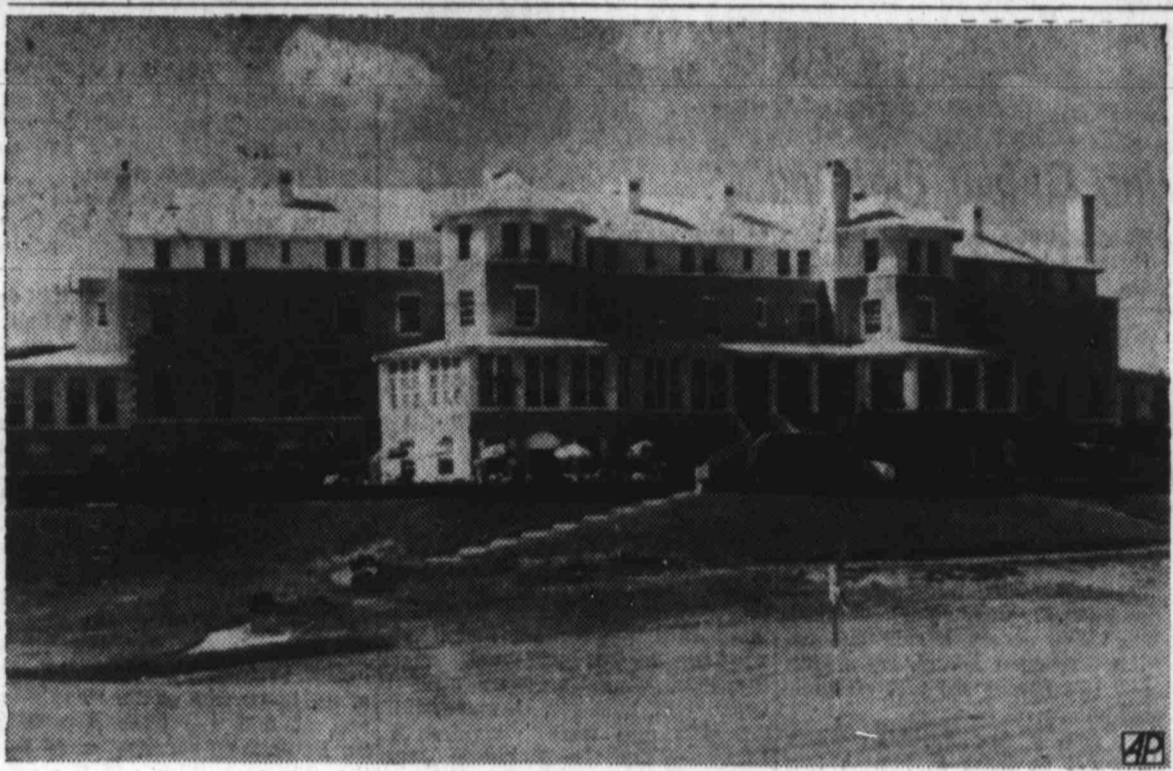

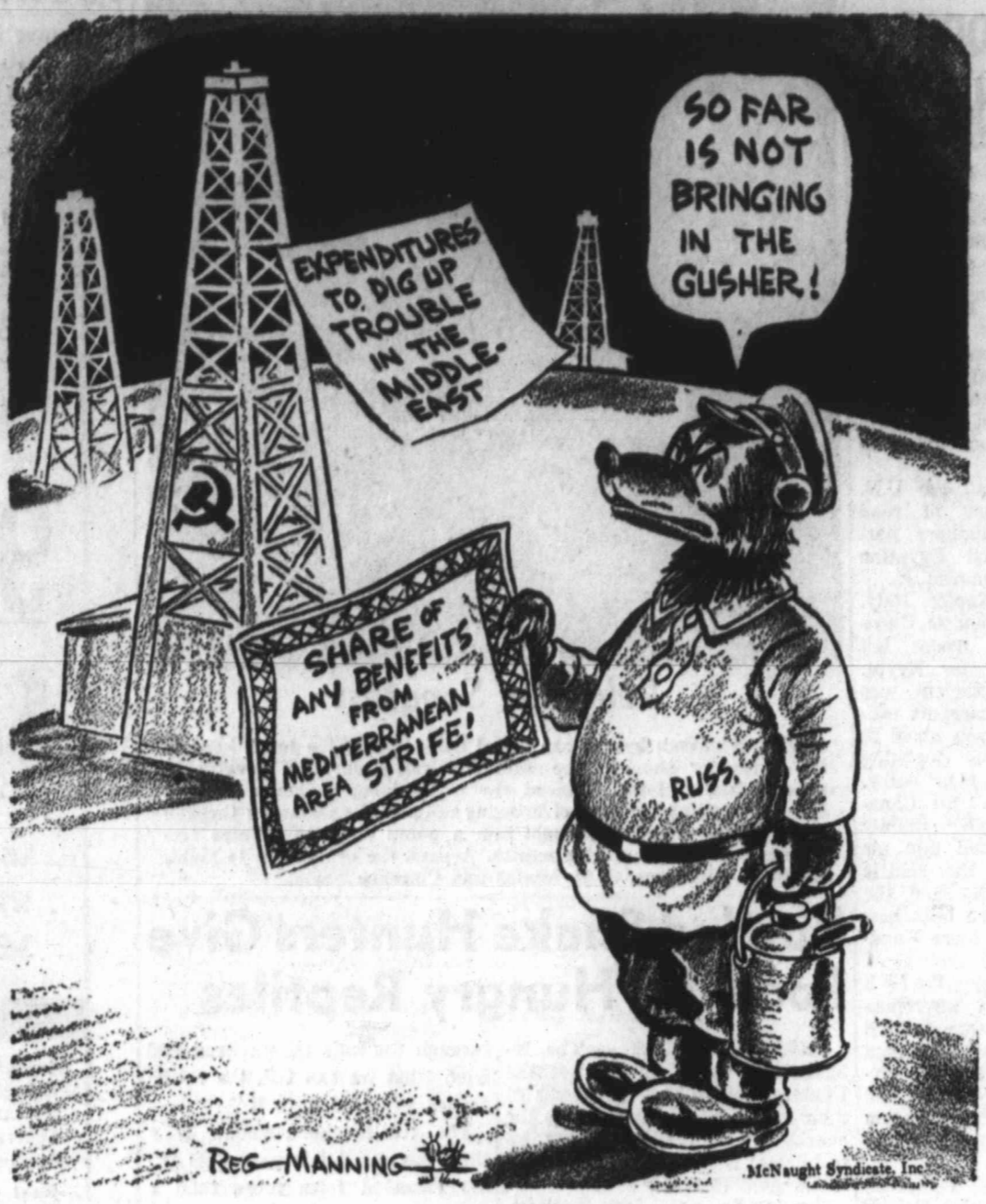

Alike And Yet Different Enough

At debates recently held by the Oxford Union some British youngsters spoke with asperity of the two-party system in the United States which finds Republican and Democrat almost as alike as two peas in a pod, with only slight differences between the two. So, there is little or no choice offered the American voter, they argued.

British critics of our system — representative as contrasted with parliamentary — seem to forget that there are only 50 million Brits as contrasted with 160 million Americans. Britain's population is homogeneous; ours is highly diverse. Ours is spread over 3 million square miles; Texas alone is bigger than two and a half Great Britains.

However, the differences are there, less apparent than real perhaps. There is not much difference between the two parties in the matter of social security legislation and administration, true enough. This makes some conservative Republicans unhappy, and rolls some Democratic liberals on the ground the GOP has stolen their stuff, but a two-party meeting of minds on social security should not surprise a British observer overmuch. In truth, the same thing has happened in a Britain divided between Labor and Conservative; the Conservatives have left social legislation almost untouched just as the Republicans have in this country.

In so huge and diversified a country as ours there are conflicts of interest between the agricultural Middle West and manufacturing New England, between a traditionally Democratic South and a traditionally Republican New England, between the economic interests of half a dozen major geographical divisions of the land.

There are, however, enough differences between the two major parties in this country to offer refuge and accommodation to large segments of our population who disagree with both on relatively minor points.

Most Americans, we believe, recognize the wisdom and strength of a two-party system, as opposed to a fractionated system such as that long prevalent in France, where the real power quite often is wielded by splinter minorities. In France, the hands of government, not to mention the cords of legislative machinery are quite often paralyzed by a coalition of splinter parties, who rally around personalities rather than issues.

Traffic Heavy On 'Road To Miltown'

PRINCETON, N. J. — Traffic on the Road to Miltown is getting heavy, judging by the results of a nationwide survey on the use of "tranquilizers"—or "happy pills" as they are sometimes referred to.

Doctors, psychiatrists and public health officials have all expressed alarm about this rush for the new pills. Medical authorities who are concerned about this can take comfort from the fact that the public is of a mind to regulate the sales of the tranquilizers.

Reactions of users vary — from that of a mid-town Manhattan actress who found that the pills made her "terribly depressed" to the young farm housewife in Beaver Dam, Ky. (pop. 1,349) who felt that "we are living too fast and we need something to tone it down." Her happy pills — she reported — "gave me kind of a relaxed feeling."

