ALL AUTHORITY By Ronnie Parker

The savior of men is also the supreme authority in religion. Christ is Prophet, Priest, and King as well as Redeemer. Paul teaches that Christ "is head of the body, the church: who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead; that in all things he might have the preeminence" (Col. 1:18).

When the authority of Christ is accepted one will give heed to His word, but one will also give heed to the apostles of Christ. To reject the apostles' teaching is to reject the authority of Christ because the Apostles were inspired spokesmen for Christ. To the Apostles Christ said, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Paul, the apostle, said; "Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us; we pray you in Christ's stead, be ve reconciled to God" (2 Cor. 5:20).

Just before His death, Christ promised to send the Holy Spirit to the apostles. He said, "Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth: for he shall not speak of himself; but whatsoever he shall hear that shall he speak; and he will shew you things to come (Jn. 16:13). Divine truth is found in the teachings of Christ and His apostles. The doctrines of men make religion vain (Matt.15:9) but the "truth shall make you free" (John 8:32).
