We're Getting Wonderful Relief

All have rejoiced in the rains which have visited this area during the past week. We can pray only that God, in His infinite wisdom, sees fit to extend the moisture further west and northwest.

As of now, the territory from Big Spring is progressively wetter as one moves eastward. As near as Westbrook, the total is better than four inches. Even as close as Coahoma the total is two to three inches and in the city itself it is about two inches.

North and west, however, the rain line ends almost as though chopped off. Most of western Howard County, all of Martin, a good part of Dawson are yet in a margi-

nal state so far as moisture is concerned. Yet, even in the relatively dry areas the soil has been conditioned to receive maximum benefit from more rain. More

rain in those sandy sections now would be of incalculable help.

East of Big Spring most farms now have at least enough for planting, and some have added enough for a modest moisture reserve. Coming as it has at this time, the seasoning will mean that planting will be done at one of the more favorable times of the year from the point of soil temperature and a good start. Farming and ranching always are suspenseful in this country, although remarkable results can be achieved on modest amounts of moisture, but one thing is sure—we must get crops up to a stand to even have that sporting chance. Ike To Be Looking For Younger Men?

WASHINGTON - Guessing who will leave the Cabinet and when has been the favorite Washington game ever since the beginning of President Eisenhower's sec-

As in all guessing games, you look for clues - who enjoys the Presidential favor. who has just bought a place to retire to, what Cabinet member has failed to renew the lease on his Washington residence and draw your own conclusions.

The fact, if one may accept the views of those who should know from first-hand information, is that the President intends to reshape his Cabinet during the current year. The goal is to put in younger men so that the last three years will not see an Administration weary and over-age.

There is shrewd political strategy behind this decision that looks to 1960 and beyond. A Cabinet of members in their late 60s and 70s would give the impression not only of an Administration but also a party coming to the end of its tenure.

The Republican who runs in 1960 in Mr. Eisenhower's place — and more and more it is assumed this will be Vice President Richard M. Nixon - would naturally not take over the Cabinet of his predecessor. But he would want to run from the vantage of a going concern made up of men looking to the Republican future rather

than the past. The changes to occur in the coming months will have little to do with who may, for the moment, have pleased or displeased the President. There will be general agreement, in theory at least, on the need to make over the Administration in a fresher, younger image.

Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey was 67 last month. He came to Washington to stay two years, remained for four and will leave before the end of the year. It may be in two months or six months. Even his closest associates

say they are not sure. Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson will be 67 in July. He has been wanting for some time to get out, and his outspoken wife, Jessie, gives him daily en-

According to present plans, he will be replaced by Donald Quarles, who is pres-

Wilson's deputy. Quarles is 62. Before Wilson goes he wants to see the 1958 defense budget through Congress. More important and also much more difficult, he hopes before he goes to present Congress with a new look in national security and defense production.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles is in his 70th year. He has shown amazing stamina since his operation for cancer last November. While he gives no signs of wanting to put down the burden - on the contrary, he is entirely absorbed in his task - he cannot continue forever at

the present pace. He has told associates that he would like to arrive at a plateau with no immediate crisis in sight before stepping out. Given the state of the world, this would seem to keep him in harness indefinitely. The new Under Secretary of State, Christian A. Herter, often mentioned as a successor to Dulles, is 62.

By EUGENE LEVIN NEW DELHI, April 30 (A) -Stand on the ridge running behind Old Delhi today and look at his-

Behind you, on the top of this hillside skirting the Indian capital, is a memorial to the British troops who subdued the Sepoy uprising of 1857, a revolt that swept bloodily across northern India yet set the stage for the British Em-

Down below sprawls crowded Delhi, obviously a perfect target for the British artillery placed during the battle for the city - on the heights where you are stand-

Beyond, in the hazy distance, is New Delhi with its Parliament and other government buildings. They are reminders that now India rules itself and that this year also marks another anniversary, the 10th birthday of free crowded slums. You see smokestacks and grimy buildings of fledgling industry. Nearby is the spire of a Hindu temple. On the horizon are the domes of a Moslem mosque.

