Public Power Dealt Blow In Court Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court today dealt a blow to public power advocates by refusing to review Federal Power Commission licensing of three private power company dams in Hells Canyon.

The case for years has been the center of a political and private-versus-public power dispute.

Public power groups appealed to the high tribunal after the U. S. Court of Appeals here upheld the FPC license for private power dams on the Snake River bordering Idaho and Oregon.

The Supreme Court's refusal to review was announced in a brief order, which noted only that Justice Douglas felt the case should have been reviewed.

Public power groups have been seeking approval for construction of a single high dam proposed as a key multipurpose storage project in the Army Engineers' comprehensive plan for developing the Columbia River System, and Oxbow and Brownlee. These dams would flood the proposed federal project site.

Independents Begin Pipeline Hearing Today

AUSTIN (AP)—Independent oil producers complaining they cannot get pipe line facilities to move their oil got a chance to present their case today.

The Railroad Commission several weeks ago set an afternoon hearing for owners of unconnected wells who claim they have to truck their oil from the wells because the major pipeline companies would not handle it.

The commission head, Olin Culbertson, indicated the hearings may take several days.

The commission directed the oil men to be prepared to state what efforts they have made to get their wells connected to a pipe line. In addition, they must list the number and size of their wells, as well as the relative location to pipe lines.

Culbertson said the commission had never been called upon to settle this particular issue. He said under a law passed many years ago, the commission can regulate operation of pipe lines if they are held to be common carriers.

The issue was touched on by Commissioner Ernest Thompson in a speech at Wichita Falls Saturday.

Thompson said there were some 80,000 unconnected wells in the state.

"Of course," he said, "there is no power to make anyone buy more oil than he desires to purchase. But if a common purchaser is in the field, he must take ratably from all wells."

Iran's Premier To Quit In Wake Of Massacre

U. S. Point 4 Aid Suspended

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Sources close to the Iranian government said today Prime Minister Hussein Ala has told associates he will resign as result of the desert bandit massacre of three Americans.

These informants said his resignation will be announced Wednesday, after the departure of West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, now in Tehran as a government guest, so as "to prevent embarrassment" to Adenauer.

The sources said Dr. Menecher Eghbal, vigorous president of Tehran University, court minister and close associate of the Shah will be proposed as new premier.

The change reportedly was to give the government a stronger hand in dealing with banditry and tribal defiance of the government.

Earlier, the United States announced that the Point Four program in southeast Iran has been suspended until the killers are caught.

The American victims of the bandits were Mrs. Anita Carroll and her husband, Kevin, a U. S. Point Four program official; and Brewster Wilson, who is development specialist for the Near East Foundation. Mrs. Carroll's body was found yesterday two miles from the spot where her husband, Wilson, and two Iranians were slain in ambush a week ago Sunday.

Student Pastor Reveals Past As A Convict

NEWARK, N. J. (AP)—A student pastor once convicted of murder mounted the pulpit of the East Side Presbyterian Church yesterday and laid bare his past.

With tears in his eyes, J. Jerry Cacopardo stood for a few minutes facing the congregation, then began:

"A great deal has happened since I last spoke to you. . . . A great deal.

Last Wednesday, Gov. Averell Harriman of New York announced that he was freeing Cacopardo, now a pastor at the (Reformed) Christian Church in Hackensack, from lifetime parole restrictions.

In 1937 Cacopardo had been convicted of the murder of a 27-year-old Brooklyn, N. Y., girl. Now married he is the father of two young children.

In his sermon yesterday, Cacopardo repeated an earlier statement that he "took the rap" for an uncle who later died in the electric chair for heading a Philadelphia murder-for-insurance ring.



Critical Of Ike's Speed

Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore) points to a billboard sign bearing a likeness and signature of President Eisenhower, urging highway safety. Sen. Neuberger criticized what he termed "evident disregard of the speed laws and elemental traffic safety" during the President's drive to his Gettysburg, Pa., farm. Eisenhower made the 80 mile trip from Washington in 1 1/2 hours, outdistancing following newsmen, who were flagged down to the legal 55 mile limit by a Montgomery County, Md., police car. They took it slow on the return trip.

WHERE TO VOTE IN TUESDAY SENATE, CITY ELECTIONS

Where do Big Spring voters ballot in the special United States Senatorial election and in the city commission election Tuesday?

In the case of the SENATE election, those in voting box No. 1 ballot at North Ward School; those in No. 2 at Washington Place School; those in No. 3 at Main Street Fire Station; those in No. 4 at the City Hall Fire Station; those in No. 8 at West Ward School; those in No. 16 at Park Hill School. All boxes outside of Big Spring vote in the customary places.

In the case of the CITY COMMISSION, balloting will be at the City Hall Fire Station ONLY. The separate boxes at the City Hall station will be clearly identified by signs. Only qualified voters who reside within the corporate limits may vote in the commission election.

MKT Seeks U.S. Ruling In Injunction

PARSONS, Kan. (AP)—The Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad moved today to take a state injunction suit filed against it in Parsons to Federal Court.

A petition filed in district court here by a railroad attorney said the litigation is a civil action in which the federal court has original jurisdiction.

Court attaches were informed the railroad planned to file the action for removal in Federal Court in Kansas City.

On March 18, Atty. Gen. John Anderson Jr. of Kansas obtained a temporary injunction forbidding the Katy from removing accounting records to Texas.

Anderson's move followed abolition of an accounting office here by the railroad Sunday, March 17, and the loading of files and equipment from the office into a baggage car that night.

District Judge Hal Hyler issued a temporary injunction and set April 30 for a hearing on a permanent injunction.

The state attorney general's action was based on a 1923 agreement between the railroad and Kansas on maintenance of office personnel and shop forces in Parsons. The state claimed in its injunction action the railroad was violating that agreement and asked that it be permanently enjoined.

The railroad's petition for removal to Federal Court said the controversy is one between citizens of different states. The railroad, it said, "was at the time and still is" a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Missouri.

"The State of Kansas is not the real party and has no pecuniary nor beneficial interest" in the action, the petition continued.

"The real parties were at the time of the filing and commencement of said suit and are now citizens and residents of the State of Kansas."

Under court procedure the railroad's petition to take the suit into Federal Court stays state court action until the Federal Court acts, court attaches said.

Tornadoes, Hard Rains Batter State

Tornadoes and torrential rains battered parts of Texas Sunday, causing heavy damage in some areas, but few injuries.

The rains, the best in a year in some sections in North Central Texas, began tapering off early Monday and skies were clearing in some sections.

A Pacific cool front was pushing west toward Texas, however, the Weather Bureau said, and would move into the state sometime Monday night.

Skies were partly cloudy in north and northeast sections, cloudy in the Panhandle and along the Red River and fair elsewhere.

Fog restricted visibility to an eighth of a mile at Corpus Christi. Some fog also was reported at Kingsville.

Showers fell early Monday at Dallas, Sherman, Tyler and Texarkana.

The heavy rains Sunday revived optimism in drought areas of the state. A tornado and severe weather warning that had been placed in effect in southeast Texas was lifted at 11 p.m. Sunday night after thunderstorms rumbled across north central and southeast Texas. Portions of West Texas also received rain, but generally in lighter amounts.

