Off Into Space In 1958 - And There's So Much To Learn

Empty? Packed with meteors? These are only a few of the questions scientists hope to answer when they shoot the first meteor into space. Here is the first of three articles bringing up to the minute U.S. plans for this dramatic

WASHINGTON (P) - Some of your destiny lies within a briliant metal ball that looks like a huge Christmas tree ornament. It is stunningly beautiful.

Inside, it is being fitted with ingenious eyes, ears, fingers, breath, voice and memory for a journey literally out of this world. For this shiny sphere is to become a shooting star, a man-made

moon circling the earth every 90 to 100 minutes. It is going to be hurled hundreds of miles out into space by rockets reaching the never-before-attained speed of 18,000 miles an hour-five

Our first messenger into space, it will learn facts which could greatly benefit your life, and your children's. It will see our sun as man has never seen it

the cosmic dust . . . tell us how empty, hot or cold space really is . . report the thick rain of powerful cosmic rays It will help determine the exact shape of the earth . . . explore

It will be man's first step toward rocketing himself through space.

But the Russians could do it first. For Russia also is planning to shoot man-made moons around the earth. Our first one probably won't be fired until early next year. No one outside Russia knows whether they are ahead of us - as yet they have announced no single detail on their progress.

But you would guess the Soviets are not likely to beat us, after talking with scientists creating our little moons. We feel pretty good now, we've come a long way," says Dr. John P. Hagen of the Naval Research Laboratory, directing project Vanguard to hoist the shiny ball into space.

'We've had our troubles, but now most of them are out of the

Hanging out the satellite is a main and fascinating goal in the International Geophysical Year (IGY) which begins officially July 1. four-foot-long third stage rocket. Gradually they will drift apart. IGY corrals an army of 5,000 scientists from 58 nations into cooperative studies of weather, oceans, cosmic rays, gravity, glaciers, who knows what? earthquakes — all major forces affecting our lives. All nations will share everything they learn.

has openly reported all her many plans for IGY, except for the satellites and for firing short-lived rockets to explore the upper air. Our scientists and officials are reticent only about some details of rockets which will put the little moon into its orbit. For rocketry

But the IGY moons are dedicated purely to peaceful benefit of all peoples.

Offhand, the blueprints look disarmingly simple "You put the satellite into an orbit. You prove it's there. You do something scientific with it," Dr. Hagen says. Actually it involves a tremendous effort by hundreds of scientists,

at a cost of millions of dollars. The little moon is only the size of a bushel basket, weighs 201/2

pounds, easy enough for a woman to lift with one hand. But it must be shot to a speed that will counterbalance the earth's pull of gravity, so it swings about like a ball on the end of a string. some mysteries of magnetism . . . aid in better prediction or control Then it will stay up, in an ellipitical orbit bringing it no closer than 200 miles from earth, nor farther than 1,200 to 1,500 miles away.

"If we miss the minimum speed by one foot per second, we fail," It may turn up astounding discoveries yet undreamed of by wildest Dr. Hagen points out. "In this horse race, we must win on the nose." The ball is a thin magnesium shell, given fantastically thin coatngs on the outside of zinc, copper, silver, gold-two ounces of gold worth \$70-chronium, and aluminum. And a special outer invisible coating of silicon monoxide to help it get rid of excess heat and safeguard the delicate, insulated instruments inside.

Inside it, scientists are putting instruments to become the extensions and perfections of the senses of man in outer space. The moon will rise up enclosed in the nose of a rocket 72 feet long, weighing 10 tons. It will be three rockets, firing off in stages. The first and larger two fall away after doing their job. The

The World Almanac reports a total of 1,384 tornadoes in the U.S. from 1916 to 1929, inclusive, with a loss of 4,164 lives and \$183 million in property damage. The worst probably occurred on August 9, 1884, that ranged from Illinois south to the Gulf of Mexico, with a loss of 800 lives. In 1893, from

The number of tornadoes this year August 28 to Oct. 2, a series of tornadoes took 3,000 lives. On May 27, 1896, a tornado took 306 lives in Illinois and Missouri.

> In the U.S. there were 532 tornadoes which took 516 lives in 1953, including 113 at Waco and 10 at San Angelo, the worst loss of life of any year since be-

From 1916 to 1955, inclusive, 7,867 these destructive storms took 8,901 lives and destroyed property valued at \$827,795,095.

