

Marking "the beginning of a new era in Naval weapons," the United States Navy fired a captured German V-2 rocket from the flight deck of the 45,000 ton aircraft carrier USS Midway on September 6, 1947. This was the first time in history such a bombardment rocket has been launched from ships or a moving platform. The primary purpose of the experiment, held at sea several hundred miles off the East Coast of the United States, was to ascertain if large bombardment rockets could be fired off modern aircraft carriers without modifications affecting flight operations. A simple valance adds a decorative touch and prevents drafts and heat loss at the top of the windows. Tests by the Armour Research Foundation of Chicago show that the blinds can save enough in fuel costs to pay for themselves during their long term of usefulness. An air space is formed between closed slats of the blind and window glass that prevents drafts from entering the room and interior heat from escaping. 
Mr. and Mrs. Horace Baird and Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Ramey re-