A squall line plowed across eastern Texas into Louisiana last night. Tornadoes lashed at least five places. Only two persons were injured, but property damage was high.

A two-mile path of destruction was cut in the southeast Texas town of Huntsville, apparently from a tornado. Damage was estimated at half a million dollars.

The path of destruction, about a block wide, included unroofed houses, smashed power lines and trees and shattered windows.

The storm hit near the Sam Houston State Teachers College campus just after noon and plowed its way across the town.

School Absentee Voting To Close

Little interest in next Saturday's school trustee election is reflected in the absentee voter turnout.

Only five absentee ballots had been cast up to noon today. The absentee voting will close at 5 p.m. Tuesday. The ballots are available at the school business offices on the South Ward campus.

Six candidates are running for two places on the school board. The office seekers are Joe B. Neely, Omar Jones, Mrs. Jack Horn, Tommy Hutto, R. W. Thompson and D. R. Gartman.

NAACP Injunction Hearing Delayed

TYLER (AP)—The permanent injunction hearing against operation of the NAACP in Texas was postponed today from April 15 to April 22.

Judge Otis Dunagan, who has heard the previous attempts by the state to put the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People out of business in Texas, granted the postponement on a motion by the NAACP.

Supplies Readied For Election Here

Election supplies for the 16 Howard County voting boxes were being turned over to precinct officials Monday and Mrs. Pauline Petty, county clerk, said most of the boxes have already been delivered to the voting places.

The equipment will be called in to use on Tuesday when the voters of Howard County go to the polls to name the man they want to succeed Price Daniel as U. S. Senator.

Polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Votes will be tabulated at the office of Mrs. Petty after the polls close. She asked that all precinct officials endeavor, if possible, to bring the boxes to the office as soon as possible after tabulation in the precincts has been completed.

She asked that those who could not bring the boxes back to the office telephone the results of the election.

There are 21 contenders for the

post left vacant when Price Daniel resigned from the Senate to become governor of Texas.

The candidate receiving the most votes will serve out the unexpired term in the national upper house.

Tuesday, too, the voters of Big Spring will be selecting two members of the board of city commissioners. This vote will be at the city hall exclusively. As a result voters who live in other precincts than that served by the city hall will be compelled to go to their respective precincts and ballot for senator and then go to the city hall and vote for city commissioners.

Little interest in the election locally has been displayed. Most observers anticipate a relatively light vote in the senatorial contest.

Gay Hill Election Returns Canvassed

Howard County Commissioners Court Monday morning canvassed the vote polled Saturday in the Gay Hill School District \$100,000 bond election.

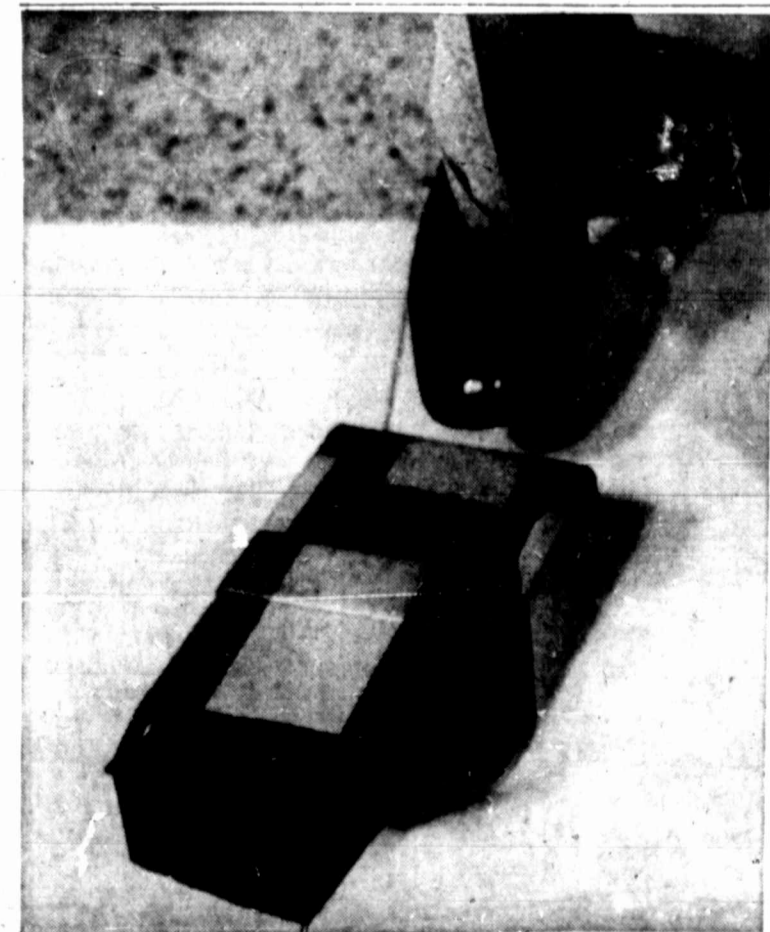
The vote, officially, was 30 for the bond issue and two against.

DENVER (AP)—Eastern Colorado farmers and ranchers, still burying livestock killed in blizzards March 22-23, were warned today to protect their herds against a new onslaught of heavy snow and strong winds.

The Weather Bureau said rain in the lower elevations would change to snow tonight and continue tomorrow with three to six inch depths expected immediately east of the mountains and one to three inches on the eastern plains.

Says Widow Got Dope Overdose

LONDON (AP)—A prosecution medical expert testified today the heroin injection Dr. John Bodkin Adams gave a wealthy patient two days before she died was "35 times the normal maximum dose."

Dr. Arthur Douthwaite again firmly insisted the 58-year-old Adams gave drugs to Mrs. Edith Alice Morrell with "murderous intent."

Adams is accused of murdering the 81-year-old widow in November 1950 to gain a chest of silver and Rolls-Royce car from her \$400,000 estate. The trial is entering its third week.

Return To Russia?

The Kozmins, former Russian slave laborers who were married in a displaced persons camp in Germany, are being aided by Russian embassy officials in a fight to regain custody of three other sons and return to Russia. The three Kozmin boys were made wards of Family Court when both parents entered Chicago State Hospital after mental breakdowns. Peter was born after their release from the hospital.

Boy, 14, Kills 4 In His Own Family

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. — "How are they? Are they going to live?" Chief of Detectives Verne Starmer answered the telephone at the Ossie Woolridge home.

Woolridge, 57-year-old plumber and heating installer, was dead. So was Mrs. Woolridge, 45; DeLores, 11, youngest of their two daughters; and Paul, 6, youngest of their four sons. Doris, 12, was shot through the neck and side, critically wounded.

"You better give yourself up," Starmer told the voice on the phone—a "Mr. Smith." It was a young voice. Starmer recognized it despite the disguise.

So the police picked up 14-year-old Daniel Woolridge at a theater where remorse had overtaken him as he watched "The Wrong Man," an Alfred Hitchcock detective thriller.

Prosecutor Frank Connett Jr. said the sobbing boy signed a statement saying he "suddenly went crazy."

A quiet Sunday dinner at the Woolridge home, after Sunday school at the Riverside Presbyterian Church, had erupted in a fuss between Daniel and his parents.

