

Europe, U. S. In Economic Boom As Uncertainty Clouds Red Areas

Editor's Note: What's the mid-1957 state of the world in terms of human well-being and international temper? The question was put to correspondents of the Associated Press at strategic points around the globe. In synopsis form, here are their answers.

GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, July 5. (AP) — Prosperity's bright face is expected to grace Britain in the months ahead.

Prime Minister Harold Macmillan projects a personality full of optimism. The humiliations of Suez appear forgotten. International tensions seem less severe.

The nation's financial position is brighter than it was six months ago. In May Britain exported more than 840 million dollars worth of goods — a record. The vital gold and dollar reserves that finance the sterling area's trade with the dollar world have risen every month this year but January. They stand now at about \$2,345,000,000.

Internationally the British intend to remain the chief overseas ally of the United States. But they seem to be talking back to Washington more. Despite U. S. regrets, Britain decided to trade with Red China on the same basis as with the Soviet Union.

Britain has exploded its own hydrogen bombs. The disarmament talks in London have produced a mild strain on British-American relations, but there is hope here of some concrete accomplishments. And to the average Briton the Soviet Union presents a less harsh face.

FRANCE

PARIS, July 5. (AP) — France at midyear is in a government financial crisis. But farms, factories and mines are producing as never before.

With a half-million men fighting a bitter war in Algeria, the country is paying only the most superficial attention to such problems as H-bomb tests.

France is unlikely to collapse in ruin. The economy is fundamentally too rich for that. But governmental and social problems seem destined to remain grave for years to come.

The battle to hold Algeria — indecisive after more than 2½ years — is draining away a billion dollars a year that might better go into housing, modernization of industrial plants, and balancing of the budget.

Every cut in American economic and military aid makes France wince. But French anger rises to boiling point at any suggestion that American economic or military aid in North Africa might be used to displace French influence there.

CENTRAL EUROPE

BERLIN, July 5. (AP) — Central Europe in mid-1957 hopes some limited agreement on disarmament may come soon between the West and the Communist world.

But there is little expectation of imminent full disarmament and "peace in our time." That can't be achieved until Germany is reunified. And Nikita Khrushchev said only recently there are two Germanys "and any realistic person must recognize this fact."

Economically West Germany rocks along on the crest of the postwar prosperity wave of the postwar era.

Neighboring Austria is enjoying a boom. It looks to the West and particularly the United States for leadership, but is trying to gain experience in a role as mediator. It will continue to provide asylum to all refugees from behind the Iron Curtain.

Yugoslavia believes gradual disarmament may be in the offing, but President Tito has made plain he intends to stay clear of deep involvement with either Russia or the United States. He hopes for economic aid from both sides.

SOVIET UNION

MOSCOW, July 5. (AP) — The Soviet Union has moved ahead substantially in the arena of world politics during the first half of 1957.

By adroit maneuvers the Russians have focused the spotlight on the banning of nuclear tests as a step toward disarmament. Considerable support of the Soviet position apparently has developed, even in the United States. The political position of the Kremlin appears stronger and more aggressive than it was Jan. 1.

Some obstacles block efforts of the Soviet Union to resume increased cultural, economic and political relations outside the Soviet bloc. But from this observation point it appears that some of the bitterness facing as Nikita Khrushchev and others strive to shift emphasis to issues more favorable to them, such as the nuclear test ban.

The economic shakeup that began early this year is still the big question mark. Decentralization has been progressing with moderate speed but its effect on boosting production probably won't be known for a considerable period. The present emphasis is on agricultural and meat production with Khrushchev cracking the whip for a speedup to bring the Soviet Union up to the production rate of the United States by 1960.

Rifts with other Communist nations appear less serious than six months ago, particularly in con-

nection with the situation in Poland and Yugoslavia.

MIDDLE EAST

BEIRUT, July 5. (AP) — The Middle East at midyear appears to be polarizing into two camps.

One is open to friendship with the West, or at least is suspicious in the extreme of Russia. With some exceptions it is prosperous. The other is suspicious of the West, it is not pro-Communist but professes friendship with the Soviet Union. It is economically troubled.

