## U. S. Oil Deliveries To Europe Doubled

WASHINGTON (AP)—An American oil executive says Europe is getting about 75 per cent of its normal oil needs largely because deliveries from the Western Hemisphere have been nearly doubled. But President Albert L. Nickerson of the Cocony Mobil Oil Co. Inc. said yesterday "the shortages cannot be completely made up."

Nickerson's statements were contained in a report to the managements of all the Mobil companies here and abroad. Operating under a government-sanctioned program, major U.S. oil firms have pooled their tanker and other distribution sources in an effort to provide emergency oil supplies to Western Europe. The blocking of the Suez Canal and sabotage of an oil pipeline from Iraq have cut off most of Europe's Middle East oil sources. This happened during the brief war in Egypt last fall. Nickerson said some 563,000 barrels daily have been added to the 624,000 barrels of crude oil and its products which normally were shipped to Europe from this country and Venezuela. "These shipments from the Americas total more than two-fifths of Europe's pre-emergency requirements," Nickerson said. "All told, roughly three-fourths of normal daily supplies were shipped to the European area during December and January."

## Truck Tax Returns Due By Jan. 31

District Director Ellis Campbell of the Dallas Internal Revenue district has reminded owners of heavy vehicles that Jan. 31, 1957, is the due date of the first returns and payments of the new Federal tax on the use of highway motor vehicles. The new tax applies to the use on or after July 1, 1956, of highway motor vehicles having a taxable gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds. The taxable gross weight of trucks and truck-tractors is determined according to the empty weight and the number of axles. The tax applies to the use of single-unit trucks with empty weight of 13,000 pounds or more, and truck-tractors with empty weight of 5,500 pounds or more. The rate of the tax for a full year is \$1.50 per 1,000 pounds of taxable gross weight. A full-year's tax for one vehicle will range from \$40.50 to \$90. Each tax year begins July 1 and ends the following June 30. If the first use of a vehicle in the tax year occurs after July, the tax is prorated according to the number of months remaining in the tax year. A special form (Form 2296) (Oct. 1956) is provided for reporting vehicles used anytime in July, August, September, October or November 1956, and must be filed on or before Jan. 31, 1957. For each month after November 1956 in which a vehicle is first used, the taxpayer must file a return on regular Form 2296 (Rev. Jan. 1957) before the end of the next month.

## Median Income Groups Hurt In Housing Crisis

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate report says an upward trend in the prices of new homes has "brought the housing industry to a point where it is serving primarily the upper income groups."

The report, prepared by the staff of the Senate Housing subcommittee, said yesterday families in the middle income bracket are being squeezed out of the housing market. Low-income families also were described as suffering from housing shortages said by the report to be plaguing most of the nation's cities. However, poorer families are eligible for low-rent public housing, the study noted.

The subcommittee staff said the building industry "is concerned with the question of whether it is pricing itself out of the market." The report cited figures showing that housing production had dropped by 200,000 units last year in the face of a rising need. And it said a "further falling off" from the 1,100,000-unit total last year is probable this year.

## State Segregation Fight Yet To Come

AUSTIN (AP)—States' rights and segregation issues flared briefly in the Legislature yesterday but apparently the expected big blow-up over new color line laws was still to come.

Both sides said an 83-52 vote on a parliamentary maneuver that turned down immediate House argument on interposition was no real test on the strength of either faction. "This was just to get the feel of the situation," said Rep. Joe Chapman of Sulphur Springs, leader of a group of East Texans backing nine special segregation bills. His side lost.

Rep. Harold G. Kennedy of Marble Falls, who successfully moved that an interposition resolution be shunted to a committee, said he did not consider the vote "any indication of how the House stands on segregation legislation."

The flurry in the House yesterday failed to stir the Senate which was in the midst of passing its first real legislative measure (SB86) which set bonds for two new Veterans' Land Board members at \$50,000.

Shortly afterwards both chambers emptied quickly as members headed home until Monday.

The interposition resolution, by Rep. Robert Johnson of Dallas, hit at "further federal encroachment," specifically by federal courts. Kennedy predicted to reporters that the resolution could be rewritten to express the "broad principles" of states' rights being paramount under certain conditions and it would pass the House. Otherwise, he said, the measure probably would die in the committee.

The segregation issue never became a question in yesterday's House action although the East Texans backing segregation bills had presented and supported the interposition resolution.