You begin to get an idea of how it must feel to be an Indian today. These are all signs of India: a nation fighting poverty, simmering with tense religious and language problems, yet trying to create industry for a bright new future.

If you have a feeling of pride and dedication over the freedom fight, a feeling of uncertainty but resolution over the future, then you will sense a bit of the thoughts Indians say are running through their minds in this year of anniversaries.

Around The Rim Help From A 'Club Member'

A week or two ago, a woman called in to report that her husband, who is in the Air Force, had suffered a coronary thrombosis and was in a hospital in England where he is stationed.

Naturally, she was most apprehensive. All she knew of the situation was a tersely worded telegram from the military authorities. It advised her that her husband was ill, told the nature of his illness. He was in a hospital, it stated, and his condition was "satisfactory."

I asked her for a few details. From what she told me, I concluded that what had happened to her husband was identical to something that happened to me about three years ago. I could understand exactly her anxiety; my wife had gone through the same ordeal, only in our case, we were not separated by 3,000 miles. I gathered from the telegram that she

read to me that her husband had survived the initial attack. There was no indication that he was being kept in an oxygen tent. Apparently, he had made it through the first critical period and was in the second interval — the time when the principal thing he has to do is be quiet, obey all admonitions of the doctors and put forth no exertion.

This is not an easy time for the patient. Theoretically, he is still far from being out of the woods. But if he manages to go through the first few days without any recurrence of the attack, he has gained half the battle. I told the wife that her husband had a good chance to make it; that it was evident he had passed the first mile-

I told her, too, what I believed was happening to her husband.

I figured his case was very similar to my own. If so, - the day following his initial attack - he was in no pain at all. There was no physical discomfort although there certainly is a heavy degree of mental uncertainty. As a matter of simple fact, the chances are the husband felt fine: that insofar as outward evidence offered, he was well and good as ever. But, of course, this is not the true pic-

There is a long period of time after this when caution has to be used. As I understand it - and I do not pretend to be an expert - a coronary thrombosis means that a blood clot has blocked out one of

the main arteries leading to the heart. This curtails the flow of blood to whatever part of the body that artery happened to serve.

If the patient is "patient," nature

will step in. His body will begin repair ing the damage. It will close off the clot and halt it from moving further along the blocked artery. Meantime, a system of blood vessels will begin forming beyond the clot and making their way to the wall of the heart. These are tiny little arteries and it takes a long long time for them to grow and develop until they are big enough and strong enough to handle the flow of blood which formerly passed through the

damaged artery. If the victim will be quiet, not exert himself, comply with all orders of the doctor and resign himself to staying in bed, all will be well. After a time, he will be permitted to get up and engage in light activities. These, as time pass, will be expanded to include other activities. Eventually, he will be able to resume normal life; go back to his job (provided, of course, that the work is not too strenuous)

It's been three years almost since that reather terrifying night when I fell victim to this widespread disease. I have never had a second attack; I have never suffered any discomfort from the illness

There is only one thing that I do which I did not do before I had the attack. I have slowed down.

I do not lift heavy objects; I do not run up stairways. I ride when it is possible, rather than walk. I try to rest some each day -

stretch out full length and relax. I have chopped off 25 pounds from what I formerly regarded as my normal weight. I feel fine. I have found I can do my work - the same work I have done all of

my life - as well as ever. I am ver much inclined to agree with my physician. He told me, the next morning after that frightening night, "It is a good thing this happened to you - now you'll slow down and quit trying to go night and day. Because of this heart attack you'll probably live longer than you would have if you hadn't had this illness.'

I told this airman's wife these things. Last week she called me again.

"My husband is recovering," she said. "I have had several letters from him. He tells me exactly what you told me the first time I phoned you. I want to thank you for helping me.'

She's welcome, believe me. There are thousands of us ex-coronary thrombosis patients. And I remember how others of the club helped me with their

Genadi F. Mashkantzev, second secretary of the Soviet Embassy in Washington, was given his walking papers for abusing his diplomatic privileges in trying to put the arm on Peter Pirogov, a former Red Air Force officer living in Virginia, to return to mother Russia.