Daniel wanted to go for a ride. His father said it was too cold. Daniel stormed out of the house but returned in a few minutes. He asked his mother to give back the hunting knife she had taken away from him. She said she had thrown it away.

Daniel sat down for a moment. Then he got a pump action 22 rifle.

Woolridge was shot in the head while napping on a living room couch. Mrs. Woolridge ran in the kitchen and was shot in the face. Little Paul tried to scurry out of the house and was cut down. The two girls were felled in the living room. It was about 1:30 p.m.

Joseph Woolridge, 18, found the carnage when he came home at 6:50 from a date in Kansas City. He called police and an ambulance.

One of the ambulance crew was

Milton Woolridge, oldest son of the family. He tried to help Doris and drove her to the hospital.

The call from "Mr. Smith" came at 7:50. Investigators said the boy had no police record. He has been in the eighth grade at South Park School and a regular at Sunday school.

Daniel is in jail. No charge was filed immediately, pending determination of his status as a juvenile.

U. S. Payroll At All-Time High

WASHINGTON — Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) reported today the federal payroll hit an all-time peak in January of a billion dollars a month.

Byrd, who heads the Senate House Committee on Reduction of Nonessential Expenditures, said regular civilian workers for the government drew \$989,549,000 and payroll funds for foreign nationals employed by U. S. agencies abroad totaled \$16,700,000 in January.

"This total was reported despite a decrease in employment which occurred during the same month," Byrd said.

He said payrolls for the first seven months of fiscal year 1957, totaled \$6,600,000,000, for a monthly average of 946 million dollars.

Byrd has contended that one of the quickest ways to cut Eisenhower's \$71,800,000,000 budget is to reduce the number of federal employees.

The senator said total civilian employment reached 2,390,507 in February, a 3,492 increase over January. He did not list the overall cost figure for February, a shorter month.

Higher Tax Rates For New Industry

NEWTON, Tex. — Most areas trying to attract new industry boast of their low tax rates, but leaders of the Newton County Water Supply District say they will fight for a higher tax rate for the same purpose.

They say the next-door Orange-Beaumont-Port Arthur area has had a billion dollar program of petrochemical development since World War II.

"A lot of little plants are going to come into this area because the big ones are already here and if we can get these dams built and make a year-round supply of fresh water available, Newton County will get some of the plants still to be built," said W. H. Talley, manager of the district.

Financing has run into a snag, however, as big land owners opposed the tax raise to finance water storage reservoirs on Big and Little Cow Creeks, tributaries of the Sabine River.

Early in 1955 Newton County

voters approved creation of the water district as a new political subdivision with jurisdiction over the whole county.

In August of the same year, county voters approved a \$2,500,000 bond issue to finance the two dams.

Talley said only \$750,000 of the authorized bonds have been sold and most of the money is still in the bank. He said the district is ready to issue the remaining bonds and start construction on the larger of the two dams, on Big Cow Creek, but can't do so because of a tax collection problem.

Taxes were levied by the district for the first time in 1956.

A large part of Newton County is made up of timberland and the taxable valuations of the county government are still at the depression level, Talley said. The average value for tax purposes on the county rolls is about \$5.50 an acre. Such land is being sold for as much as \$100 an acre.

Talley said the water district, on the advice of bond dealers, set its taxable valuations on timberlands at about four times the figures used by the county.

Some of the timberland owners protested.

Only one of the 13 big landowners in the county paid their taxes, Talley said.

Talley said the district has employed a delinquent tax attorney and suits will be filed as soon as possible.

Michigan Dems Seek Victory

DETROIT — Michigan Democrats seek to consolidate a decade of political gains in today's statewide election with a pair of victories that would give them a sweep of the State Administrative Board for the first time in history.

Democrats haven't held every seat on the nine-man board since its creation in 1921. The board, made up of the state's top office holders, exercises general supervisory control over administrative departments.

State highway commissioner and state superintendent of public instruction are the only board jobs now held by Republicans, who 10 years ago had all 25 state elected offices.

Democrats now hold nine statewide posts. They swept six out of six last November despite the fact the state gave President Eisenhower a 553,000-vote majority.

Odessa Found Dead In N. Mexico

RAMON, N.M. — Leon Harvey Jarrell, 59, of Odessa, Tex., was found dead yesterday, slumped over in the front seat of a pickup truck at the side of U.S. 285 near this small southeastern New Mexico town.

A coroner's jury in Fort Sumner ruled that death was due to natural causes.

Senate Probe Spurs Demands For Labor Union Safeguards

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate investigation of alleged finagling by Teamsters Union officials is spurring demands that Congress act to safeguard the rights of the laboring man.

Such demands were voiced over the weekend by Republican and Democratic senators, by Secretary of Labor Mitchell and by Americans for Democratic Action.

Proposals ranged from greater protection of "democratic processes" in unions to closer policing of union funds.

There was some talk that the Senate probe might build a fire under a drive for enactment of more state "right-to-work" laws, which outlaw the union shop. Eighteen states already have them, the possibility was raised too of a federal "right-to-work" law.

Debate arose over whether the disclosures would set back the labor movement. Senators Ives (R-NY) and Kefauver (D-Tenn) said they felt this would happen. Mitchell disputed this view.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark), chairman of the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee, said yesterday, "I wouldn't, as a result of these hearings, simply undertake to pass laws of reprisal, laws of punishment."

The committee, in recess for a few weeks, has undertaken a search for evidence of racketeering in both labor and management. So far, it has concentrated on activities of certain leaders of the giant Teamsters Union. It has heard testimony that union funds were used to finance real estate investments and to pay for racing stables, lavish homes and other personal outlays of these officials.

McClellan said the hearings so far "clearly" indicate to him that "there should be federal legislation to insure the democratic processes in unions" and to insure "the security of their funds so they cannot be dissipated or misappropriated or stolen or diverted to any other purpose than union purposes."

Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz) said legislation is needed to put some teeth in Taft-Hartley law provisions dealing with union reports of their finances.

Sen. Douglas (D-Ill) said he favors public disclosure of union welfare and pension funds "to clean up this mess."

Secretary Mitchell said on a television program an administration bill to allow publication of union

financial reports will be pressed again this year. He said it "lay dormant" in Congress last year.

The ADA, which met here over the weekend in its 10th anniversary convention, adopted a resolution urging a bill to require full public disclosure of all transactions involving union welfare and pension funds. The organization, which labels itself nonpartisan and "liberal," also called for "forthright enforcement of laws punishing embezzlement of union funds."

Both Mitchell and Ives indicated concern that the rackets probe disclosures might give impetus to state "right-to-work" laws. Such laws bar the union shop, under which a worker must join a union within a certain time after he goes on the job.

Mitchell restated his opposition to such laws, saying he believes employers and unions should have the right to bargain for some form of "union security."

Ives said there is a "great move on foot" for "right-to-work" laws in the various states. He said that when the public is aroused "there's no knowing how far it will go."

Church Unit Plans Philippines Radio

NEW YORK (AP)—The National Council of Churches plans to build a 100,000-watt radio station on the Philippines. The station will beam programs to the Philippines, Indonesia, Burma, Thailand, East Pakistan, India and other areas in Asia.

