Even if the original model is available, it must be translated back into a master pattern made of stiff paper. When all the pieces are made to fit together properly it is then made into one-half of a garment from inexpensive muslin.

abroad? How long does this have to go on? Indefinitely? Or can Congress cut back now, and eventually stop the programs entirely?

Big questions. They lie like boulders on many desks in Washington today. Thousands of people have written their representatives. Some were angry some merely puzzled. Their communications have come from all parts of the country, blurring the old boundaries between "isolationist" and "internationalist" sec-

Many of these say, "Cut back!" Some say, "Stop the whole thing." Meanwhile, teams of specialists business, heads and military men have put the intricate problems

under microscopes. Most of them say, "Don't cut back now." Some recommend, "Step up the pace."

President Eisenhower's own view: "I believe it is one of the cheapest ways we have of insuring the position in the world we want to maintain."

He has asked for \$4,400,000,000 for foreign aid programs for the coming fiscal year. Congress isn't ready to vote on that yet. Right now, it is taking

Gross Revenues Up, But Costs Lower T&P Net

Gross operating income was \$81, 388,881; operating expenses was \$31/2 million more than in 1955. After taking care of debt requirements, the balance of net income was \$6,260,887, or about \$800,000 under 1955.

Freight revenues amounted to \$70,240,554, almost as much as the preceding year. A general six per cent rate increase was effective for part of the year, but it did not offset revenue lost during the steel strike.



Israel reported recently two clashes between its troops and those of Syria and Jordan, with no great damage done. The clash with the Jordan Legion came when an Israel patrol intercepted "a unit of Jordan legionnaires while entering Israeli territory northeast of Megiddo.'

Megiddo is the biblical Armageddon, which the Revelation of St. John the Divine speaks of as the final battle to be fought on "the great day of God," between the powers of good and evil. Armageddon was a place where many battles had been fought in ancient times, and had come into use as the figurative place of any great

In his campaign for the presidency in 1912 Theodore Roosevelt wrested this figure of speech from the obscurity into which it had fallen when he declared: "We stand at Armageddon and we battle

for the Lord. Since more often than not battle sites are chosen for topographical reasons. Gaza, like Megiddo, has been the scene of numerous conflicts throughout human history. It is the natural gateway between Palestine and Egypt, and the Philistines family

History stares you in the face at almost took it from the Egyptians and made it their chief stronghold. Alexander the Great took it in his conquests, and later it became a Greek city.

From Gasa the Philistines made life tough for Israel, and while the great General Joshua approached its walls he never got inside. It remained for Samson

to make Gaza's strength a laughing stock, The Crusaders found Gaza a desolation, and Baldwin III built a fort on the spota short-lived deal

No fewer than three battles were fought in and around the city in World War I. The first two attempts to take the city by the British failed, but later General Allenby outflanked it by breaking the Turkish fines at Beersheba.

Out of small disagreements mighty conflicts evolve. Tensions in the Middle East today are higher than at any time in modern history, and a single spark-like a pitched battle between Israeli and Jordanians at a place called Megiddo-could well set off World War III.

None of the neighbors found out about most of the battles in that area until weeks or years after they were fought, but today news travels with the speed of light and world is one big contentious

David Lawrence The Issue Of Presidential Disability

WASHINGTON - No law passed by Congress under the present provisions of the Constitution can take care of the situation that would ensue if a President of the United States became disabled. It really requires an amendment to the Constitution to deal with the problem.

This is the conclusion reached by the attorney general and is the basis for the message which President Eisenhower shortly will send to Congress asking that a constitutional amendment covering the subject be adopted and submitted to the states for ratification.

The legal mess that would result if, as a consequence of an act of Congress, a commission should try to determine whether or not a President was disabled mentally, for example, can well be imagined. Lawsuits would emerge because laws signed by an "acting president" would be challenged in the courts as in-

Article Two of the Constitution isn't at all clear. It says: "In case of the removal of the President from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what officer shall then act as President, and such officer shall act accordingly, until the disability be removed, or a President shall be elected."

The trouble with this article is that it doesn't define "inability." Nor does it give Congress any power to fix presidential succession except when both the President and Vice President die or both - not just one - are disabled.

The idea has been advanced that Congress could pass a law providing for a commission consisting of a bipartisan group of officials from the executive and legislative branches of the government, with the Chief Justice included. The theory has been that such a commission would be required by law to seek competent medical advice.

of political discretion is involved and, when Congress starts to legislate in that area without express authorization by the Constitution, there can be plenty of legal obstacles interposed which might cause serious delays, if not a big crisis, some day in the operations of the whole gov-

The decision has been wisely reached, therefore, by Mr. Eisenhower and his legal advisers that the best thing to do is to get some kind of specified powers from the people through a constitutional amendment. There will be no difficulty in setting up a system of succession, where there is a clear elimination of the executive, such as in the case of death, resignation or removal through impeachment. But how can the world "inability" be defined? If it is left to a commission to determine, who shall be the members? This is something that must be provided in the wording of the constitutional amendment itself.

