A new system of legislative meetings is proposed in the one next to the top of the Senate calendar. It is by Rep. John L. Crosthwait, Dallas.

BAIRD NEEDS HOMES

We notice a news dispatch from another State, reporting that an industrial plant will begin construction on two hundred houses for workers, at a cost of \$1,-

The point that the news article makes is that people who must work must have houses in which to live. The same observation applies to Baird, where there is a serious shortage of dwelling units. In fact, the construction of living quarters is probably of first importance in connection with efforts to attract industry or workers into this section.

While the same situation probably exists in a greater or lesser degree in other areas of the state, the first community to offer homes will probably be the first in adding population and industries.

URGING FAMILY BUDGETS

The Institute of Life Insurance recently inaugurated a series of advertisements to proclaim the central theme that family budgets and family happiness go hand in hand

The advertising campaign was intended as a public service and to help families meet the cost factors of the present day. It recognized that financial problems often cause trouble and urged family financing planning, whatever the income of the fam-

ilv might be We call attention to the advertising campaign because the idea has merit and it behooves families in Callahan county to carefully consider their financial status in connection with the family existence. Someone has said that happiness comes to any family which spends less than one hundred per cent of its income and unhappiness is apt to dog any family which spends more than one hundred per cent of its income. The amount of the income makes no difference. The rule is the same.

AID THE FIGHT ON CANCER

The people of Callahan county should be interested in the drive to raise funds for the effort to treat the victims of cancer and for the support of scientific research designed to discover everything possible about this dread disease.

Second only to diseases of the heart, cancer and other malignant tumors account for more deaths in the United States than any other disease. In 1944, for example, 171,171 Americans died from this cause. It should be noted also in this connection that the death rate, per 100,000 of population, from cancer has steadily increased from 1900 when it was 64 to 1944 when it was 129.1 per 100,000 of population.

Obviously, there is need for a wellfinanced campaign against cancer. The fact that many cases can be cured, if discovered promtply and properly treated, adds emphasis to the plea for popular support of the current campaign. We hope that the readers of The Baird Star will generously support the battle against cancer.

TOP SOIL FOR SECURITY

It is interesting to report that the fight against soil erosion is making progress and that those who keep up with the battle feel that the landowners of the nation are determined to prevent its top soil from being washed down its rivers to the sea.

Recently, enthusiastic farmer-conservationists from forty-five states attended a convention in Chicago to adopt a national organization of farmer-organized soil conservation districts. It is pointed out that every Amirecan state has a law authorizing farmers, by democratic process, to set up soil conservation district. New districts are reported springing up everywhere.

In addition, an organization known as "Brains of the Lands." is attempting to awaken the general public to the need for action to stop waste of the few precious inches of top soil that stand between the human race and oblivion. One of those who have taken the lead in organizing a local soil conservation district is G. C. MacArthur, of Gaffney, S. C., who was among the first to take leadership in establishing a soil conservation district when his state passed an enabling act.

In recognition of his services, he was elected President of the Soil Conservation District officials and plans to volunteer a full year to the work of speeding the organization of similar districts throughout the United States.

SAFETY IN THE AIR

Publicity recently given to accident on the airlines of the United States and elsewhere in the world has created the impression that flying is more dangerous than ever before.

This is a mistaken impression. The safety record for 1946, according to W. Averell Harriman, Secretary of Commerce, was forty per cent better than that for 1945.

Justice Rutledge, in his dissenting opinion, pointed out that the purpose of sectarian education is the propagation of a certain form of religious beliefs. Teachers, books, classrooms, school equipment and transportation are used for the purpose. He points out that the design of the first amendment was to exclude religion and religious education from the public functions surrported by the state.

Frank Lerner, recently writing in PM, the New York tabloid daily, suggests that it will be disastrous if the United States yields any further to the drive for state support of religious establishments. He says, as Madison pointed out long ago, the whole point about separating church and state is to take the question of religious education out of politics. Once it is admitted, there will be competition between various sects for state funds and state support and finally for state power.

Mrs. Lerner says that "religious controversies are fatal to democracy" and that "the only way to avoid them is to stick to the rigid separation of church and state and especially of church schools and state funds.

Justice Rutledge insists that the price we must pay for religious liberty is double. One is the effort to keep the state from interfering in the way a man worships his God. The other is the effort to keep churches from using state strength to propagate one particular version of religious truth. Both prices must be paid if the people of this county expect to retain religious liberty.

This, we remind you again, is a good time to save money; the day is not far distant when the dollar will buy more.