Practically Everything Handled By Teamsters Union Member

WASHINGTON (AP)—Practically everything you own and use — your furniture, bread, milk, laundry, clothes, beer, even the hearses that take you on that final ride — is handled by a member of the Teamsters Union.

It's an organization with 1 1/2 million members, mainly truck drivers and chauffeurs, but also production workers in various fields.

Nearly one out of every hundred people in the nation belongs and pays dues to the Teamsters Union.

It collects about 100 million dollars a year in dues, and controls welfare funds several times that amount.

The Teamsters hold quite a grip on the nation's transportation system, which is not to say that in itself is a bad thing. The union has cooperated to the hilt with truck operators to develop the industry into a valuable American asset.

The statistics furnish an inkling of the inherent economic power of the giant labor union which, for more than a month, has been the main target of Senate rackets investigators.

When James R. Hoffa, Teamsters Midwest kingpin and vice president, was arrested here on charges of bribing an investigator for the rackets committee, Chairman McClellan (D-Ark) said Hoffa "controls the nation's transportation system, except for railroads from the Rocky Mountains to the Atlantic Ocean."

This left out the Far West, but there Frank W. Brewster, another union vice president, wields similar influence.

Over them, nominally at least, stands Dave Beck, the Teamsters Union general president. Beck has

refused to tell McClellan's committee under oath — invoking the Fifth Amendment — what he has claimed publicly away from the committee; that he borrowed some \$300,000 to \$400,000 in union funds, but repaid it.

The Teamsters Union has been on the American scene a long time. Originally the teamsters were all wagon drivers.

The exact title of the union today is the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Warehousemen and Helpers of America.

The union grew and grew under the late President Dan Tobin, a Boston Irishman. Tobin called the shots on the old AFL council and, in frequent jurisdictional squabbles with other unions, generally won.

The result was that the Teamsters grabbed off jurisdiction — and members — in a lot of industries in which other unions claimed organizing rights. After World War II the Teamsters really began to expand on a big scale into other fields.

Beck replaced the aging Tobin in 1952. While Beck's financial deals, largely and admittedly with borrowed union funds, are now raising the nation's eyebrows, he has done a job for his union.

Membership now is at least 250,000 greater than it was when he took over. Contracts generally rank with the best in the country from the worker's standpoint.

The Teamsters Union is divided up into city, state and area duchies, each with its own set of bosses. Generally speaking they have by tradition operated as they saw fit.

Beck and Hoffa have changed this quite a bit in the past few

years. Beck, having welded together an 11-state organization into the Western Conference of Teamsters, carried the plan further after becoming national president. He established similar Eastern, Central States, and Southern Teamsters conferences.

The result has been that where Teamsters previously bargained for city or regional areas, they now bargain on conference scope with contracts that are largely identical.

It's a move toward national bargaining. It also has meant bigger powers for a few union officials, including Beck and Hoffa.

The Teamsters have more than 800 local unions scattered from coast to coast, from Canada to the Gulf (some, by the way, in Canada too). There are 44 joint councils, which are sometimes statewide and sometimes community-wide, such as the Chicago or Boston areas. California, for example, has three joint councils.

Who are the Teamsters? They are the truck drivers, the guy with the big square van ahead of you on the road.

These were the over-the-road

drivers, the long-haul boys jockeying freight across country.

But there are thousands and thousands of other Teamsters driving local delivery trucks, taxicabs, ambulances and practically every other type of vehicle.

The union also represents production workers in milk plants, breweries, canneries, all sorts of fruit and vegetable processing workers and handlers, race track employees, warehouse employees, and pinball and vending machine servicemen.

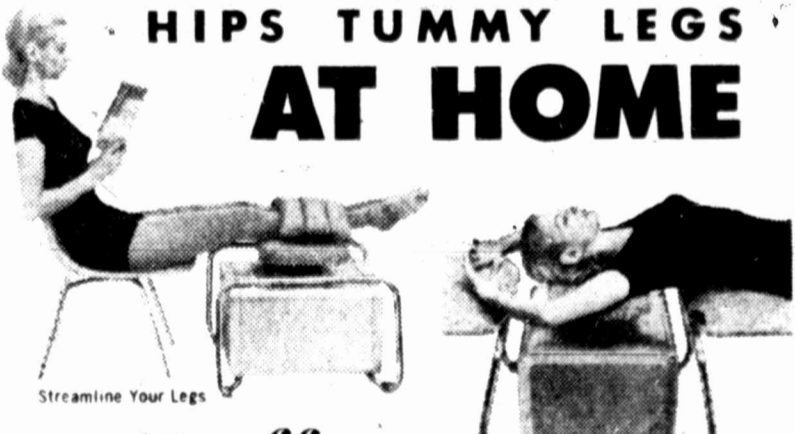

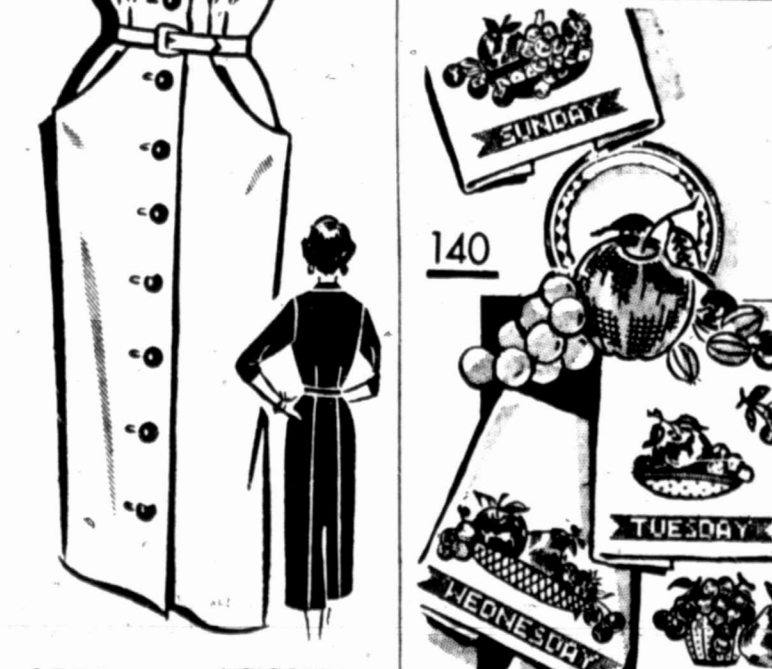

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Foreign Aid Questions Lie Heavily Upon U. S. Officials

Editor's Note: Sister congressional hearings are being held over President Eisenhower's request for \$4,400,000,000 for foreign aid. This is the first of five articles which present a searching study of U. S. foreign aid programs as a background for the coming debate.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Take a \$20 bill, three singles, a nickel and two pennies.
This is what the United States foreign aid programs cost you last year. It is the "per capita" figure. In effect, it means that helping other nations took from every American — man, woman and child — \$23.07.

Did you get your money's worth?
Did the dollars hit the targets overseas? Merely nick the edges? Or miss completely?
Will the same portion of your taxes be taken this year and sent abroad?

How long does this have to go on? Indefinitely? Or can Congress cut back now, and eventually stop the programs entirely?