The nine segregation bills were formally introduced after the resolution vote was completed. They had been announced earlier in the session by Chapman and others. Generally the bills would:

Establish school segregation as a state policy with integration only after local option elections give local boards "full and final authority" in transferring students, exempt students from compulsory attendance at integrated schools, take away state financial support from schools not doing away with presently integrated schools, provide state scholarships for students at private non-sectarian schools if they didn't want to attend integrated schools, and require that all persons and groups urging integration register and stand state inspections.

Earlier in the session the East Texans introduced a measure to provide penalties for school officials who integrated a school without a local option election and one forbidding the state or any of its divisions to employ a member of the NAACP.

## Students See Safety Movies

High school students Thursday got a look at three safety films sponsored by the Citizens' Traffic Commission. James Eubanks, executive secretary of CTC, showed the movies to students after showing them at junior high school Wednesday.

The movies are entitled "Noontime Nonsense," "Six Murderous Beliefs," and "Chain Reaction." The last one is an Air Force production, narrated by Bob Hope.

## Speed Survey Set

LAMESA — The State Highway Department is expected, within the next few days, to begin a traffic survey of all highways going through the Lamesa city limits. The survey will be to determine the need for raising or lowering speed limits on the through highways.

## Planes Collide Near Cuba

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Two U.S. Air Force B47 Stratofortress bombers, believed to have collided in flight with six men aboard, were sought today off Cuba's southwestern Isle of Pines by air and surface craft of both countries.

The six-jet intercontinental bombers were on a refueling practice mission with other Homestead Air Force Base planes when they apparently figured in a destructive explosion.

Maj. James G. Cary and Capt. John N. Latham, aboard another plane in the mass refueling exercise, radioed last night they had seen what appeared to be a collision. They told Homestead AFB interrogators later they saw "a ball of fire with wreckage separating and falling." They said they surmised two aircraft had crashed into each other.

Unofficial reports said sizable fires were seen flaring up around an unnamed island off Isle of Pines.

Homestead Air Force Base notified relatives that the two planes' crews were missing. A spokesman said no refueling was in progress at the time Cary and Latham saw the explosion.

Those aboard were Maj. James McFarland Jr., 37, Watsonville, Pa.; Lt. James Rose Jr., 28, co-pilot from Dallas; Capt. James Parker, Rock Hill, S.C.; Maj. Winfred Lynn, Paducah, Ky.; Lt. Earl Chrisawn Jr., Sumter, S.C.; and Maj. William Norris, Lansing, Mich.

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## Refugees Due

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A group of 235 Russian, Chinese and Portuguese refugees is expected from Hong Kong tomorrow aboard the President Cleveland to begin life anew in the United States.

They are among the last to enter this country under the Refugee Act of 1953, which expired Dec. 31. The group includes 21 White Russian refugees from Harbin, Manchuria.

## India, Pakistan Peace Is Urged

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—By a 10-0 vote, the U.N. Security Council has called on India and Pakistan to stand fast in disputed Kashmir until the people decide their future through a plebiscite.

The former princely state in the Himalayas is claimed by both the South Asian neighbors. Troops from both countries occupy separate areas, divided by a U.N. cease-fire line.

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# AEC Sets New Atom Tests To Include Missiles, Artillery

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission is setting up a new series of atomic tests, presumably to include such defense weapons as nuclear anti-aircraft missiles and artillery.  
An AEC announcement last night gave no dates, but said the tests will begin late in the spring at the Nevada proving grounds west of Las Vegas. Four previous series of tests have been conducted there, the last in the spring of 1955.  
The announcement said the new series will involve "low-yield nuclear tests."  
This presumably means that the explosions will be not much more than 30 kilotons. A kiloton is the equivalent of the energy released in explosion of 1,000 tons of TNT. The commission, obviously sensitive to concern over radiological