In the first camp are Lebanon, Iraq, Saudi Arabia and Jordan. Standing aloofly in the second camp — in increasing isolation — are Egypt, whose President Gamal Abdel Nasser is a rallying point of Arab nationalism, leftist Syria and medieval Yemen.

Oil has made Iraq and Saudi Arabia rich by Middle Eastern standards. Iraq, the only Arab nation belonging to the anti-Communist Baghdad Pact, is booming. Saudi Arabia, hit hard by the closing of the Suez Canal, again is enjoying royalties. Lebanon has no oil but it has tourists and smart businessmen. Jordan remains poor depending on subsidies to keep alive.

INDIA

NEW DELHI, July 5. (AP) — A

general feeling of optimism and confidence exists at midyear among Indian businessmen and the public in general in this economically underdeveloped nation of 380 million.

This is true despite a shortage of foreign exchange. Production of iron, steel, cotton, sugar, textiles and cement is increasing. The wheat harvest last spring was the heaviest in history.

Prices, however, continue to rise. Russian prestige is still suffering from the invasion of Hungary, but this did not prevent the Communists from making strong gains in the last election.

RED CHINA

HONG KONG, July 5. (AP) — Communist China's already harassed peasantry is being urged to tighten belts and knuckle down to avert famine.

Floods, a disastrous typhoon, drought and other natural calamities last year have resulted in a critical shortage of foodstuffs.

In the face of this Mao Tse-tung is banking heavily on a bumper harvest and has postponed plans for additional expansion of heavy industry. He will concentrate on a proportional development of agriculture and light

industry, though heavy industry still will have priority.

China needs a long period of peace. Mao's regime follows to the letter the Soviet lead on issues such as disarmament and nuclear tests.

Red China remains hostile toward the United States. But should American correspondents be permitted to enter China and the lifting of Western trade embargoes became general there might be a period of greater relaxation of tensions, similar to those experienced with Soviet relations.

JAPAN-KOREA

TOKYO, July 5. (AP) — At Mid-year Japan and Korea face futures clouded by uncertainty. Each looks to the United States for solutions to problems in which the United States also has a vital stake.

Japan is riding the crest of a business boom but is on the brink of trouble. Foreign exchange needed to buy raw materials for humming factories and food for a burgeoning population is almost gone. Imports outstripped exports by more than 100 million dollars last month.

The only answer is a sharp increase in exports. Topping the agenda for Prime Minister Kishi's conferences in Washington with President Eisenhower was an elab-

orate Southeast Asia development plan for combining American dollars with Japanese industrial output and technical know-how.

LATIN AMERICA

BUENOS AIRES, July 5. (AP) — Two crucial issues — revolt and inflation — preoccupy Latin Americans at midyear.

They overshadow international problems. Latin Americans believe the danger of war has decreased after the Middle East and Hungarian crises. Latin Americans are more worried about their own political and economic troubles than nuclear tests or disarmament.

The big stories are the struggles in Haiti and Cuba, the ouster of dictator Rojas Ciniilla from Colombia and the ups and downs of the Aramburu regime in Argentina.

In Mexico the thinking is more concerned with domestic problems than weighty world affairs. Mexico is enjoying a rapidly expanding economy but poverty is still evident in parts of the country. The dollar reserve is well over the 400 million mark, crops have been good and industry growing. Tourist trade is brisk.

In general, the Latin lands feel they are "coming of age" and look to the United States for aid in pushing industrial expansion both through government and private assistance.