Big questions.
They lie like boulders on many desks in Washington today. Thousands of people have written their representatives. Some were angry some merely puzzled. Their communications have come from all parts of the country, blurring the old boundaries between "isolationist" and "internationalist" sections.

Many of these say, "Cut back!" Some say, "Stop the whole thing." Meanwhile, teams of specialists, business heads and military men have put the intricate problems under microscopes.

Most of them say, "Don't cut back now." Some recommend, "Step up the pace."

President Eisenhower's own view: "I believe it is one of the cheapest ways we have of insuring the position in the world we want to maintain."

He has asked for \$4,400,000,000 for foreign aid programs for the coming fiscal year.

Congress isn't ready to vote on that yet. Right now, it is taking testimony from key witnesses. Soon the sparks will be flying from a red-hot story.

At this moment, the mood of Congress appears to be for a cut in the \$4,400,000,000. Perhaps to the bone.

Some legislators talk of a one-billion-dollar cut. Others would go even deeper.

Some argue that the program hasn't attained its goals. Others say the present approach is outdated. Still others believe it's a good thing as it stands. In short, there are very mixed feelings about it today on Capitol Hill.

Here are some reflections —
"Insofar as winning friends or battling the Russians, our foreign aid program has been an abysmal failure," says Sen. Ellender (D-La.). He traveled in 28 countries last year and submitted a 525-page report to the Senate.

"It's a good program," says Sen. Cooper (R-Ky), former ambassador to India. "Nations in the Middle East and Asia that have recently become independent, and are trying to establish a stable economy, have great needs. We can't determine where they're going to land. But if we're trying to establish the right kind of feeling, we must help them."
"A lot of technical assistance

has been baloney," says Congressman Taber (R-N.Y.), veteran member of the House Appropriations Committee. He said he believed the administration of the International Cooperation Administration has improved, but added, "There are still many people in it with nothing but political qualifications for their jobs."

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Gross Revenues Up, But Costs Lower T&P Net

Gross revenues were up one-half of one per cent for the Texas & Pacific Railway Company during 1956, but operating expenses were up 6.1 per cent.
That meant that net income was down by \$806,258 or 8.7 per cent from the preceding year, according to the annual financial statement just released by the company.

Gross operating income was \$81,388,881; operating expenses amounted to \$61,523,517, which was 3 1/2 million more than in 1955. After taking care of debt requirements, the balance of net income was \$6,260,887, or about \$800,000 under 1955.

Freight revenues amounted to \$70,240,554, almost as much as the preceding year. A general six per cent rate increase was effective for part of the year, but it did not offset revenue lost during the steel strike.

Passenger revenue was pegged at \$4,135,249, an increase of 4.4 per cent due to raises in fares and increased military traffic. Other sources of revenue included \$2,504,267 for handling United States mails, and \$1,458,374 from distribution of railways express funds.

The Texas & Pacific paid out \$27,144,786, or 60.4 per cent of the total operating costs, in wages. Material and supplies, other than fuel, cost \$9,145,642. Diesel fuel costs stood at \$3,156,817. Higher wage rates boosted the outlay for this cause by \$3 million during the year, and material costs rose \$700,000. Maintenance expenses stood at \$25,909,470, or 5.3 per cent more than the preceding year. Maintenance-of-way and structures cost \$12,803,855, and maintenance equipment expenses stood at \$13,105,615.

Cost for 1,000 gross ton miles rose to \$1.95, which was second only to the \$2.04 in 1949. Return on investment was 4.30 per cent in 1956 as against 4.08 in 1955.

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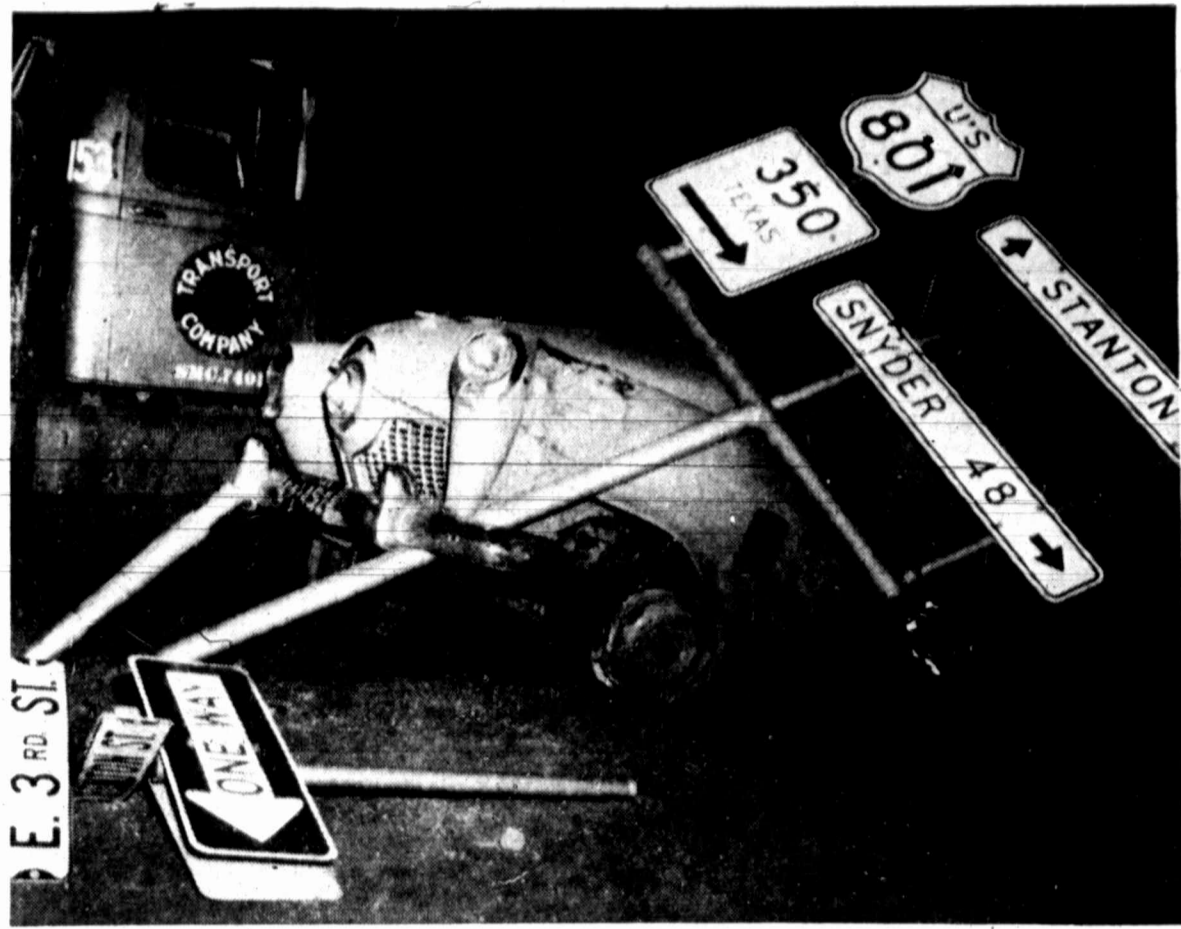

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One Way Which-Away?