# Brothers Lead Cops On Chase At 100 MPH

GRAPEVINE, Tex. (AP)—A couple of Fort Worth brothers who "just didn't want to be stopped" led police on a 100 m.p.h. car chase yesterday. It ended when the 1947 car the boys, 9 and 13 years old, were driving quit running.  
"It's a miracle someone wasn't killed or hurt," said Highway Patrolman Dan Nowlin, who took part in the chase.  
He said the boys covered a 45-mile stretch of busy road in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. They traveled at "fantastic speeds" through small towns, he said.  
He said the boys, Donald, 9, and Ronnie Walden, ran away from home in Fort Worth in their dad's car.  
He said he and McKinney policeman Jack Sullivan were cruising three miles south of McKinney, 50 miles from Fort Worth, when they saw a "driverless" car speeding southwest.  
"A little sandy-red head raised up over the steering wheel and looked at us as it passed," Nowlin said.  
The officers gave chase and were hitting 100 miles an hour when they drew alongside the sedan which Ronnie was driving.  
"He ran us off the road and kept going," Nowlin said. "The 9-year-old was navigating for his big brother. We could see his head bob up now and then. He would tell the driver how close we were and which way to swerve to drive us out. The big one drove like a professional race driver."  
"We never stopped him," Nowlin said. "The engine quit running on that old car."  
The boys were taken to police headquarters and were released to their parents. No charges will be filed, Nowlin said.  
"They told officers, 'We just didn't want to be stopped.'"

# 4 Women Dead, 5 Missing As Fire Sweeps Shop Building

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—Fire flashed through a four-story brick loft building an hour before quitting time yesterday. Women workers panicked trying to flee the inferno.  
There were 112 workers inside. Four are dead, 5 are missing and feared dead, and 31 injured, 9 of them critically.  
Women, their hair and clothes blazing, piled from the building onto fire escapes.  
One fire escape, supposed to lower to the ground, jammed, trapping the women against the building.  
Raymond Washington, 47, who slid down a drain pipe from the third floor, said, "I looked up, and there was this fire escape, jammed."  
"I felt awfully helpless. I felt I ought to do something, but I just couldn't do anything. There was nothing I could do." A few minutes later someone knocked out a pin with a hammer and the fire escape came down.  
Fireman James Curry, one of the first up the fire escape, said five women jammed up on its fourth-floor landing.  
"Their clothing was on fire and they were screaming," he said. "Their legs were caught between the steps of the fire escape and we had to pull them apart. I could hardly pull them apart."  
"The flames were everywhere, coming out of doors and windows."  
Firemen got three down. The other two burned on the fire escape.  
The sprawling, 70-year-old loft building, near the harbor on the East Side, housed six separate shops. Two machine shops occupied the first floor, and the other three floors housed dress shops and a house slipper maker.  
Dead were an 18-year-old bride of three months, Mrs. Angelina Di Rienzo; Mrs. Jessie Mongillo, 42, mother of a 15-year-old child; Miss Alma Bradley, 46, and Miss Grace Pittman, 42.  
Three hours after the fire started it was still blazing out of control. A huge section of wall collapsed, leaving a wedge-shaped hole two stories deep which exposed the opposite wall.  
No one knew how the fire started.  
Walter Myjak, one of the owners of a first-floor metal shop, said he heard a rumbling and opened the door of the elevator shaft.  
"Red fire burst out at me," he said.  
He tried to call the Fire Department but the phone was dead.

# Armed Service Pay System Revision Set

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Times said today the Eisenhower administration is expected to send to Congress in March a plan to "revolutionize" the pay system for enlisted men in the armed services.  
A Washington dispatch to the Times said that under the new pay plan — which has been dubbed the "Green Pasture" system — there would be higher pay for higher skills and rewards for performance.  
The story also said, in part: "The plan provides for the eventual abandonment of the present system, which is based on length of service. Under the present system two sergeants — one a truck driver and the other an electronics mechanic — who have equal time in grade — draw the same pay."  
In the words of the experts who have drafted the new plan, men would be paid according to their "contributions" to the service and according to their "productivity."  
The plan was worked out by the Defense Advisory Committee on Professional and Technical Compensation, which was appointed by Secretary of Defense Wilson last

# More Contempt Citations Due

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman McClellan (D-Ark) said today more citations charging contempt of Congress will follow that which his Senate Investigations subcommittee voted against Frank W. Brewster of Seattle.  
Brewster is an international vice president of the teamsters union and president of the 11-state Western Conference of teamsters.  
Brewster, called as a witness at a public hearing Saturday, refused to answer questions and contended the subcommittee had no authority to question him. The subcommittee was looking into alleged racketeering in labor unions.  
Among other things, Brewster refused to say whether he had received \$30,000 from the union in addition to his salary and whether union funds were used to pay for the maintenance and operation of his race horse stable.  
He also refused to produce union financial records the subcommittee had ordered him to bring.  
McClellan called this "wilful contempt" and said he expects citations will be voted soon against some other officials of the union who refused to testify.  
The subcommittee announced it had voted 5-0 in a closed door meeting yesterday to file the contempt charges against Brewster.

