace.'

He talks about the farm economy and how he sponsored the first bill to fix a parity price of 9 per cent on tobacco. He talks about his effort to help rural electrification in the state and his friends in the REA cooperatives. He talks about his long service, first in

the State Legislature, then as a county and later circuit judge, of his four state-wide campaigns for the Senate, twi elected to short terms to fill an unexpired vacancy and twice defeated for the regular six-year Senate term.

This is a spot where Kentucky tradition is strong, and before the speeches both candidates did a stint for television (1 the doorstep of the mansion in which Stephen Foster is said to have been inspired compose "My Old Kentucky Home. The roots of the past go deep, the problems of tobacco and corn and hogs are close and urgent.

India is a long way off, remote and legendary. So is Suez, and for that matter, so is Paris, or London, or Bonn. But if within the framework of the Republican party there are men who can bring home the perilous proximity of Bardstown and New Delhi, it is here.

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



Thompson said the children's father, Sgt. 1.C. William Wilson of Fort Polk, La., was brought to Elizabeth from the field where he had been on maneuvers for two days. Thompson saids Wilson "went to pieces" as he tried to call his mother in Atchison, Kan. The sheriff said Mrs. Wilson tried to commit suicide by slash-

ing her wrists. She was placed under guard at a clinic where her condition was believed not seri-