Pirogov was not the only Russian refugee whom Mashkantzev was trying by forgery and cajolery to persuade to return to the U.S.S.R. If Communism's unmitigated gall fascinates me, so, in equal measure, does its unrelenting and worldwide campaign by every kind of doublewhammy hook-and-crook to force refugees from its tyranny to return to Russia.

Nor is Mashkantzev the first secret copin-cutaway to be given the heavy by Uncle Sam for such dirty work. What animates the Kremlin to pursue Russian refugees with such deadly determination probably would keep a psychiatrist employed indefinitely. The few who escape through the Iron Curtain represent such a minuscular portion of the Russian population that their pursuit seems a ridiculous tempest in a teapot.

But it is my guess that the Communist ego, as nurtured in the Kremlin hothouse, cannot stand the criticism that a handful of refugees at large in the world represents or implies

Obviously, refugees would not flee Russia if they were deliriously happy with Communism and the world it creates for them. Ergo, they are dissatisfied. Hence they stand before the world as a vivid form of criticism and rebuke to Com-

So the Kremlin, unable to stand criticism in any form, hunts down the refugees and begins to apply the pressure to return, pressures in a hundred different forms, from active kidnaping to subtle appeals from hamstrung kinfolk

If a citizen of the U.S. or Britain or France thinks he can get a better deal behind the Iron Curtain, Americans, Britishers and French may think he's crazy, but it's his funeral. Not so the Russians. The implied criticism of the Communist paradise inherent in each runaway is more than the Commies and their old inferiority complex can stand.

Thus they track the man down and begin to lower the boom. And when caught in the act, they fill the heavens with Russian diplomats, often police officials cries of "foul," with enough injured gall

LARRY JANSEN, Pacific Coast League pitcher: "It doesn't make sense to me, batting the pitcher anywhere but ninth in the order. The pitcher is ordinarily the weakest batter.

"Let us not deceive ourselves. There is a place for smart basehall in our profession, but there is a new definition of smart baseball. It no longer means the bunt, the steal, the sacrifice or the squeeze. You knock the ball over the fence and that's smart base-

TOM GALLERY, sports director of the National Broadcasting Company, on why Southeastern Conference football teams will not be seen on nation-wide TV screens next fall:

"The committee picking the games works by districts instead of conferences . . . NBC made efforts last year to get SEC teams to switch a date to December and did not succeed. So, this year no effort was made. Miami is in the same district as SEC teams and the Miami-Pittsburgh game Dec. 7 is being televised the same as last year. Why are so many Big Ten teams being screened? We had to go to the West Coast for two of our dates, due to late starting times because of our baseball telecasts. With Stanford and California, it just happened they were playing Big Ten teams on those days. Last year, the Big Ten felt it didn't get its rightful share of TV dates. You see, they're in the same district with Notre Dame and they don't regard a Notre Dame telecast as their game. This thing's a headache, and you can't begin to please everybody.'



And there are those in duca-tional circles who think that's ex-actly what Dr. Martin Buber of Israel is, a modern prophet bring-ing a message on how man can better understand himself.

The 80-year-old Buber is a writer and a religious philosopher. He studied, taught, wrote and edited in Germany until Hitler came along. In 1938 he moved to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Buber has been in this country for a series of lectures on religion at Columbia University in New York. And here, sponsored by the Washington School of Psychiatry. he has had a lecture series with

he formidable title: "What Can Philosophical Anthropology Contribute to Psychology? Before looking at what Dr. Buber says, let's turn to what others

have said of him.
"His whole personality," one scholar has decided, "tolerates no "Outside of Albert Schweitzer." another has written. "I know of no one who has realized in himself a similar great and genuine identi-

ty of truth and life. "This little old man with the penetrating, incorruptible eyes has already today begun to project into the brokenness of our time like a legendary figure. Buber has accomplished what one can only say of a very few: he has reached

the limits of his own being." Despite this glowing endorsement, it's difficult for a layman to follow Buber's most celebrated accomplishment: his "I-Thou" theory of human relationships.