### Rocky Road Ahead For Labor Group

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Talk among AFL-CIO leaders attending winter meetings here pointed today to a rocky road immediately ahead for the year-old merged labor organization. A squabble loomed among big AFL-CIO unions over whether organized labor should cooperate with a thorough-going investigation of alleged union racketeering shaping up in Congress. A second point of probable conflict is a growing scrap among former AFL and former CIO unions in their age-old jurisdictional battle. AFL-CIO President George Meany is trying to iron this out, but deep-rooted rivalries are smoldering. A third factor pointing to strife is the approaching deadline next December for merging rival AFL and CIO state and local groups in the big industrial states. Only a score of the least industrialized states have completed mergers. All three are explosive issues that could lead to possible withdrawal or suspension of some major unions from the AFL-CIO family. The U.S. Senate is about to trigger off in Washington a probe of alleged union corruption. The Senate Investigations Subcommittee headed by Sen. McClellan (D-Ark) already has held a set of preliminary hearings at which several union officials refused to testify. James B. Carey, president of the International Union of Electrical Workers and an AFL-CIO vice president, said he wants to take up with the AFL-CIO Executive Council next week the refusal of some union officials to testify before congressional committees.

### Second 'Prank' Victim Dies

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—Death yesterday claimed the second of two nurses who were burned in an ether explosion caused by a "prank." The latest fatality was Kathleen Oehler, 19, died Sunday of burns suffered in the incident at St. Joseph's Hospital Jan. 16. Two registered nurses signed statements that each threw about half a pint of ether at the students just before the fire, without knowing Miss Smith was smoking. Fire Chief Earl McDaniel said. He quoted them as saying ether throwing was a nurses' "prank." He said Margaret R. Donovan, 24, and Mary Frances Hutchinson, 26, signed the statements. No charges have been filed. Police Chief E. C. Hale said police inquiry may be completed next week.

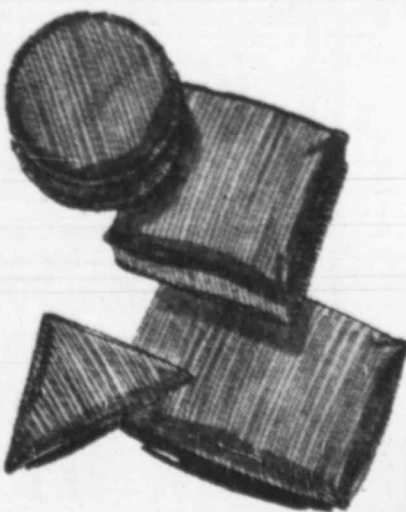

## JEFF TAYLOR IS PRESIDENT

### C-City Chamber Installs New Officers At Annual Meeting

COLORADO CITY — Jeff Taylor, Colorado City lumberman, was installed as president of the Chamber of Commerce at the organization's annual meeting last night.

Taylor, recently recognized as "Workingman Jaycee" by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, has also been active in affairs of the senior organization and was recently elected a director of the Chamber of Commerce.

He pointed out that work on a new lake and an increased highway construction payroll were in prospect for Colorado City in 1957 and added that Colorado City

would soon have "potentials which will attract any type of industry."

Taylor took over from H. I. Berman, last year's president. Berman reviewed the accomplishments of the Chamber of Commerce in 1956, noting that the Chamber of Commerce had pushed through an all-age recreation program, expected to begin operations Feb. 1. He said that the Agricultural Committee under Curtis Latimer had acted to promote the caged-hens layer program in Mitchell County and that the Merchant's Trades Committee had used a trade promotion in the fall in which 108 firms took part.

The president announced his committee chairmen for 1957, including: merchant's trade, Glover Rader and Carl Gary; membership, Ralph Lee; education, Jay Craddock; industry, Charles Root; publicity, J. B. Glenn; civic, H. J. Stenkley; water, Frank Kelley; housing, Pete Warren; agriculture, Elmer Martin; highway, Nap Caddell; legislation, Eldon Mahon; oil, Walter Grubbs; and aviation, Dr. E. H. Berkman.

Dr. Martin L. Cole, academic dean, Eastern New Mexico University, spoke on "The Second Mile," pointing out that those who did just enough to get by could be called "First Milers," while those who did a little more could be said to have gone the "second mile."