Among those who have heard about the new pills (slightly less than half of those in the survey), sentiment is roughly 9-to-1 that laws should be passed regulating tranquilizer sales.

Denial Of Right To Trial By Jury

WASHINGTON — The right of trial by jury is such an integral part of the Constitution of the United States that, when someone in the law-enforcement branch of the government begins to tamper with it, there is naturally grave concern.

law, automatically barred a jury trial. The theory back of this law presumably is that a judge is the best person to decide whether contempt has been committed in his own courtroom. But the decisions rendered in the past do not uphold the right of a judge to punish for contempt ordinary acts of lawlessness committed outside his courtroom.

Then the government would refuse new accounts, stop interest on those it holds and start giving depositors back their money. This job would take two years.

In this instance, the local school board is the complaining party, and the local authorities have the responsibility of enforcing law and order. There would have been a reason for interposing the name of the "United States" as a party to the suit if the local school board had refused to obey the Supreme Court's order on forced association or a federal judge's injunction on the subject. But the school board has been complying from the start.

After that the unclaimed deposits would go into the U.S. Treasury where depositors who later turn up could claim their money.

All this becomes pertinent because of the so-called "civil rights" legislation pending in Congress, under which it is sought to allow the "United States" to intervene in cases where Negroes may have been refused an opportunity to register and vote in elections. If such legislation is passed, the "United States" will become a party to all the suits filed, and there will be no opportunity for jury trial unless Congress repeals the present law.

What the offspring will be, no one knows, but all hope it will be long. Likewise, most of them hope they'll be along when the show leaves late this month for its New York opening April 3. They won't know until it's almost time for the show to leave.

Presumably the proponents of the "civil rights" legislation fear local trials by jury because of public sentiment adverse to forced association of children in schools. So the device being employed is designed to avoid trial by jury.

For its "new start" this year, the circus has done away with its traditional "big top" tent. Instead it will be seen in indoor arenas and outdoor ball parks and fairgrounds throughout the country.

It's a situation where the end is supposed to justify the means. But the "means" happens to be a denial of rights granted in the Constitution itself.

There has been a performance each Sunday afternoon, with 12 to 14 acts, but ticket sellers and others say business hasn't been as good as in other seasons.

It is being alleged that the Department of Justice all along has not objected to jury trial in the Clinton cases, but this never has been and is not now up to the Department of Justice to decide.

Officials estimate crowds run to 2,000 on good days, but on the road the circus played to as many as 10,000 a performance and once in the Kansas City baseball park thrilled 32,000—an all-time record.

Women Win Vote For Monotonous Working

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Research by a Michigan State University professor suggests that women generally do better than men in long, monotonous tasks.

Dr. Paul Bakan, assistant professor of psychology at M.S.U., bases his preliminary findings on 1 1/2-hour tests given to 20 subjects. He found that both sexes scored better in the first 15 minutes than in the remaining hour and 15 minutes, but that women did better in the long run.

In the tests, 10 men and 10 women were asked to watch a light and note changes in its brightness.