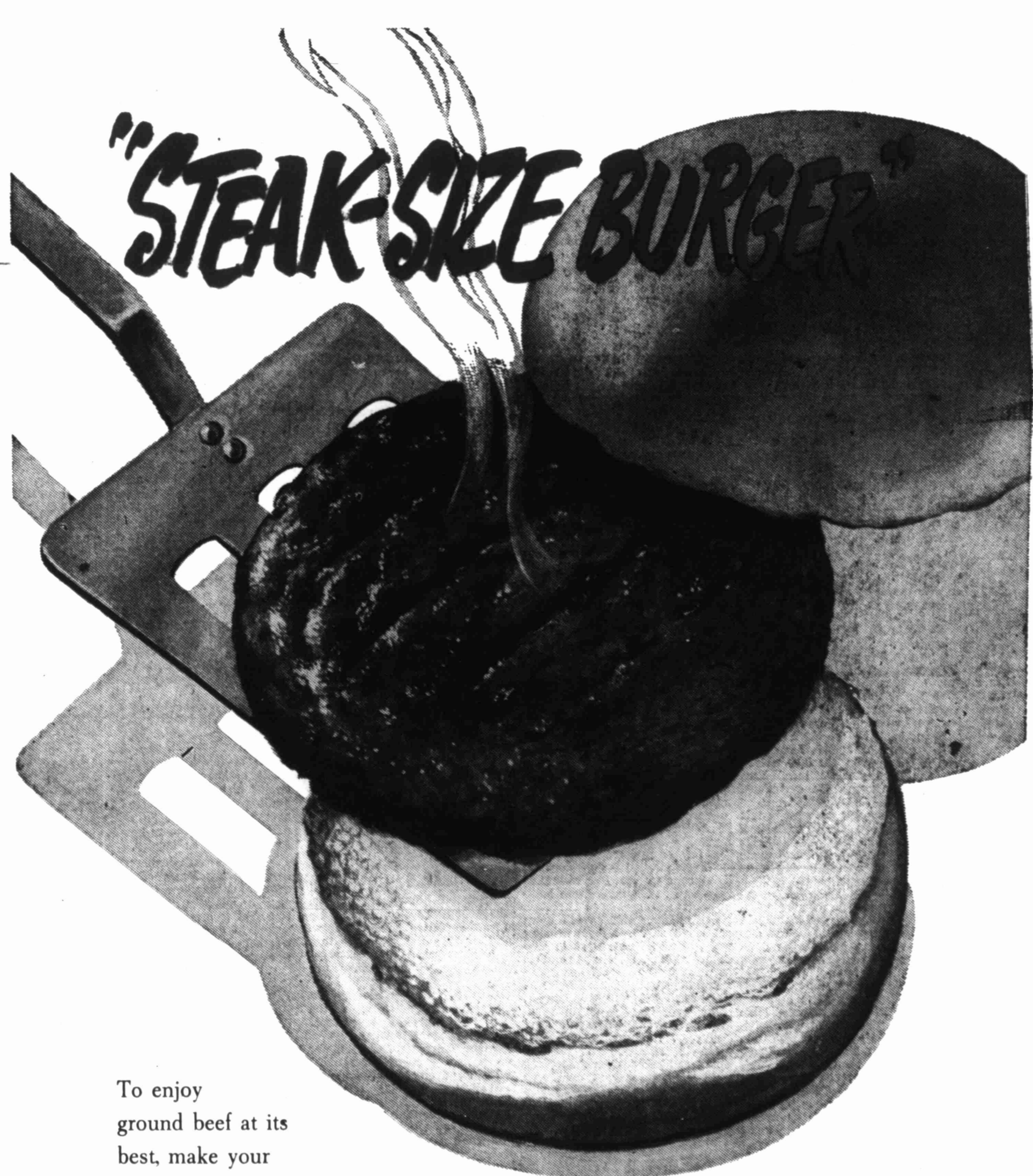

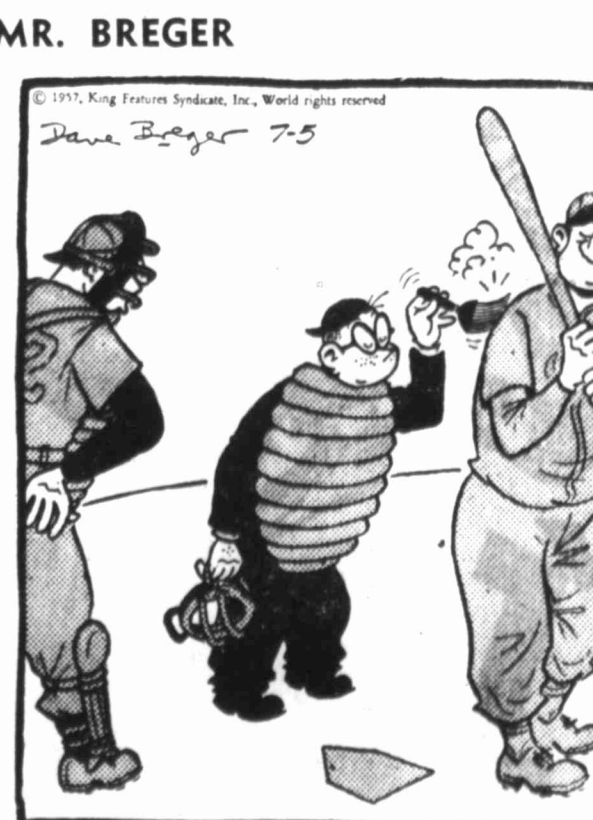

Late Gardeners Can Still Have Flowers

Now we have the knowledge with which this fear can be eliminated. After years and years of painstaking research the polio vaccine was finally discovered by Dr. Jonas Salk. It was first introduced in April, 1955.

The vaccine has been proved effective. In 1956 the incidence of paralytic polio was vastly lower among those who had been vaccinated than among those who had not.

