

Good yield is expected from cotton crop

The cotton that survived the cold and wet month of June may yield as much as two bales an acre, according to Jim Bradford, manager of North Gin.

Of course, a lot of farmers won't see a cotton crop this year.

"We probably lost 60 to 70 percent of the crop in June," Bradford said. "But the extremely warn weather in July and August probably helped the cotton that was left mature and catch up."

All things considered, he said, if crops were going to be lost, June was better than later in the year.

"If you lose your crop early, you don't have as much money invested in it," he said. "Farmers with insurance were probably able to recover and put in milo or some other grain."

However, the large loss of crops doesn't bode well for the cotton industry or ginners, he said, adding that they were already committed to building a new gin.

Dimmitt ISD earns state's highest rating in fiscal accountability

School District received a rating Achievement" under Texas' Schools FIRST (Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas) system. The Superior Achievement rating is the highest rating that can be achieved, demonstrating the quality of Dimmitt ISD's financial management and reporting system.

This is the first year of the FIRST Schools accountability system that was developed by the Texas Education Agency in response to Senate Bill 875 of the 76th Legislature in 1999. The primary goal of Schools FIRST is to achieve management of school Achievement," districts' financial resources, a goal made more significant due to the complexity of accounting associated with Texas' school finance system.

"We were expecting this rating," said Dimmitt ISD Superintendent Les Miller, "as it verifies that our district is not only accountable for student learning, but also for the way we manage our

Over the years the Dimmitt ISD Board of "Superior Trustees has been supportive of the fiscal management of the District and has contributed to this rating by making sound financial decisions. I can attribute much of this rating directly to our staff and to Dimmitt ISD Business Manager Vicki Eaton, who does an excellent job of assuring that our taxpayers' dollars are spent efficiently and effectively." The Schools FIRST accountability rating system assigns one of four financial accountability ratings to Texas school districts, with the highest being "Superior Achievement," followed by "Above-Standard quality performance in the Achievement," "Standard "Substandard Achievement." Districts with serious data quality problems may receive the additional rating "Suspended - Data Quality." Districts that receive the "Substandard Achievement" or "Suspended - Data Quality" ratings under the Schools FIRST must file a corrective action plan with the Texas Education Agency.





If the Horns continue to improve on offense their chances for making the playoffs will improve dramatically.







How can vacation sick and severance payments affect your social security?


If you're like most people, that vacation you took this summer was, at least in part, provided by your employer. By that I mean you probably earn a certain number of paid vacation days every year. And, as you get older and reach retirement age, those paid vacation days might have an impact on your Social Security a "special payment." benefits. Many American workers accumulate large amounts of vacation time and sick leave.

And, after you retire, you may receive some accumulated vacation or sick pay.









You might wonder if those payments count towards the earnings limit imposed on Social Security beneficiaries under their "full retirementage." Usually, they won't, if we know they are compensation for work done before you retired. However, many times we don't know this unless you tell us. We call this compensation

If you worked for wages, income received after retirement counts as a special payment if the last thing you did to earn the payment was completed before you stopped working for your employer. Besides vacation and sick pay, the most common types of special payments include bonuses, severance pay, back pay and sales commissions. If you are a Social Security beneficiary whose total yearly earnings exceed the annual limit and these earnings include a special payment, you should contact Social Security. Tell us you think you received a special payment. If we agree, we will not count the amount of the special payment as part ofyour total earnings for the year. The example below shows how a special payment is treated under Social Security rules. Mr. DeSilva retired at age 62 in January 2002 from his job at Crown Jewelry Company and began to receive Social Security benefits. A few months later, Mr. DeSilva received a check from his employer for \$12,000 for vacation and sick time he earned while he worked. Simultaneously, the jewelry company reported those "earnings" to Social Security. That report generated a letter we sent to Mr. DeSilva telling him that he was paid more Social Security benefits than he was

due, because his 2002 earnings exceeded the \$11,280 limit for that year. But Mr. DeSilva contacted us immediately and explained that the \$12,000 payment was not earnings for work done in 2002, but vacation and sick pay he accumulated before he retired. We agreed that the \$12,000 was indeed a "special payment" and cancelled the overpayment. The next example involves insurance agents. Many insurance sales people continue to receive commissions after the year they retire for policies they sold prior to retirement. Maria Juarez worked as an insurance agent for Safety Net Insurance Company. She retired at age 62 in 2002 and began to collect Social Security benefits. In July 2003, she received \$8,000 inrenewal commissions on life insurance policies she sold before retirement. In addition, she continued to work part time in 2003 as a selfemployed contractor for another insurance company. She received \$12,000 in net commissions from new policies she sold in 2003 working part time. Although her total 2003 income is \$20,000, the \$8,000 in renewal commissions will not count toward the earnings limit, because Ms. Juarez did the work to earn that amount before she retired. However, the \$12,000 will count as earningsbecause Ms. Juarez sold these policies after she began receiving Social Security benefits. And, because the \$12,000 earnings slightly exceed the \$11,520 limit for 2003, her Social Security benefits will be adjusted. We have a fact sheet that explains these provisions in more detail. 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
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

Nazareth ISD has met the new requirements, as set for under the "No Child Left Behind" legislation, according to the TEA.