But the annual average of tornadoes reported is only 197 - there were only 53 in 1941, but 890 in 1955 - and the average loss of life has been 223 per year since 1916. Not until 1949 had the number of

annual blows risen above the 200 mark. and this figure has climbed steadily since that time - undoubtedly reflecting more thorough reportage. Only in 1953 had the number of killed reached or exceeded the all-time average of 223. Meantime the population has increased by the tens of millions, and the failure of the annual loss of life to climb accordingly must reflect the greater care people take to protect themselves from these awful storms.

It may also reflect to a certain extent, the system of advance warnings worked out by the Weather Bureau in cooperation with other agencies. It may also reflect, to some degree, over-active

Soviet Influence Vs. U.S. Budget

WASHINGTON - Vice President Nixon thinks that the biggest danger that confronts the free world today is not a defeat in a shooting war — he believes America can win such a war - but the infiltration and penetration by the Communists in the "uncommitted" countries, with 700,000,000 people.

Mr. Nixon, who spoke on the federal budget in Chicago on April 30 and in Hartford, Conn., on May 14, has just delivered his third punch in behalf of President Eisenhower. Having recently come back from some of the underdeveloped areas of the world, the vice president portrays vividly the situation there in relation to the security of the United States

Mr. Nixon points out that critics of the federal budget have overlooked a salient fact - that "eighty per cent of the increase is directly attributable to the higher prices the government has to pay for both material and personnel." But his most significant statement, which is a challenge as well as a disclosure of what's going on in Washington, was buched in even more pointed phrases,

Mr. Nixon contends that any cut of the defense budget below 38 billion would be a reckless and foolhardy action which on sober reflection the American people will not and should not support." He adds that the four billions to be spent in mutual security programs and economic assistance are "as essential a part of our national defense as the 38 billion dollars we spend for our Army, Navy and Air Force at home." He argues that, despite waste and mistakes, "we are getting more for our money in security for the

United States in what we are spending

abroad than we are in what we are spending at home."

The vice president predicts that the Communists will obtain a strong hold on the "uncommitted" countries unless America gets there first and wins the people to our side. The expenditure of about one billion dollars in that field, out of the four billion for foreign aid, is supported by him as a necessary risk to be taken in the "cold war" because the stakes are so important. He declares that there is "no expenditure being made by our government which is more esential to our national security than this one."

Mr. Nixon warns, moreover, that "this is no time to announce to the Communists and the world that we are tired of the struggle.'

What the vice president didn't refer to in this particular speech, but which the President has emphasized, is that the free countries have spent more than 107 billion dollars for defense against communism since the close of World War II and that the United States has furnished them with about 17 billion in assistance. This answers the argument that America is doing it all and that the other nations are not as concerned with their own defense against the Communist menace as they should be.

it is apparent that those on the attacking side have generalized that the waste in governmental operations amounts to many billions of dollars and that a tax cut of that sum can be obtained. Actually, it now appears that even the Democratic leaders are unwilling to try to pass a tax - reduction bill at this session of Congress and will not be pinned down as to whether or when they will propose one after next January.

While a tax reduction - if 'he budget were cut by as much as six billion would mean a saving to every taxpayer of about \$78, it could be at a cost later of such a weakened defense in a possible war as to wipe out overnight any such saving. For, if a global or limited war ensued, it would draw many times that amount in taxes from pocketbooks of the taxpayers, even as human lives might be lost. Randolph Burgess, Under Secretary. The demand for an investigation has

been generated in the House and Senate by Congressmen who believe the Administration's "tight money" policy is producing an inflationary price rise as a result of rising government interest rates which, in turn, bring up all interest rates. Leading the push in the Senate for an

inquiry are Senators Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma and Russell B. Long of Louisiana. They have frequently attacked the "tight money" policy, putting the blame on Humphrey, Burgess and William Mc-Chesney Martin Jr., chairman of the Federal Reserve Board. Humphrey will be the first witness, to

be followed by Martin and Burgess. It was Martin who, after a long controversy with Humphrey's predecessor at the Treasury, John W. Snyder, won the argument over the right of the Federal Reserve Board to take action independent of the Treasury. The board, Martin, insisted, must be under no compulsion to go into the market to support the price of Federal bonds and, thereby, also the government interest rate.

Largely as a result of this independent policy initiated in 1951, the interest has risen from \$5.9 billion in 1952 to an estimated \$7.2 billion in '57. Byrd, the great economizer, says gloomily that if the Treasury is forced to raise interest payments on the bulk of the debt to 3% per cent-and recent failure of the Treasury to market bonds at lower returns makes plain that the rate is steadily advancingthen the total charge to the taxpayer will go to \$10 billion annually.