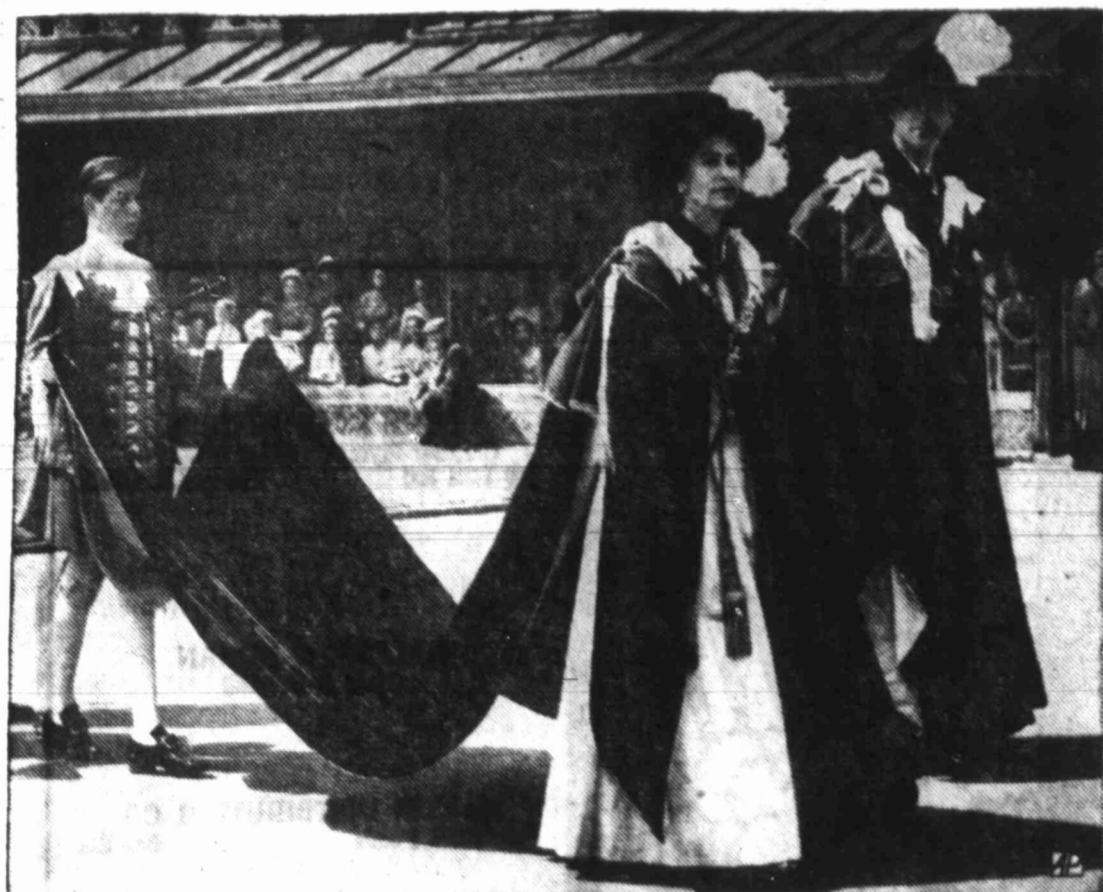

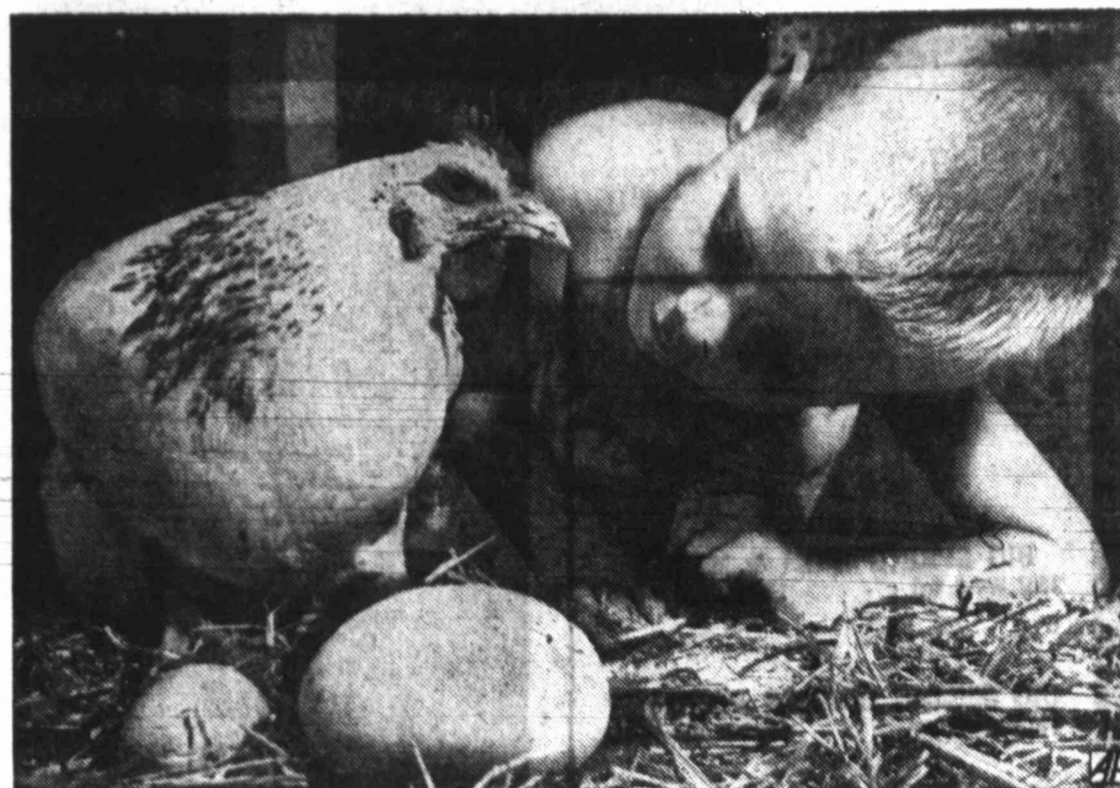