"America has been built by sec-

ond milers," he said.

Cole spoke scornfully of the cult of "bigness," saying, "It's wonderful to have a good city—who wants to be too big anyway?" Far better to channel efforts into having the "best" city instead of the "biggest," he commented.

Other officers installed were Raymond Perdue, and R. B. Baker, vice presidents, Luke Thomas, secretary and Gus Chesney, treasurer. New directors introduced were Taylor, Baker, Thomas and J. C. Costin.

## Chaplain At Webb Is Ex-Parachutist

First Lt. Verlin E. Mikesell, former Navy man, is the new Protestant chaplain at Webb Air Force Base.

He has been in the Air Force since 1955 and previously served at Lowry AFB, Colo., as chaplain.

Lt. Mikesell is a native of Richmond, Ind. He entered the Navy in 1943 and served as a paratrooper during World War II. He received his parachute training at Corpus Christi and in his first parachute jump he won the distinction of being the last man out of the plane and the first to hit the ground.

Prior to the jump, he was told to be sure to spot the airplane before pulling the ripcord. It took him longer to find the plane.

After the war, Mikesell attended Indiana Central College where he was on the track team and played in the band. He was president of

its senior class in 1941.

He studied at the United Theological Seminary in Ohio and served as pastor for an Evangelical United Brethren Church before entering the Air Force as a chaplain in 1955.

Chaplain and Mrs. Mikesell have three children, Judith Ann, 14, Deanna Kay, 12, and Robert Eugene, nine.

Temporarily assigned to Webb AFB as chaplain is 1st Lt. Frederick Kevetter, whose permanent station is Moody AFB, Ga.

Kevetter, a Baptist minister, received his wings and was commissioned in the Army Air Force at the old Big Spring Bombardier School during World War II. He is a graduate of William Jewell College and New Orleans Baptist Seminary.

## Old-Age Insurance Vital Economic Factor To Many

With the start of 1957, old-age, survivors, and disability insurance becomes a significant economic factor in the future of nearly every person who works for a living.

Burke Johnson, district manager of the Odessa social security office declared today.

Benefits of the end of 1956 were being paid to 9,200,000 persons at the rate of \$485 million a month. At the end of the year approximately 60 per cent of the 14 million persons past age 65 who are without income from employment were receiving old-age and survivors insurance benefits. Over 60 per cent of the paternal orphans in the county were receiving sur-

vivors insurance benefits.

Money to pay these comes from the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund, which is built up from social security taxes paid by employees, employers, and self-employed people covered by the law.

During 1956 the Trust Fund received \$6.6 billion, of which \$225,000,000 was interest on that part of the fund which is not needed for current benefits and is invested in government securities.

Benefit payments for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1956, totaled \$3.7 billion, or about 56 cents of each dollar received during the year.

## Veteran Officer At Webb Transferred

Capt. Lawrence J. Boland, chief of airmen's division of 3560th Pilot Training Wing at Webb AFB, has received orders transferring him to Marana Air Base, Ariz. He will assume new duties of base personnel officer.

Capt. Boland, former resident of Highland Falls, N. Y., practically grew up in the military service. His father, Peter Boland, had completed 18 years of service when he became a victim of the influenza epidemic of 1918.

Lawrence Boland was born in Cadet Hospital, West Point, N. Y., in 1915. Upon graduation from high school in 1935, he enlisted in the U. S. Military Academy service detachment at West Point. His first job there was as secretary to Maj. Jacob L. Devers, who was to later become chief of Army ground forces subsequent to WWII.

At the completion of initial enlistment, he re-enlisted for the U.S.M.A. Air Corps Detachment. Several officers, later to become famous, were stationed there at the time in their junior grades. Included were Gen. Robert W. Harper, then a captain, and Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker, also a captain. He watched the Air Force in

its infancy and handled much of the paper work during the activation of Stewart Field, Newburgh, N. Y. He recalls that it was in 1939 that West Point began a program to interest students at West Point in aviation. Available at the academy were three aircraft: an OA-3, an OA-4 (amphibious type), and one BT-7 at nearby Stewart Field.

An ardent football fan, the captain is considered an expert on West Point football "greats." He can rattle off the team positions and the numbers of various players from "Light Horse" Harry Wilson to "Doc" Blanchard.

His 22-year career includes such varied assignments as assistant adjutant, Mitchell Field, 1940; assistant administrative inspector, Patterson Field, Ohio, 1943; base re-enlistment and separation officer; recruiter.