It is most important to find a way to validate the official action taken by an 'acting president' who serves only "until the disability be removed," so there can be no legal doubts raised as to any bills he might sign or any other acts he may perform in the interim of a President's disability. For when an "acting President" takes the oath as President, it must be crystal-clear whether he is to serve for the remainder of a President's term or only for a period undetermined at the outset but which is left to a commission to determine definitely as the condition of a President develops one way

In many English-speaking countries, of course, such as Canada, Australia, New Zealand, England - in fact, wherever they have a parliamentary form of government — the national legislative body can remove the prime minister at any time by a majority vote or leave it to the people to decide in a special election

whether he shall remain or be replaced. This is the really flexible way to deal not only with the mental or physical illhealth or disability or a President but also with any political ill-health he may encounter in the course of the term forwhich he was originally elected. In an atomic age, it would seem sensible to give two-thirds of both houses of Congressthe right to select a President at any time he fails to win a vote of confidence or else to submit the issue to the people to decide in an election called immedi-

ately for that purpose. A modification of the parliamentary system to conform to American political habits would, if adopted now, probably solve a lot of the questions that the people will have to face in the amendment dealing with presidential "inability." 

Time For The Rank-And-File To Be Mad

It would be a great solace to millions of taxpayers whose money is supporting the U. S. Senate inquiry into corruption and high-binding union labor if we could believe that union virtue, rectitude and reform would follow as night the day.

Undoubtedly a few of the gents who have been caught flagrante delicto, i. e., with the till in both hands, may eventually go to jail. (Frank Costello, the big fish netted by the Kefauver-remember Estes? -investigation, spent a handful of months in durance vile. But his lawyers sprung him recently, and he is out once more.)

But it is one woman's opinion that the present Senate investigation of racketeering in the Teamsters Union isn't going to be worth a lead nickel unless there is a revolution, sparked by rage and indignation, within the union rank and file.

If I were a member of the Teamsters Union, I would be in a red rage today because my dues apparently had been siphoned off for wine, dancing girls, racing stables, air-conditioned apartments in Palm Springs, a mansion in Seattle and \$300,000 "loans" for union bosses.

Maybe the 1,500,000 members of the Teamsters Union, the biggest in the country, are too stunned at the moment by the revelations of hanky-panky in the front office to set up any hue and cry for reasonable honesty in administration of their funds. Maybe it is too early for them to have found their voices.

Or is the American working man willing to tolerate goons and racketeering at the top in exchange for a fast buck, fringe benefits and a biennial raise? Does he honestly believe that this is the price he must pay for union labor representation and it undeniable benefits? And is he supinely willing to pay that price?

If I were a member of the Teamsters, I would be screaming my anger and disgust to the high heavens today at the spectacle of Dave Beck, my trustee, pleading the Fifth Amendment before a Senate committee to avoid answering whether he helped himself to \$322,448.80 in union funds. I would be petitioning for the head of Teamster Vice-President Frank Brewster and those of his race horses,

But the worst thing that can happen to union labor now is for the rank and file of the Teamsters to be indifferent. If nobody in the Teamsters ain't mad at nobody else, if the boys don't give a continental about the finagling as long as they get theirs, then a lot of taxpayers are going to bring a lot of pressure on a lot of Congressmen to write a lot of new,

corrective laws. It isn't enough for George Meany and Walter Reuther to try to clean labor's house, or for the AFL-CIO ethics committee to get busy with the broom. It's labor's grass roots that need to get out the water

bucket and the soap. Labor unions have made invaluable contributions to the American way of life, but this is a time for disinfectant and not whitewash within the movement.

But as Congress has again demonstrated, these fine-sounding promises molder in the files between election campaigns.

Senator J. William Fulbright of Arkansas for the fourth time tried to effect the simplest possible change in the corporation tax laws to bring some relief to smaller businesses. His amendment to the bill to continue corporation and excise taxes at present rates - the only opportunity the Senate is likely to have this session to pass on tax changes - was defeated

Fulbright would reduce the tax rate for corporations earning less than \$225,000 a year from 30 per cent to 22 per cent. All earnings above \$225,000 would be taxed at 22 per cent plus a surtax of 31 per cent. which would be a one per cent increase for the larger corporations.

As the debate developed, 98 per cent of all corporations would benefit by this change, with a total tax reduction of about \$400,000,000.

But under the Fulbright proposal, this amount would not be lost to the Treasury. It would be made up for by the increase on the larger corporations comprising two per cent of the total. In fact, according to Fulbright's showing, the government would get an additional \$20,000,-000 in revenues.

As originally put forward, the Fulbright amendment had 35 co-sponsors - nine Republicans and 26 Democrats. But the day after they put their names on the proposal four of the Republicans - Senators Andrew F. Schoeppel of Kansas, Frank A. Barrett of Wyoming, Charles E. Potter of Michigan and Homer E. Capehart of Indiana - withdrew.

This left only five Republican supporters, Mrs. Margaret Chase Smith of Maine. H. Alexander Smith of New Jersey, Francis Case of South Dakota, Barry M. Goldwater of Arizona and Alexander Wiley of

WASHINGTON (P-The United States is trying to pin Egypt down to a Suez Canal agreement protecting the interests of Western


U. S. Ambassador Raymond Hare yesterday handed the Egyptian government the preliminary U. S. response to Egypt's proposal

for running the international waterway. The response, described as "constructive," was intended to invite further negotiations.

S. support of (1) the six principles adopted last Oct. 13 by the United Nations Security Council and accepted by Egypt then, and (2) the U. S.-British-French-Norwegian interim plan for turning over half the tolls to an international agency pending a longrange settlement