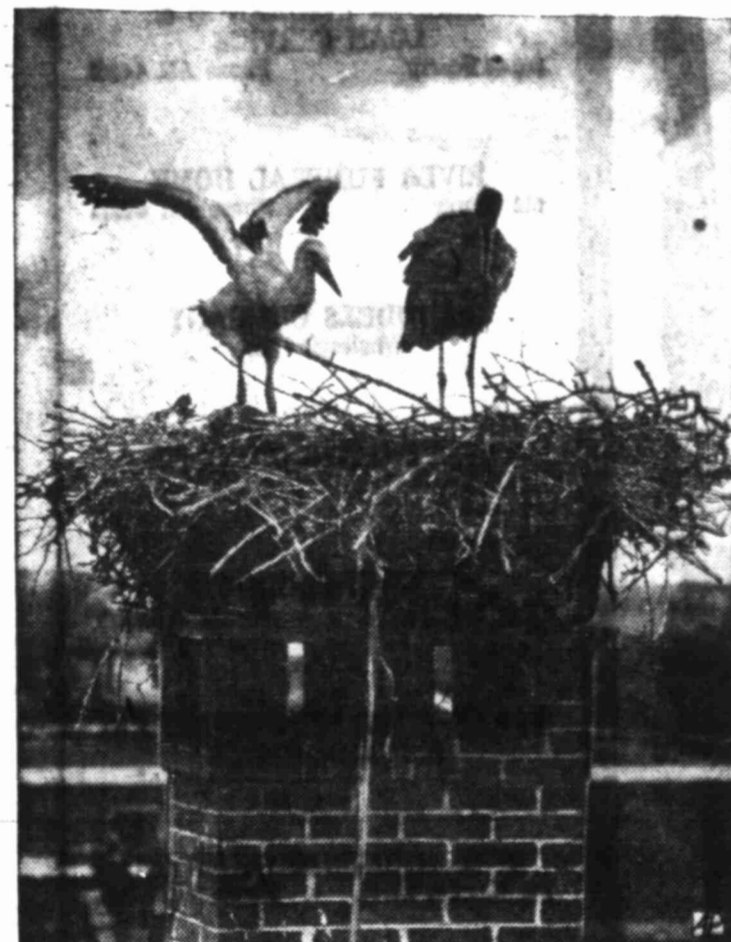