The truck transport and the 1951 Studebaker collided at Third and Benton early today, hospitalizing three in the car. The smashup clipped off the one-way sign pertaining to Third Street and bent over the highway-directional marker. The incident occurred about 2 a.m. No one was going the wrong way regardless of the position in the picture; the car was going north and the truck west.

Three Injured, Car Demolished In Collision With Transport

A transport truck loaded with asphalt and a car with three occupants collided at Third and Benton early today, but no one was seriously injured.

The three in the car were hospitalized, however.

Injured were Ruben Tavez, Snyder, and Manuel Ramon and Frank Subia, both of Balmorhea. They were taken to Big Spring Hospital for treatment. Tavez sustained a broken collar bone but the other two received only minor cuts.

Nalley-Pickle carried two to the hospital and Subia went with police officers.

Subia was driving a 1951 Studebaker that collided with a 1954 White truck driven by Raymond W. Lilly, Rt. 1. The asphalt-laden truck is owned by C&R Transport. Lilly was uninjured.

The truck was traveling west on Third while the car was proceeding north on Benton. The three in the car had just turned north from East Fourth, and the three were en route to Snyder, coming from Balmorhea.

Police said that both drivers

claimed they were within the speed limits. The truck was lodged in third gear (it has five forward gears) which is for speeds from 18 to 30 mph, police patrolmen said.

The incident occurred at 2 a.m. today, and at that time the city traffic lights are flashing caution or stop on the highways. However, officers said that the light at the Third and Benton intersection was not in operation and had not been for several days. This is just while flashing.

The two vehicles collided in the center of the intersection and the car stopped on the northwest corner. The car had been hit on the right side and was practically demolished. It cut off a one-way sign and bent a huge highway-directional sign almost parallel with the ground.

The driver of the car was thrown out, and Tavez was thrown out the left side of the car — he was sitting on the right side — while Ramon was still in the back seat at the time sheriff's officers arrived. Deputies Bill Cartwright and Randal Sherrod were the first officers to the scene.

The Studebaker was facing east when it stopped.

The job, Roberts said, will cost an estimated \$169,000.

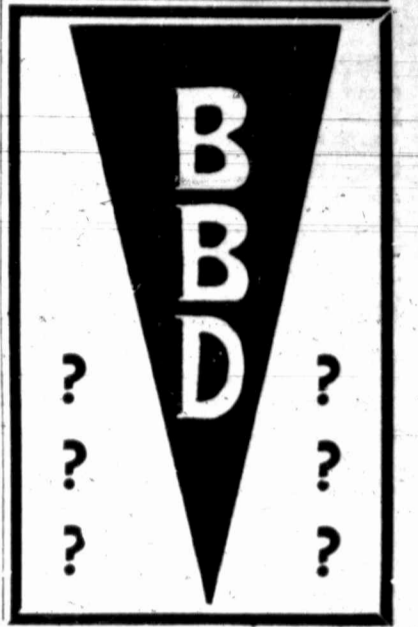
He indicated that it would be scheduled immediately and be pushed forward as rapidly as possible.

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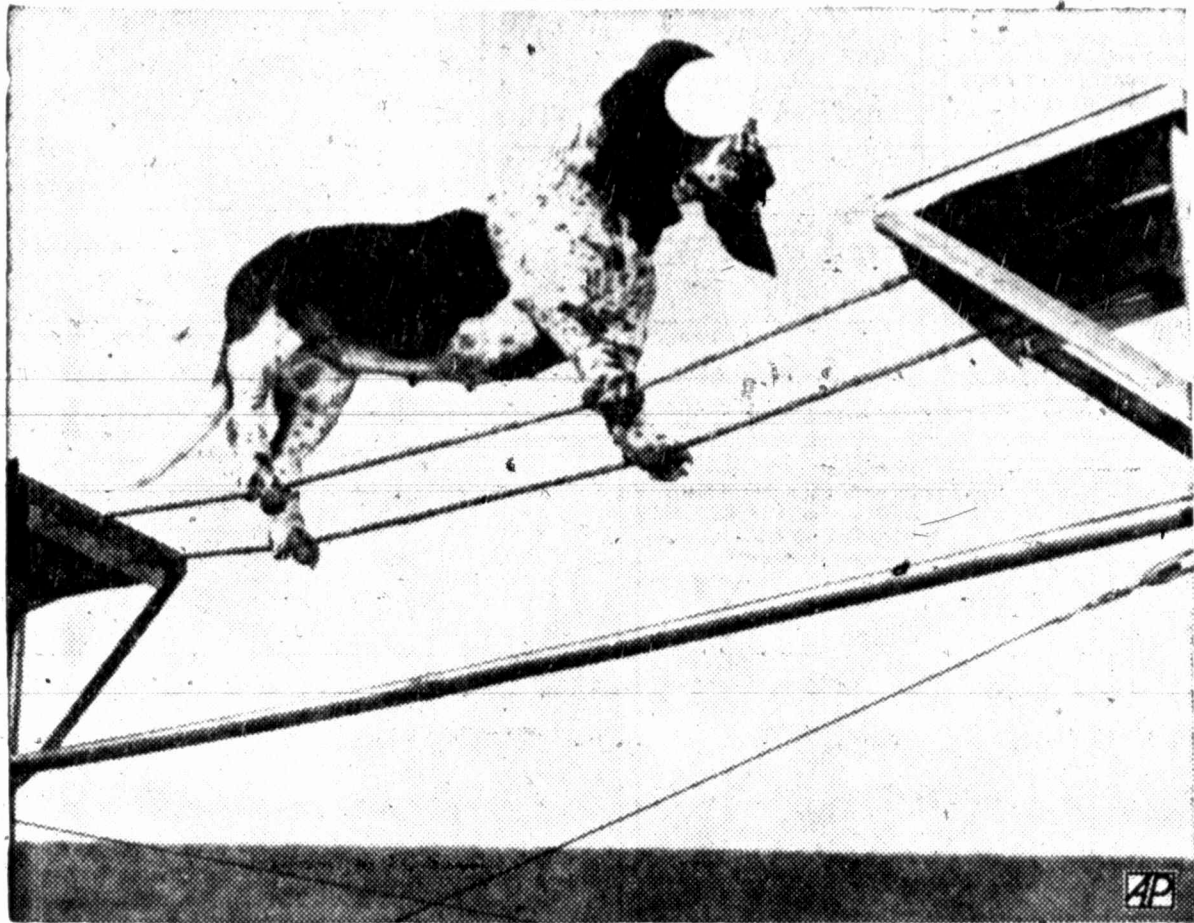

Figure In Hodge Scandal Is Kidnaped, Slain In Chicago

CHICAGO (AP) — A former high official of a bank prominent in the Orville Hodge financial scandal, which rocked Illinois last year when he was kidnaped and shot to death last night on the South Side. Police reported Leon Marcus, 61, former board chairman of the Southmoor Bank and Trust Co., was seized and dragged into an auto as he left a friend's home. His body was discovered in a nearby vacant lot a short time later, a .45-caliber bullet wound in the head. Police said the body apparently was hurled from the car. Marcus, his brother Hyman, 50, an attorney, and Marcus' son-in-

law Martin J. Rosene, 36, were under federal indictments charging misapplication of bank funds and making false entries in bank records. They were scheduled to face trial Sept. 23. The Southmoor bank is where former Republican State Auditor Hodge cashed more than \$600,000 in fraudulent state checks. Hodge, former Southmoor President Edward A. Hintz and Edward A. Epping, former office manager for the high state official, are serving prison terms in connection with Hodge's theft of nearly two million dollars in state funds. The indictments against the