Capt. Boland served 26 months at Burtonwood Air Depot, Lancashire, Eng. One unforgettable experience: He was in London at the dramatic instant "the lights went on again," and recalls half-grown children who had never seen the city lighted up.

## JOE SPIKES OF LAMESA

### 'Dean Of Scoutmasters' Observes Birthday Today

LAMESA—Many Lamesans will stop their busy schedules today to wish a man who has had a strong influence on many lives a "Happy Birthday." Today is the birthday of Scoutmaster Joe Spikes.

It all started back in 1928 when a letter came to him and was signed by each boy in the Lamesa Boy Scout Troop 22 requesting he become their scoutmaster. Little did he realize that by accepting he was signing up with an idea that would one day earn for him the title of "Dean of Scoutmasters in the South Plains."

The story of Joe Spikes has been the story of Scout Troop 22, because from his 28 years of service to the troop have come both business and civic leaders. Lamesa's Mayor Bob Crawley is one of Joe's boys; the president of the Noon Lions' Club, J. D. Dyer Jr., is another, as is Willie Ed DuBose,

senior at Lamesa High School who was one of the Scouts in the Asian Airift last spring.

With the organization of an American Legion Baseball team for Lamesa in 1931, Joe Spikes was right in there coaching the boys and later when it was revived in 1945 it was Joe who headed it up. Two of the former players have not turned professional, Kenneth and Kelton Russell of Welch.

Not only does he hold the admiration of his boys, but "Nappy" holds the Scout's Key, the Silver Scoutmaster's Key, the Silver Beater, which is scouting's highest award for outstanding adult work, and he is a Vigil Member of the Order of the Arrow, which is the highest rank in a National honor camper's organization.

man, Marcus Agrippa. Later the temple was rebuilt and enlarged by Hadrian, a Roman emperor. During most of its long life, the Pantheon has been a place of prayer — first for the Romans, then for the Christians.

The name "Pantheon" means "all the gods," and the temple was employed at first as a center for prayers directed to Jupiter, Juno, Mercury, Venus, Neptune, Minerva and other Roman deities.

Q. What is the width of the dome of the Pantheon?  
A. The mighty dome has a diameter of 144 feet! It is wider than the dome of the cathedral in Florence, or St. Peter's in Rome. A vast amount of gilded bronze was used for the dome. This made the building a place of glittering splendor.

At the center of the dome is an open space with a diameter of 28

feet. This was designed to provide daylight for the Romans who gathered inside.

Q. When was the Pantheon turned into a Christian church?  
A. This was done 1,348 years ago. The Christian church was given the name of Santa Maria Rotonda.

About one thousand years later, while St. Peter's Church was being built, workmen took 215 tons of bronze from the Pantheon and used it to make bronze pillars to hold the canopy over the high altar of St. Peter's.

Q. Does Paris also have a Pantheon?  
A. Yes, a church in Paris was given the name of Pantheon after the French Revolution. This building is of different shape than the Pantheon of Rome, and is smaller, but it contains the tombs of several noted men — Rousseau, Voltaire, Victor Hugo and others.

**Benefits For Reservists Provided In New Statute**  
A section of the new Service-Benefit Act provides additional men's and Veterans' Survivor benefits for members of the Naval Reserve under "portal to portal" coverage for Reservists attending drills, according to Hays Bacus of the local reserve unit.  
The main provision of the law covers survivors of military personnel who die in service or who, under certain circumstances, die later as a result of military service.  
Under the new law, PLRRA a member of any reserve component who, under authorization of proper orders, assumes an obligation to perform active duty for training or inactive duty training, is covered. If he dies from an injury which occurred on or after Jun. 1, 1957, while proceeding directly to or returning directly from such duty, he shall be considered as having been on such duty and therefore is entitled to basic pay at the time the injury occurred.  
This means that reservists are given survivor coverage for their families while en route to or from training. This includes regular drill periods as well as weekend drills.  
A reservist's survivors are thus entitled to the death gratuity which is computed by multiplying his basic pay by six, but the payment cannot be less than \$300 nor more than \$3,000. In addition, the widow, children and dependent parents have coverage under the "Dependency and Indemnity Compensation" provisions of the law. For instance, the monthly compensation to the widow is \$122 plus 12 per cent of the basic pay and is paid as long as she remains unmarried. The minimum payment of this type is \$122 per month.