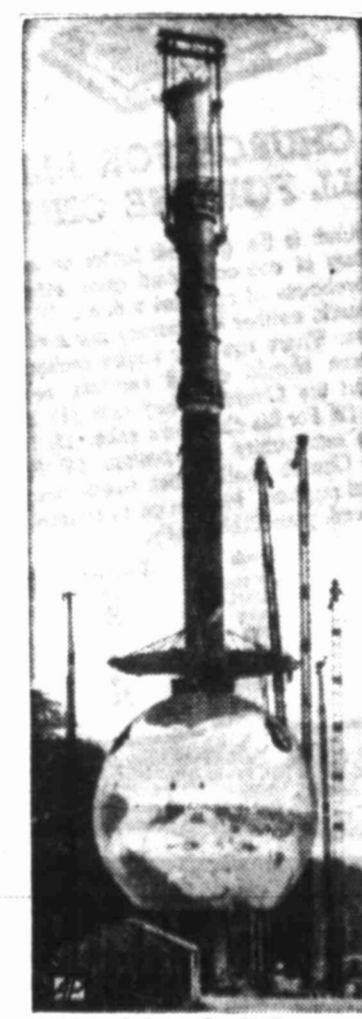

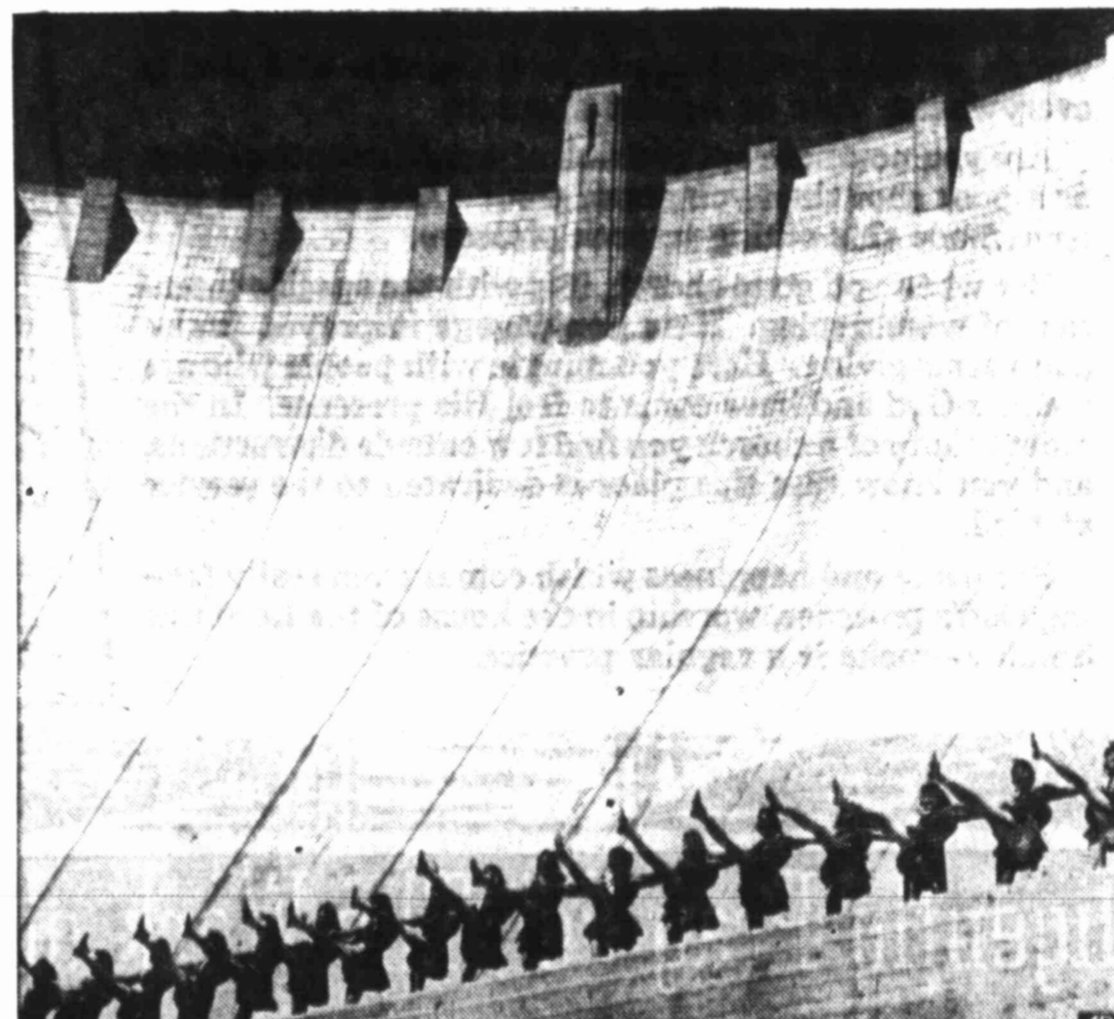

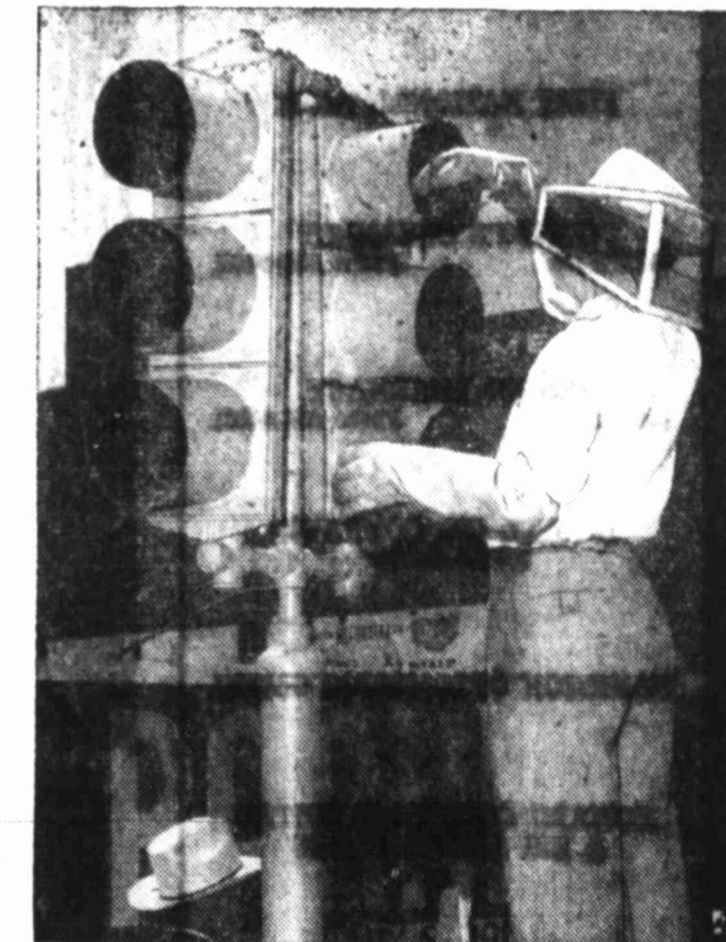