Marcus brothers and Rosene alleged unlawful diversion of bank money from real estate loans. Alfred Rado, owner of the Lavin Lumber Co., told police Marcus was leaving his apartment over the lumber firm's office after Sunday dinner. Five or six men grabbed him as he was about to enter his car. Rado said the victim shouted: "Leave me alone and I'll give you anything I got." Rado told police Marcus had \$3,000 in cash when he was seized. Police said they found no money on his body. His trouser pocket was ripped open. Marcus was thrust into a dark Chevrolet, Rado related, and the auto drove off. Meanwhile, Rado's wife Joyce, who was upstairs, called police. Richard Hehl, 19, a dock worker, said he was watching television and heard a gunshot. Hehl told police he went to the door and saw a black Ford roar away from a vacant lot. He went to the lot and found Marcus' body.

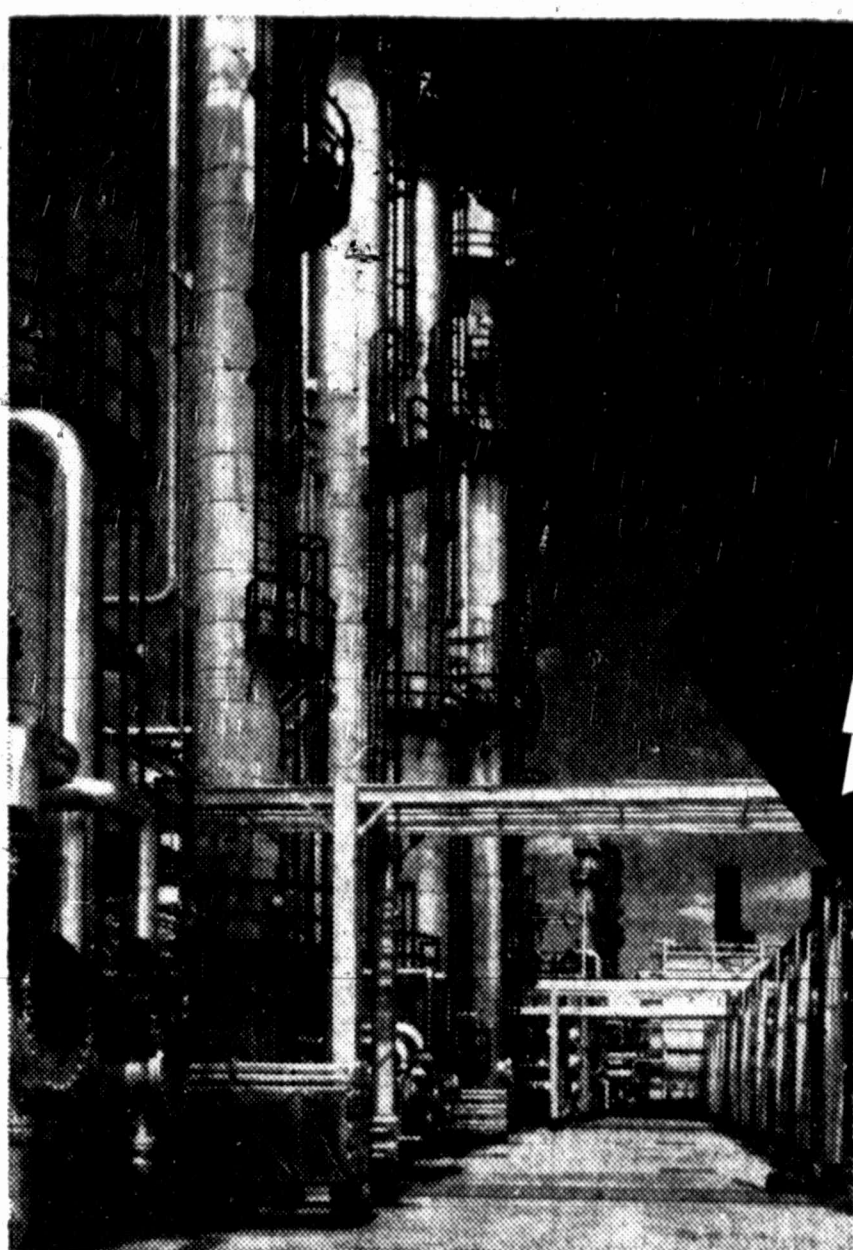
Israel Says Interference With Ships Cause For War

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel has served notice she will consider as "an act of war" any Arab move to impede her shipping in the Suez Canal or Gulf of Aqaba. The Foreign Ministry issued the warning after a report that President Nasser told visiting U.S. newsmen that Egypt would permit Israel to use the canal and gulf only if Palestine Arab refugees "are given back their rights, property and land." "We are not interested in the pretext Nasser puts out from time to time to justify his determination to interfere with the freedom of navigation of Israeli ships," a ministry official asserted. Israel has announced she will send ships flying the Israeli flag

through the gulf as a test and will also test Egypt's ban on shipping in the canal. Foreign-flag ships chartered by Israel are already sailing unmolested through the gulf, which is still under protection of the U. N. Emergency Force. The Foreign Ministry also declared a reported suggestion for a security zone extending more than 2,000 feet on both sides of the Gaza Strip border would not be acceptable to Israel. A ministry official contended such a move would facilitate raids by Arab commandos into Israel. In Cairo, Egypt's Suez Canal Authority said several U. S. and British ships have asked permission to sail through the waterway next week, despite advice of their governments to steer clear of the canal for the time being. No U. S., British or French ships have yet used the waterway although vessels up to 11,000 tons are allowed through if they pay tolls directly to Egypt.