"This year, the state is not releasing accreditation ratings (exemplary, recognized or acceptable)," said NISD Superintendent Marshall Harrison.

"The ratings this year are based on the passing percentage in reading/ language arts, mathematics and graduation rate."

The legislation states that a school must meet "adequate yearly progress.".

Harrison said, "This means that each year, districts must improve test scores to pass the new, rigorous federal guidelines."

The percentages for NISD are: reading/language arts, greater than 95 percent of students tested met the standard; math, greater than 95 percent of students tested met the standard; graduation rate, 100 percent of all students graduated.

"Nazareth ISD will continue to increase our expectations of our students and our teachers," Harrison said.

He also announced that the school has received a grant allocated by the U.S. Department of Education for the second year in a row.

"We received an estimated \$24,000 last year," Harrison said.

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



The Idle American

Life is full of paradoxes. (Thankfully, we are spared pair-a-BOXES; I'm not sure we could stomach two crate stowaway stories....)

Americans are good at creating great gulfs between "superstars" and us commoners. It requires more persuasion than can often be mustered to convince many "underlings" Fred Lowery (1909-1984). that "overlings" can be regular folks, too. Further, truly famous people-down deep-spend a good deal of time in their galaxies wishing, oh so often, to be regular folks again. Ah, such a paradox....

The only "superstar" I've known was

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He was arguably the finest whistler in the world for a half-century. A mainstay on the Horace Heidt network radio show after appearing regularly for years on Dallas Radio Station WFAA's "Early Birds," he provided the haunting movie theme music for John Wayne's High and the Mighty. He also and whistled his happy tune weekly on the "Andy Griffith Show."

He appeared with show business stars like Bing Crosby and Bob Hope; Bing called him "king of the whistlers." Lowery, blind since a toddler, wanted no pity, no advantage and no "superstar" status.... He once challenged Hope to a golf game, and it was accepted. "We'll play at 12 midnight," Lowery insisted....

I knew him during the final two decades of his life. There was no pretense about him. More than anything, he was an encourager who happened to be a whistler. He whistled for royalty, presidents, major athletic events and in big coliseums-you name it. He appeared before more than 10,000 audiences--mostly at schools, churches, civic clubs, hospitals, retirement

years, was "behind the wheel" (mostly motor homes; they owned six of them), driving Fred to the next engagement. For four decades, she drove some two million miles (many career truckers don't make it that far), without so much as a dented fender or a moving traffic violation. Oh, they survived a fire in one motor home, and another was heavily damaged when an Illinois tornado leveled buildings all around....

Planes/trains/motor homes--it was always "life in a hurry" for the Lowerys. "Many promises to keep and miles to go before we sleep" fit them to a "T." One time, back in 1956, they were hurrying from Ohio down to Nashville. Fred, already a respected artist on Decca Records, had a studio date there to record another collection of tunes. It was to be in the afternoon, but they arrived early and ate breakfast near the studio.

"We got to hear an affable young man sing, but

he was so nervous," Gracie remembers. She said he was there for hours, doing take after take. "Fred was right there, trying to help him relax," Gracie added.

The session paid off for the 24-year-old son of an Arkansas farmer. The song? "I Walk the Line." The composer and vocalist? Johnny Cash. (It became the #1 song on country charts, and ranks 26th among country hits of all time.) His career was off and running. The "man in black" is one of the few vocalists in history to sell more than 50 million records.

The rest, of course, is history. The country music icon experienced some rocky interludes, but received all the top awards, time and again. In failing health for several years and widowed when his beloved wife, June Carter Cash died some four months ago, he is dead at age 71. Those who knew him best say he never lost "the common touch...."

In 1964, a presidential

inauguration was planned for the new Sul Ross State University president. We had \$75 for a musician, and noticed that the Lowerys were appearing nearby in Fort Stockton the night before.... Fred thrilled the Alpine, Texas, audience, and our friendship was "nailed down." During the next two decades, he and Gracie were guests in our home during stints in Fort Worth and Snyder, and again, he starred-never losing "the common touch."

Fred brightened places wherever he appeared. He yearned to be thought of as "an average, sighted 'Joe." One night, we made hamburgers in the backyard. "Does Fred prefer mustard or mayonnaise?" I asked Gracie. "Ask me," he insisted, "I'm blind-not deaf!"

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

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