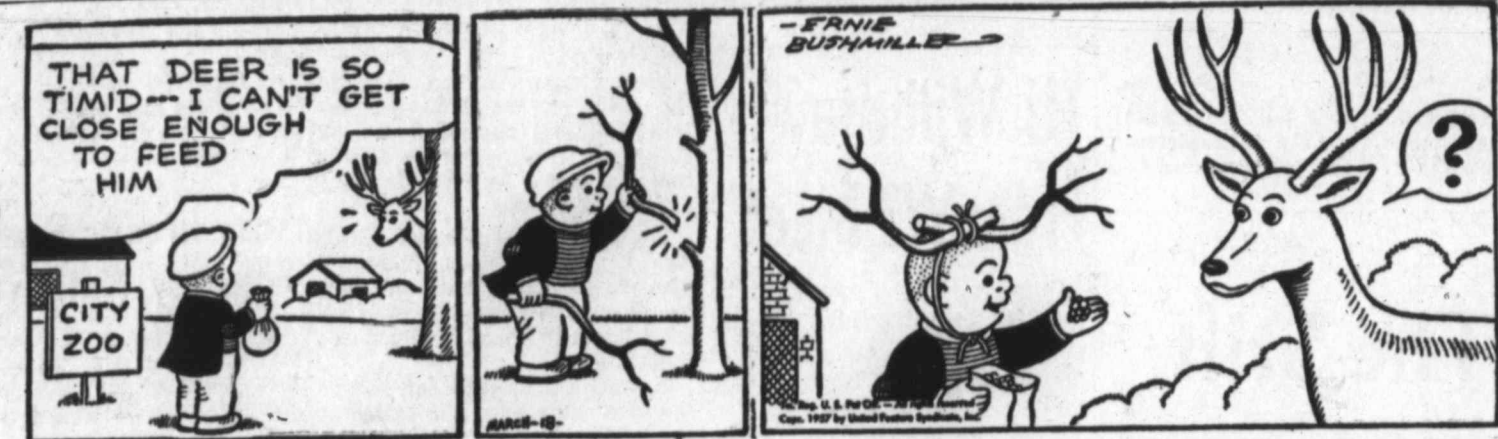

Pup, Figure In Dognap Fuss, Is Found Dead

GALVESTON—The death of a small mongrel dog, key figure in a gun fight that resulted in the firing of five dogcatchers, continued today to stir up a controversy. The dog, Blackie, was found floating in a bayou Saturday near where its young master and another boy holed up with a rifle and held off police and dog catchers for an hour last Wednesday. The two 14-year-old boys, Charles Layman and Robert Garcia, said the shooting occurred after a dog catcher tried to shoot Blackie. Dogcatcher Otis O'Callahan said he fired to scare the dog after it bit him. No one was hurt in the exchange. City Commissioner Tom June-man revealed yesterday that five temporary dog catchers have been fired and drive to rid the city of strays has been called off. Blackie had been put in the pound for a 14-day observation period. The boys were suspended from school. Mrs. Ruby Layman, mother of young Charles, said when she asked to see Blackie Friday, she was offered any other animal in the pound. She said Charles was hysterical after finding Blackie's body. She said the dog's head had been mutilated by what appeared to be a "shotgun blast." Earlier all but the head dog catcher was disarmed as a result of the incident. There was a mystery as to how Blackie met death. "In this case it's highly possible," June-man said, that the dog was killed in anger. But he added, "I don't think that is the case." Mayor George Clough, however, thought otherwise. "I don't see why they killed that little fellow's dog," he said. "And I'm going to see that it doesn't happen again." A meeting was to be held today between the boys' parents and school officials to discuss their suspension.

Uncle Ray:
Frogs Can Move Limbs After Losing Brains

By RAMON COFFMAN
In our survey of the brains of animals, we have taken up starfish, insects, worms and fish. Now it is time to look at the "amphibians." Amphibians start life as water animals, with gills for breathing. In due course they lose their gills and develop lungs. The frog is a good example of an amphibian. It comes from the egg as a tiny tadpole, or pollwog, and soon proves itself an excellent swimmer. As the weeks go by, strange things happen to the tadpole. Legs appear on its body, and the tail starts to shrivel up. Instead of simply dropping off, the tail serves as a source of food for the growing tadpole. Then it vanishes. After losing its tail and growing four legs, this little animal is ready to go about on land as a frog. From time to time it will return to the water for a good swim, but it has started to breathe air and will do so the rest of its life. Q. Is it true that a frog can move after it is dead? A. Tests have been made on frogs which have lost their heads. Here is a report of one series of tests: "A half hour after the frog's head was severed from the body, one of the toes was pinched. At once the leg was lifted and pulled away. "A drop of a weak acid was placed on the animal's chest, and it brushed the spot with its hand. Then its arms were held, and it brought up one of its feet to brush across the spot. When that foot was held, the other foot was used to brush the spot." In a sense, the frog was dead, but "reflex actions" took place. These involved the spinal cord and certain nerves, but the brain was gone. Without the brain, the frog was free from suffering. 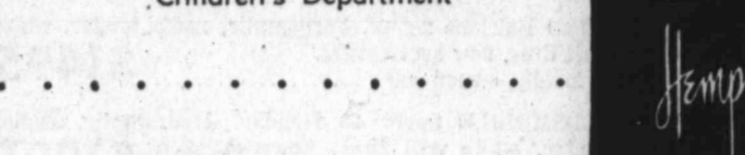

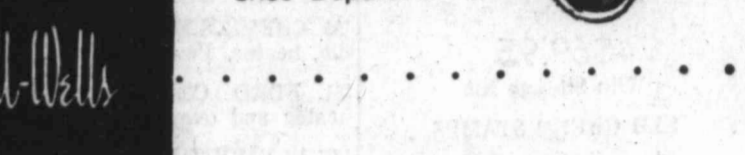

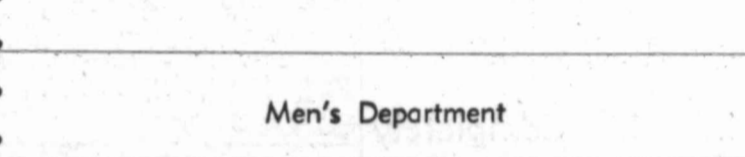