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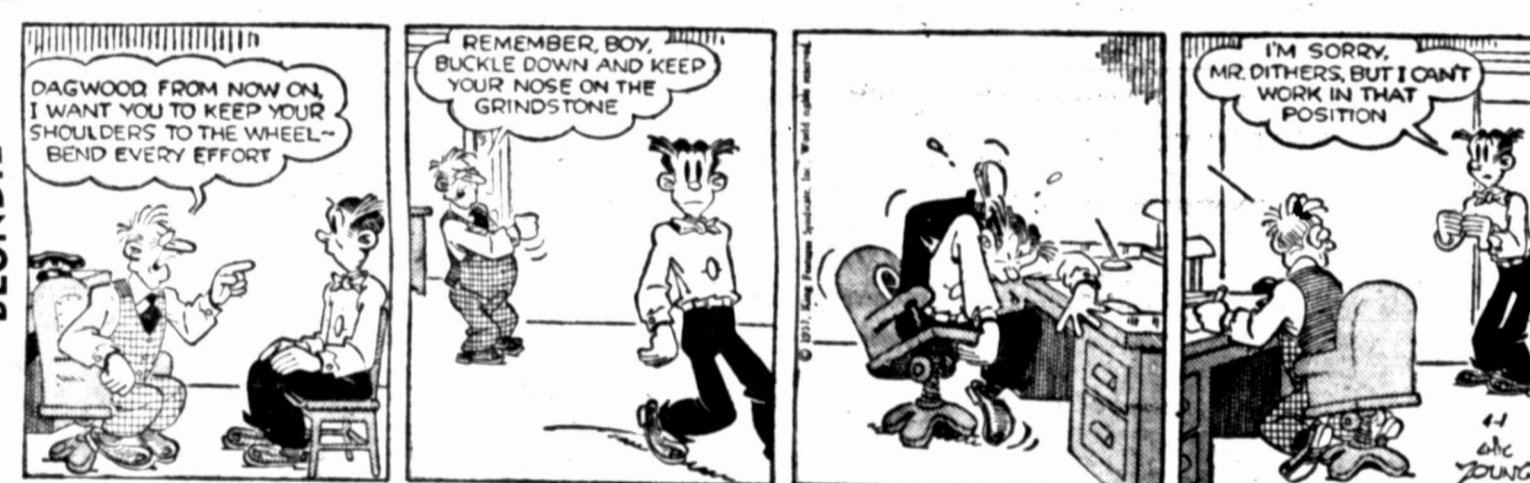
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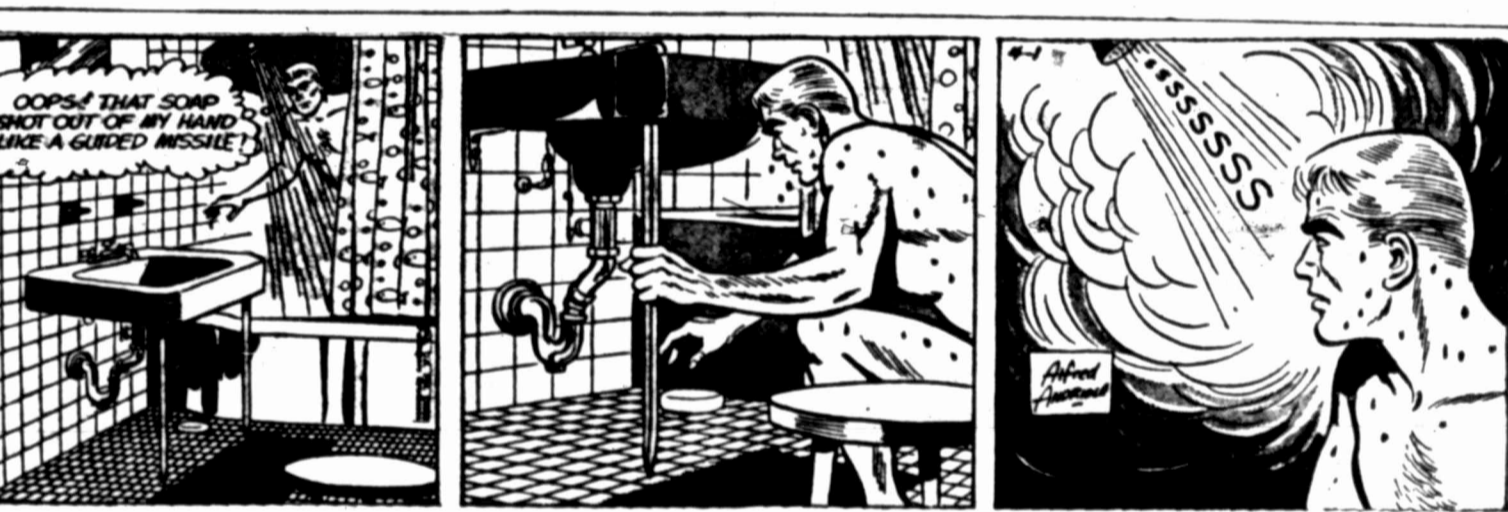

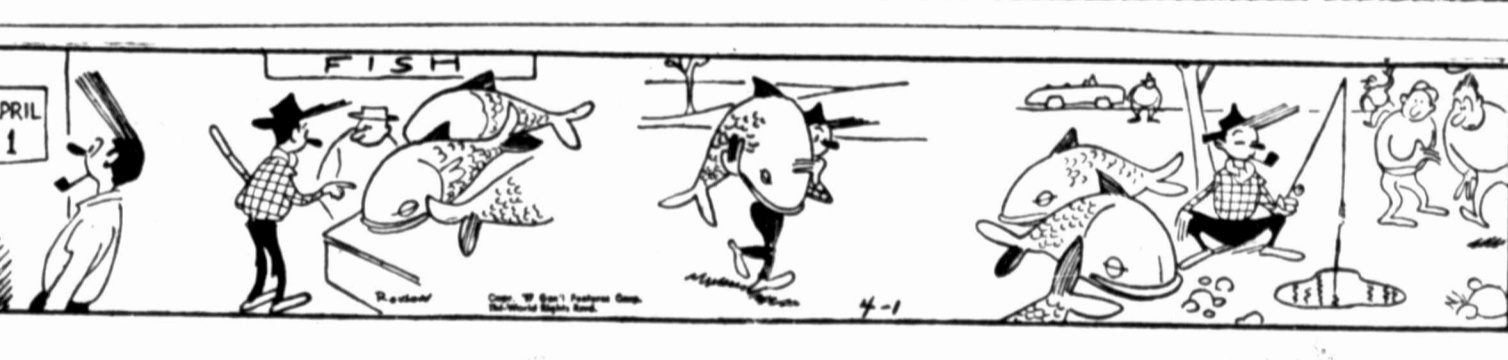

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower was back at the White House today after a comparatively slow-paced drive from Gettysburg, Pa.

Returning yesterday from a weekend of rest at his farm, Eisenhower car kept to the posted speed limits throughout most of the 85-mile trip.

When he rode to Gettysburg Friday, his car—driven by a Secret Service man—moved at speeds of 70 to 75 miles an hour much of the way. This was well above the speed limit.

News men, following the President in several cars, had no trouble keeping up on the return trip. But on Friday, they were flagged down by the 55-mile-an-hour speed limit by police in Montgomery County, Md. Later they had to step up to as much as 100 miles an hour to overtake the President.

U.S. Seeks Pact To Protect Users Of Suez Canal

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States is trying to pin Egypt down to a Suez Canal agreement protecting the interests of Western users.

U. S. Ambassador Raymond Hare yesterday handed the Egyptian government the preliminary U. S. response to Egypt's proposal for running the international waterway. The response, described as "constructive," was intended to invite further negotiations. Some changes were understood to have been suggested, in line with U. S. support of (1) the six principles adopted last Oct. 13 by the United Nations Security Council and accepted by Egypt then, and (2) the U. S.-British-French-Norwegian interim plan for turning over half the tolls to an international agency pending a long-range settlement. Officials are reported anxious to have Nasser's proposal — after changes are made to protect Western users — registered in such a way as to give it an international character binding on all nations who ratify it. As a unilateral statement, it could be changed by Nasser at will. But as an international document, it would require agreement of other signers before its terms could be changed.
